The spokesman of the French War Office in Paris said that the Germans had yesterday continued to push forward from the Meuse between Sedan and Namur. The penetration was deep, but was being combated by strong forces.

The Germans had flung armoured troops far ahead of the main body and penetrated some distance into the Allied line, attempting to strike at the rear of the French forces. A great battle was progressing. The situation was serious and confused, but the Allies had brought up enough troops to smash this pene-

The two generals commanding the Sedan sector, within the French border, where the Germans made a deep thrust on Wednesday, have reported to headquarters that they are "masters of the situation." They said they would regain control of their front within a week.

The line of battle was virtually unchanged on Wednesday. The Germans attempted a frontal attack towards Brussels, encountering British cevalry outposts east of Louvain. The British retired after mining the roads and the Germans carried on the attack, occupying a strategic railway station and penetrating the outskirts of the town. They also built pontoon bridges across the also built pontoon bridges across the Dyle River, north of Louvain, crossin tanks and captured a village

Heavy Strafing.

Despite the heaviest strafing from the air and artillery, the British moved up their forces and counter-stracked, evicting the Germans from stracked, evicting the Germans from the town and pushing them to the Dyle. The battle lasted all night, with bitter street fighting. The British infantry has now dug in and artillery duels rage across the river. The Meuse frontier is approximately the same as yesterday. German armoured detachments pushed on to many places, but were mostly wiped out or forced back before the main forces established tenable posi-

main forces established tenable posi-tions. The Germans sent in three fresh mechanised divisions in Sedan, but the defenders continued to take enormous toll here and at Mezieres, Montmedy and Longwy

Counter Attack.

A French counter-attack at Sedan yesterday, said the French War Office spokesman, had halted a violethic salient in France. The Germans were being held on the eastern side of the "dent" in the Maginot zone. The French had also made slight progress at certain points along the Meuse. Several German attacks on British, French and Belgian troops north from Namur were repulsed.

The French morning communique states: "From the region of Namur to Sedan, the battle has now taken on the characteristic of open warfare, with the participation on botsides of motorised units and aviation. The highest interests of the conduct of the operations compel us not to give at present precise information of the action now taking place."

DESTRUCTIVE WORK BEGUN

ALLIES PUSH ON French Alpine Troops' Great Work

A Norwegian communique states that the Germans have been pushed back to the mountain regions east of Bjervik (north of Narvik). There has been intense fighting on the Narvik front. Press reports indicate that the Germans are preparing to quit Narvik. They have lown up tunnels and bridges on the railway and have begun the de-

struction of the iron ore quay.

The Allies on Monday took Elvegaard and Oyjord Ferry, under two miles from Narvik across the Romak Fiord.

The Swedish newspaper "Dagens Nyheter" says that the Allies have performed an outstanding military feat in capturing Elvegaard. Guns and equipment had to be lifted 4000 feet in the mountains.

French Alpine troops, the newspaper says, are only two miles from Narvik. Only 1200 Germans remain at Bjervik and 3000 at Narvik.

It is stated in a German High Command communique that German troops at Narvik repulsed attacks with heavy losses to the Allies.

While the German Navy has been severely crippled as a result of the relentless pursuit of U-boats by the Allied navies and of the naval actions off Norway, in which Hitler's decision to subdue that small and peaceful State involved it, British sea power continues to grow.

The losses incurred at the hands of the enemy represent but a tiny fraction of the total British warship tonnage and a small fraction even of the naval tonnage which was nearing completion in British shipyards at the outbreak.

On February 1, OFF THE DUTCH 1939, the following warships, in addition to naval auxiliaries, were be- COAST ing built in Britain: Seven battleships, five aircraft carriers, 21 cruisers, 28 destroyers, 25 sloops, fleet mine-sweeper patrol vessels and motor torpedo boats.

Many of these ships were already nearing completion and have since entered the service.

On February 28, 1939, a further naval building programme was announced. It provided for the building of two battleships, one aircraft carrier, four cruisers, 36 destroyers, four submarines, and a number of other craft.

