Hitler May Help Italy By Heavier Blows At Britain ANTI-NAZI TENSION AT

LONDON, Dec. 2. "The Times", in an editorial headed "The Italian Defeat", takes a most favourable view of the outlook, but concludes by suggesting that should Hitler decide to come to the aid of his ally he might do it by striking heavier blows at Britain, particularly at her shipping.

Mrs Coombs, who came out to New Zealand in 1849, has the added distinction of having the longest period of residence in Otago of any white woman. She has been living in Dunedin for nearly 92 years. Mrs Coombs who was Miss Elizabeth Boyes before her marriage was born in Edinburgh in the house of John Knox, the famous preacher. She came out to New Zealand with her parents, Mr and Mrs Andrew Boyes, in the ship Mariner in 1849. Their first home was a two-storied wattle and clay cottage, and Mrs Coombs attended the first Dunedin school.

"I am quite sure this is a New Zealand record, if not a world record," Mr Coombs told a reporter in discussing the all-important seventieth anniversary of his wedding. "There were some people in Sydney who had been married 71 years and they claimed that to be a world record but that couple is dead now." Mr Coombs is younger than his "bride;" he is only a mere 91 years! He was born in London but came out to New Zealand in 1858 and resided in Auckland for a time. While still a boy he went to Dunedin and

SEX PAY EQUALITY A POST-WAR NEED

Sydney Man Discusses The Problem

"We must adopt equal pay for men and women as it will be the only way to adjust employment after the war," said Councillor J. O. Cramer, County Councillor and Mayor of North Sydney.

"I believe this will be necessary to restore the country to a normal standard of living in which the wage-earner has sufficient to maintain his family in comfort.

"During wartime, women's em-

"During wartime, women's employment in industry is a national necessity. If their employment on the same scale is continued when peace comes, it will become a natonal calamity

"Thousands of women are now being drafted into business, fac-tories, and other avenues of em-ployment, in place of their men-folk who are in the fighting line. "The last war brought a big per-centage of women into jobs which had hitherto been filled by men. "They were efficient, and because their personal responsibilities were

less, they were cheaper.
"When the war was over, no one had the courage or the vision to take steps to restore things to a normal basis."

The Latest Methods LESSONS FROM THE WAR

Varied Exercises

A full muster of the Havelock North company of the Home Guard paraded last night, when an outline of the training scheme which has been drawn up was given by Company Commander R. Tapper.

The free use of an empty shop to serve as company headquarters had been secured, he said, and it was intended to build up a library of training manuals and books dealing with modern war conditions.

One special section is already training in first-aid work, and other special sections are soon to be formed for other technical training.

Reconnaissance Instruction

Profiting by lessons learnt at Dunkirk and elsewhere overseas, the training of North Island territorial artillery units in camp at Waiouru is being based on new principles involving speed of movement combined with accuracy. In furtherance of this plan the various units have been conducting live shoots daily in the tussock country south of Ruapehu.

Field regiments have carried out exercises in vanguard and advance guard work, involving impromptu firing calling for quick thinking and action. The exercises have included action against tank attacks and similar rapid mangeluves made necessary. Profiting by lessons learnt at Dun-

similar rapid manoeuvres made ne-cessary by the speeding up of war-fare through the extensive use of armoured fighting vehicles. Medium artillery also has been carrying out live firing.

Gun On Pneumatic Tyres An interesting test was carried out of a 60-pounder gun which has been mounted on pneumatic tyres which permits it to be moved if necessary at the speed of field guns, and will result in greatly increased speed of movement for this class of modium artillery.

DEALING WITH BOMBS

Sections Work In Three Shifts

When Adolf Hitler began his long-When Adolf Hitler began his long-promised air Blitzkrieg on Britain, things began to get busier for the London Air Raid Warden (writes a warden in a "Christian Science Monitor" article).

Our Sector Post 99 of a big London borough has lately found itself lifted out of the routine of makebelieve practices into the immediate prospect of putting into effect what

believe practices into the immediate prospect of putting into effect what we had been gradually learning for about 18 months.

Sector Post 99 consists entirely of volunteers, all of whom have day-time work to do, and when nightly air raid alarms became the rule our consequences of the property of the

personnel was divided into three shifts. In each of these there is one woman warden whose job is solely to attend to the telephone and log all calls.

All Are Equal

All Are Equal

The male members of the post range from a retired Army Colonel to the gardener of lawns and tennis courts belonging to the adjacent block of houses. But in the post all are equal and obey the Head Warden. Each shift is on duty at the post every third night. They come on only from 9 p.m. to midnight and if the sirens have sounded before that they remain until the "All Clear" goes. The post is then closed down and they go home ready to come out should what Mr Winston Churchill calls the "Banshee howl" sound again.

On opening the post—it was opened at 9 p.m., but the hour now is earlier as the days have become shorter—two wardens go out on patrol to see that no lights are showing in our sector. Perhaps a voice is heard at the door, "Is this the Warden's Post?"—and a conscientious citizen tells us that there is a badly sereened window on the top floor of No. 270 down the road. No. 270 turns out to be a house of separate flats.

