# WHEAT SHORTAGE IN EARLY DAYS OF WAR

# Minister Reveals How Grain Consumption Exceeded The Supply

LONDON, Jan. 26. The Minister of Food (Mr W. S. Morrison) in the House of Commons revealed that Britain was threatened with serious food shortages in the early stages of the war.

Replying to a charge that the Government had glossed over the true position, which had resulted in the necessity of importing animal feeding stuffs from overseas, Mr Morrison said that after the outbreak of the war there was a considerable period—now happily ended—in which our consumption of grain for bread exceeded the importations. Stored wheat had carried the people safely through the period, but it had been impossible to bring in the accustomed supplies of animal feeding stuffs. The Government had been unable to release more than 30 per cent. of the normal requirements during

There was no shortage at the outbreak of the war, but no considerable stores were in stock. A very considerable improvement had occurred and supplies had been raised to 50 per cent, of the normal requirements in January and were now at 66 per cent., and stores were being built up.

### FREEDOM OF SPEECH

A message published yesterday setting forth the views of the Hon. H. G. R. Mason, Attorney-General, and a statement by the New Zealand Freedom Association published this morning, cover practically the same ground. It is contended in both instances that freedom of speech—as was hinted in yesterday's article in this column—must be regulated by social principles in order that other people's freedom may be conserved.

There is a temptation to be merely academic on such a subject, and it is one which should be resisted. The Freedom Association, for instance, emphasises the mutual rights of all sides to express their views. But the academic argument falls flat to the ground if we ask the question: Has anyone in a civilised country the right to express his opinion that civil disputes should be settled by duelling or by the ordeal of fire, or by any other means that would simply not be recognised as valid? Neither of the two pronouncements here referred to get to the real heart of the matter, although Mr Mason gets nearer to it than does the Freedom Association. At any rate, Mr Mason says that we are entitled to demand that propagandists should "abstain from propaganda which is hostile to the national cause." The Freedom Association leaves the whole question in the hands of Parliament.

But there is more to be said than that. The voice of the loyal people of the Dominion should be heard on the subject, and their unanimous opinion will be that without further ado or discussion the subversive elements in the community should be punished and suppressed. We have Cabinet Ministers in the present Government who have been in gaol for the reason that they over-did the freedom of speech business, and it is only honest and just to say that they cannot look upon similar breaches through the same eyes as those of the ordinary citizen who has no such history behind him.

While we may believe that the Government is out to prosecute the present war to the best advantage, we cannot help agreeing with the correspondent in yesterday's "Daily Mail" who said that the spokesmen of the Government are strangely silent on the question. There has not yet been in this country that ringing call for service in defence of the Dominion which has characterised the Old Country. A little restriction of petrol is about the strength of the civilian's sacrifice as yet. As Mr Fraser said, it is a very small sacrifice.

The people of the Dominion have the right to insist that they should be truly represented on the question of war service and of anti-war, pacifist, or Communist propaganda. Mr Semple, it will be admitted, has said hard things to the Communists. He has called them names in his own picturesque way. But the fact remains that nothing has been done to stop the rot. It is still going on. Once more we are being treated to an overdose of "freedom of speech"—on both sides.

The Scots have a proverb worth remembering. It goes like this: "Sticks and stanes can break my banes, but names can never hurt me." In other words, a time comes when it is not enough to combat words with more words. That time is now, when definite and firm action should be undertaken by the Government and by all those to whom the Government should delegate the power, to put an end to the vicious spreading of rumours and to the ridiculous spectacles of soap-box orators mouthing their nauseous platitudes and cliches while red-blooded men are entraining daily to go and fight for them.

Where is the lead that we are entitled to expect from the Government? A Cabinet does not govern a country with words, but by Acts. Let us see something concrete in the way of a definite drive against the traitors who are doing all in their power to lower the prestige of Britain in one of the Empire's Dominions.

WELLINGTON, Jan. 26. Flood water covering the rails of the Hutt line for a distance of over a mile delayed the peak suburban traffic between eight and nine o'clock this morning by eight minutes per train, owing to the reduction of speed through a depth of

The operations of the electric control points of the Johnsonville line were interfered with, necessitating the elimination of an electric train.