At the end of last year Mr. Winston Churchill told the House of Commons: "We have at present building, much of it in an advanced stage, nearly a million tons of warships of all classes," and, he added, "the very great reinforcements to our hunting craft in Home waters have already been tripled since the beginning of the war and will come into service during 1940."

New Organisation Enables Producers To Speak With One Voice

By Telegraph—Press Association NEW PLYMOUTH, May 17.

To unify the Dominion's primary producers and facilitate une greatest efficiency of operation, 14 farmers' organisations have been formed into a Joint and Federated Council, according to a statement made at Stratford to-day by Mr W. J. Polson, who is chairman of the council.

Times such as the present, he said, demanded that farmers' organisations should not operate along divergent lines, but should be of one voice in meeting the Dominion's war needs. With this object, 14 farmers' organisations, such as the Farmers' Union, the Sheepowners' Federation, bodies formed by the poultry farmers and the fruit farmers, and all similar associations, had formed a federated council.

The council would consider issues which from time to time confronted the component organisations of the council. In this way primary producers' opinions would be welded and no ground would be lost through deviating opinions and

cross purposes among farmers' organisations.

The all-important activity of the federation, he added, was in connection with the war effort.

The authorities have appealed to householders in London and adjacent parts of Essex, Middlesex, Surrey and Kent to offer accommodation to these unfortunate victims of the Nazi terror in Europe who have been compelled to leave their homes by the lawless invasion of the German armies, the ruthless destruction of the German air forces, and the fear which the prospects of German administration arouses everywhere since Poland revealed everywhere since Poland revealed that the Nazi regime treats conquered and "protected" peoples with the same savagery as it used against

its political opponents at home.

The Germans' ruthless bombing of open towns is driving back across the French border hopeless and helpless hordes of Belgian men, women, and children. The Foreign Minister (M. Paul Spaak) indicated the measures of the refugee problem when he said that the number was tenfold greater than in 1914.

No outrage is too great for the German airmen. One squadron bombed and machine-gunned a Confirmation procession which was going to church.

The effect of a raid by 29 German bombers on a Belgian town is described as truly appalling, the worst sufferers being refugees traversing the town. Women and children were found buried in the debris.

Bombs destroyed a number of buildings at Arras. A German bomber flew so low over the village that the 'plane was wrecked by the blast of its own bomb. The villagers captured three of the crew, of whom one proved to be a local chemist whom nobody had recognised as a German in his

many years' residence.

"The Times" Paris correspondent says that a tide of refugees is flooding the Paris stations, where they are sitting and lying in pathetic groups amid their bundles.





PLOUGHING A STRAIGHT FURROW

There is a forthrightness about the speech delivered yesterday by Mr W. W. Mulholland to the Hawke's Bay Provincial Executive of the Farmers' Union which goes straight to the heart of many of the most urgent national problems of the day and which will make an instant appeal to the much wider audience throughout the Dominion who will read his words.

The pity of it is that what he had to say will more than likely be written off as political propaganda by those whom he had the courage to criticise, but that is to be expected in a country where our politicians do not seem to be sufficiently large in mind or heart to recognise the ring of sincerity and truth when they hear it.

As representing the men on the land, Mr Mulholland, true to his own type and to that of those whom he represents, dug down to the absolute essentials of the present critical situation and called a spade a spade. This kind of direct talk is characteristic of the men who deal daily with the primal problems of production from the land. They are close to Nature. They wrestle with elemental forces, and they have not learned the tricks and flourishes of the oratorical political trade. They say what they have to say in plain, blunt words. Mr Mulholland has rendered a real, manly service to the Dominion's war effort, and should be thanked for it.

