# Noisy Raid Startles Londoners

# LOW-FLYING ATTACKERS

# Bristol Bears Brunt Of The Furious Onslaught

(United Press Association-Copyright.) (Received December 4, 12 a.m.)

LONDON, Dec. 4. London had the noisiest raid to-night since November 29. Londoners who gradually have inclined to the belief that the battle over London had ended for the present were startled by warnings, after which there was heavy ground fire and the incessant sound of 'planes flying fairly low.

Bombs were dropped in several areas. A West Midlands town, however, was selected as tonight's principal target.

Incendiaries illuminated half-a-dozen districts. Some persons are believed to be buried under demolished houses

The German reports of Monday night's bombing of Bristol (says a British Official Wireless message) make no attempt to disguise the fact that it was indiscriminate, for a Berlin message claims that Bristol has been "coventrated," a word coined by the Germans to denote the kind of destruction they claim to have done at Coventry.

This tacit admission of the indis-eriminate nature of the bombing is fully borne out by early reports from that town. Flares preceded the dropping of incendiary and high-explosive bombs, which, as in the case of Coventry and Southampton, caused damage to shops and resi-dential premises.

# BY U-BOATS

15 MERCHANTMEN SUNK

NAZI CLAIM.

Raiders In Indian And Pacific Oceans

LONDON, Dec. 3.

A German communique has claimed that U-boats attacked a convoy en route to Britain on December 2 and sank an escorting auxiliary cruiser, the Caledonia, and

auxiliary cruiser, the Caledonia, and 15 merchantmen totalling over 110,000 tons.

Another U-boat sank two freighters including the Victor Ross, making a total of 160,000 tons sunk on December 2. After the British Admiralty pointed out that H.M.S. Scotstoun, formerly the liner Caledonia was admitted to have been sunk on June 14 the German news agency issued an urgent correction to the communique, substituting an auxiliary cruiser for the Caledonia.

After making a stand northward of Pogradec the Italians are again retreating.

It is now revealed that two Greek cavalry companies drove an entire battalion from heights of the utmost strategic importance, in consequence of which the main body of Italians was forced to evacuate positions affording excellent possibilities for defence.

"The Times" Athens correspondent says that the main Italian forces on the northern front will in future be able to do little more than fight rearguard actions until they are installed in the next defence line, 50 miles beyond their present positions.

A considerable amount of hard plodding confronts the Greeks if they attempt to gain this line, but the intervening struggle, according to the present outlook, is unlikely to consist of more than methodical thrusts and mopping up, although the Greeks, if successful, will undoubtedly be able to give an imposing list of captured villages.

The latest dispatches received from Athens emphasise that bad weather is preventing major operations on the northern front, although there have been heavy artillery duels. The Greeks are advancing slowly northward of Pogradec along a lakeside road and have reached a point just beyond Mumuniste. 

CHRISTMAS DAY FILMS IN NAPIER

The controversy over the screening of films on Christmas Day crops up every year throughout the Dominion, and the same old arguments for and against the proposal are brought

But when all is said and done, the point is rather trivial and the issue can be narrowed down to two questions: (1) Do the people want films on Christmas Day? and (2) Is anyone going to be penalised by the screening of films on Christmas Day?

The sideline about the religious significance of the day cannot be regarded very seriously. Certainly there is nothing actively immoral about going to the pictures on Christmas Day, and the sacred character of the holiday will be no more impaired by the opening of the cinemas than by the holding of family Christmas parties on the beach or anywhere else. The traditional English Christmas is essentially a family festival, and it is difficult to see much difference between watching a film and dancing under the mistletoe in the Dickensian fashion.

It can be taken for granted that the opening of the emas will be a popular move, and this applies particularly to Napier, which is one of the Dominion's most popular holiday

For this reason alone, it is somewhat surprising to find the Napier Council so evenly divided on the question. Consideration for the theatre employees has naturally been a foremost factor in bringing about the division of opinion, but almost all the employees have not only raised no objection to the opening of the theatres, but have supported the move.

After all, even if the theatre workers are making some sacrifice by working on Christmas Day, they are doing so not for charity but for wages which most of them will regard as a very useful Christmas "extra". Further, as members of a union, their interests are fully protected and thus it hardly seems reasonable that any suggestion of "intimidation" can enter into the matter.

In the meantime, Napier has reached a decision and it will be interesting to see what measure of public support is given to the move.

# MAIN STREET CAR PARKS

Some day Hastings will be a city. As numbers go it is moving in that direction fast, and residents may well be proud of the town's growth and progress.

A small town complex, however, is an attribute that clings like a poor relation, and is discarded with extreme reluctance. In the horse and buggy age, the country customer got into the habit of anchoring his turnout to a hitching post in front of the post office, the public house or the general store. The practice had its advantages because it advertised his arrival in the village and gave the storekeeper time to think up a reason for asking something on account or an excuse for refusing to extend further credit.

Time marched on, as the movie commentator would say, and came a day when the country customer rolled up in a £500 limousine to buy a packet of cigarettes or spend an hour in a place of entertainment. Having inherited the habit of leaving his conveyance in the main street, he treats the paved and neon-lighted thoroughfare just as his grandfather had regarded the grass grown roadways in the eighties. He pretends to be surprised when the townspeople mildly point out that cluttering up Heretaunga Street with fifty thousand pounds' worth of cars at a time, may be a tribute to the wealth of Hawke's Bay, but it is also the cause of a great deal of public inconvenience.

The Hastings Borough Council has sought in a halfhearted way to mitigate the trouble by making it an offence to leave a car longer than twenty minutes at a time in the shopping area. Unfortunately no serious attempt is made to enforce the regulation. Stronger measures will have to be taken for the public welfare and safety. Two unbroken lines of motor cars in Heretaunga Street for the greater part of the day are a source of danger to life and limb. The moving traffic is confined to a lane a little more than half the width of the street, and if a taxi or a private car stops to set down passengers, the following traffic is held up.

There is no novelty about the problem; it has been dealt with effectively in other parts of the world and in smaller towns than Hastings. If Heretaunga Street were kept clear of stationary cars parking places would soon be established on vacant sections not far away. No one desires to see the town's main street as empty as High Street, Aberdeen, on "Poppy Day," but if it were kept reasonably clear of motor vehicles, the improved access to business premises would be welcomed by shopkeepers and the general public.

Mr H. R. Bannister represented Fletcher and Mr E. J. W. Hallett appeared for Corlett. The first action was one in which J. B. Fletcher Ltd. claimed from W. H. Corlett, horse-trainer, and his wife, Heremenia Corlett, £172/12/-for goods supplied by the plaintiff to the defendants between September, 1934, and February, 1940.

Two Counter-Claims

Two counter-claims were made by Corlett. In one against J. B. Fletcher, Corlett claimed £50 for training Royal Star II at 30/- a week, and for free meat, £14/10/-, week, and for free meat, £14/10/-, representing 10 per cent. of the winnings from July 9, 1939, to February 29, 1940, £14 for breaking in and training a Defoe filly, and £6 for looking after a Pink Coat filly after an accident, making the total claim £84/15/-


