The Finns are attempting new encirclements of the Russian forces on two fronts and have marooned from 15,000 to 20,000 in the Salla area and are battering the flanks of a large force in the Loimola sector, where ski patrols have already damaged the supply line.

The Russians are reported to have dispatched from 35,000 to 40,000 reinforcements from Kaandalaksha to Salla, but the foremost are wedged between the Finnish forces and, in view of this, it is most likely that the Russians will suffer yet another severe defeat.

An earlier Finnish communique states that Russian attacks in the Petsamo and Salla areas were repulsed.

The Russians bombed the Gulf of Finland coast, injuring six women.





Tibetan Princess Marries Chinese

ALL OBJECTIONS **OVER-RULED**

An Unusual Ceremony

The second daughter of a Tibetan ruler, sister-in-law of the Tibetan Living Buddha Kamuyan, was married recently to a well-known Chinse writer, Mr Liu Keh-jan.

Through the educational system established by her brother-in-law, who is a brother of the highest livng Tibetan Lama, the princess earnt to read and speak Chinese, and through his radio set she was closer to China than the average oman of Tibet.

She had always dreamed of mar-ying a Chinese, and when Mr Liu, 6 years old, handsome and Amerian by training, came to her native town in Labrang, she induced her brother-in-law to invite him to take pictures of her at their house.

Complete Exile. After a second meeting she asked nim to marry her, and, although it meant total exile for the young Chinese, he was so in love he ac-

cepted her proposal, and immediate-y tested his skill as a horseman by racing the princess, according to Tibetan tradition.

Once more, with the help of the brother-in-law, objections raised by the elders were overruled. Instead of an engagement ring the princess received two sheep, a pot of wine, and a piece of silk blessed by the Living Puddle.

The marriage ceremony was per formed by kowtowing three times before the princess's household gods and in his marriage vow, Mr Liu dedicated himself for life to the adancement of education among his wife's people.







A QUEER RESOLUTION

At first glance it appeared that the resolution passed by the Auckland Labour Representation Committee concerning Mr J. A. Lee's article in a recent issue of a Christchurch magazine had been mutilated in transmission; but a checkup reveals that the mysterious decision is evidently authentic. The statement reads: "By 109 votes to 85, the meeting adopted an amendment upholding Mr Lee's action and expressing complete confidence in him and in the Prime Minister."

The last five words boggle the imagination in its attempt to visualise the committee's opinion. It is impossible to understand. Mr Savage at any rate has no illusions about the matter. "I have been the victim of one of the most dastardly attacks that has ever been made upon a public man in this country," he says, and refers to the "stupid inconsistency of the motion."

Surely on this issue most intelligent people will vote for Mr Savage on the basis of the information available. It is inconceivable that the same body of men should, in Mr Savage's phrase, "express confidence in the author as well as in the victim" of an attack of this kind. The whole thing makes nonsense. It is absurd.

The proceedings, says the report, were private. Private, and yet not quite. If the Press of the Dominion is to make 'intelligent comment upon affairs of vital moment such as this, it is only fair that a full report of the proceedings should be available. There is no doubt whatever in this case about which side is doing the suppression act. Meetings behind partially closed doors which eventuate in an apparent deadlock between the Prime Minister of the Dominion and a member of Parliament who was recently deposed from an important office require something more definite in the way of explanation and information.

As it is, all of us are forced to use whatever intelligence Providence has given us to reason our way to conclusions on the basis of the meagre facts available. The Left Wing of the Labour Party is definitely in revolt. There would seem to be little doubt about that. Mr Lee as the leader of the Left Wing is at loggerheads with Mr Savage. That would seem to be a certainty. Mr Lee's supporters, still full of pride in the fact that they returned him with the largest majority given to any candidate at the last election, like him and still support him; but at the same time they do not wish to do anything to jeopardise the chances of the Labour Government, so they support Mr Savage, too. Is that political honesty? It is farcical.

Mr Lee's well-known eloquence has never been more strongly vindicated than in this outstanding achievement in which he faced the Representation Committee and emerged from the meeting without a stain on his political character and with an assurance that both he and the Prime Minister are jolly good fellows. It is humorous.

On the serious ground of national policy, however, the country has a right to know whether the Labour Government will now be able to pull its full weight, man by man, in these grave times of emergency. The people of the country at such a time as this have every right to be assured of this all-important point. They are not in the least degree interested in the personal squabbles, the rival ambitions or the selfaggrandisement of any member of the House, whosoever he may be.

There is a war on, and linen-washing can wait. Most of us also are prepared to agree that it is bad policy to swap horses when crossing the stream. The times are critical. All of us need discipline and more of it. Domestic differences should be shelved entirely until the day comes when they can be calmly reviewed. In the meantime, all of us have the right to ask: "What is the trouble, anyway?"

The most widespread air-raids of the war were experi-

enced to-day, when Nazi warplanes crossed the coast at various points from Scotland to the Thames Estuary. No bombs were dropped, but several towns were showered with shrapnel from anti-aircraft batteries.

The Air Ministry announces: "There has been considerable air activity off the east coast of England and Scotland this morning. In addition to a raid at Newcastle-on-Tyne, enemy aircraft appeared off the Firth of Forth and the estuaries of the Humber and the Thames. They were driven off by anti-aircraft fire and fighter patrols.

"Off the Norfolk coast, enemy aircraft made a bombing attack on a merchant vessel. They were intercepted and engaged by our fighter aircraft."

It was the Tyneside's first raid.

Some residents narrowly escaped falling shrapnel, which smashed the glasses from one woman's face and broke an omnibus window.

AN INVESTIGATION INTO THE PRICE OF PETROL

Industries And Commerce Bureau Responds To Hastings Resolution

Of vital interest to all local bodies, carriers and commercial and private car owners in the district is a letter received yesterday by the Hastings Borough Council from the secretary of the New Zealand Bureau of Industries and Commerce (Mr L. J. Schmitt). The letter, which was in answer to a resolution passed by the Borough Council on December 21, 1939, soliciting an investigation into the wholesale prices of petrol in Hawke's Bay, states that such an investigation is already being made in response to the council's request.

The resolution arose from a growing dissatisfaction with the prices in Hawke's Bay and the council expressed its opinion to the bureau that these were too high in relation to the prices charged in other districts, and in view of the facilities now available for the berthing of oil tank steamers at Napier, bulk storage and distribution. The prompt response of the bureau to the council's resolution is marked evidence to the reasonableness of the claim and a testimony to the council's policy of furthering the best interests of Hastings and

No indication of the progress of the present investigation has yet been given, said the Hastings Town Clerk (Mr Noel C. Harding) to a "Daily Mail" reporter yesterday.

Should, however, the rumoured rise in the price of petrol eventuate and a favourable report result from the bureau's investigation, a greater significance than was originally anticipated may attend the council's resolution.
