Many people, he said, were under the impression that Germany's conquest of the greater part of Europe had destroyed the effect of the British blockade, but that was not so. The countries under German domination produced little or no oil, rubber, iron ore and other essential war materials. The accumulated stores in the conquered countries had now been used and Germany was back to where she was six

Italy's position was even worse than Germany's, and Italy at pres-ent was a liability rather than an asset to the Axis, continued Dr. Dal-

ton.

The Navy was the principal weapon in maintaining the blockade, and, while it had a large sea to patrol and could not be 100 per cent. effective, it allowed few cargoes of essential goods to escape its net.

The Japanese Foreign Office announces that plenipotentiaries from Japan, Manchukuo and China have signed a joint declaration whereby Japan formally recognises the "Republic of China headed by General Wang Ching Wei."

General Abe (Japan) and General Wang Ching Wei (Nanking) have signed the treaty which "readjusts Chinese and Japanese relations." The treaty revealed that Japan had been granted virtual control of the Yangtse Valley, North China, and inner Mongolia and that Nanking has agreed to pay full indemnities to Japanese nationals for war losses.

The treaty provides joint defence against Communism and the closest economic and cultural co-operation Paris. 



EFFECTS OF THE BLOCKADE

The object of the blockade is to cripple the capacity of Germany to carry on the war. Of the importance of the blockade as a weapon, no one has any doubt; of its effectiveness there may be misgivings, particularly if one is susceptible to German propaganda.

The speech of the Minister of Economic Warfare (Dr. Hugh Dalton) which was addressed during the week-end primarily to American listeners, was therefore timely and reassuring. More than that, it was an informative statement of how the blockade is being applied, and it was a moving appeal to Americans to co-operate with us in making it tighter and more deadly in its effect.

According to Dr. Dalton, who is in a position to know, the stocks of oil, rubber, copper, textiles and other commodities which fell into German hands when they plundered the occupied countries because here always because the commodities when they plundered the occupied countries because here always a least the occupied countries because they are always as the occupied countries are always as a constant and the oc the occupied countries, have already been used up. Without a sufficiency of these things, the German war machine will gradually slow down, and Dr. Dalton can see this position being reached in a matter of months.

Right from the beginning it has been agreed that Germany's best chance of winning would be in a short war. That hope has now disappeared, and every day that passes makes the task of winning a long war more difficult.

The blockade applied by the Navy and aided by the destructive work of the R.A.F. on Germany's oil supply, munitions works and transport system, is steadily sapping the power of Germany to maintain the offensive, and is preparing ay for the invasion of the Continent by a new and infinitely more powerful expeditionary force than Lord Gort commanded in the early stages of the war.

As far as the junior partner of the Axis is concerned, the squeeze of the blockade must already be testing Italy's endurance. More dependent than Germany on external sources of supply, and with little or no share in the loot from the occupied countries, it is becoming exceedingly doubtful if Italy can get through the winter without a military and, perhaps, an economic collapse. The spirit of liberty is far from dead in Italy, and a military disaster, combined with acute economic distress may well prove fatal to the dictatorship of Mussolini.

But the real enemy is Germany, and the Americans who are giving us in so great a measure their moral and material support can help further to compass the defeat of the Nazis and shorten the war by refusing to trade with firms in neutral countries which have been blacklisted by Britain, and by making no purchases which would provide Germany with much-needed dollar exchange.

It is, perhaps, asking a good deal of American business houses which have affiliations with Europe, and which find trading indirectly with Germany through neutral countries a very profitable business, but although such trade may be legal, it is morally indefensible. For all practical purposes, America is in the war on the side of Britain, even if her participation does not extend to the dispatch of troops, and it does not seem too much to ask her co-operation in closing up the gaps in the blockade.

Short of a formal declaration of war, it may not be possible for the United States Government to prohibit entirely the activities to which Dr. Dalton refers, but it will be disappointing if his appeal does not bring about early and

STANDARDS OF FITNESS

The views of an Invercargill doctor, who is endeavouring to explain the very high percentage of rejections among men medically examined before being included in or excluded from the military forces, are interesting but not particularly convincing.

