## TOMOANA WORKS THE SCENE OF A DESTRUCTIVE FIRE

### Big New Building Goes Up In Flames

#### TWO BRIGADES CALLED OUT EARLY THIS MORNING

##### Serious Meat Loss Feared

Fire which broke out soon after one o'clock this morning almost completely destroyed the building intended to provide new freezing storage space at the Tomoana freezing works.

Summoned by the hooting of the works whistle, the works engine turned out at 1.30 a.m. By that time the whole of the building was alight in the top section, the flames bursting through the iron roof at several points.

The fire is likely seriously to embarrass new season's killings at the works, for the building was to provide very necessary extra storage space.

When the fire broke out many of the workers were about to begin duty on night shift. The hooting of the whistle and high-flung flames and sparks attracted several hundred residents in night attire to watch the blaze.

With two leads of hose the Works Brigade turned its attention to preventing the flames from spreading to the adjacent freezing accommodation and the engine-room, being assisted by the Hastings Brigade, which arrived at 2.5 a.m.

At 2.35 the flames were spreading to the engine-room, and it was feared that that might also be destroyed.

#### Explosions Heard

Some difficulty was experienced in maintaining a good flow of water, this greatly hampering the efforts of the two brigades.

Explosions could frequently be heard from the blazing area; these were believed to be due to the effect of the fierce heat on the insulating material.

Immediately the fire broke out the works emergency pumps were started to boost the pressure to fight the flames. Leads of hose were run out on each side of the building and efforts were directed to checking the spread of the flames into the old building.

#### Large Crowd Watched

The large crowd which watched the blaze was forced to keep its distance by the violent explosions which forced pieces of insulating material through the walls of the building.

The insulation in the walls comprised asbestos, bitumen, and cork, the latter two substances giving fuel to the fire.

#### Fire Spreads

An hour after the fire had broken out it was spreading into the main building by way of the roof and some hundreds of carcasses of new season's beef, mutton, and pigs were being damaged by smoke, flames, and water.

An emergency gang of workers was summoned and, in an effort to move the meat from the path of the fire, a hole was being broken in the wall of the store.

#### Cost of £12,000

To have been completed at the end of February, the building was estimated to cost £12,000. The bottom half was brick with asbestos exterior sheeting on the top section. The roof was on the building, the insulation work was complete, and only interior finishing work had to be done.

At 3.15 a.m. the fire was still spreading through the roof, but the brigade appeared to be gaining control. The plan to break through the wall to save the meat was abandoned and only a few carcasses were shifted.

#### At the time of going to press

(3.45) firemen had entered the ground floor of the new building and were fighting the flames from within.

## WOMEN'S APPEAL FOR PEACE

### AMERICAN REQUEST TO WASHINGTON

#### Conference Of Neutrals Proposed

A conference of eleven of the largest feminist organisations in the United States, representing five million women, has appealed to the Government to initiate a conference of neutrals to offer terms for a negotiated peace.

Mrs Roosevelt warned the conference that the time was coming when Americans must decide what sacrifices they are willing to make for peace.

## AN EARLY CANADIAN ELECTION

### SUDDEN DISSOLUTION OF PARLIAMENT

#### Continued Criticism By Opposition

United Press Association—Copyright. (Received January 26, 11.15 p.m.) OTTAWA, Jan. 25.

The Governor-General of Canada, (Lord Tweedsmuir), speaking at the opening of Parliament today, announced that an immediate general election would be held. The Government, he said, felt that it should have a direct and unquestionable mandate.

#### Lack of Unity

The Prime Minister (the Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King) told the House that he had hoped for a regular session and the passing of essential legislation, but this was now unlikely because of the lack of unity.

He stressed the fact that the attack made by the Premier of Ontario (Mr. Michael Heppburn) on January 15, had changed the situation. Mr. Mackenzie King asked how it could be expected that he could do what was necessary in war time if he was surrounded by enemies and with political opponents seeking to undermine the Administration's every effort.

#### Election in March

The election is expected late in March. Parliament will meet immediately the returns are declared.

#### Precedents Set

Meanwhile the Government will continue to function with extraordinary wartime powers and administrative funds provided by Orders-in-Council. The Speech from the Throne remains unadopted, which is just one of the many precedents set in the shortest and most dramatic session in Canada's history.

What saddened the Opposition particularly was that Mr. Mackenzie King's move bade fair to deprive them of all the political ammunition they were expecting to obtain against the Government by obtaining access to the Government's documents through demands on Ministers on the floor of the House.

## WHEAT SHORTAGE IN EARLY DAYS OF WAR

### Minister Reveals How Grain Consumption Exceeded The Supply

United Press Association—Copyright. (Received January 26, 10.5 p.m.) LONDON, Jan. 26.

