## Blitzbombers' Toll Fails To Impair Morale

#### **COSTLY BRUTALITY**

#### Nazi Losses Out Of Proportion To Results Achieved

(United Press Association-Copyright.) (Received December 2, 10.45 p.m.) LONDON, Dec. 2.

After raging for 12 weeks the greatest air battle in history—the autumn battle for London—has ended and the result is a technical victory for the R.A.F. and military defeat

The battle began on September 7 though there were heavy raids against England before that date. The losses of enemy 'planes over England were greater in August than in any succeeding month—1101 compared with 1093 in September, 264 in October and 222 in November—but the strategy and purpose of the August attacks were different.

The August raids were designed to break our fighter strength while the bombayding of the south-east and south coasts and south-eastern England was in preparation for an invasion and for greater aerial attacks. The blitzbombing of London was more a battle to paralyse half of England physically and smash it morally. It was an attempt to immobilise road and rail and transport and wipe out the food stores for millions, not only in London but all over the country.

Though there were times in the first few weeks when the question was asked whether London could continue to take the punishment it was receiving, the "blitz" failed. Of the 25,000 Londoners killed and admitted to hospital in 12 weeks, 23,700 occurred in the first seven weeks, but in the next four weeks the average was below 1300 and the twelfth week below 500. Deaths dropped from an average of 421 in the first two nights to none on November 26, and the daily average was only 23 in the twelfth week.

## ITALY'S MAJOR Appalling Plight Of Southampton After Air Raid

LONDON, Dec. 1. The Berlin News Agency states that after nightfall on Sunday German squadrons bombed the Southampton harbour works, dry docks, industrial plants and other essential war objectives. The railway connection between Southampton and London was stated to have been interrupted.

#### CURE POSSIBLE FOR GAS GANGRENE

Work In Australia

NEW TREATMENT SUGGESTED

Research Institute

(Daily Mail Special Service)

Completion of an important line of research, which may lead to a new and more effective method of treating gas gangrene—an infection which caused many deaths among soldiers in the last war—is revealed in the annual report of the Baker

Research Institute (says the "Sun") The new work is distinct from earlier successful experiments carried out at the Institute by Dr W. J. Peniold and Miss J. C. Tolhurst which dealt with immunisation against gas gangrene by means of toxoids, as it relates to treatment So far, there has been no oppor

tunity to test cither the immunisa

mide drugs on gas gangrene-ject on which only scanty existed at the time.

It was known that four separate baccili caused gas gangerene. In pre-liminary tests, Dr Singer found that all sulphanilamide drugs had a fair effect on the commonest of these—Cl. welchii—and a weak solution on another—Cl. ceptique—but none on the remaining two.

Use of Serum He then went on to test the effects of sulphanilamide used in conjunction with an anti-toxic serum—a substance obtained from the blood of animals containing the antibodies produced to counteract the effects of infection.

This yielded extremely promising results in increasing effectiveness of the action of sulphanilamide on Cl. welchii and Cl. septique, especially on the latter.

There was still no action against the other two kinds of baccili, but with Cl. welchii and Cl. septique out of the way, the anti-bacterial substances produced naturally in the body could deal prove effectively body could deal more effectively with them.

The importance of the discovery is two-fold. It means that the dose of sulphanilamide can be considerably reduced, thus lowering the chances of complications as a result of the action of the drug, and that the possibility of recovery is greatly enhanced.

#### CUTTING ACROSS FRONTIERS

In spite of the reports of revolution in Bessarabia, there is no justification for the building of hopes that Germany would do anything at the present time to provoke Russia into abandoning her attitude of friendly neutrality towards the Axis. The statement of the London "Sunday Express" that "the disturbance in Bessarabia may have been engineered by Hitler against Stalin, who is believed to have backed up Bulgaria to resist any Nazi move southward" is credible enough, but the idea that Germany would march into Russian territory is rather too good to be true.

The theory that Germany is working to reorganise Rumanian oil and grain production under a strict military dictatorship is nothing new. It has been a sufficiently obvious point of German policy ever since the German hopes of limitless supplies from Russia after the agreement in August, 1939, failed to materialise. What is much more interesting is the fact that once again Russia has disappointed the Nazi leaders. A few weeks ago, when Molotov was in Berlin, the German propagandists were announcing grandiose schemes for Russo-German co-operation. At the same time Rome was declaiming to a world which refused to be impressed that a pact linking Germany, Italy, Japan, Spain, and possibly Vichy France was in process of projection. If ever this precious scheme came within the bounds of possibility, the refusal of the Soviet to be lured into committing itself one way or the

other has effectively killed it.

