Bombs Fall On Danish Territory

United Press Association—Copyright. (Received January 11, 10.10 p.m.) LONDON, Jan. 11.

What was apparently the biggest air engagement since the outbreak of the war took place yesterday at Sylt, north-ernmost of the German Frisian Islands, lying just off the southern border of Denmark.

It is believed that 50 British and German 'planes participated in the engagement. Security patrols in the Heligoland Bight dropped bombs as early as 1 a.m., and a major battle began over Sylt at 6 a.m., when anti-aircraft guns cannonaded for two hours. This was resumed at 9 a.m., when German fighters went up. The guns roared continuously till 12.30 p.m. New outbursts were intermingled with bomb explosions at 2.30 p.m. and continued till 4 p.m.

The objectives included the Hindenburg Causeway, on which is a strategic road and railway for the transport of supplies to the air base. Three bombs landed on or near the

The German radio announced that German 'planes encountered nine British bombers at 1 p.m. and shot down three. No German casualties are admitted, but Denmark reports that two bullet-riddled German 'planes made forced landings in Denmark. One pilot stated that he had been dog-fighting all the afternoon.

Our troops advancing on Raate cleared an area to the frontier from Suomus-

"Enemy aeroplanes carried out minor unsuccessful raids on coastal objectives. The Finnish forts at Lake Ladoga and Koivisto participated in the land operations."

The fighting in Finland flared up to-day on the Salla front, where picked Russians are making an effort to bisect Finland 150 miles north of where their efforts to cut across the Finnish "waistline" failed, said an earlier cable.

The Russians have apparently abandoned their south-eastern drive in favour of trying to cut across Finland westward from Salla, which they now hold, through Kemitrask, the eastern terminus of the seaward railway. Their vanguard is now 20 miles west of Salla.





Anti-Waste Campaign In England

To preserve the country's surplus fruit crop the women of the villages of England have been busy filling more than a million one and two bound pots of jam. This was carried out by an emergency board of the National Federation of Women's the National Federation of Women's Institutes. The women successfully organised the distribution of preserving sugar in bulk to villages, hamlets, even isolated cottages in England and Wales. Those who got it were on parole to use it for the sole purpose of turning the year's abundant crops into jam. The Sugar Commission gave permission for each institute to take at least one hundredweight of preserving sugar. Within a few days more than 345 tons had been distributed, and the country women were soon on trek country women were soon on trek with cars, farm carts, barrows and even prams to collect the quantity allotted to them.

SACRIFICE CALLED FOR

Yesterday in this column something was said about what Mr Chamberlain did not say in his Mansion House speech. It would not be quite fair to say nothing about what he did say; for he said quite a lot. While we await the official statement about the drastic Cabinet changes, we may dwell for a moment or two on the magnificent response which was made to the British Prime Minister's appeal for sacrifice on the part of the people at Home.

A Mansion House gathering has nothing in common with a beer-hall conference. It is a conference of the best blood and brains of the Empire. (Oh, yes. There are differences of breeding among men and women just as there are differences of breeding in animals). Those who listened in to the broadcast from London must have been impressed by the spontaneous and prolonged applause which greeted Mr Chamberlain's appeal for even greater sacrifices. Taxed already to the point of exhaustion, the supporters of the Empire's cause in the Old Country are still ready and willing to "hold on a little longer" and to see this grim business through to the end.

There is an object lesson here for every one of us. The peculiar thing in this country is that there are many who blame international financial gangsters for making war so as to increase the girth of their roll of notes, while at the same time these very objectors do their level best to make as much for themselves out of the emergency as they can. Those who listened to Mr Chamberlain's speech and who paid attention to the immediate reactions to it could not honestly say that he was addressing a crowd of unscrupulous profiteers who would not budge an inch from their predatory instincts. But in other parts of the world (New Zealand, for instance) there are many groups of people who are nothing more nor less than profiteers, inasmuch as they take quick advantage of an emergency to get as much out of it as they can for them-

There are no overtime rates on active service. The men who are standing between us and disaster have given themselves outright to the cause. Some days they will "stick it," with not much to do and never knowing the moment when anything big may break. At other times they will do forced marches for long hours, they will go hungry, they will be sick and carry on, they will fight and strive and endure without any count of time, and marvellous to say, they will not even consider whether they have marched and fought for forty hours in a week or for twenty hours in a day and will make no claim for extra pay.

That is breeding. It always tells. Theoretical or other excuses are not worth the proverbial "tin of fish." Some of the earliest to go are the best men. Possibly that is why this generation is not doing its bit as it should. (We are not talking about quotas from Hawke's Bay or anywhere else. There should be no such things. It is only a discouragement to willing men to say that no more are needed at the moment. The recruiting offices should be wide open every day for every fit and willing man who cares to come along.)

Good men went early in the last war, and most of them fell. This generation is suffering from that fact from the point of view of breeding. The blood is thinner than it was in 1914. It may be said that we missed a generation in the last war, and a generation of the best Britist stamp. All up and down the Dominion we see the evidences of that fact now.

Mr Chamberlain called for sacrifice on the part of his distinguished audience in the Mansion House and met with instant response. The Empire calls for similar sacrifices on the part of people on this side of the world. Is it too much to expect that the same response will be forthcoming, or is it a reasonable charge that our people are degenerating?



ESTABLISHMENT OF SECOND N.Z. EXPEDITIONARY FORCE

Terms Of Service Outlined In The Latest Issue Of The Gazette

WELLINGTON, Jan. 11. Provision for the establishment of the Second New Zealand Expeditionary Force under the Defence Act, 1909, is contained in the Expeditionary Force Emergency Regulations, 1940, which are issued with to-night's Gazette.

The members of this force, state the regulations, "shall be enlisted for service within New Zealand and out of New Zealand for the duration of the present war and for twelve months thereafter."

The Special Force Emergency Regulations, 1939, are revoked and the Special Force will cease to be known as such and will be deemed to be part of the Expeditionary Force.

The regulations make the necessary provision for the appointment of a General Officer to command the force out of New Zealand with the full powers which are general ally given to such commanding officers in the way of appointments and promotions, etc., and powers regarding appointments, promotions and discharges are also conferred on the Adjutant General of the New Zealand Defence Forces or officers to whom he may delegate his powers,

One clause states that no officer of the Expeditionary Force shall be competent, without the consent of the Governor-General, to resign his commission or appointment in time of war or at any time within 12 months from the conclusion of page.




