



MICHAEL JOSEPH SAVAGE

Everyone admires, whatever beliefs may be held in the tangled maze of political doctrine, the man of principle who is at the same time convinced of the ultimate truth of his own convictions and has the courage, when opportunity is presented, to translate them into action.

Everyone, whatever theoretical views may be favoured, likes those frequent stories of the men and women who, despite humble beginnings and adverse circumstance, fight their way forward to positions of prominence and usefulness in public life.

It is with such thoughts as these that we receive, with great regret, the news that the Rt. Hon. M. J. Savage, Prime Minister of the Dominion, has succumbed to his grievous illness. He was a man of courage, of great resource and enterprise, a doughty champion of the cause which he so ably represented as leader, and with one accord the people of New Zealand will pause to-day to pay a tribute to his memory.

A brief outline of Mr Savage's career is given elsewhere in this issue, from which outline it will be seen that he absorbed the lessons of his ever-widening experience as the years went by, until he occupied one of the most honoured positions in the British Commonwealth of Nations.

It has been growingly evident for some time that the strain of his onerous work was telling upon his health, and there can be nothing but admiration for the splendid fight he put up against his weakness. His brief appearance in the House of Representatives, after his serious operation, gave tangible evidence of the personal esteem in which he was held by all members. Since that day in August last year, Mr Savage has made few public appearances, yet all the while he was closely in touch with his colleagues and maintained his keen interest in all the affairs with which his name will ever be intimately associated.

Perhaps his greatest service to the Labour cause in New Zealand will be regarded as the fact that he was able, despite many difficulties, to hold the party together as a working team. He was a man who made few compromises, but who, seeing his goal, marched straight forward to it, mingling caution with acumen and steering clear of the pitfalls of rash adventure. But for his restraining hand at times the political history of the past few years might have read differently, and all of his political persuasion have lasting cause to be thankful for the real leadership which he demon-

Although he was not a New Zealander by birth, Mr Savage at all times proved that the welfare of his adopted country was very close to his heart, and the story of his plodding and methodical rise from obscurity to powerful leadership is worthy to rank with those tales of "From Log Cabin to White House" or "From Village Green to Downing Street," which still have power to thrill the minds of ambitious youth. The story of Mr Savage's life gives proof in abundance that in this Dominion the way is clear for anyone of ability and sincerity to rise to great heights in the service of the

Mr Savage passes out mourned by more than the friends of his own party, as one whose personal integrity was unimpeachable, as a man who fought a clean fight consistently and persistently in defence of the truth as he saw it, and as a leader whose place it will be exceedingly difficult to fill.

Now that the question of Mr J. A. Lee and the Labour Party has been settled at the psychological moment when a settlement was most needed, the logical choice should be Mr Fraser. Whatever the issue, the people of the Dominion can do no other than wish for the consistent pursuit of the war effort, the duties of which remain even while good men fall.



Mr Savage's Courageous Fight Against Illness

AN ACKNOWLEDGED LEADER

By Telegraph—Press Association WELLINGTON, March 27.

After the announcement of Mr Savage's death, an official brief tribute was made publicly. It briefly traced the late Prime Minister's career from boyhood, and stated that his quiet sincerity, accompanied by great strength of character, left a deep impression on all whom he met.

During his illness messages of sympathy were received from all over the Empire, including those from their Majesties the King and Queen and the Prime Minister of Great Bri-

The tribute concludes: "Mr Savage had a profound love and regard for New Zealand and its people, and his work for the aged, ailing and young has won him the affection and love of thousands of people in the Dominion. A man of simple tastes, he was fond of his home and enjoyed nothing more than quiet conversation with his many friends. Those who were closely associated with him feel a sense of irreparable loss. His personality salflessness and his measure of able loss. His personality, selflessness and his messages of sympathy to all in trouble will keep his memory alive in the hearts of the people."

An Extraordinary Gazette announces that, in consequence of the death of Mr Savage, Government offices throughout the Dominion will (except in the case of those that require to be kept open for the transaction of urgent public business) be closed from to-day, Wednesday, until Sunday, March 31, both days inclusive.

The Acting Prime Minister (the Hon. P. Fraser) has received the following message of sympathy from the Governor-General (Lord Galway):—

"My wife and I learned of the passing of Mr. Savage with heart felt sorrow, and we should like to convey to you and to the members of the Government our deepest sympathy on the loss of such a distinguished leader.
