LAST RITES AT AUCKLAND

AUCKLAND, March 29. All arrangements have now been made for the control of the State funeral to be accorded to the late Prime Minister (the Rt. Hon. M. J. Savage) in Auckland on Sunday afternoon. ROME, March 29.

An Admiralty communique states that an enemy aero-plane attacked a convoy in the North Sea. Five bombs were dropped but no damage was done.

The Berlin official news agency early this morning claimed that the air force successfully attacked a British convoy off the Shetlands last evening, also a French destroyer in the Channel. The convoy was scattered, and several ships were hit. The air force yesterday also carried out extensive reconnaissance flights over the North Sea, including the Orkneys and the Shetlands. A British Official Wireless message stated that the first vessel to be attacked with an aircraft torpedo—one of which recently was found on the Yorkshire coast—seems to have been the 350-ton motor-coaster David M. A short time ago this vessel, after groping through a North Sea fog, emerged in clear weather, when aircraft were seen from the ship's bridge, and turned out to be Nazi bombbers.





THE "WHITE FEATHER" COMPLEX

It is inevitable that the result of the sowing of voluntaryism in military service is the reaping of a crop of white feathers. It is the sowing that determines the reaping. It is the fault of the voluntary system that fit young fellows are left looking askance at one another and saying to themselves in a curiously mutual chorus: "If he doesn't go, why should I?"

Some recent and current correspondence has shown that something like a "set" has been engineered against footballers. These are all fit men. They have to be. If they are of military age and spend their leisure time in careering up and down a football field, it is but natural that they may find their jerseys adorned with a decoration in addition to the "old school badge."

But it remains to be explained why any one section of our sporting youth should be singled out for special remark. One of our correspondents this morning, in a facetious mood. refers to his passion for ludo. Well, ludo players, fit and of military age, have as much right to fight as have Rugby players, billiard players, bowlers, golfers, tennis players, or even in extreme cases, croquet players.

It is not the sport in which one is interested that matters. It is all a question of physical fitness and the recognition of duty to use it in the service of the country. Under the terms of the voluntary system, it is left entirely to the individual to say whether he will go or stay. To hand out the white feather is to subscribe to the doctrine of compulsion, inasmuch as it means bringing the moral pressure of public opinion to bear upon those concerned and inasmuch as it means a virtual command to "fight or get the bird."

Those who agree that there should be no conscription in New Zealand and who nevertheless hand out these most unpopular decorations to their fellow citizens are really guilty of a hopelessly tangled logical contradiction. Every white feather handed out surely means a vote for compulsion in some individual case.

Why not, therefore, go the whole way by abolishing the possibility of white feathers along the straight line of the adoption of conscription? It is recognised that the decision of the Government has gone forth on this question and that it refuses to countenance compulsory service. But that is no reason why constant protest should not be made by those who believe that in this instance the Government is wrong. Yesterday we held forth to the effect that they also serve who only ride the hills after sheep. That is true. There are many essential occupations from which men can ill be spared at any time and from which they cannot at all be spared in war time, however willing they may be to fight.

But in the case of non-essential occupations, it is utterly unfair that the fighting should be left to those who still believe in the British tradition, while others, who have an equal right to serve, stand back and wait for the day when their companions overseas do the big job and make New Zealand safe for them.

We need more soldiers, and we shall need more as time passes. It is evident that constant and earnest appeals by those in authority are needed to keep the man-power of the Dominion up to even an approximation of its strength. The only way in which to abolish the possibility of the distribution of these emblems of cowardice is to bring along legislation which will compel every fit man to toe the line. We have compulsory unionism. Why not compulsory service for the defence of the country whose free existence makes unionism of any kind possible?

INQUEST INTO DEATH OF STAN JENKIN

BRAIN INJURIES

Boxer Struck His Head On The Mat

By Telegraph—Press Association. WELLINGTON, March 29. A finding that death was due to harmorrhage and laceration of the brain was given at the inquest con-cluded at Petone into the death of Stanley Wallace Jenkin, aged 23, of Dunedin, who died on March 5 after taking part the previous night in a professional boxing contest with Adolphe Victor Caltaux for the welterweight championship of New Zeological Zealand.

Zealand.

Dr. Lynch, pathologist, gave a report following a post-mortem examination, which, in effect, was that the injury to the brain was such, affecting as it did the respiratory and cardiac centres, that it produces a hopeless outlook. He did not think that it could have arisen from a blow or blows on the front or side of the head. He understood that when deceased fell his head struck the floor. This fall, in his opinion, produced fatal injuries in the brain substance. Other organs of the body presented a normal appearance. The heart and the lungs were sound, and there was no bodily disease which would have rendered deceased liable to injury. Death was due to haemorrhage and laceration of the brain.

The referee, Mr Leonard Stewart, said that the contest was a clean fought one. During the course of the last round Jenkin, who was well ahead on points and fighting well, was knocked down, his head striking the floor hard. He rose at the count of eight, and continued to fight without showing any effects of being knocked down on the floor. He was then knocked down again, but rose at the count of three, still showing little effect from blows which sent him to the floor on the two previous occasions.

On rising on the count of three he was rushed into a corner by Cal-taux, who delivered a severe blow to taux, who delivered a severe blow to the jaw, forcing Jenkin into a half-sitting position in the corner of the ring with his back resting on the pads protecting the corner ropes. At this stage it was not necessary, in witness's opinion, to stop the fight, as Jenkin was still on his feet, and there was very little time to go. Caltaux then delivered two uppercuts to the face.

Out On His Feet

Witness saw that Jenkin was out on his feet, so stepped in between, raised Caltaux's hand and declared him the winner. Immediately Caltaux stepped back Jenkin collapsed on the floor. He was taken on a stretcher to the dressing room and attended by two doctors.

Witness was surprised to find him so seriously injured, as a tree.
