# No Thought Of Losing Independence

SHORTAGE OF WEAPONS SPELT DEFEAT

Tribute Paid To The Fallen

HELSINGFORS, March 14.

Field-Marshal Baron von Mannerheim's last order of the day, following the announcement that the peace treaty had been signed, paid a tribute to the 15,000 men who would never return to their homes.

The help which the Western Powers had promised had not arrived, he said, because Sweden and Norway were looking after their own house rather than allowing the transit of troops. Only two battalions of volunteers and some artillery, anti-aircraft guns, and 'planes had been able to arrive in time to fight alongside the Finns.

It was extremely hard to give up land the Finns had possessed for centuries to a foreign race with entirely different culture and morals.

#### AN ASSURANCE

When vast sums of personally contributed moneys are at stake, there is always a tendency to hesitation on the part of some individual contributors, based for the most part on the fear that administrative expenses will eat up a good proportion of the total sum, or that bureaucratic bungling may result in the diverting of subscriptions from their legitimate purpose.

The sum asked for by the National Patriotic Fund Board is a big one. It asks for £100,000 for the purpose of providing comforts for the troops. So far, over one-third of the money has been subscribed, but it is felt that many have hesitated for the reasons mentioned.

It is therefore timely and to the point that we are able to publish this morning an interchange of letters between the Governor-General (Lord Galway) and the Minister of Finance (the Hon. W. Nash), which should go a long way towards clearing up many of the misapprehensions which exist. His Excellency first of all clears away the mistaken idea that the money itself will not be allowed to leave the country, and he goes on to detail the various organisations which will have the handling of the funds. A glance at his letter will serve to reassure the hesitant that their contributions will reach the

destination for which they are intended. The Finance Minister's reply indicates that all the necessary arrangements have been made with the Reserve Bank for the transfer of funds overseas, so that the way should now be clear for the prosecution of a still more vigorous drive for the raising of the necessary total.

The credentials of the organisations into whose hands the allocation and distribution of the funds have been placed are unimpeachable, and all that remains is for the people of the country to realise their obligations to the men overseas

The latest news of the Finnish tragedy in Europe should serve to stir up and to consolidate the determination of our people that they will not be behind any other part of the Empire when sacrifices are asked for. It has been said before, but it cannot be too often repeated, that we are so far from the scenes of conflict that we are apt to become lackadaisical about the whole affair. But while we are busy with our Centennial celebrations, our private businesses, our personal affairs and all the rest of it, men are placing their lives in jeopardy in the high places of the field and the call is insistent and clear that everything we can do for them should be done.

The further we are from the actual noise of the conflict. the more we should cultivate a realistic imagination which will enable us to visualise the conditions under which our men are living—cut off from home and friends and the amenities of their familiar surroundings, working under a strict disciplinary system with but few chances of rest or recreation, the victims of nostalgia, boredom, and the countless small irritations that accompany the herding of men together in intimate contact without variation from day to day, and at the same time with nerves strung to a high pitch as they await the command to plunge into some great adventure which may mean life or death to them.

We need the power to see and the imagination to realise what it must mean to men under such conditions to have sent to them those gifts from home that are redoubled in value because of the circumstances under which they are

Some splendid service has already been rendered by many in the Dominion, but the feeling still persists that there is room for more. It is confidently to be expected that as a result of the Governor-General's assurance still more will come forward to lend a hand to make the lot of the men overseas as comfortable as money can make it.

## **BIG CROWDS AT AUCKLAND**

The first Air Force funeral held in Auckland—that of Squadron-Leader David Malyon Allan, who was killed at Mangere on Tuesday, took place to-day.

All three services were represented, and rarely has there been in Auckland a larger gathering of airmen, for there were present wartime flyer colleagues of the dead officer of 25 years ago, as well as many young pilots whom he had trained, now wearing the uniform of the Royal New Zealand Air Force.

In addition, there was a large attendance of representative citizens, relatives, and many personal friends and members of the general public by whom Squadron-Leader Allan was held in high esteem.

Wrapped in the Royal New Zealand Air Force ensign, and bearing the dead officer's cap and medals, the casket was carried by six officers intimately associated with him in both military and civil aviation. They included brother instructors and former airline pilots now serving with the Air Force, and several pupils of past years.

The party, comprising Squadron-Leader Bolt, Flight-Lieutenants White, of Ohakea, Kirkup, of Mangere, and Jury, of Hobsonville, with Flying-Officers Harvie and Robinson, some 400 men of the Royal New Zealand Air Force, comprising a firing-party from Mangere and an escort and accompanying party from Hobsonville and Whenuapai, paraded in Khyber Pass, outside the chapel, with a military band from Papakura camp.

After a short service at the chapel, conducted by the Rev. G. T. Robson, chaplain to the naval base, the casket was placed on a Royal New Zealand Air Force tender. among the many wreaths sent from various parts of New Zealand.

With the band playing the "Dead March," and Squadron-Leader Allan's younger son Peter, accompanied by his uncle, Mr L. There was another brief service, and at the conclusion the silence was broken by three volleys fired by the firing party. The ceremony ended with the sounding of the "Last Post" by trumpeters of the Royal New Zealand Air Force.

The ashes of Squadron-Leader Allan will be scattered from an aeroplane flying over the Hauraki Gulf.

Lively Scene.

The scene was one befitting the occasion. For some time after the arrival of the train, soldiers and friends remained on the station engaged in eager conversation. It was as if relatives and friends were too excited to wait until the men had reached their homes before saying those things which they had waited so many weeks to say.

Although a few of the men were to be seen in the streets later in the evening, it was evident that a far greater number had sought the comfort of their homes.

"Individuals who spread rumours of this nature are beneath contempt, and I would ask the people of New Zealand in all sincerity to decline to listen to any such statements, which evidently emanate as part of a planned whispering campaign."
Mr Jones said that he felt sure
that the public would take warning should any similarly contemptible methods be used in future.

In actual fact, the number of men invalided out of the First Echelon through sickness or normal causes was remarkably few, and he had been advised by the Director-General of Medical Services (Colonel F. # TRICK RIDING BY PUPILS

DANGER IN HASTINGS STREETS

INSPECTOR'S VIEWS

No Consideration For The Public

Describing the conduct of High School pupil cyclists as "intoler-able," the borough traffic inspector (Mr H. A. Green) urged immediate and strong action in a report he submitted at yesterday's meeting of the Hastings Borough Council. He

"It is a common sight to see three or more High School cyclists riding abreast and taking up more than half the width of the available road space, while others ride with their hands in pockets, duck in and out of traffic, or other kinds of trick riding. In my opinion the lack of consideration shown by these pupils to other road users is not becoming to their school and uniform.

'I have witnessed incidents in

"I have witnessed incidents in which a number of cyclists take up more than their share of the road and a motorist has given warning that he wishes to pass, and instead of being allowed to pass he has been smiled at by the cyclists and has had to wait until such time as the road was clear.

"A few weeks ago I was driving along Karamu Road south and approaching me from the opposite direction was a High School boy riding fast on the wrong side of the road and not looking where he was going. I stopped my car and waited; sure enough, he collided with my car. Fortunately he was not hurt, otherwise I would have been put to the inconvenience of explaining the accident.

"Some months ago I made an appeal to the principal of the Hastings High School for his co-operation in enforcing control of the roads. He promised his support by giving offenders detention as a deterrent. If this has been carried out, it is obvious that it has not had the desired effect.
