Wide Area Covered By Raiders In Britain

LONDON AREA IS AGAIN A TARGET

Boy And Girl Killed

(United Press Association-Copyright.) (Received August 29, 1.20 a.m.) LONDON, Aug. 28.

It is officially stated that enemy activity during the night consisted of a number of dispersed indiscriminate bombing attacks on many districts, including the London areas. In south-east and northern England towns house property was damaged, the casualties including some killed.

The damage was slightest in the London area, and there were no casualties. Attacks elsewhere caused only slight damage, but there were some casualties. An enemy bomber was brought down by anti-aircraft fire shortly before mid-

Enemy raiders were reported last night from two Scottish areas, three towns in Wales, two in the south-west, eight in the south-east of England, seven in the Midlands, and three in the north-east. Compared with the previous night's activity, last night's raid periods in the metropolitan area were uneventful.

An incendiary bomb crashed through the roof of a large building in one London district, but firemen promptly dealt

One area in south-eastern England had its longest and most exciting night raid, which lasted intermittently for several hours. Many incendiaries were dropped and a big fire lit up towns for miles, but firemen controlled the flames within an hour.

An enemy 'plane is believed to have been shot down in the southwest England area early this morning. Coast watchers saw it plunge into the sea following heavy anti-aircraft fire.

The second raid over London lasted for 40 minutes. A single 'plane approached the London area and dropped incendiary bombs. Most of them fell on waste ground, but others caused fires which were quickly extinguished.

Three towns in Wales, two in south-west England, five in south-east England, and six in the Midlands report that raiders were over.

The sirens were again sounded in London after the "all clear" had been heard following the first raid.

An Air Ministry and Ministry of Home Security communique issued at 3.25 p.m. stated that enemy air activity had been very slight during tae day. > Nazi Industrial Plants Are Targets For British **Bombers**

HEAVY DAMAGE CAUSED

(British Official Wireless.) (Received August 28, 7.30 p.m.)

RUGBY, Aug. 27.

An Air Ministry bulletin states that they are maintaining their systematic attacks on industrial targets in Germany and at the same time are harassing many enemy-occupied aero-dromes in France and Holland which are serving as bases of

operation against Britain.

A large force of R.A.F. bombers on Monday night attacked military objectives ranging from Leipzig through the Ruhr and down Normandy and Brittany. One of the main objectives in Germany was the I. G. Farben industry at Leuna, which suffered heavy damage during a raid carried out by the R.A.F. on the night of August 16. The works, one of the largest chemical plants in the world, are situated some 20 miles west of Leipzig and produce annually 400,000 tons of motor fuel.

One aircraft dropped several bombs right across the target. At least two were seen to fall on the main buildings in the middle of the raid. One attacker scored further hits on the main buildings, and the rear gunner later reported having seen a large explosion soon after leaving the scene.

GREYMOUTH, Aug. 28. 



Soaring Values For Fat Cattle Yesterday ·

STORTFORD LODGE SALE

A particularly short yarding of only 96 head in the fat cattle section at Stortford Lodge yesterday resulted in another dear market with prices frequently topping the £2 a 100 quotation. Comparatively few good quality pens were on offer, much of the entry comprising indifferent sorts which in normal circumstances would attract little attention. On a quality basis, however, yesterday's rates represented some of the season's peak values, with prices soaring for all entries at all prime.



"The Governor of the Chad territory, French Equatorial Africa, announced yesterday that the territory refused to accept France's capitulation and will fight on the side of Britain," said General de Gaulle, leader of the free French forces, in a broadcast to-day. "Colonel Marchand commanding the troops in the Chad territory, also signed this declaration."

General de Gaulle declared: "Th General de Gaulle declared: "The decision of the Chad territory is the signal for the rising of the whole French Empire. I have reason to believe that the Chad territory's example will be followed. I have reason to state that combatant France is being reconstructed and that her forces will increase. France by remaining present in the battle, will be present at the victory."

Are Not Fascists

Most of these Italians have been long settled in Egypt, many for generations. They are not anxious to die, or even to do, for Fascism.

Certain alterations to the seed wheat certification scheme of the Department of Agriculture for the ensuing year were announced by the Minister of Agriculture (the Hon. W. Lee Martin) who said that he had decided with regret to modify the seed wheat certification scheme so that there would be no hindrance to the efficient production of linen flax.