At the time when Berlin and Rome were in transports

the visit of Moletov it was said that of enthusiasm over the visit of Molotov, it was said that Russia's price for lending support against Great Britain in the Mediterranean would be the Bosporus and the Dardanelles -presumably without any reference to Turkey, the rightful owner of both straits, and the ally of both Britain and Russia. To-day Turkey, instead of showing alarm at the possibility of a Russo-German alliance, is declaring herself to be irrevocably on the side of Great Britain and Greece, and further, she has committed herself to joint action with Yugoslavia and Bulgaria in the event of any German attempt to help Italy out of her predicament in Albania. In short, as the Turkish radio said yesterday, "it must be emphasised that the war is developing remarkably in favour of Great Britain.'

All this seems to rule out any possibility of a major German move across the Russian frontier in Bessarabia. It is plain enough that in view of the undefined attitude of Russia, Germany already has her hands full within her own frontiers, in the German-occupied territories, and in such countries as Rumania.

The present situation in Rumania, incidentally, provides another indictment of the cold-blooded ruthlessness of German methods. It is nothing to the German leaders that, in addition to subjecting inoffensive neutral States to the tyranny of an inhuman system, they deliberately provoke civil war and revolution as a mere matter of policy.

With the tragic example of Rumania before them, it is not surprising that Yugoslavia and Bulgaria, two States which have long been well within the Axis diplomatic web, should have been goaded into making a stand against the aggressors. Beyond their own frontiers they have in Greece a State which might have been expected to have fallen into the snares of Axis intrigue long before such a nation as Rumania—an inspiring example. The Axis expected Greece to offer less real resistance to a sudden invasion than Denmark, Norway, or Belgium; it was thought that the country would be occupied by the Italian forces much more easily than Holland was occupied by the Germans.

The remaining neutrals, with Rumania on one side and Greece on the other are drawing their even conclusions and

Greece on the other, are drawing their own conclusions and are forming their own policies accordingly.

It is a question whether both Germany and Italy have

not reached the point where neither can cut across international frontiers with impunity. At all events the long frontier between Germany and Russia, while it may offer many temptations to the Nazis, is a barrier to any further extension towards the east. Probably there is nothing that would please Herr Hitler more than a widespread revolt in the "restored" territory of Bessarabia, and he is perfectly capable of inspiring and fomenting it, but neither Stalin nor Molotov is likely to have forgotten that Bessarabia is a gateway to one of the Nazi aims expounded in "Mein Kampf" the Russian Ukraine.

"The situation is developing very favourably," said a spokesman at Creek Army headquarters in Athens on Saturday.

The opinion was held in military circles, according to neutral correspondents, that military events of the highest importance were impending and that nothing was being told that might reveal the plans of the Greek High Command.

Unless otherwise determined by the Adjutant-General, no soldier returned to New Zealand on account of physical unfitness due to wounds or sickness is to be discharged from or sickness is to be discharged from the army until provision is made for him under one of the follow-ing headings: granted war pension, replaced in former civilian occupa-tion or suitable employment, grant-ed monetary benefit by the Social Security Department pending return to civil occupation to civil occupation.

The proposal that a scheme be provided for the regimentation of labour to maintain primary production in New Zealand has been made to the Minister of Finance (the Hon. W. Nash) by the chairman of the Hawke's Bay Manpower Committee (Mr G. A. Maddison).

"As chairman of the manpower committee for this district I am thoroughly satisfied that it is essential, and not cally essential but importing for the maintenance of our

only essential but imperative, for the maintenance of our primary production that some definite and comprehensive scheme be undertaken to provide the necessary labour," said Mr Maddison in a letter to the Minister.

"The manpower committees did | not come into operation until June Whakatu Man On 6. and before that scores of permanent employees as well as farmer owners had left their lands to join owners had left their failus to join the fighting services," stated Mr Maddison. "As a matter of fact, this district has sent away scores of men over and above our quota to make up deficiencies in the quotas from other parts of New Zealand."

"At present, as you are aware, manpower committees are mainly dealing with appeals against service in the Territorial forces, but the inin the Territorial forces, but the Instructions from headquarters really mean that every effort should be made by the committees to see that every fit man undergoes Territorial training in camp for three months," continues the letter. "I know that you realise it is essential for the protection of our production to have an adequate and trained internal army."



Judged by the manner in which Colonel Grattan had to be pulled out of the way the tiring on the part of Plutus appeared to be somewhat sudden, but fortunately Colonel Grattan escaped a fall, which might have created a most disastrous result for those in his wake.