The main tenets of his belief in the necessity for a coalition Government and the introduction of conscription (which he prefers to call national service) have been expounded in these columns on many occasions and without any equivocation, and they will continue to be expounded as a contribution to the national effort. That "flurry of recruiting speeches, followed by silence," has been referred to more than once, and justifies the opinion that some of the Ministers of the Crown are not giving the wholehearted and devoted service to the cause of winning the war that might reasonably be expected of them. It ought, in these dire circumstances, to be a matter of common agreement that the Government should insist on the wartime efficiency of its Ministers or get rid of them. As Mr Mulholland said, they should unfurl the flag and get ahead with the main task before them: but the Red Flag will not suffice. What we need at the masthead of our common endeavour is still that glorious old symbol of unity and strength—the Union Jack, beneath whose folds the majority of Britons are content to live or die, whether or not cowards flinch or traitors flee.

It is altogether absurd that selfish party interests should be allowed by a democratic people to jeopardise the unity of purpose which is so essential if we are to continue to survive at all. The choice, so to speak, is between the Red Flag and the Red Ensign—between the clash of rival political interests

of the country, whatever politicians may think or say to the contrary.

ANGRY PEOPLE HAD TO GO ON FOOT TO WORK

Another Transport Hold-Up In Auckland Caused By Business Strike

> By Telegraph-Press Association AUCKLAND, May 17.

Following hard on the heels of the city tramwaymen with their recent go-slow tactics, all the drivers employed by the North Shere Transport Co. refused to man their buses to-day and temporarily disrupted the normal life of thousands of people. The strike lasted until 3 p.m., when, after negotiations in which the Auckland Trades Council participated at the request of the Hon. P. C. Webb, Minister of Labour, the men returned to their tasks pending a conference of both

The strike followed a decision arrived at by a meeting of drivers on Thursday night not to start work unless one of their number who had been dismissed was immediately reinstated.

The management stated that the man's dismissal resulted from his behaviour toward a woman passenger. He had been warned and had later repeated the offence, and was thereupon dismissed, being given four weeks' wages, three of which were instead of holidays that were due to him.

An offer by the managing director (Mr A. S. Bailey) on behalf of his directors to have the matter impartially discussed at a meeting next Tuesday was said to have been immediately rejected by the Union secretary (Mr L. G. Matthews) and the strike resulted.

The drivers gathered by the company's garages at starting time today, and some of them said that they did not heed an appeal by Mr Bailey to resume work pending the

It was not until the afternoon that this course was followed.

Mr Matthews said that the management could have reinstated the dismissed driver and still have discussed the whole question at the proposed conference on Tuesday. Mr Bailey had refused to do this until the drivers resumed work.

Inconvenience

The effect was even more severe though to fewer people, than that of the tramway dispute. The natural isolation of some of the North Shore bays and beaches imposed many hardships on residents and upon tradesmen, who were suddenly called upon to perform greatly enlarged delivery rounds.

Drivers of motor-cars, lorries, milk vans and butchers' carts all helped to take hundreds of hurrying to plod angrily on, and scores of workers continued to arrive on the city side long after 9 o'clock.

A GREATER SACRIFICE

"In view of the very grave danger that is facing the people of this country, a danger so great as to imperil our very existence, and with the feeling that we are not making our maximum effort to assist the Allies, this representative meeting of farmers in Hawke's Bay urges the Government to call Parliament together immediately, and to set up a War Cabinet composed of members of all parties, and as well of men outside Parliament, who may be chosen for their ability to give effect to the need for the best utilisation of the money and man-power available for the country's war effort."

This is the text of a resolution passed at the annual conference of the Hawke's Bay Provincial Executive of the New Zealand Farmers' Union yesterday. "Fiddling while Rome burns" was the expression used by Mr F. N. Beamish in seconding the resolution. "The leader of the British Empire has offered blood, tears, toil, and sweat," he declared. "There is not much blood, tears, toil or sweat around here.

Criticism of the Government's war effort was expressed the president of the New Zealand Farmers' Union (Mr W. W. Mulholland). He spoke strongly of the need for greater sacrifice in New Zealand, and the need for a leader to ask the people for this sacrifice.