The Minister of Food (Mr. W. S. Morrison) in the House of Commons revealed that Britain was threatened with serious food shortages in the early stages of the war.

Replying to a charge that the Government had glossed over the true position, which had resulted in the necessity of importing animal feeding stuffs from overseas, Mr. Morrison said that after the outbreak of the war there was a considerable period—now happily ended—in which our consumption of grain for bread exceeded the importations. Stored wheat had carried the people safely through the period, but it had been impossible to bring in the accustomed supplies of animal feeding stuffs. The Government had been unable to release more than 30 per cent. of the normal requirements during December.

There was no shortage at the outbreak of the war, but no considerable stores were in stock. A very considerable improvement had occurred and supplies had been raised to 50 per cent. of the normal requirements in January and were now at 66 per cent., and stores were being built up.

## Battle-Scarred Liner At Napier

### ATTACKED BY BOMBER

#### Wireless Operator Killed By A Bullet Ricochet

### SHIP DEFENDS HERSELF

Battered and scarred from an encounter with an enemy bombing plane, an 11,000-ton liner dropped anchor in the Napier roadstead yesterday morning. One member of the ship's company, the second wireless operator, was killed by a machine-gun bullet during the attack.

A vivid story of the encounter was related by one of the ship's officers.

"It came without any warning," he said. "The cloud was fairly low that day, and we did not realise anything was wrong until we heard the bomber swooping down over the ship.

"Although the bomb missed the ship by about 30 feet, it exploded under water, and nearly lifted us into the air," he said.

In missing the vessel from such a low altitude the marksmanship of the aeroplane's crew was not particularly creditable and when they returned they machine-gunned the ship, riddling the woodwork like a sieve. The captain's cabin received a very severe battering but no one was hurt on that part of the vessel.

The second wireless operator was killed by a bullet which ricocheted from the steelwork.

## AMERICA VIOLATES HER NEUTRALITY

### DELIVERY OF BOMBERS TO CANADA

#### Big Orders Flown Over The Atlantic

United Press Association—Copyright. (Received January 27, 0.10 a.m.) NEW YORK, Jan. 26.

The Washington correspondent of the "New York Times" says: "The British Government thus far has shipped 80 planes to Finland and is expected to ship more soon under an informal understanding whereby Britain will release American-made planes on condition that American manufacturers ship replacements immediately.

"The priority of British and French orders, apart from the question of finance, made it almost impossible for Finland to secure planes direct from the United States."

The "New York Herald-Tribune" gives prominence to a Washington correspondent's report that Lockheed bombers, purchased by Britain and manned by French crews, are flying over American soil en route to Botwood, Newfoundland, whence they are flown across the Atlantic to the Western Front. The flights have been proceeding for some time and will continue until an order of 250 planes is delivered. The method involves violation of American neutrality, but it is being winked at.

The Lockheed Corporation has received an additional British order for 200 bombers at a cost in excess of 20,000,000 dollars.

The total foreign and domestic orders received by American aircraft manufacturers exceed seven hundred million dollars.

It is reported that the British and French are discussing lodging orders for from 6000 to 8000 bombers and numerous fighters.

## A NEW HARRIER OF SHIPPING

### Use Of Aircraft-Carriers NAZI INTENTIONS SUSPECTED

#### Problem Of Supply

British Official Wireless. (Received Jan. 26, 7.20 p.m.) RUGBY, Jan. 26.

Reports of the launching of German aircraft-carriers have caused speculation in London air circles about their possible use. The inferior strength of the German Navy, reduced further by the losses and damage at the hands of the Navy and the R.A.F., may preclude the use of enemy aircraft-carriers in full scale fleet actions.

An alternative which is thought likely to appeal to the Nazis is to employ these aircraft-carriers as destroyers of Allied and neutral commerce. Assuming that they run the gauntlet of the British forces commanding the North Sea and the long-range aircraft operating from other areas, the carriers would then have to face the considerable problem of supply while on the high seas.

## CONSPIRACY DISCOVERED IN RUSSIA

### OGPU MAKES MANY ARRESTS

The Rome radio says that the OGPU has discovered a vast conspiracy against Stalin, Molotov and Voroshilov.

Mass arrests have been made all over the Ukraine. At Kiev 150 officers and high officials have been arrested.

## Training Time Of Airmen Cut By One-Fifth

### New Apparatus Teaches The Art While Standing Still

#### Saving In Cost

#### Adaption Of "Link Trainer" Used In Blind Flying

British Official Wireless. (Received Jan. 26, 7.45 p.m.) RUGBY, Jan. 26.

A new method of giving flying instruction of an elementary kind by the adaption to this purpose of the apparatus known as the "Link Trainer," hitherto only used as an aid in teaching blind flying, is expected to shorten by one-fifth the time required by pupils to learn flying.

