## Scorn Poured On Hitler's Efforts To Excel Kaiser

### FAILURE AS GENERAL AND DIPLOMAT

### Bombards The Enemy With Peace Appeals

STOCKHOLM, March 27.

The Swedish newspaper "Dagens Nyheter" in a remarkably outspoken article, scorns the German Army, saying: "Hitler has often described his army as the best in the whole world in every respect and has contrasted with it the Kaiser's badly led and badly equipped armies, but five weeks after the outbreak of war in 1914 the raggle-taggle Germans stood at the gates of Paris, while Hitler's iron army in six months of war is still standing on the frontier bombarding the enemy with peace appeals.

"No trace is seen of the Russo-German measures with which Hitler threatened the Allies last October.

"As a military threat to the Western Powers, the Soviet is something like a ghost in daylight—not very terrifying.

"Even the German submarines have left enemy shipping alone for a whole week and have sunk eight neutrals instead."

## New Menace To Neutrals

WESTERN FRONT

Nazi Mechanised Units  
Near Border

ALARMING POSITION

LONDON, March 26.

An authorised spokesman in Paris declared today that German motorised units which for some months have been kept about 35 miles from the Belgian and Dutch frontiers are now stationed only 18 miles from these borders.

He added that intense activity on the West Front, combined with certain German military dispositions and diplomatic manoeuvres, led to the belief that the Nazis had abandoned hope for the success of any peace offensive.

"Recent German reinforcements," he said, "have suggested a menace to the Western neutrals comparable to the alarming situations in January."

The spokesman pointed out that allegations that the Royal Air Force had violated Dutch territory in the past few days recalled a similar Nazi procedure in January as a pretext for increasing pressure on Belgium and Holland.

### Air Battle

The German High Command states: "An enemy plane was shot down today in the course of a fight between Messerschmitts and French Moranes in the neighbourhood of Saarbrücken."

The battle between Messerschmitts and Moranes was the highlight to a flaring-up of activity on the Western Front. Whereas the German communiqué claimed the destruction of one French plane, the German News Agency says that several were brought down.

The Brussels radio states that 20 planes were sighted at noon today flying over Luxembourg at a great height in an easterly direction—that is, towards Germany.

### Balloon Barrage

Britain's balloon barrage is to be greatly strengthened and the R.A.F. is calling for volunteers between the ages of 18 and 45.

According to correspondents with the British Expeditionary Force in France, the British line was extended when men of the B.E.F. took over a new sector from French troops.

Outposts of the Maginot Line were yesterday to see three German balloons launch a small craft on the Rhine with sails and streamers plastered with very rude anti-British slogans.

The pollus rifle fire quickly sank the boat and killed its three occupants.

The incident started a series of machine-gun exchanges.

A German attack against a French advance post in the Warndt region was easily repelled. Aircraft were active on both sides.

## NAVY BUSY IN SKAGERRAK

### "A WHOLE DESTROYER FLOTILLA"

### TRAWLER SUNK

LONDON, March 26.

Well-informed sources in Copenhagen state that British destroyers and submarines are active in the region of the Skagerrak, the area of sea separating Denmark from Norway.

A Stockholm newspaper refers to a "whole British destroyer flotilla" off the Norwegian coast.

The Norwegian Foreign Office has instructed its legation in London to protest against a British destroyer's violation of Norwegian territorial waters on Good Friday. It is claimed that the destroyer fired a shot at a German steamer. An unexploded shell was later found ashore. The German vessel did not stop, and the destroyer took no further action.

The Berlin radio announces that the German trawler Butt was torpedoed in Norwegian waters.

## Farmers Working Like Trojans

### PLOUGHING CAMPAIGN IN BRITAIN

The Government scheme of grants to farmers who plough additional land to increase the food supply and thus release tonnage needed for the import of other war supplies is stated to have had gratifying results.

The "News Chronicle" says: "The farmers have laboured like Trojans to make a success of the ploughing campaign. If the weather is reasonably good during the next few weeks they will probably be able to complete their programme of two million extra arable acres in addition to the eleven million acres that would have been ploughed in any case."

## "FLYING BULLETS" FOR THE ALLIES

### Fast, New Plane Available In America

### GREAT FLYING RANGE

NEW YORK, March 26.

The Washington correspondent of the "New York Times" says that Allied sources stated that the inter-departmental committee has decided to release to Britain and France the Army's new Curtis P46 interceptor, the so-called Flying Bullet.

This plane is considered superior to anything in the possession of foreign Powers. It is an improvement on the B40, released in December, and is described as at least as fast as if not faster than the German Messerschmitt, with greater flying range and manoeuvrability.

Since the Curtis P46 is being experimentally developed it will probably not be in production before May 1.

