The Stockholm correspondent of the "New York Times" says it is learned that the Finnish and Russian representatives are now in personal touch. The peace terms are more excessive than anything the Finns expected; nevertheless, it is reliably stated that they are being seriously considered.

It is denied that the Swedish Government brought pressure to bear. It is said that Stockholm acted merely as a postman.

The Stockholm correspondent of the Associated Press of Great Britain says it is reliably stated that Sweden is seeking a Russian-Finnish armistice. It is also confirmed that Russia's peace demands were recently presented to Finland.

Another Stockholm message says that Germany is taking the initiative for the peace talks.

Official Swedish sources refuse to deny or confirm reports that Sweden has submitted to Helsingfors peace terms from Stalin providing for the surrender of the Karelian Isthmus, Viborg, Lake Ladoga and Petsamo. They also decline to discuss reports that Germany has warned Sweden that the transit of volunteers would be regarded as a hostile act.

The impression prevails that Sweden is striving for a peaceful solution before the arrival of volunteers. Forces At Work

Strong diplomatic forces are at work in Helsingfors and Stockholm, according to the special correspondent of the official Italian news agency on the Swedish-Finnish fronr. A large hole was torn in the freighter's bows, penetrating through to the crew's sleeping quarters. The liner was not greatly damaged.

Dawn revealed the full havoc of the collision.

The U.S.S. Co. freighter, her bows shattered, forepeak flooded, stern high out of the water and the top of her foremast snapped off, presen ted a battered spectacle. She was held precariously in postion off Goat Island by two tugs and late this afternoon was lightened sufficiently to be towed slowly to Walsh Bay.

## MINISTER'S STRONG STAND

When the Minister of Labour (the Hon. P. C. Webb) declared that the circumstances existing on the waterfronts of the Dominion cannot be allowed to continue, he said something with which there will be universal agreement. When he added that the necessity for the quick dispatch of our produce outweighs at the present time all minor difficulties that may arise as between the shipowners and the watersiders, he was in line with the ruling sentiment in the Dominion. He was almost passionate in his appeal to all concerned to avoid hold-ups, pointing out the root fact that we are at war and that food must be delivered overseas as quickly as possible, but all through his remarks is the recurrent refrain that it will be a guarantee to watersiders that they will get in hard cash the value of their work. Nothing was said of the difficulties of the shipowners or the economic hardships facing them.

For their part, the watersiders, after holding a stop-work meeting, decided yesterday morning "to remain in the same frame of mind" until a new agreement as between the employers and themselves is reached. Just the day before, the Hon. R. Semple, in one of his picturesque phrases, referred to those who seek to "hold a pistol to the head of the Government." The watersiders are doing just that. They have the whip-hand, and they know it. They are the living embodiment of the Solidarity of Labour. They can, so far as New Zealand's part in it is concerned, make or mar the war.

The particular Government with which the watersiders have to deal is caught up on the horns of a dilemma. For the sake of its own existence it must not fall out with this powerful union, and every member of the union is well aware of the fact. Yet, strangely enough in the light of these events referring to the waterfronts, it is one of the biggest planks on the Labour platform that there should be no profiteering in war time. No one, we have been assured again and again, will be allowed to make more for himself just because there happens to be a war on. What, then, are the wharfside workers trying to do? And is the Government going to allow it? As has been said before in this column, the Labour Government is not game to take on the watersiders, and it is a pound to a peanut that these men will come out of the present argument with a fair amount of profit to themselves.

And all the time the grave and solemn issues of the war itself are demanding sacrifices on the part of all sections of the people. Thousands of men have given up much to go into the ranks where they may play an active part in protecting those whose particular work it is to do service on the wharves or elsewhere. They have willingly put themselves under a stern and strict system of discipline which amounts almost to a loss of personal identity. And the watersiders, regardless of the dire inconvenience to essential shipping services, decide that they will not change their minds, nor will they work overtime until they get more money for so doing. That, in plain words, amounts to an ultimatum. But the watersiders are on the "box seat" and they will probably win.