On the main north line, earth falls at the north portal of the second tunnel delayed two inward suburban trains by 70 minutes and 45 minutes respectively. Subsequent earth falls interfered with the automatic signalling system, resulting in a delay to the Limited from Auckland of 27 minutes.

The Wellington express to Napier struck a telegraph pole, which fell across the line in front of the engine north of Takapu Road, causing minor damage.

# Pacifist Meeting THE PEOPLES' RIGHTS IN TIMES OF EMERGENCY

# Freedom Association Urges That Clear-Sighted View Be Taken

The propagandist activities of Communists, of pacifists, and of certain other like-minded groups are creating so much open hostility in the public mind that a measure of intervention on the part of the authorities would appear to be inevitable, says a statement issued by the New Zealand Freedom Association. The quarter from which that intervention should come and the precise form which it should take are matters of vital importance and, as such, they deserve the most careful consideration. It is essential that in our approach to this problem we will make certain that a long and clear-sighted view shall be taken; passion and prejudice must be excluded so far as that is humanly possible; and, in arriving at a final decision, due regard should be had to the events and tendencies of recent years.

The privileges of public assembly and of free discussion are rightly regarded as being absolutely fundamental to our conception of Democracy. Without those privileges, representative government, as we understand it, could not function; and, if representative government were to go, Democracy, as we know it, would vanish from our land.

In times of emergency, and of grave national peril, it might well be expedient, and even very desirable in the common interest, that rights and privileges normally regarded as fundamental should be brought within the ambit of legislative restriction supportion or warm.

brought within the ambit of legislative restriction, suspension or even abrogation. In that event, whenever we happened to be dealing with privileges regarded as being fundamental, and as belonging to all, we should insist that all measures of abrogation or of suspension of those privileges themselves should be introduced by Parliament and by Parliament alone. The central government should be the only body that introduced legislation designed and intended to abrogate or to susand intended to abrogate or to suspend, in whole or in part, rights and privileges regarded as of constitutional importance.

(1) Parliament represents the eople as a whole and it is, therefore, the appropriate tribunal to deal with the abrogation or suspen-sion of privileges belonging to the people as a whole.

(3) Local authorities should start off with the idea that the people living within their jurisdiction have and free speech. der their jurisdiction Difficult Choice

Freedom has been aptly described as the state of having such rights as are consistent with others awing and enjoying equal rights. We cannot in democracy claim a having and enjoying equal rights. We cannot in democracy claim a fundamental right for one section of the community and deny it to another. This may lead us into very awkward situations at times, but that is the price we have to pay for our system. It may be difficult for us to grant to those who would destroy us the privilege of discussing in public their plans for accomplishing their object. But that is just the logical result which we have to face if we wish to continue to claim liberty of speech for ourselves. The assertion of the privileges of free speech imposes an enormous strain upon the good sense leges of free speech imposes an enormous strain upon the good sense and sound judgment of the people. If the risk is too great, or if pressing circumstances compel us to deviate from principle and to introduce restrictions, we should hand over that task to the central government for that body alone is competent to deal with matters that are fundamental. In approaching such a task the central government of a particular group tends only to drive underground certain forces and activities that would be better

In other words, if it should be found to be imperative to take away the privilege of public assembly from any one section of the community, the measure for the community, the measure for the community. The British practice in such matters is to treat the privileges as existing, to make no effort to cancel or to suspend them, to allow them to be enjoyed as freely as possible, but to frame regulations which will define specific abuses and provide appropriate punishment for their

appropriate punishment for their infringement.

In conclusion, it may be submitted, with proper respect, that:—

(1) The Emergency Regulations which already exist contain ample provisions for dealing adequately and effectively with any persons who abuse the privileges of public assembly and free discussion.

(2) Local authorities should not seek to legislate in such a manner as take away a fundamental and con-

to take away a fundamental and con-stitutional liberty from one section

stitutional liberty from one section of the community while leaving other sections of the people in possession and enjoyment of that self-same privilege.

