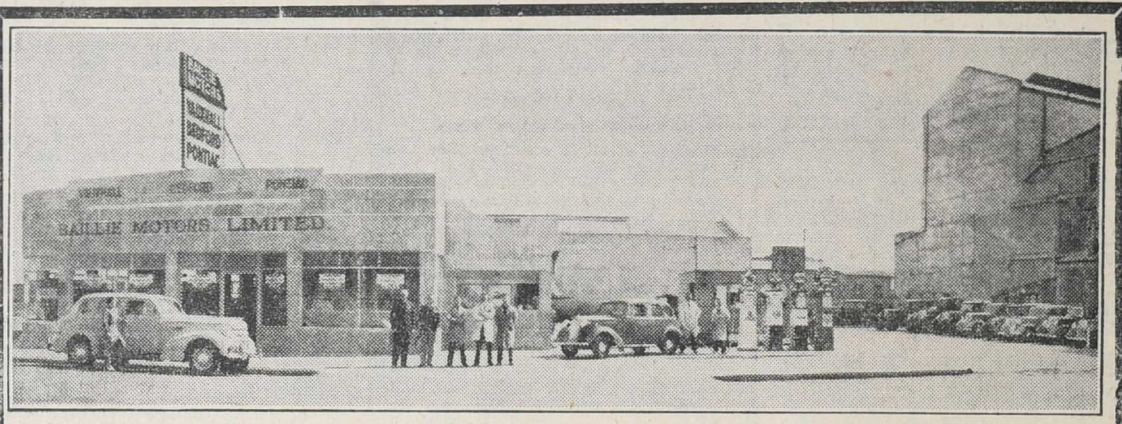

George Sanders Has A Career Of Interest

Depression's dark cloud had a silver lining for George Sanders. It made an actor of him. If the world-wide business slump hadn't come along, George would most probably be following a humdrum career in the business end of some British textile mill. Instead, he is gathering honours and a goodly supply of shekels by playing such screen roles as that of Jeffrey Pyncheon in Universal's screen dramatisation of Nathaniel Hawthorne's "The House of the Seven Gables."

Sanders was born in what was St. Petersburg, where his father was in business, in the days before Lenin. The revolution made refugees of them and the family fled to England.

Educated in England. Always interested in science, Sanders prepared at the Dunhurst and Beades Schools, and at college in Brighton, for a technical career. At the conclusion of his studies he found a job in South Africa. He was just getting well started when along came the depression.

Business in South Africa being no better than any place else in the world, and needing to eat, Sanders went back to England. He couldn't find a job. An uncle suggested that he try to become a singer. George took the advice, practised earnestly for a few months and ultimately landed a place in the revue "Bally-hoo." And in rapid succession he obtained engagements in other English stage productions.

Successful On Screen. His first picture was "Strange Cargo." After he had appeared in a number of British screen productions, he went to Hollywood and was engaged for an important role in "Lloyd's of London," which brought him a term contract at one of the major studios.

Sanders has grey-green eyes and light brown hair. He has a quick humour and an engaging manner quite unlike his screen portraits. He lives alone, his entire family being in England. His father and brother are engaged in yacht building and his sister is one of London's best known interior decorators.

Her Majesty spent two and a-half hours at Denham, where Paramount were making "This Man in Paris." She was escorted by Mr Adolph Zukor, to whom we are indebted for this story. Mr Zukor was in New Zealand early this month and has since returned to America.

The highlight of the queen's visit was when she watched the filming of a scene in which the stars Barry K. Barnes and Valerie Hobson were required to crouch behind a barricade of chairs.

When the first "take" had been recorded, the Queen noticed that Valerie Hobson's hat was on crooked.
