

Two New Zealanders Killed

Apparently the wireless operator was unable to send anything other than: 'We are being forced down,' before the machine hit the water six miles off the Balinese coast. Five waves of Russian bombers attempted to wipe out the strategic town of Oulou, starting a dozen fires and machine-gunning people trying to save their treasures. The town was reduced to blackened ruins, but the railways from Sweden southward are intact.





Difficult Staffing

WANGANUI HOSPITAL SETS EXAMPLE

**Emergency Measure** 

Because of the acute shortage of irls for the nursing profession be-ng accentuated by military requirements, married women are likely to appear in the wards of public hospitals in the near future. The married women will be qualified nurses and will not live on the hospital like the single personnel

Notice of the waiving of the practice of not employing married women has been sent to the Wanganui Hospital Board in common with other boards by the Director-General of Health, Dr M. H. Watt. The provision of an allowance to permit these nurses to live out is also advocated by the department.

"In view of the present shortage of nurses, which will undoubtedly be accentuated by military requirements, the department recommends hospital boards to waive the usual practice of not employing married nurses," states Dr Watt's letter. May Live Out.

"Where members of the registered nursing staff marry it is suggested that they should be allowed to rethat they should be allowed to retain their positions and that if necessary they be granted living out allowance so that they may live out and come to duty by the day. In the case of pupil nurses who marry before the termination of their training, it is considered that provided the husband is leaving on active service, they should be encouraged to return to the hospital to complete their training. In this case it is necessary that the nurses should live in the nurses' home in the usual manner. The above recommendation is to be carried out purely as an emergency measure for

commendation is to be carried out purely as an emergency measure for the period of the war."

Wanganui is one of the boards which has experienced difficulty in providing sufficient staffing for its institutions and on many occasions in recent years the subject of a shortage of nurses has been raised by the New Zealand Hospital Boards' Association and the suggestion has even been made that male nurses should be employed.

#### DESERT GOLD HUT No. 2

The magnificent gesture made by Mr T. H. Lowry in handing over the sum of £10,000 to the Y.M.C.A. for the provision of a hut for New Zealand soldiers is not unique either in the history of the Dominion or in the personal history of Mr Lowry; for he did exactly the same thing in the

Possibly many who read these lines know more about the actual value of the gift than does the giver himself. "Diggers" remember with everlasting gratitude just what it meant at Etaples, the well-known base during the previous conflict, to come from the rigours of the "bull-ring," with its crunching sand and gruelling drill, to the quiet and peace of a "home from home" presided over by men and women whose sole aim was to attend to the comfort of tired men.

The large wooden hut, affectionately known as the "Desert Gold Hut" because of Mr Lowry's famous racehorse, provided rest, recreation, and instruction for the men at a time when they needed them most; and fathers who have sent their sons, or old "diggers" who have gone to war for a second spell, will be glad to know that somewhere on the other side there await the kindly attention and service known

and appreciated in other days. Those who know Mr Lowry most intimately were unaware of his action until it was completed. There was no flourish of trumpets about it. Realising his opportunity and at the same time the duty that lay within his power, he provided without fuss or advertisement for the lasting comfort and happiness of thousands of men for the duration of the war. New Zealanders will pass a unanimous vote of sincere thanks to Mr Lowry.

It is at once amusing and annoying to discover that there are still some disgruntled persons who shrug their shoulders even on such a great occasion as this and pass ignorant remarks about the generosity of a fine gentleman. There are some people to whom you could not present a doughnut without at once receiving a complaint that there is a hole in it. It will be clearly understood, of course, that this money is "going out of the country"! (Incidentally, it will be subject to gift duty.) It will likewise be understood that a person must have £10,000 to give away before he could give it away.

But it will yet again be emphasised that such magnificent benefactions come about by the impulses of people with the highest sense of public duty. New Zealand as a whole is under a tremendous debt of obligation to this great citizen who has once more proved himself in a great way to be the friend of men in circumstances wherein they need friendship most. It is utterly absurd nonsense to suppose for a moment that there is no sacrifice whatever in such a gift; but it was made in the characteristic Lowry style, which means that it was made directly, simply, and with its clear intentions outlined. Mrs Lowry has acted similarly many a time, and her benefactions to good causes will never be forgotten.

