WHARFSIDERS PLEASED

"Our ends have been achieved and there is no longer a dispute" was the reported statement by a union official yesterday in relation to the decision of the Government to take over the control of the waterfronts. Work, it is understood, would be resumed to-day.

The prophecy was ventured in this column the other day that the watersiders would get what they wanted. According to their own spokesman, they have evidently got it. But the spokesman's remark inevitably raises the question: What were the ends of these men? They say that they have achieved them. What has happened is that the Government has taken over. Was that their end? If so, why did they not say so? Nothing yet has been made public as to the vexed question of the award which was the ostensible cause of the trouble. There are many people up and down the country who have a right to know why the waterside workers are so pleased all of a sudden.

The new Government official who is now controller of the wharves (Mr R. E. Price) spoke for a long time and evidently spoke words that were dear to the hearts of the watersiders. We read that he was given an ovation accompanied by musical honours. What he actually did say is not fully available, but the chief point would seem to be that the men have endorsed his views. That fact involves the deduction that he may have promised them what the shipowners on economic grounds could not promise them.

Private ownership, unfortunately for the economics of the Labour Party, is forced to cut the cloth to suit the coat, and is in the unenviable position of having to make both ends meet. When costs are bearing a dangerously close relation to revenue, private ownership must pause before increasing them. It has nothing in the way of public credit to fall back upon. It must pay as it goes or get out of business.

Governmental control is in another category. It can make up on the roundabouts what it loses on the swings, and if it loses on both roundabouts and swings there is always the possibility of borrowing in the hope of brighter days to come. If the new controller can meet the demands of the war and at the same time make the waterside work a paying proposition, he is a cleverer man than those who have put their capital into the enterprise, and it will be with the most lively interest that his modus operandi will be observed by the people of the Dominion.

However, it is something to have peace on the waterfronts, even although it is peace at a price, for the stern realities of the war situation are still staring us in the face and the fact remains that if the Dominion is to do its duty it is imperative that essential foodstuffs should be sent overseas to meet the needs of the Old Country and her fighting

If the watersiders get their pound of flesh, it will mean merely that the burden of sacrifice has been shifted on to other shoulders, but the people of the country are willing to see the war through at any cost and they will carry whatever load is put upon them with as good a grace as possible. Now that the men on the waterfronts are working for bosses of their own choosing and presumably under terms of their own dictating, it is devoutly to be hoped that no more will be heard of the recurrent hold-ups of necessary services. If their end has been achieved, let them go ahead and do their work without complaining and without slacking.

"I am pleased that the men on the waterfront in Auckland have resumed work under the conditions laid down by myself yesterday on behalf of the Government," said the Minister of Labour (the Hon. P. C. Webb) this evening.

Reports on discussions that had taken place with the Auckland waterside workers were made to a meeting of Cabinet to-day by Mr Webb and Mr Sullivan following their

return to Wellington from the north.

"The discussions between the executive of the Waterside Workers' Union and the shipowners to which I have referred, relative to the introduction of a new system of employment under co-operative principles to operate under the supervision of Mr Price, the controller, will be opened during the present week," said Mr Webb.

"The negotiations should proceed continuously without delay while the controller carries out preliminary work in connection with his new office. In the meantime, members of the union will be offered work on the basis of the present award and conditions.

"I cannot," said Mr Webb, "too strongly emphasise that control by the Government has been introduced to ensure that there is no delay in the dispatch of the ships which carry the produce so essential to the maintenance of the people of the United Kingdom and to the success of our war effort."

Stating that they were now employed by the Government and not by shipowners and stevedores, members of the Auckland Waterside Workers' Union decided to return to normal work at eight this morning. The decision was practically unanimous.

"Our ends have been achieved and there is no longer a dispute," said a union official after a meeting which started at 8 o'clock and lasted three hours. The attendance was large.

Mr R. E. Price, who has been appointed by the Government as controller of wharves, spoke for an hour and 20 minutes, stating that it was his intention to open the port to-morrow whether the union worked or not. A call would be made for union labour, and if this was not forthcoming his instructions from the Government were to have all jobs manned.

It was explained that the three delegates who went to Wellington on Saturday were present to-day. They return to Wellington probably to-morrow to continue negotiations with the national body.

An indication was given unofficially that there was likelihood of an award being made within three weeks.

In explaining the changed attitude of the men, the Press committee pointed out that various shipping companies and stevedores were no longer employers and the men were now employees of the Government quarrel.