The French, it is understood, are particularly anxious to obtain it.

## GAIETY IN LONDON AT EASTER

### WARTIME CARES ARE ALL FORGOTTEN

### Theatres And Restaurants Besieged

RUGBY, March 26.

London resumed its serious wartime mood this morning after amazing scenes in the streets last night.

It was generally anticipated that full advantage would be taken of the Easter holidays—the first break after a specially trying winter—but the light-hearted mood in which war cares were temporarily forgotten last night was unexpected.

The "Daily Telegraph," describing the scenes in the West End over the Easter holidays, says: "Crowds defying the blackout and their war anxieties, thronged the streets until a late hour. The scenes recalled those of the night after the University boat race or a Football Cup final."

Theatres, cinemas and restaurants were besieged and did the biggest business for many years.

## Explosion Aboard Patrol Ship

The explosion is said to have been due to an unexplained gas accumulation.

## FIJI CONDOMINIUM IS A UNIQUE GOVERNMENT

### Harmony Of Britain And France Well Exemplified In The Pacific

WELLINGTON, March 27.

"The harmony of Britain's relations with her ally France is probably nowhere better exemplified than in the New Hebrides," said Sir Harry Luke, Governor of Fiji and High Commissioner for the Western Pacific, when interviewed in Wellington today.

He recalled that these islands were jointly governed by the British and French as a Condominium. There was a British and a French Resident Commissioner; some of the heads of the departments were French and some English; each nation maintained a district representative or agent in each district, and these officials accompanied each other on tour and all decisions required their agreement.

Such a system might appear cumbersome, but in practice the high officials of the two countries co-operated most wholeheartedly in every way.

The smooth working of the system was an excellent testimony to the friendship and understanding that existed between the people of the two countries.

## Steel King Leaves Germany For Good

Dr. Thyssen  
Opposed Nazi Pact With  
The Soviet

### Secret Flight

### Army Command Being Cheated Over Weapons

BERNE, March 26.

Dr. Fritz Thyssen, the German steel magnate, who fled from the Reich last December, has departed from Locarno for Paris with his wife and all his baggage. He left no forwarding address, but asked the authorities to keep his whereabouts secret.

Officials of the German Legation said they were not surprised to hear that Dr. Thyssen had gone to France. "He can certainly never return to the Reich," they declared.

Dr. Thyssen's friends say he still has large industrial interests outside Germany.

### Warrant of Arrest

Following Dr Thyssen's escape from Germany, the German police issued an international warrant for his arrest on charges of embezzlement, fraud, and non-payment of income-tax.

On arrival in Switzerland, Dr Thyssen, in interviews with the Press, made bitter attacks on the Nazi regime.

In Zurich he said that he and other German industrialists had spent 62,000,000 Reichmarks in 12 years for the support and upkeep of the Nazi Party.

He revealed that before von Ribbentrop went to Moscow to negotiate the pact with Russia the Government held a conference with industrial heads, at which Dr Thyssen strongly protested against the pact. Industrialists were not informed of the Government's intentions.

### Immediate Flight

Dr Thyssen's family, totalling 30, decided to flee immediately.

He added that the extreme shortage of German raw materials was more seriously affecting the steel industry than was admitted. The production figures were largely bluff. The Army Command was not aware that alloys, instead of steel, were being used in the production of armaments. Substitutes were frequently used where steel was essential.

## Northern Neutrals In Financial Straits

### REVERSES TO TRADE

### New Taxes And Restrictions On Imports

### DRAIN ON EXCHANGE

LONDON, March 27.

The economic impact of the war on the northern neutrals is reflected in Denmark's imposition of taxes to combat the increasingly adverse trade balance, also Sweden's announcement of measures to check the alarming drainage of foreign exchange.

The Stauning (Parliament) expressed the nation's deep sorrow and concern at the sinking of Danish ships, which is threatening the nation's economy.

The first seven months of the war have caused great economic difficulties to rise. The price of imported goods has exceeded the rise in export prices, resulting in an increasingly unfavourable trade balance. The financial situation has deteriorated because of the large expenditure on defence, also the measures ensuring neutrality.

### The Stauning added that the financial year 1940-41 will probably end in a deficit of £10,000,000.

It is officially announced from Stockholm that coffee and tea are being rationed and about 200 luxury import items are being subjected to Government control from March 27 in order to conserve foreign exchange. The Swedish currency reserves have shrunk by £41,000,000 since the outbreak of the war, representing one-third of the total. Commodities now subject to regulation represent 71 per cent of the total imports.

### DUTCH CREW LANDED IN ENGLAND

A British warship today landed at an East Coast port eight of the crew of the Dutch trawler Protinus, which was sunk in the North Sea. Three are missing.

It is not known whether the trawler struck a mine or was torpedoed.