Mr Lowry has been well known for many years past as one of Hawke's Bay's leading sportsmen and as one whose left hand seldom knows what his right hand does. Not too many people even to-day are familiar with the name of the Lowry hut which was so well known to the soldiers in France twenty-odd years ago. That is because it was never advertised.

With the same quiet efficiency, the same donor has repeated his great effort, and before many months are over we shall be hearing of the delight and gratitude of the boys overseas when they find a replica of the former hut.

There is a largeness and a glorious uncertainty about the whole thing. "Wherever it may be" is the phrase used to describe the location of the friendly headquarters. But wherever it may be, it will be home to the boys of New Zealand, who will gladly foregather in the quiet retreat which they are certain to christen "Desert Gold Hut No. 2."

#### NO SHORTAGE ON THE ENGLISH MARKET

#### Advice To Growers Of Apples

New Zealand's inability to ship apples to England will not cause a shortage in that market. Record crops have been grown in commercial orchards as well as private gardens. The advice given by the London "Daily Mail's" agricultural correspondent to English growers may be of some interest to New Zealand. To store in clean boxes or barrels is best, he says. A few wooden boxes holding not more than 1 cwt. of apples should be easier to obtain than barrels. They should be lined with clean paper. Any apple with a bruise or blemish should be put aside. Only whole, clean fruit should be stored, and the apples should be put into the container as far as possible in layers and then left out. put into the container as far as possible in layers and then left out-doors, but protected from rain, for about a week.





## PETROL RESTRICTIONS TO BE RENEWED

#### Strict Rationing For Private **Motor Cars**

#### TO APPLY ON FEBRUARY 1

WELLINGTON, Jan. 22.

The reimposition of the petrol restrictions from February 1 was announced by the Minister of Supply (the Hon. D. G. Sullivan) this evening.

Small private cars will receive eight gallons monthly and







## ACHILLES CRUISING IN SOUTH AMERICAN WATERS

#### The Son Of Hastings Residents Writes Of Ship's Recent Activities

Events prior to the H.M.S. Achilles' engagement with the German battleship Graf Spee are described by a young man, a member of the crew, writing to his parents in Hastings. Because of an official restriction, he stated that he could not speak of anything which occurred after October 13.

"We left Auckland in a hurry," the letter states, "and when we were clear of the harbour the captain mustered us all aft, and told us that we were going through the Panama Canal to join the North American Squadron. We had been out only three days when we altered course for Valparaiso, on the Chilean coast, from where we were to hunt for merchant raiders."

Arriving at Valparaiso on September 13, the Achilles took in fuel and stores, no one was given shore leave, and she sailed the following day. After visiting several other South American ports, they arrived at Callao, the sheep port of Peru, on September 22, to find five German ships sheltering there. "We left next day and steamed up and down outside the harbour waiting for them to come out, but they were wise, and stopped there," states the letter.

At a port called Talana, a Canadian-American oil concession, the ship's company had its first shore leave on September 24. They sailed the following day, to arrive at Edina Descriptions of the September 25. the following day, to arrive at Ediha Bay in Ecuador on September 26.

"All this coast was as desolate and lonely as could be imagined, and Aden looked fertile compared with it," states the writer. "The sand-hills were several hundred feet high, all along the coast."

After spending several hours at Buenaventura, in Columbia, on September 28 they sailed to escort the British liner Orduna to Valparaiso. They picked her up on September 30 and steamed south again, not in sight of the liner, but close enough to be of assistance if she were attacked by enemy craft. The voyage was uneventful.

The ship's crew had their first real break after leaving Auckland when they were given leave at Valparaiso on October 10. The men were being paid in sterling at that time, but at that port they were given the local currency. Each member of the crew was given £3 sterling, the equivalent of 360 pesos.