Seated in a cockpit mounted on a small fuselage on a pedestal, a pilot can be given all the impressions of flying in any conditions of weather and with changing landscapes. This is done by induced movements corresponding to those of actual flight and by a "cyclone" on the walls of the bare circular chamber in which the apparatus is installed.

Indoor instruction by this method can proceed when outdoor conditions render flying impossible, and valuable time would be lost. Driven by a powerful bellows, the fuselage is steered on its turntable through all the motions of actual flight. The take off, climb, turns and banks are made. Flying on a given course, the pilot passes from sunshine to fog, skirts a large town and finally reaches his objective. Indicators under the wings, nose and tail record for the instructor's information exactly how much bank the pupil is applying, how far the nose is down or up and whether he is keeping these elements steady.

## RUSSIA FRUITLESSLY SACRIFICES TROOPS ON FINNISH FRONT

### THOUSANDS OF LIVES SQUANDERED IN ONE WEEK

#### MANNERHEIM LINE RESISTS ALL ATTEMPTS

United Press Association—Copyright. (Received January 26, 11.15 p.m.) HELSINGFORS, Jan. 26.

The Finns regard the front north of Lake Ladoga as vital but impregnable unless the Russians turn its flank. The Russian commanders have been lavishly squandering lives in an effort to accomplish this, expending 10,000 dead and wounded in the past week, while many tanks fell into Finnish hands.

The Finns feel that the Russians must take a breathing space, which will give them a respite, enabling reorganisation of their defences.

The Russian plans to envelop the Mannerheim Line by breaking through north-east of Lake Ladoga seem doomed to failure. The invaders' offensive has progressed to a minimum extent in the past five days, though the pressure against the Finnish lines has been maintained.

## AMERICANS URGED TO LEAVE SWEDEN

### "FUTURE CANNOT BE FORETOLD"

The "Daily Mail's" Stockholm correspondent says that the United States Minister (Mr. Frederick Sterling) has circulated Americans throughout Sweden, urging them to return home.

It is believed that the reported troop concentrations in northern Germany and Sweden's defence preparations have influenced the decision.

The circular particularly urges the withdrawal of women and children, adding: "While the situation is not immediately dangerous, nothing can be foretold."

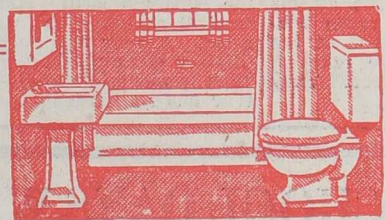

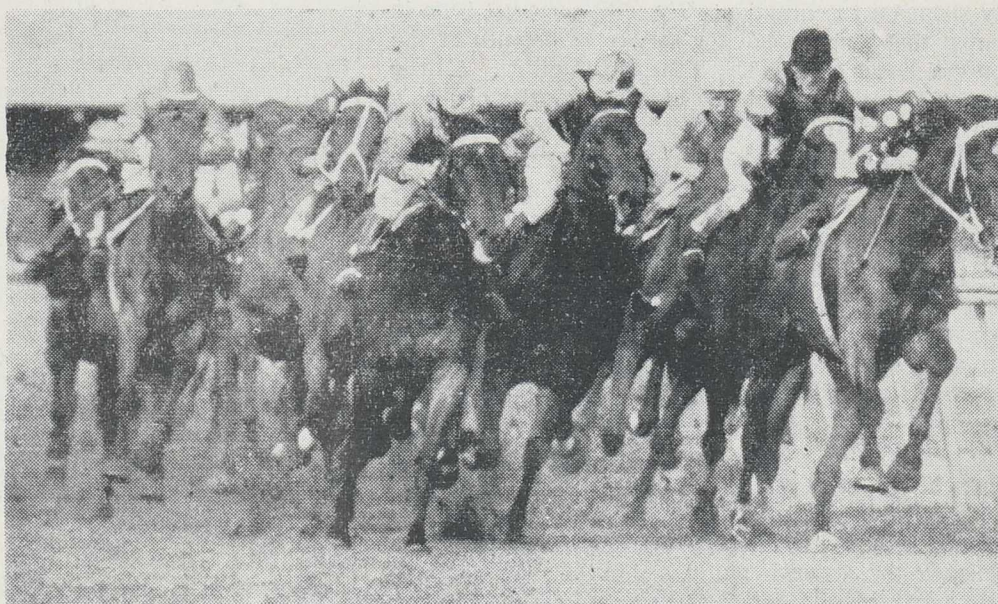

**BURNS NIGHT AT WAIROA**  
**THE IMMORTAL MEMORY**  
**LARGE GATHERING**  
**A Real Scottish Occasion**

"Daily Mail" Special Service. WAIROA.

"You could never balance a holy halo upon that broad brow. Depend upon it, Burns would coddle it sideways like a Glangary and at the first fling of his heels off it would go into the mire, even although the next moment he might be down on his knees after it with a tear in his eye."