POPULAR FLYER KILLED MEN ON FINAL DISLOYAL "STICKERS" AT MANGERE

Fatal Fall From Inverted Machine

SQUADRON LEADER ALLAN

By Telegraph—Press Association AUCKLAND, March 12.

Falling 3000 feet from the cockpit of a training aeroplane while carrying out instructional flying near Mangere aerodrome this morning, Squadron-Leader D. M. Allan, officer in charge of the school for instructors at Mangere, was killed instantly.

He was accompanied on the flight by the pupil instructor, acting-Pilot-Officer P. G. H. Newton, who assumed control of the machine after the accident and flew it back safely to the

Squadron-Leader Allan took off with Newton about 9.15 a.m. He occupied the back cockpit, with the junior officer in front, the machine being an open cockpit Tiger Moth.

After flying for some time at about 2000ft, and carrying out various evolutions, the pilot took the craft to 3000ft. approximately and performed a slow roll, a manoeuvre in which the aeroplane flies onward, turning slowly into an inverted position and continuing to fly upright again.

This manoeuvre was performed when the Tiger Moth was over open country near the Black Bridge about two miles from the aerodrome, and it was while the machine was inverted that Allan fell.

FOUND IN SHIP'S HOLD

Communist Anti-War . Slogans Attached To Butter Boxes At Auckland

By Telegraph—Press Association

AUCKLAND, March 12.

The discovery in the hold of an overseas steamer at Auckland of stickers bearing anti-war inscriptions pasted on boxes of butter loaded for Great Britain has created a strong feeling among many sections on the waterfront.

A serious view is taken of the propaganda, as it is considered that a wrong conception of New Zealand's attitude to the war will be given to British dock workers and to the public generally through the actions of isolated individuals

An officer who was examining the hold of the ship during loading operations discovered that a yellow sticker bearing the words, "Down with Conscription and the Imperialistic War," had been pasted on to the temperature tube in the hold. The sticker was signed by the Auckland branch of the Communist Party.

Poverty Bay men will then proceed by road.

The provision of road transport between Wairoa and Gisborne for such a large number has been no small problem for those responsible for the organisation, but has been satisfactorily arranged.

Men from Ngaruawahia and Papakura will arrive by the mid-day train to-morrow and on Friday, each party comprising about 70 According to the officers and shipping officials, many more similar stickers were found pasted on boxes of produce in the hold. They were removed and destroyed, but it is thought possible that several hundred may be on the boxes loaded earlier and not exposed to examination. Troops from Burnham will arrive by the ordinary express on Friday and Saturday. Their numbers are not particularly large.

On this ground the ship has drawn the attention of the naval authorities to the matter.

An officer of the vessel stated that many leaflets bearing propaganda on similar lines to that on the stickers had been given to members of the crew.

"The matter has been under consideration by the Auckland Shipping and Stevedores' Association," said Captain Lewis, chairman of the organisation, when the position was referred to him.

Hardship Necessary In every country there must be pioneers, said Mr. Ebbett, and it was necessary that those pioneers endure many trials and hardships.

New Zealand was no exception, and
there was no doubt that the forefathers of those old identities present were a great people. While no one hoped that children of to-day should have to undergo similar hardships, it was realised that the children of the pioneers were not beset by the same temptations as existed to-day. While the days of old might be forgotten, the fact still remained that they played a great part in building the Dominion. The days before river control, great part in building the Dominion.



A hard corn consists of hard skin with a small, hard centre core. If the corn is just appearing, it can often be rubbed away by using an emery board at night and touching with a little iodine each morning. Once the corn has progressed and become painful, it must then either be cut out, which is not advocated for home treatment, or a corn plaster should be used. Soft corns are those which appear between the toes, and are frequently

caused either through continual perspiration or through improper drying after a bath. If the corn has reached the stage where it is covered with a white or yellow hard skin, ed with a white or yellow hard skin, it is better to visit a chiropodist, but if it is still in the soft-corn stage it can be treated at home. The main essential is to keep the skin between the toes dry, and this can be done by placing a tiny pad of cottonwool there and allowing it to remain until all the soreness has disappeared.











MRS M. U'REN

Early Days On The East Coast ARRIVED IN 1872

Members of the older generation of Hawke's Bay will learn with re-gret of the death of Mrs Martha U'Ren at Gisborne after a lengthy illness. Mrs U'Ren was 83 years of illness. 


