# British Losses Surprisingly Light

(British Official Wireless.) (Received August 25, 9.10 p.m.) RUGBY, Aug. 25.

"The Times," discussing the enemy's air tactics, suggests that the Battle of Britain has entered on the second phase.
"The first phase has ended," says "The Times." "It consisted of a very heavy air offensive lasting about a week. The result is not in doubt, but it is possible that we do not even now realise the extent of the victory. That victory was won by the Fighter Command, well supported by anti-aircraft batteries, searchlights, balloon barrages, counter-action by bombers, and the A.R.P. services.

"Some not inconsiderable loss of life and destruction of property was suffered by the defence and some military damage also was done, though it was nothing serious. Even where the most devastation has been wrought it is the absence of it rather than its extent that is surprising. Even in southeastern ports and seaside towns, which the enemy bombers could reach within a few minutes of rising from their aerodromes, neutral observers who have been allowed to go where they would and see what they would have been astonished to discover how small has been the damage.

An Admiralty communique states that when the trawler Arctic Trapper was attacked by enemy aircraft this afternoon she shot down two enemy bombers into the sea and probably damaged two others. The trawler was machine-gunned

by enemy fighters which were escorting a force of German bombers. The first shell burst between two enemy bombers and it is probable that the aircraft received damage; the second shell scored a direct hit on another bomber, which was seen to turn over and come down in the sea.

There were no casualties in the Arctic Trapper.

RUGBY, Aug. 24. Aerodromes in the occupied territories of France from which German fighter and bomber squadrons have been operating against Britain were the chief objectives in last night's raids by aircraft of the R.A.F. Bomber Command. The attacks were distributed over a wide area and were carried out by both heavy and medium bombers. Villa Coublay, a large military air base on the outskirts of Paris, was raided in the early hours of the morning and bombs dropped in a lowlevel attack were seen to burst across the aerodrome. Parachute flares released to illuminate the target set fire to a wood

on the east side of the landing ground.

Raiders operating nearly 250 miles away over South
Brittany bombed aerodromes at Vannes, St. Brieuc, Rennes,
Dinard, Lanveoc, Poulmic, and Guipavas, an important air

base north of Brest. In Normandy great fires visible for many miles were started on aerodromes at Lisieux and Caen.

In northern France two aerodromes, St. Omer and Merville, which formerly served as bases for R.A.F. fighter units in France, were attacked and a fire started on the edge of the St. Omer landing ground was followed a few minutes later by two heavy explosions.

# LONDON GUNS Screaming Bombs Fall On London

THREE ALARMS SOUNDED

Running Fights With Nazis At Height Of Five Miles

# CHASE ACROSS CHANNEL

(United Press Association-Copyright.) (Received August 25, 10.5 p.m.) LONDON, Aug. 25.

Screaming bombs were dropped within the London area on Saturday, and a huge, vivid red glow appeared in the sky a few minutes later, but the buses were still running. One bomb was heard to explode in a densely packed area of London. Londoners generally continued going about their business calmly, and buses, trams and trains carried on.

Shortly before the third warning two sudden bursts of anti-aircraft fire excited home-going theatre crowds in the London area. Searchlights were sweeping the sky in all directions and the hum of a 'plane could be heard, then there were sounds of explosions.

The German Air Force had raided a south and south-east England repeatedly since early on Saturday morning. Until mid-afternoon the attacks were concentrated on aerodromes in east Kent; then large numbers of German bombers were flung into two new mass raids. While some of them were attacking aerodromes almost up to the outskirts of London, others were raiding the Portsmouth area. There were 80 German aircraft in the first wave, which began at 7.45 a.m. and lasted until 9 a.m. Before 10 o'clock the second wave of attacks had started. Formations of Dornier and Junkers, each of 30 or 40 bombers, followed one after another over Kent, German fighters flying high above them. The sky was cloudless. During the second wave of raids above east Kent; then large numbers were land another climbed to attack some 30 German fighters flying nearly five miles high. In the clear air at this great height, while each pilot inhaled from his oxygen apparatus, a series of dog-fights began. Two Messerschmitt 109-110 went down and the Spitfire squadron chased one Messerschmitt into the sea off Cap Gris Nez.