In his statement—which is published this morning—the doctor claims to have found the solution of the question in the much greater severity of the tests applied to-day as compared with those which were applied in the 1914-1918 war period.

This is a good enough reason as far as it goes, but it does not get over the fact that a good many men who went to the last war were not of sufficiently strong physique, and suffered a permanent deterioration in health as a consequence, and also that conditions in the last war, when the casualties in a single month frequently totalled more than those of the entire fifteen months of the present conflict, demanded a continuous and heavy stream of reinforcements, which in turn resulted in a lowering of the physical standard required.

Again, the doctor does not give any sound reason for the assumption that there has been no deterioration in the physique of New Zealanders. Even if his assumption is right -and such a view is open to serious question-surely there should have been a marked improvement in the years since 1918. Such factors as the almost universal acceptance of the late Sir Truby King's theories, a wider appreciation of the benefits of rational diet, and a general realisation of the benefits of fresh air and sunlight should have resulted in a marked raising of the standard of health and physique in the Dominion.

If the results had been commensurate with the greater advantages now available to everyone, they would have offset any tightening of the medical tests.

MEDICAL TESTS

Stricter Examination Than In Last War

By Telegraph—Press Association. INVERCARCILL, Dec. 1. Contradicting the assertions made in northern centres that the general average physical capacity of young men in New Zealand has gone down badly since the last war, an Inver-cargill doctor said to-day that the results of the medical examination of men called up in the first and second territorial ballots had dis-

second territorial ballots had disproved this.

The chief fact to be taken into consideration when contrasting the physical standard of 1914-18 and that of to-day, he said, was that in the last war the examination was not nearly so strict as now. Men in this war were being put through tests never given last time.

"What the public do not realise is that the examination which reservists go through to-day is the strictest possible. The examination is 100 per cent stricter than that of 1914-18," said the doctor, who had a great deal of experience examining men in the last war.

More Tests Taken More Tests Taken

Eye tests this time were a great deal stricter, cardiac efficiency tests were applied and urinalysis was taken. These three tests were not undertaken in the last war. Finally, a complete X-ray examination was being rade now which recruits did not have in the last war.

Last time the medical regulations were so framed as to permit the passing of men with physical defects which, if found in men coming before the medical boards to-day, would bar them. There had been cases in the Great War of men being passed who had the sight of only one eye. Others suffered from hernia.

Severe Tests The advance of science and the extension of medical knowledge had made the tests far more severe.

On the results of the examination of reservists so far, taking these factors into consideration, he was utterly unable to subscribe to the belief that the physical standard of young men in New Zealand was deteriorating.

The comparative quiet of London's nights was broken on Saturday by the heaviest raid for some time. A heavy bomb in the London area killed seven and injured several. Most of the casualties occurred at two public houses. Two ambulance men were killed and three A.R.P. wardens seriously injured. In a London cinema, when an incendiary bomb blazed up, the audience remained calm while the staff dealt with the bomb.

A lone raider bombed an eastern town, one person being killed and three seriously injured.

Three enemy aircraft were detroyed to-day, while the R.A.F. lost wo fighters, the pilots of which, lowever, are safe, states a communique, which adds: "During day-munique, which adds: "During day-mu ight to-day enemy air activity was nainly concentrated on the southeast of England and bombs were

Over the Irish Sea Wave after wave of raiders came from the Irish Sea and used very heavy calibre bombs. Many people were rendered homeless. Hardly a window is left in countless streets. Cinemas, police stations, shelters, and banks are among the damaged dropped at several places in this area.

During the morning a small number of raiders succeeded in reaching London and dropped a few bombs, with no great damage and few casualties

ualties.

The enemy attacks last night were mainly directed against the London area. Many fires broke out, but few were serious. Most were soon put out and all were under control by the early hours of the morning. A number of houses and some other buildings were damaged and a few people killed and injured.

Du Maurier Repeats At Feilding