(3) If it should be found to be necessary or expedient to differentiate between different sections of the community in a matter of fundamental right the responsibility for that course should rest with Parliament and with Parliament and measures of the kind contemplated should be introduced only in the face of an emergency that was the face of an emergency that was compelling and immediate and which left room for no other available alternative.

(4) In regulating the exercise of the privileges of public assembly and free discussion, local authori ties should not discriminate unfairly between different sections of the people, but should lay down regulations which would be general in their nature, uniform in their appliants of the people of th

their nature, uniform in their application and scrupulously impartial in their operation and effects.

It is hoped that the material set out in this memorandum will be of assistance to those who are charged with the responsibility of dealing with a very difficult problem. Such difficulties as there are do tend to disappear when basic principles are carefully examined and faithfull' applied.

# GIRLS' SPORTS CARNIVAL

JUDGE'S COMMENTS ON MARCHING

RECENT MEETING

Valuable Criticism Offered

Major J. W. Olphert, judge of the marching section at the recent interhouse girls' carnival at Napier, has supplied some interesting com-ments on the performances of the teams. Taking each movement separately, they read as follows:-

Syllabus

The syllabus comprised a few simple movements as set out in the "Manual of Elementary Drill, 1935," and the judging could be done only from the detail of this manual. Too many teams failed to adhere strictly to the manual and introduced details which, although spectacular from the spectators' point of view, were wholly incorrect from the judge's point of view and therefore lost the offending teams many points. When a definite method is laid down team coaches should adhere strictly to such method and here strictly to such method and eschew "stunt" movements.

Fall In And March

Marker.—Some markers marched out far too rapidly. The pace should be that which would cover 100 yards

in Osler's Hall in the evening.

Saturday

The second day of the races, side shows and the final dance to be held in Osler's Hall will mark the concluding day of Carnival Week next Saturday.

Be that which would cover 100 yards in one minute.
Fall In.—In some instances this was too formal. The fall in is not a march in line. The squad should be standing easy and on the word "Squad" should assume the "at ease" position and on the command "Fall in" should spring to attention and march briskly into position on the marker. The distance between ranks should be 60 inches right through the contest. In numbering, some team captains gave the wrong order. The order is not "By the right, number," but simply, "Squad, number." All numbering is done from the right. In dressing the squad, some team captains, again, gave the wrong command. The command is not "Eyes right, dress," but "Squad, right dress." One good team, Westerman's, had too much space between the squad members. Each member should occupy a lateral space of 24 inches. Two inches between elbows will get the distance

about correct. Forming Fours

The forming fours was uniformly good and really excellent in the best squads. The marching in fours, too, was very good, although some teams adopted an exaggerated arm swing. The arm should be raised forward to meet a line drawn forward from the waist line and should ward from the waist line and should be swung the same height to the rear. Team captains should remem

rear. Team captains should remember there is no such thing as a "back rank." Always refer to it as a "rear rank."

Advance in Line. — Uniformly good. Faults in dressing in some squads. Step in most squads was well maintained. vell maintained

Right or Left Turn.—Turns were well executed, but covering was poor in some teams on completion

Right or Left Wheel.—Generally good, but in some squads the inner girl of the leading file would round on her own ground instead of "round a quarter of the circumference of a circle having a radius of four feet."

Right or Left Form.—A tendency Right or Left Form.—A tendency to jam in too close, in some squads, and swing round like a gate. Each member of the squad should march round at her own pace. It is obvious that the outer member cannot get round as quickly as the inner member, and should not endeavour to do so

o do so. Halt, Form Fours.—When halted the squad should be well dressed. This was lacking in some cases. Forming fours was very good.
Dismiss.—When dismissed, squad should march briskly off the parade ground. One squad failed to do this, otherwise the dismiss was good.

The work of all competing teams was good and a credit to their coaches and captains, but no comment would be complete without mentioning the uniformly excellent display of the Golden Crust team. It was easily the best team in this section of the competition, and I felt it could compete with any team anywhere. It had an excellent cap tain, ably supported by an equally excellent team, displaying the results of careful coaching and long and persistent efforts of the team

It was a pleasure to judge such a good competition, and these comments have been made as constructive as possible in the hope that they may be of some benefit to I teams for future contests