Into Sea In Flames

Over Ramsgate a Hurricane squadron destroyed three Junkers 88 bombers and a Messerschmitt 109. One of the pilots, a Polish sergeant, made a German bomber burst into flames and fall into the sea, then he sent a German fighter crashing after it.

A squadron of Defiants encountered 20 Junkers 88's, followed by Heinkel 113 fighters. The Defiants tacked the enemy at 3000 feet. The Junkers at once went into a steep dive, and the Defiants, diving after them, chased the enemy out to sea, bringing down three Junkers and one of the Heinkel fighters before the rest disappeared.

As a result of the day's engagements 10 British fighters are missing, but the pilot of one is safe.

There has been a change in the tactics of the Nazi air war on Britain which may prove only temporary, but it is quite obvious, and there is some speculation in the Press as to its significance, says a British Official Wireless message. In place of the mass daylight raids there have been a series of hitandrun attacks by aircraft singly or in small numbers. These tactics were continued on Friday night and Saturday morning. Reports on Saturday morning's activities received up to 11 a.m. show that enemy aircraft dropped bombs on a town on the coast of East Anglia, where damage was done to some houses and a small number of casualties was caused. 

logists unearthed an Egyptian tomb, 5000 years old, they found a jar of honey in perfect condi-tion. It is the formic acid from the bee itself which acts as an antiseptic and a preservative, and for this reason honey is highly effective in cleaning wounds; it soothes pain, has-tens healing, and even in healthy skins is an excellent skin tonic.

Honey is a predigested sugar, incidentally the sweetest sugar occuring in Nature—for this reason it is quickly and easily assimilated by the system and is an ideal heart tonic or a perfect food for invalids or those of week digestion. those of weak digestion.

In replacing sugar by honey in cooking it is well to remember that it differs in its chemical composition from ordinary sugar; honey is not only a group of different sugars, but it contains moisture and a slight degree of acidity. For this reason the liquid normally used in cake recipes should be slightly reduced when part of the sugar is replaced by honey, and always use t teaspoonful of carbonate of soda to each

of carbonate of soda to each cup of honey.
In rich fruit cakes honey can be used exclusively with excellent results, both as to flavour and keeping qualities. If the honey is granulated always heat very gently over hot water until liquid.

Colonial Mutual's Block An Imposing Edifice **ULTRA-MODERN DESIGN** 

The latest acquisition to Hastings in the form of important buildings is the new block which has just been completed at the corner of Russell Street and Eastbourne Street for the Colonial Mutual Life Assurance Society, Ltd. As the building

faces extensive open spaces on both fronts and is clearly seen from a considerable distance in all directions, it has already become a prominent landmark in the town.

While many of the newer buildings of Hastings are characterised by modern exterior treatment and extensive use of colour, this building is particularly noticeable for its exterior finish and the manner in which a number of different exterior finish, and the manner in which a number of different colours are harmoniously blended gives an effect which is entirely new to this district.

# UNCONSIDERED TRIFLES

The worst of the proverb about keeping a thing for seven years on the assumption that some use will eventually be found for it, is that the thing concerned may be kept for seventy years without any use being found for it. In every home there are certain little or large "glory-holes" where this, that, and the other have been put aside for future use on the basis that "you never can tell." To the "magpie" householder it is now being said that the country's war requirements demand a careful turning-over of the innermost recesses of the dusty hiding places where material may have been lying forgotten for years-material that may now be used to speed along the day of our ultimate victory.

Thousands of people in the Dominion, only too conscious of their inability to perform the kind of service being rendered by others who are younger, fitter, or wealthier, have nevertheless felt the urge to do something within their power. The chance is here and now. An appeal is made in this issue of the "Daily Mail" to-day for the salvage of the unconsidered trifles which have accumulated during the years in odd drawers, cupboards, cellars, and outhouses. The individual contribution may be small, but the national aggregate will reach to surprising proportions. The details are clearly set out in the advertisement this morning, and they should be studied by those who can provide the material asked for. Attention should be paid particularly to the kind of contribution that is not wanted in the meantime.