One climbs up many stairs and knocks at the door. "Madam, do you know you've got a bright light showing from your top front room?" "Oh dear, I'm so sorry," and a wordy explanation follows about how the girl who occupies that room went out in a hurry and must have left the light burning. Sometimes a kindly warden's firmness about a light is met with "Well, you needn't be rude." There is a certain reply to this which almost always brings about the desired result: "Well, Sir (or Madam), if I have to send the police they will probably cut off your electric light."

Post 99 is housed in the kitchen of a house with facilities for simple cooking and a small weekly subscription provides tea and cakes and is supplemented with gifts of tins of soup which is very comforting when a long spell of air raid warning extends into the early hours of next day. Bombs had been heard in various directions for about five hours but the climax came when the house worked as if by an earthquake.

nature of the bombing has wrought a remarkable change in the public's attitude. When the raids began many looked on them as a sort of show and could be seen gazing into the sky and paying no intention to the sky and paying no intention to the streets. They were willing, too, to run the risk of sleeping in their beds. But when they realised that a real air raid was not a bit funny, the streets became quickly empty and at night many persons may be seen with an armful of bedding making for their chosen shelter in which to spend the night.

At the time of writing the main brunt of the raids has fallen on the fire fighters who have done magnificent work. The wardens lend their assistance in these cases to the area to their armies and Greece.

I was with two friends at the time so, as it was night we went into a 'speak-easy' and each cashed a Bank of England note. For these we got only three American dollars. PRICE OF DOMINION FRUIT IS RAISED IN PARLIAMENT

Choice Of State Marketing Or Hit-And-Miss System, Says Mr Lee

By Telegraph—Press Association PARLIAMENT BLDGS., Dec. 3.

The Minister of Marketing (the Hon. W. Nash) moved, in the House to-night, the second reading of the Agricultural Emergency Regulations Confirmation Bill, an annual measure

common with other emergency regulations, the consumer had been completely forgotten. He criticised the high price being charged for lemons, when they were retailed to the public and the low prices paid to growers, stating that as a result of the low prices in the Bay of Plenty district, a bulldozer was pulling up lemon trees. If that were so the Minister should make a close investigation.

Mr H. S. S. Kyle (Nat., Riccarton): They are pulling up apple trees in Canterbury.

Mr J. A. Lee (Dem. Lab., Grey Lynn) said they could have State marketing or the old hit-and-miss system, but they should avoid a hybrid of the two. The country was faced with the same problem with other commodities that were produced in abundance, and unless the State developed a technique whereby consumers could get such articles without risk of a rush being made on goods, in short supply there would be wastage while people went without.

Area (Nat., Riccarton): Apples had reached the consumer in New Zealand at a lower price than previously. Just because the price of apples was 6d a pound at present, some people stated they had never been so dear before, but personally he remembered apples being sold for 8d a pound. The Government had not wished to market apples, said Mr Nash, and had only consented to do so at the request of the growers.

The Minister then gave an indication of some of the prices at which apples had been sold:

In April 240,000 cases of apples had been sold at a fraction over a previously.

Never in the history of the country had the consumer to pay so much for fruit, and yet it was being tipped out on the rubbish dumps. Moreover, it was a disgrace for the Government to put on the market the rotten material that was being sold.

"Orderly System" Mr A. G. Osborne (Govt., One-hunga) said the Government's Marketing Division had inaugurated an orderly system and was repacking orderly system and was repacking every case of apples before it was paid for by the consumer. As the result of this system, retailers and consumers were able to purchase cases of sound fruit. The evidence up to the present was that there had been less wastage and decay of fruit this year than in any previous year.

The Hon. W. Nash, in reply, said the prices paid growers for lemons last year were better than they had last year were better than they had been for the past five years, and he thought he was correct in saying better than ever before. The Government had lost some money on the marketing of lemons, but not much. As far as pulling trees out in Tauranga was concerned, these trees had been affected by citrus canker and the grower had received compensation. Tauranga growers were well satisfied with the arrangements that had been made.

The medical practitioner qualified to provide this service and any person entitled to claim medical benefits for himself or for any member of his family may mutually agree in the prescribed form and manner for the provision of the service. Medical practitioners undertaking the service will be entitled to the prescribed capitation fee for each person, but no other payment, with the exception of mileage fees to be computed in accordance with the

If his appeal is allowed, his position regarding territorial service will then be determined.

Similarly, in the case of a man already training in a territorial force camp, as soon as it is known if he is available for the Expeditionary Force, he will be given the option of continuing his service in the territorials or being released at once from that force. If he elects to continue territorial trains at once from that force. If he elects to continue territorial training, he will continue training until the completion of the usual three months or until required to go into an Expeditionary Force camp, whichever is the earlier.

If he elects to be released, he will be discharged from camp at once.

Bookmaking will go on unchecked with the present system in operation, but, with additional revenue offered, it is thought by most sportsmen that a change will be effected in order that all the taxable money available will be transferred to the Treasury.
