MR CHURCHILL SEES BATTLE AT RAMSGATE

Seven Nazis Crash

(United Press Association-Copyright.) (Received August 29, 11.55 p.m.)

LONDON, Aug. 29. Spitfires and Hurricanes three times on Wednesday broke up and routed strong enemy formations—the first, at 8.30 a.m., over the Kentish coast, consisting of 100 bombers and fighters; the second, at midday, over the Thames Estuary, consisting of 120 bombers and fighters; and the third, at 5 p.m., over the south-east coast, consisting of over 100 Messerschmitts, which dived for the clouds immediately they sighted the British fighters, who shot down at least ten.

Mr Winston Churchill, when inspecting air raid damage at Ramsgate and other parts of the south-east coast, saw seven 'planes shot down in one of the fiercest air battles of the war. One 'plane plunged flaming into the ground several miles away. Mr Churchill drove to the spot and tracked down the Messerschmitt in a field. An officer was already guarding the wreck.

"Is it one of theirs or ours?" Mr Churchill asked, the officer replying: "One of theirs."

A bomb damaged the water-main in a south-western town, and the water supply was interrupted. A number of houses and industrial property were damaged in a Midlands town, where casualties resulted, some being fatal.

Bombs were also dropped on a number of north-east and northwest towns, where industrial property, houses and other buildings were damaged. The casualties from all these towns were not numerous, but they include some deaths.







MAINLY ABOUT THE DAILY MAIL

The Hawke's Bay Daily Mail has changed hands and this is the first issue by the new proprietors.

It is not easy to found a daily newspaper and to build it up into a successful commercial enterprise. Capital may be forthcoming and the field may be open, but unless the proprietors are thoroughly experienced in the details of newspaper production they are sure to encounter all kinds of unforeseen difficulties which lead to frustrated hopes and monetary loss.

Few newspapers make profits in their early years and it often happens, as in the case of the Daily Mail, that the original proprietors get tired and decide to let someone else build on the foundations that have proved so expensive to lay down.

To their great credit, it can be said of the founders of the Daily Mail, that they did not concern themselves very much with the prospect of receiving dividends on the capital invested in their paper. They felt that a great and prosperous district like Hawke's Bay required a representative morning journal. The province was already provided with several evening papers, but there must be few persons indeed, who do not prefer to start rather than end the day with the news of the world they live in, and unquestionably, a morning paper was called for.

For two and a half years, the Daily Mail has given Hawke's Bay a newspaper that compares more than favourably with any other published outside the four largest cities. Its presentation of news has been modern and comprehensive, and it has set a standard in newspaper illustration that puts it in the metropolitan class. On public questions it has endeavoured to avoid extreme partisanship and has won a reputation for the fairness of its views and comments that commends itself to a very wide circle of readers.

It is a pity, therefore, that the financial results were not more encouraging, and it was doubly unfortunate that before the paper could turn the corner, the war brought a crop of difficulties and anxieties to newspaper proprietors generally. These are chiefly concerned with increasing costs of newsprint and the dislocation of the import trade which has affected advertising revenue.

The new proprietors are taking over in the full knowledge that the times are exceptionally difficult, but they have confidence in the future, in the outcome of the war, and in their ability to command the measure of support essential to the establishment of the Daily Mail on a sound financial basis. The Editor and his staff will spare no effort to produce, with the means at their disposal, a firstclass newspaper, which will be devoted, first and last, to the advancement of the interests of the province and of the Dominion.

Politically, the Daily Mail will be independent. It will have no party affiliations, and will endeavour to discuss public questions and legislative projects solely in the light of reason and common sense. No political party has a monopoly of wisdom, and the Daily Mail will always be prepared to give public men the credit for being imbued with a perfectly sincere desire to do what they consider is best for the country they serve in a public capacity. The Daily Mail will proceed on the assumption that its readers prefer information to guidance, and that they are quite capable of deciding for themselves between political candidates. The columns of the paper will always be open to anyone who has something to say and who can say it in a manner that will interest our readers. We are not very much enamoured of anonymous letters and prefer to print the views of contributors who are prepared to put their names to what they write, but we recognise that there are occasions when this might preclude the expression of opinions that would be

Finally, we do not think it is altogether out of place if we express the thanks of our readers and the people of Hawke's Bay to those who provided the means of starting the Daily Mail, and trust that future developments will show how abundantly the original project was justified. An announcement that the schedules of amounts due to territorials for travelling expenses had been received by district headquarters from the territorial units concerned, and that these were at present being checked preparatory to payment being effected, was made by the Minister of Defence (the Hon. F. Jones) when the House of Representatives met at 2.30 p.m. to-day.

In reply to an urgent question by Mr H. S. S. Kyle (Riccarton), the Minister added that he had given instruction to expedite the payment of the amounts due.

Replying to another question by Mr Kyle concerning the payment of the Social Security charge by territorials, Mr Jones said that the Social Security charge of 5 per cent. on military pay received by members of the territorial force called up for special training, and that received by members of the Home Defence and expeditionary forces, was being paid by the Government.

An appeal for some relaxation in the present petrol restrictions was made by Mr A. E. Jull (Waipawa) in an urgent question to the Minister of Finance (the Hon. W. Nash). Mr Jull asked the Government for a definite statement concerning the possibility of easing the restrictions even to the extent of 1,000,000 gallons a month, and stated

even to the extent of 1,000,000 gallons a month, and stated that as a result of the restrictions thousands of motor trade employees had already lost their means of livelihood, and that there was every prospect of still further unemployment.

Replying, Mr Nash said that the reason for the restriction in the first place was the imperative necessity for building up reserves for our own defence purposes. The second point was the necessity for conserving dollar exchange from the United Kingdom's point of view. Every charge we made against those dollar funds reduced the ability of the United Kingdom to buy munitions.

Mr Nash added that it had been suggested that because petrol could now be obtained from inside the sterling area, for instance the Dutch East Indies, it might be possible to relax the restrictions. On this point he had cabled London and had received the reply that the United Kingdom still desired us to restrict the use of petrol, as the sterling areas as a whole had to find a very heavy sum in dollars for oil, and the need for restriction was greater than ever owing to increased munitions purchases from the United States.

Coroner Gives A Verdict Of Death From Accidental Causes

everything in first-class order. Dennis Bowen Patterson, flight rigger at Wigram, said that he had inspected the fabric, undercarriage, elevators, rudder and other equipment of the machine and had found

them to be all in perfect order. Robert Henry Swan King, flight lieutenant, said that the men who were killed had been under his supervision for

about six weeks. Each man had had about five months of solo flying and was within about two weeks of completing his training and going overseas. Both were pupils above the average and

both had been in good health. The Coroner found in each case that death was caused by a fracture of the spine and other bones of the body, suffered when the machine stalled on a steep turn to the left at a low altitude and spun to the ground, bursting into flames on impact.