Even although this national appeal gives a chance to many to carry out some long overdue "spring-cleanings," discretion must be exercised so that the authorities will not be embarrassed instead of being helped by the zeal of the public to contribute. There can be no doubt about the response that will be forthcoming to the appeal, but zeal must not run away with discretion. The fossicker among the suburban vaults and archives must use his imagination as he classifies the various contributions as they come to light.

The general idea is that these miscellaneous collections of disregarded so-called "junk" will be classified, treated, and sold, the profits in all cases going to the aid of the patriotic funds. If every householder will act conscientiously and thoroughly without delay, the cumulative effect of individual contributions will amount to a considerable sum. It will be a pity if anyone presupposes that in his case he can do nothing in such an effort. It is a safe guess that even in the smallest "bach" in the country there is something of value lying around which fits into the categories of the supplies asked for by the National Council for the Reclamation of Waste Material. In this national service there are few who cannot help in any way, and it may be stressed that the more the individual can assist to classify the material according to the published instructions, the more smoothly will the whole system of collection and distribution work to the end that the effect of the scheme may be realised as speedily as possible.

Besides affording definite assistance to the war effort, the diligent collection of what has been hitherto regarded as waste material will serve to impress upon the mind of the general public that we are all in this war and that there is a job for everyone. In many ways we are still much too much aloof (in our minds) from the struggle going on in Europe. This very appeal should pull us up short to a realisation of our duty.

As it is pointed out in the appeal announcement, we are exercising our initiative when we respond to the request. Were we living in Nazi Germany there would be no "please and thank you" about it. The command would thunder from totalitarian headquarters and we would disobey at our peril. Let us, therefore, who are proud of our democratic system, let it be seen just what can be done by wholehearted and enthusiastic co-operation. In the case of those whose time is fully occupied or who are aged or not fit to do their own work of research, there are all kinds of youth organisations which would be willing to help.

# Same Prices From Old Country But Greater Quantities Will Be Taken

WELLINGTON, Aug. 25. New contracts to replace last year's agreements with the United Kingdom for the sale of New Zealand butter and cheese covering the Dominion's exportable surplus for the current production season were announced last night by the

The prices for the 1940-41 season's output are to be the same as last year's, but the new contracts cover the sale of greater quantities both of butter and cheese.

The United Kingdom Government has agreed to take this season 120,000 tons of butter and 107,000 tons of cheese, as compared with 115,000 tons of butter and 84,000 tons of

In addition, though it is not embodied in the agreement, an understanding has been reached that the general arrangements for the purchase of New Zealand dairy produce will continue for the duration of the war and a subsequent period to be agreed on, and that though specific quantities are named, the Ministry of Food will take, as nearly as possible,

the maximum surplus production of the country.

# No Reply To Representations Made To Minister Of Marketing

By Telegraph—Press Association WELLINGTON, Aug. 25.

"Because of the increases in costs which have occurred recently, particularly the 5 per cent. cost of living bonus recently granted by the Arbitration Court, the Dairy Industry Council, on behalf of dairy farmers, is asking Mr Nash to say that the guaranteed price for dairy produce will be increased forthwith," said the chairman of the council (Mr W. E. Hale) in a statement to-night.

"The Dairy Industry Council, when it met last June, gave consideration to the guaranteed price and pointed out to Mr Nash that, despite the increases in costs which had occurred since the present price was fixed in 1938, the council wished to avoid asking for any increase in the price. It then intimated its willingness to meet representatives of the Government and those who would be affected by the policy which aimed at arresting rises in costs.

'No reply has been received to that letter. At its meeting last Thursday, the council expressed regret that this was the case. It agreed to a suggestion which had been made verbally by the Minister that there should be a conference of Government producers, the Manufacturers' Federation, and the Labour Civil Service organisation, with a view to exploring the possibility of a 'stay-put' in wages and of a standardising of costs, but could not agree that such a conference disposed of the question of the guaranteed price for the current season.'

Thursday's meeting also decided that a Dominion dairy conference should be called in the near future.


