





POINTS OF VIEW

There is a certain crass realism about Labour's attitude to the war which is at least honest, whatever other adjectives may be applied to it. Three speeches within the past two days are worthy of being brought together and looked at through the same microscope so that some interesting differences and similarities may emerge.

The first speech is that delivered by the Hon. R. Semple in Christchurch. He is still carrying on his good work against Bolshevistic propaganda, and most of us wish him the best of luck so far as that "job" is concerned. He has made clear what has been more than suspected for a long time—that foreign money is actually being spent in this country for the subversion of our civilised institutions. He has promised some dire revelations along that line at an early date. That is all

But Mr Semple's chief concern seems to be that Communism is the enemy of Labour and his main theme seems to be that it is for that reason that it must be destroyed. In other words, we see a curious mixture of party politics and world economics. Mr Semple has, as usual, offered to pay somebody's fare to Moscow, and so on-but the narrow view of his own duty remains. He is fighting against Communism because he is fighting for the doctrines of the Labour Party. There is no breadth of vision in what he had to say.

The second speech was delivered by the Hon. F. Langstone in Napier on Wednesday. He certainly grasped a wider issue than did Mr Semple. "It was not only sentiment and love for the Mother Country that brought us in," he declared. "We had to come into the war to save our own hides." Earlier, he had said that Labour is anti-war and always would be. and he went on to express the belief that what is needed in New Zealand is more socialist propaganda. At any rate, he sees the great problem as affecting the interests of the Dominion as a whole, which is a step forward from viewing it as affecting merely one of the political parties in it. Yet one feels that that is not enough.

It is like stepping into a new, clean atmosphere to turn to the remarks made by Sir Harry Batterbee at Palmerston North, who set the bounds of the whole question wide and wider yet, so as to include not only the Dominion and the Empire but the whole world of civilised endeavour. He made an appeal during these critical times for a return to "the old, simple things, such as duty to one's neighbour and duty to one's God." He was speaking to Rotarians, who are people who profess to a splendid creed of "service before self," and he pointed out that practically the only countries in the world which will not allow the entrance of Rotary are Germany and

To be taken back to the simplicities is what we all need at such a time, and the broadening of the outlook as suggested by Sir Harry Batterbee should be regarded as a contribution for which thanks are due. New Zealand has not even yet shaken off that half-thinking and half-unthinking sense of complacency which has been the cause of more than one disaster in the world before now. We are still too apt to be immersed in and preoccupied with our own personal or party or even national affairs so that we "fail to see the wood for the trees." To be recalled to the elemental facts of honour and of duty to our fellow creatures, wherever and whoever they may be, is to be brought to face the real issues of the

conflict. We are not fighting Communist propaganda to keep the Labour Party in power. We are not fighting Nazism merely to save our own skins. We are in this struggle "for the wrongs that need resistance, for the cause that lacks assistance, for the future in the distance, and the good that we may do," so that those who come after may live in freedom and in



> "Futile To Make An Order For Restitution," Says The Judge

> > By Telegraph—Press Association HAMILTON, March 7.

The view that it would be futile to make an order for restitution of conjugal rights against a soldier away on active service was expressed in a reserved judgment delivered by Mr Justice Blair to-day.

The judgment arose from a case heard on February 15 during the quarterly session of the Supreme Court in Hamilton, when Gertrude Olive Jefferies Johansen, of Waipukurau, proceeded against Bert William Johansen for restitution of conjugal rights.

During the hearing the petitioner said that in September, last year, she received a letter from respondent saying that he was going into a military camp. At the time of the hearing she understood that he was with the New Zealand troops in Egypt.

In that instance the Judge made an order so that the respondent, if he were willing, would have ample time and opportunity to obey the book to day.







Although not one of the old-established classic events, the Taranaki Stakes, the highlight of to-morrow's racing at New Plymouth, is a race which has attracted some of the best horses in New Zealand in the last quarter of a century. Hawke's Bay played a very important part in the establishment of the Taranaki Stakes and, while the first two winners in 1915 and 1916 were South Islanders in Flying Start and Emperador, the Okawa speedsters Estland, Finmark, and Desert Gold won the next three contests, Desert Gold's defeat of Gloaming in 1919 being a story in itself.

Owner-trainer Jack Cameron's great galloper The Hawk won the Taranaki Stakes in 1927 and 1928, and the last Hawke's Bay horse to succeed in this event was Golden Wings, who scored in 1934.

To-morrow the 26th Taranaki Stakes will be run, and glancing over the list of winners in the brief period the race has been run, one is struck by the number of really great horses whose names are inscribed among the winners. Gloaming won twice, and so did Motley and Paganelli. Ammon Ra, who went on the following season to great triumphs in Australia, won as a two-year-old. That great imported mare Glentruin won in 1924, and other good mares to win the race have been Silver Link, Lady Quex, and Stretto. Smoke Screen, holder of the New Zealand mile record, suc-