## SWISS RALLY AGAINST NAZISM

### Call To Catholics "MORAL BOUNDARIES IGNORED"

The Swiss Roman Catholic Church has appealed to Swiss Catholics to rally against Nazism.

The appeal states that Catholics should know that Nazism aims, first, at conquest, ignoring moral boundaries, secondly, a military despotism at home, thirdly, to hide its real motives from thinking people throughout the world.

## ARK ROYAL RETURNS TO HOME PORT

### SHIP THAT NAZIS SAY THEY SANK

LONDON, March 26.

Another "sunken" unit of the Royal Navy has reappeared in an English port to plague whatever conscience the German propaganda possess. The aircraft-carrier Ark Royal, whose destruction was exultantly proclaimed from Berlin last year, returned today after five months' service in distant waters, in which, while hunting the pocket battleship Graf Spee and other "suspicious" vessels, her planes surveyed 5,000,000 square miles of the Atlantic.

The Ark Royal's wartime experiences include an escape by 15 feet from a 100lb bomb dropped by one of several Heinkels.

A U-boat also fired two torpedoes at the Ark Royal about the time the aircraft-carrier Courageous was sunk, but missed by a wide margin, whereupon the Ark Royal's destroyer escort dashed up and sank the attackers.

### Vessel Shaken

One pilot aboard the aircraft-carrier said today: "One German pilot, apparently Lieutenant Franke, who was awarded the Iron Cross for sinking the aircraft-carrier, flew through a barrage from nearby warships, dived down to 1000 feet, and dropped the biggest bomb I have ever seen, which crashed into the sea about 15 feet from our bows. The explosion shook the whole vessel, and lifted the bows a little. The only damage was the smashing of some crockery."

"The other bombers were not so enthusiastic, and their aim was not good."

"Before the bombers attacked, three German flying-boats circled outside the range of the Ark Royal's guns. The Ark Royal sent up planes, which brought down one flying-boat and drove off the others."

## IMPRESSIVE VICTORY IN ELECTION

### Canadian Liberals Sweep The Board: Opposition Leader Defeated

The Canadian Press conceded the return of the Mackenzie-King Government and considered the Liberal sweep comparable with that of 1935.

Mr Mackenzie-King is himself among the doubtfuls due to the slow returns from Prince Albert, but ten members of his Cabinet have been elected.

Dr R. J. Manion, the Conservative Party leader, was defeated by a Liberal opponent, Mr McIvor, in Fort William.

There was a heavy urban vote, but a light one in eastern Canada, due to the snow-blocked roads. Rains also affected the voting on the Pacific coast.


It is not expected that the soldiers' vote, which will not be known until mid-April, will greatly alter the result.

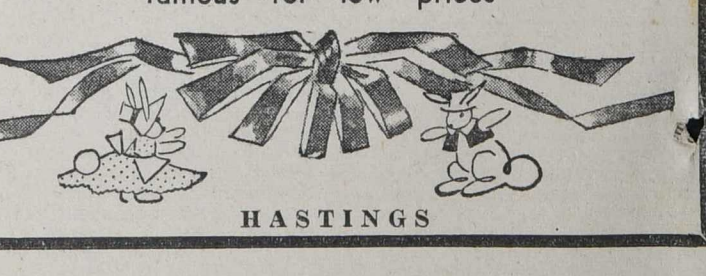

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PLACE-MONEY IS NOT WANTED! POOR SUPPORT FOR THE CLASSICS EASTER COMMENT

Light Should be Shed On Later Fixtures

By MOTUROA The poor support accorded the G.N. Leger and the C.C. Challenge Stakes at the Easter meetings further emphasised the remarks made in these columns recently that owners were not supporting the classic events as they should. This lack of patronage makes it extremely hard for the executive committees of the major racing clubs to recommend that these events be carried on. By their lack of foresight, owners are thus doing themselves a bad turn.

Both races mentioned above drew only three starters, and while Beau Vite certainly dominated the St. Leger, the place money was well worth racing for.

At Riccarton the seemingly unbeatable Duncannon was defeated in the Challenge Stakes by Shikari, who had been well beaten by Chary in the Champagne Stakes and who only narrowly held second place in the Nightglass. There could have been quite easily five or six starters in this event had owners realised their duty to support the classics and the result might easily have been different.

H.B. Nominations The attention of Hawke's Bay owners and trainers is drawn to the fact that nominations for all events at the Hawke's Bay Jockey Club's autumn meeting at Hastings on April 11 and 13 close with the secretary, A. E. Wishart, Hastings, at 8 p.m. to-morrow. It is to be hoped that provincial owners will respond generously.

