New Command Will Ensure Better Support

"The increase in the strength of the army in France has necessarily involved modification in the organisation of the air forces required, as well as the best means of affording the necessary co-operation and support to the army," states an announcement from Downing Street. "In November the matter was fully reviewed in the light of practical experience in the exercise of control of the R.A.F. in support of the army in France. As a popult of this review the following agreed. in France. As a result of this review the following agreed recommendations were approved by the War Cabinet at the beginning of December:-

"An R.A.F. Command, to include all units of the R.A.F. in France, is to be formed. The new Command will be designated the 'British Air Force in France,' and will be under the command of an Air Officer Commanding-in-Chief, who will also be responsible, in consultation with the Army Commanders-in-Chief, for ensuring the most efficient support by the British air forces for the B.E.F. and the French armies on the Western Front.

"In conjunction with the General Officer Commandingin-Chief the French air forces, he will also be responsible for co-ordinating the operations of the R.A.F. in France with those of the French air forces.

"The above arrangement," the statement adds, "involves no change in the principle which governs the relationship between the Army and he R.A.F. It is based on the analogy in the existing relationship etween the Navy and the Coastal Command of the R.A.F., and will nsure the closest co-operation beween the Army and the air forces in the field.'

Air-Marshal A. S. Barratt has been appointed Air Officer Commanding-in-Chief of the British air forces in France, states a Press Association cable.



The mechanized industry which is pouring forth streams of supplies for the fighting services rests ultimately on the skill of individual craftsmen. Looking round a factory, with its whirling belts and wheels which turn endlessly, one is apt to rate even the wonderful machines of these times too highly (writes a special correspondent of "The Times").

To-day, during a third tour arranged by the Ministry of Supply, I visited a factory where craftsmen abound and mass production is unknown, and yet only because of the delicate scientific instruments which these men make is mass production, so necessary and valuable to-day, possible elsewhere A million war.

The factory we visited was one of the finest optical works in the world. 



SEEING IT THROUGH

. . nor will I shirk my inevitable responsibilities in what I feel to be right, no matter how difficult or even disagreeable they may be."

That is the only sentence in the speech broadcast throughout the Empire by the British Prime Minister which contains even the slightest conjectural reference to the question for which the whole commonwealth of the British nations is seeking an answer: Why was Mr Hore-Belisha dismissed?

We were led to believe by various reports that Mr Chamberlain's first utterance to the subjects of the Empire in the year 1940 would make it clear why such radical changes had to be made in the British Cabinet. But one listened to the broadcast feeling all the time that the Mansion House audience was waiting, just as listeners all over the Empire were waiting, for some reference to this most important matter. But not a word of a direct kind was spoken. This is not good, for the sake of the cause itself. The citizens of the Empire are intelligent creatures who wish to know the why and wherefores of even British Cabinet activities.

The other day in this column the collated list of guesses was set down as to the reasons for the departure of the War Minister. The cables have since indicated the possibility that Mr Winston Churchill may yet be chosen to unify the land, sea, and air forces. Rumours are of no use. We may be a very small part of the Empire, but New Zealand has more than pulled its weight in the councils of the nations at Geneva and elsewhere, and we have every right to ask for an official explanation from the head of the United Kingdom Government of the reasons why such a sudden change in administration should have been brought about.

The speech delivered by Mr Chamberlain was admirable in every way so far as it went, and we all know by this time that we are in this war for good or ill and most of us are willing, in our various capacities, to see it through to the best of our ability. The references to the development and perpetuation of Franco-British sentiments for the purpose of creating a new kind of Europe which will be freed for ever from the lowering clouds of threatened war, meet with the entire agreement of the millions of true Britishers who listened to the broadcast.

Similarly, all right-thinking citizens of the British Empire will homologate Mr Chamberlain's hint to America that it is not enough to give benevolent approval of the Allied aims and to make references to the "forces of evil that must be overcome" (Roosevelt) without "risking blood and treasure for so great an end" (Chamberlain). Nothing but approbation can be given for the utterance of such sentiments. But the unanswered question remains.

It was hoped that as from to-day the radical changes that have been effected so far as the control of the fighting forces is concerned would have been clearly explained. But we are as much in the dark as ever, and until the whole business is cleared up we shall be at the mercy of the too easily manufactured guess-work rumours which always follow the downfall of a great man as the vultures follow the expected carcase.

All this is so much beating of the air. We know that. What is said here is not at all likely to come anywhere near the attention of the British authorities. But whether it will be heard or not, the protest is made for the sake of our own honesty of thought and peace of mind. In such a time of emergency the people have an inalien-

able right to be taken into the confidence of the authorities so that their own confidence may be strengthened and sus-

AN ELOQUENT SPEECH

British Official Wireless.

RUGBY, Jan. 9. In a speech in the City to-day, inaugurating a great nation-wide campaign in which members of the War Cabinet, addressing the people directly, will renew their asservation of the objects for which the Allies have taken up arms and steel the resolution of the public for the sacrifices which lie ahead, the Prime Minister (the Rt. Hon. Neville Chamberlain) referred to his own efforts to avert war. His reference was brief but eloquent to his sympathetic audience of so much of the diplomatic history of the past three years.

Mr Chamberlain declared in ringing tones: "Since that day when war was declared, my sole thoughts and all my actions have been directed to one purpose only-namely, to do all I could, in closest conjunction with our dauntless French

allies, to bring this war to a successful conclusion.

"To that end," he said, "I have subordinated everything else—all thought of rest or relaxation—all partial affections, to use the words of the daily prayer in the House of Commons—all personal feelings and considerations whatsoever. From that purpose, so long as I hold my present office, and until the war comes to an end, I will not be deflected. Nor will I shirk my inevitable responsibilities in what I feel to be right, no matter how difficult or even disagreeable they may be"

The ravages of the censorship in France are daily visible in the numerous white spaces which appear in newspapers and magazines when deletions have been ordered at the last moment and new material could not be inserted.

So far as cable communication with America is concerned, the situation thus far gives little cause for complaint. Messages from Paris to the United States have apparently been arriving promptly and with little interference. It is still too early to be certain as to the fate of mail correspondence. There has obviously been a great slowing-up of the postal service. A letter from London, which formerly arrived overnight, now often requires six days for transmission. Letters from America sometimes arrive with a delay of three weeks.

Two Censorships

Two Censorships British newspapermen must run the gauntlet of two censorships, their own and the French. The cheapest, and most convenient means of communication between Paris and London, the telephone, was cut off shortly before the outbreak of the war and was only restored to British newspapermen, with severe restrictions as to the times of telephoning several weeks later.

The main weight of the censorship, however, naturally falls on the French newspapers and other publications. The severity of the censorship is reflected in the French weekly, "L'Europe Nouvelle." Its editor is the well-known journalist. Andre Gerund better journalist, Andre Geraud, better known under his pen-name of Per-

Many Deletions

In one single issue of the magazine one finds 10 deletions by the censor. Two of these occur in an article on what certainly looks like a harmless theme: American opinion on the Soviet-German pact. Four are significantly and rather amusingly in an article devoted to the subject of the censorship.

However, the French censors are not always ruthless. They let pass a good many witticisms at their own expense, of which the following is typical:

"From the activity with which censorship plies its scissors one could imagine that it wishes us to make war in lace."