However, one would be failing in public duty to let this opportunity go by without making an honest appeal to these men, whose work is admittedly hard and uncertain, to stand in on the national effort, to postpone their dispute if possible, and in any case to keep on working at the highest pressure while the matter is being discussed by the committee which the Government has set up. They will not be departing from precedent in doing such a thing.

The most essential work relates to the shipping of our produce overseas. There can be no doubt about that. The greatest effort and even sacrifice, if need be, is therefore demanded from those who have it in their power to hasten or to hold up the necessary supplies. The watersiders should fall in on the waterfronts in a common cause to serve New Zealand in her hour of need.

## **GOVERNMENT TAKES** A STRONG STAND WITH WATERSIDERS

## **Union Asked To Show Cause** Why It Should Not Be Deregistered

## DAY OF SURPRISE MOVES

By Telegraph—Press Association

AUCKLAND, March 8.

A message from the Government asking the 'Auckland branch of the Waterside Workers' Union to show reason why it should not be de-registered, and the dismissal by employers of all men who declined overtime work, were features of the situation on the Auckland waterfront to-day.

Since Wednesday the union has refused to work overtime until the claims for a new award covering waterfront conditions in New Zealand

A day of surprise moves opened with a special stop-work meeting of the union.

When the telegram was received from the Minister of Labour (the Hon. P. C. Webb) stating that the Government took a serious view of the situation and asking the men to advise him immediately of their attitude, the union replied that the men would continue in the same frame of mind until the ship-owners had intimated their willingness to meet the workers for the purpose of negotiating a new agreement. Implications that the present position was brought about by Communist influence were emphatically denied at the meeting.

Apparently acting on instructions received from the headquarters of the shipping companies at Wellington, an employer dismissed men who refused overtime work to-night.

When the customary call was made about four o'clock in the afternoon, about 1000 men were working on the vessels to-day, and a large majority of those on the ships which normally would have worked overtime to-night were put off. A call for labour will be made in the morning.

If work is refused, the entire union will have failed to comply with the award conditions, according to the claim of the employers, who hold that in this event the next move must come from the Government.

The determination of the Government to govern and protect the interests and rights of the people was emphasised

by the Minister of Labour (the Hon. P. C. Webb). Referring in an interview this evening to the situation on the waterfront, he criticised the attitude adopted by the Auckland waterside workers and said that the Government hoped that common sense would soon prevail. The situation will be further discussed by Cabinet to-morrow after the return to Wellington of the Deputy-Prime Minister (the Hon. P. Fraser) by aeroplane from the South Island.

Since the present trouble occurred, Mr Webb has been in daily telephonic communication with Mr Fraser, who has been away from Wellington since Monday on a recruiting campaign, and has kept him advised of all developments.

If such had been the case, I would have considered the actions of the watersiders, especially at such a critical time as this, as being extremely ill-advised. "But the situation, to my mind, would not have been wholly black. My investigations reveal something that I am ashamed to admit. I was informed that the delay of the Arbitration Court in the hearing of the dispute was only a pretext, and that the real object of the organised minority of our watersiders was to tarrede our effort in getting our

The oldest part of the display is an eighteenth century map of the world, in which appears Abel Tasman's first map of New Zealand as he saw it in 1762—part of this, it will be remembered, is featured on the Centennial twopenny stamps.

This explorer had a considerably different conception of the appearance of our coastline from that illustrated in some of the comparatively recent maps on view. Two of these, dated about 1860, are on a large scale and illustrate respectively the North Island and the whole of New Zealand. They were issued by an Auckland firm.

A photograph of the first Mayor of Hastings, Mr. R. Wellwood, who held office in 1886 and 1887, stands side by side with one of the present Mayor, Mr. G. A. Maddison. It is of interest, incidentally, to note that Mr. Wellwood was the father of the present Mayoress, Mrs. Maddison—probably a coincidence unique in New Zealand.

Early photographs of Hastings include one of the first school. Established in 1879, it had a staff of one master and a class of nine pupils. The town's first steam fire engine also has its place. This, the very latest equipment in 1894, is still in use at Whakatu.

Skipper) expressed the hope yesterday that many more early scenes of the town and district, or other mementoes of interest, would be brought forward by residents to add to the display. If this appeal meets with the response it deserves, the library windows may be expected to be a centre of attraction throughout the celebrations.