"Burns was like you and me. That is to say, he was like other folk—a mixture of dirt and Deity, the ingredients necessary to make a man of any sort."

This was the keynote of an eloquent address given by Mr A. D. Morrison, M.A., M.C., Hastings, in proposing the toast of "The Immortal Memory," at the Burns Night anniversary ceremony conducted by the Wairoa Burns Club, in Osler's Hall, Wairoa, on Thursday night.

**Outstanding Success**  
 More than 100 persons, including many Scotsmen from throughout the Wairoa district, and a number of visitors from Napier and Hastings entered wholeheartedly into the spirit of the occasion, and enthusiasm predominated. The event was from all points of view an outstanding success. Great credit is due to the organisers with Mr D. Glangary as president and Mr R. C. Bauld as secretary.

A warm welcome to the gathering was extended by Mr Glangary, who explained that the evening being conducted to do homage to Scotland's greatest poet and also with a view to reviving the Burns Night at Wairoa.

There was never such a mixture of fun, gaiety, sympathy, rebellion and seriousness as Burns, said Mr Morrison, in proposing the toast of "The Immortal Memory." Burns was just plain human. He made mistakes and he was inconsistent. On the other hand he strongly disliked humbugs. "Burns was the most sincere of all the literary men in the world," declared Mr Morrison. "He meant everything he said, and he said everything he meant."

By his remarkable vision and understanding of human nature Burns became international in his appeal. His qualities were outstanding. He was the biggest, finest and best democrat ever known in the world of letters. He sang the loves and hates, the joys and sorrows of common men and women.

**Hatred of Sham**  
 Continuing, Mr Morrison illustrated how Burns had a "tremendous hatred of 'skiting' and sham. Through this attitude alone he played no minor part in eliminating class distinctions; a far bigger part, in fact, than anyone has played since."

What was more, he never lost his independence of judgment.

Mr Morrison interspersed his address with verses from Burns's works.

The ceremony of the "Piping o' the Haggis" was conducted by Messrs J. B. Cook and J. M. O'Leary. The following toast list was honoured:—

The King (Mr D. Glangary), "The Immortal Memory" (Mr A. D. Morrison), "The Land o' Cakes" (Mr H. H. Lyall—Mr J. B. Cook), "Bonny Jean" (Mr R. Bauld), "Kindred Societies" (Mr J. M. Taylor—Mr A. Gordon), "Local Bodies" (Mr H. L. Taylor—Mr H. Brady), "The Lassies" (Mr Glangary—Mr R. J. Powdrell), "The Press" (Mr Murray—Mr Russell Kirkby), "The President" (Mr D. J. Simpson), Osler and Sons.

Items were contributed by Madames J. Thomas, Gledstone, Misses Newland and Thomas, Messrs R. Bauld and A. McLellan (songs), Mrs Boyd, Napier (recitations). The by Mr J. Corbett, and pipe music piano accompaniment were played by Messrs. D. Simpson and W. A. Simpson.

A highlight of the programme was provided by a highland fling contest staged by two well-known Scottish veterans, Messrs J. M. Taylor and H. H. Lyall. Mr Morrison, with infinite tact, gave the verdict as a draw. The verdict was popular.

**INK STAINS**

Before using acids on ink stains, try to remove them with milk, or salt and lemon.

For ink stains on wood, put a few drops of spirits of nitre in a teaspoonful of water; touch the spot with a feather dipped in the mixture and, as soon as the ink disappears, rub over with a rag wetted in cold water or it will leave a white mark.

For ink stains on carpets cover thickly with salt and remove with a spoon, applying fresh salt until no more ink is absorbed. Rub the spot with a cut lemon and rinse with clean water.

For ink stains on white or light coloured fabrics, or a carpet of delicate shade, rub the part affected with a juicy tomato, leaving the spot pulp on the stain for a day. Lightly scrape off the fleshy matter, and wash with a clean cloth and warm water. Always select a fully ripe tomato, as it is the juice and not the flesh and seeds that has the cleansing property.

No stains will result if, when ink is spilt on boards, cold water is immediately poured over it to dilute the ink.

For stains on coloured fabrics a simple but effectual method is to squeeze some lemon juice on to the stains, which will disappear when the article is washed. Another method is to dissolve a teaspoonful of oxalic acid in a teacup of hot water; rub the stained part well with a rag dipped in the solution.

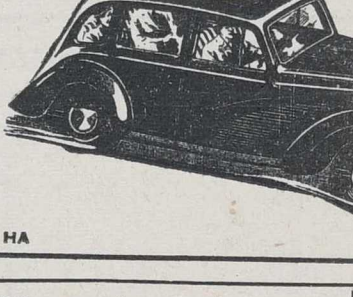
