Air-Marshal Joubert de la Ferte, a member of the staff of the Air Ministry, in a broadcast said that the great lesson of the attack on Holland was that we should be prepared against surprise attacks by troops parachuted and landed in troop-carrying aircraft.

In Holland the Germans had used up these aircraft and crews in a lavish way. As long as the soldiers were landed successfully the Germans apparently did not care what happened afterwards. The losses among these troop carriers were very heavy, not only from air attack and sea bombardment as they lay on the Dutch beaches, but from crashes due to landing. The Dutch fought most gallantly, but they were prevented from making a successful resistance by the swift, heavy blow dealt at the heart of their country, and we could not go to help them until they had asked for assistance.

Gallant Attacks The Allied line east of Brussels was threatened by events in Holland. The Allied air forces did their utmost to arrest the German thrust and they made the most de-termined and gallant attacks, which made possible orderly withdrawal of the French and Belgian forces. This movement toward the French frontier, which is still going on, has been supported in every way by the Allied air forces; indeed, the small Belgian air force has shown

Guards took up their posts at the entrances to the building while the remainder swarmed up to the offices



PARTY OPPORTUNISM

"One can readily understand that the example of the Old Country in its virtual commandeering of person and property may constitute a temptation to any Labour Government to go and do likewise, but our legislators should be told that before taking that step the Old Country had a full measure of conscription in operation and had established a truly representative War Cabinet."

The sentence above comes from the article published in this column yesterday morning. It was as plain as a pikestaff to any intelligent person that the Government of New Zealand as we know it to-day would immediately jump to the seizure of a golden opportunity to bring their socialistic programme into operation. That was why the sentence was written, and that was why the indication was given in that sentence that nothing of a mere party nature would be tolerated in this country in its present mood.

One can almost hear what went on in the caucus. Nothing else was discussed but the British move to take complete control of person and property. Is it too much to imagine that the discussion went something like this?

"Some of these disgruntled people in the Dominion (mostly of the opposite political persuasion) have been advocating that this Government of New Zealand should follow the example of the Old Country. The Press has given its support to this advocacy. Now then, we have given to us, out of the lap of the gods, a golden opportunity to test their sincerity. Great Britain has conscripted person and property. Every man, woman and child in the United Kingdom is now at the disposal of the State to act as the State may direct, in any capacity whatever. Excess profits have been taxed one hundred per cent. and people may be moved from one occupation to another without question. Now is the time to get ahead with our socialistic programme and do likewise."

But, as we anticipated, this is a purely party policy, and as we will insist with all the emphasis at our command, such a drastic measure can be introduced only after the establishment of a Cabinet that is representative of the whole of the people, barring the subversive elements.

New Zealand citizens are not infants with little power to think for themselves. No democratically elected Government has the right to out-Hitler Hitler by bringing in such legislation without consultation. The Labour Government had the chance to follow the lead of the Home Country when it brought in conscription. It did not take it. It had the chance to follow the lead of the British Parliament when a truly representative War Cabinet was set up. It did not take it. It did not take it because it was afraid of its own present followers.

But the control of person and property is entirely a different matter. That is in another category altogether. It happens to have a beautiful socialistic tang about it, so that Mr Fraser and his men immediately choose that particular action out of all the multitudes of others that the British Government has taken.

But the country will not stand for such a policy being applied by a party. The people are already incensed at the ineptitude of party government in war time. All over the country the evidences are piling up that if this Government does not toe the line of its duty it will have to get out and make room for a better.

The latest decision of the Labour caucus was foreseen only yesterday in this column, and, having got in first, we register the most vehement protest possible. Let the Labour Government of New Zealand follow the whole of the British programme and not just a selected part of it, and our people will be solidly behind them.

PARLIAMENT WILL BE SUMMONED ON THURSDAY

An Important Announcement Made By The Prime Minister

By Telegraph-Press Association WELLINGTON, May 24.

Parliament is to meet next Thursday. This was announced by the Prime Minister (the Rt. Hon. P. Fraser) when the caucus of the Government party adjourned at lunch-time to-day.

Mr Fraser explained that when the caucus met, he had at once stressed the gravity of the present war situation and the imminent possibilities of military operations of Britain and France. He expressed the opinion that while everything should be done to counteract and prevent hysteria and scare-mongering, the situation would be faced up to efficiently by the Government, supported by the whole of the community.

"When Parliament meets on Thursday," said Mr Fraser, "Measures will be introduced providing for powers on the lines of the Emergency Defence Act passed by the British Parliament on Wednesday.

"That measure requires persons to place themselves, their services and their property at the disposal of the country. "It is quite clear," continued Mr Fraser, "that the country will welcome such a measure, and in my opinion the serious nature of the war situation demands it and it cannot be met effectively by any other means."

When asked to explain the full significance of this important announcement, Mr Fraser suggested that the mean-

"All forms of property and institutions, as well as every person in the Dominion, will be at the disposal of the country for the prosecution of New Zealand's war effort to a successful conclusion. Various organisations have passed resolutions calling upon the Government to take just such steps in connection with civil and military service and the wealth of of the Dominion."

Mr Fraser said that the proposals he had outlined represented the considered opinion of the Government and that these decisions were unanimously endorsed by Labour members of the House.

"It is obvious that under the proposed legislation both personal and property, rights and liberties, would inevitably be subordinated to the common interest. This applies to all forms of national activity, but the Government will, as soon as possible, discuss its proposals with the representatives of industrial, commercial and financial interests and trade union organisations, and it is fully anticipated that there will be whole-hearted support from them.

"New Zealand and the Empire, of which New Zealand is proud to form a part, is threatened with the gravest danger that ever confronted it. If Britain and the British Commonwealth are defeated. wealth are deefated, all our property, privileges, rights and liberties will be swept away. I cannot imagine that anybody will object to sacrificing present advantages for future security and liberty."

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