Manawatu Acceptances Hawke's Bay horses are freely engaged at the Manawatu Racing Club's autumn meeting at Awapuni on April 4 and 6, and a reminder is given that the acceptance for all first-class events and the final payment for the Manawatu Sires' Produce Stakes are due to-morrow (Friday) at 9 p.m.

Lambourn Disappointments The fond hopes of the admirers of Lambourn were dashed at Ellerslie when the Buller colt failed miserably in the G. N. Champagne Stakes. However, Lambourn's work before the meeting left the impression that he was unsuited by the right-hand going and it is just possible that this colt will give a better account of himself on his home track next week. Lambourn impressed as being a really good two-year-old when he won the Handicap at Trentham and it is to be hoped that he will be in the best form to add interest to the Manawatu Sires' Produce Stakes on Saturday week.

Badly Ridden Ruatiti was badly let in at Feilding in the Oroua Hack Cup and was rushed around a big field to lead into the straight. It was little wonder that he stepped to a walk, but it is obvious that he is on the upgrade and his chance may come at Awapuni next week.

Nicely Handicapped Although she has won five races this season, including an open seven at Wairoa where she downed the Easterners Native Song and Endeavour, Hui is still a very solid hand in the Woodhey Handicap at Awapuni next week, having only 17 lbs above the minimum. It is a strong handicap, but Hui seems likely to be the hardest to beat.

Back to Hurdling Queen's Dream is to return to hurdling next week at the Manawatu meeting and, as the opposition does not appear to be over-strong, the Gisborne mare should be very hard to beat. Provided she goes on the right tack Queen's Dream should win some good jumping races this season.

Unlucky Narrow defeats have been suffered by the Awapuni filly in the New Zealand Oaks, Wanganui Cup and Nolan Handicap this season. With fortune more in her way she might have won all these races, but she is a good advertisement for the Paper Money horse inflation, who is leaving a hardy breed.

His First Classic Inflation, a classic winner himself, was represented by his first classic winner on Monday when Chary won the C.C.C. Champagne Stakes, but he has also another high class representative in Duncannon, who ran up to a head in the Great Easter when a new seven furlongs record was established by Sir Hannam was unlucky as he was the last to leave the mark.

Likes the Track Sir Beau, who is now the favourite for the Manawatu Sires' Produce Stakes, likes the Awapuni track. He made his debut there on Christmas Eve when he was well beaten by Absolve, whom he eclipsed on Boxing Day. Fit and well, Sir Beau will prove that he is the colt of the season.

Fell From Grace Aucklanders held Lou Rosa in very high esteem before last week-end's racing at Ellerslie, but the complete failure of the Foxbridge gelding disposes of the idea that he is a champion. He has had his turn in a year that has as yet produced no outstanding two-year-old.

Needed the Race Reports from Feilding indicate that Sleeveless stripped above herself on Monday when she finished a good fifth after being left a straggler. That race will bring her along fast in view of the Manawatu meeting next week and the Longburn Handicap on the second day should suit her to perfection.

Trained Off Gaelic Song was made a hot favourite for the Hack Cup at Feilding on Easter Monday, but she faded on early in the race and was trained off. The effort was miles below her winning form in the Champion Hack Cup at Trentham at the beginning of the month.

Has Improved The handicapper has taken a risk with Ceteaway in the Cloverlea Handicap at Awapuni next week. This colt was very unlucky at Trentham and has improved many pounds since then.

At Her Best Lady Furst simply played with the Easter Handicap field at Taubererika and there is no doubt that Mr. H. Nagle's good Stegird mare is right back to her best. It is a pity that she was not entered for the Awapuni Handicap at the beginning of the month.

MEMORIES OF A GREAT MARE Piuthair Recalled By Gaelic Song

By MOTUROA Gaelic Song's recent successes at Woodville and Trentham, and her more recent failures at Woodville recall that remarkable Kilbroney mare Piuthair, who has thus far proved a comparative Stud failure. Piuthair, who was bred in 1922, was a galloper of considerable merit up to fourteen furlongs. She is the only one to succeed in Taranaki, Egmont and Wanganui Cups in one season, while she also won the C.C.C. Metropolitan Handicap and Great Autumn Handicap among other good races. Her stakes-winnings amounted to £7255, £4720 of which she earned as a three-year-old when she was almost unbeatable in handicaps. Gaelic Song, who has had two wins, two seconds and a third in her last five starts, is now trained by Jim Waller at Awapuni. She is a six-year-old mare by Hunting Song from the great Kilbroney mare Piuthair, who traces back to the dame Atal taproot as the well known Sanguinary family on the East Coast. Gaelic Song commenced racing at three years, when she ran a first and a second in five starts. She was unplaced in three starts the next term and did not race last season. She may yet make a good handicapper, but she has a long way to go to be in the same straits as Piuthair.
