GERMANS NOW ABLE TO ATTACK IN THE REAR

Every Inch Of Ground Being Contested as New Positions Are Taken Up



It is stated in well-informed circles that the existing stocks of raw cotton in Britain are abnormally large and it is isting stocks of raw cotton in Britain are abnormally large and it is necessary urgently to conserve foreign exchange and save shipping space by reducing next season's imports to a level in line with requirements. Since the outbreak of the war imports, parficularly from the United States, have been very heavy nearly 1,900,000 bales being received from August to the middle of May—a figure very considerably in excess of that during the whole of any recent season.

The programme of future imports will be discussed with the United States authorities.



A GRAVE BETRAYAL

There is an expressive and not too polite word of one syllable which describes the quality in which Leopold III, King of the Belgians, has shown himself to be conspicuously lacking. At one of the most momentous hours in the history of civilisation, without warning and in the teeth of the open rebellion of his Ministers, he raised his hands in token of surrender to the Nazi invaders of his country.

He did that while his army was still full of fight and ready to carry on in the defence of their country and to aid the rest of the Allies to gain the final mastery over the unleashed Nazi dogs of war. He did it at a critical moment that could not have been better chosen had it been planned beforehand. He did it to the lasting disgrace of his own name and without dimming the prestige of the people he was supposed to rule. When his Ministers in the Old Country—apart from those who literally walked out on him—heard of it, they were stunned into amazement and deep shame. When his refugee and other people heard of it, they wept. When they realised the depth of the perfidy of their king, both Ministers and people made an instantaneous decision to fight on to the best of their ability without him.

It is inevitable that at such a time the famous cartoon drawn by Bernard Partridge in the London "Punch" in 1914 should come back to mind. It depicted the former Kaiser confronting Leopold's illustrious father, King Albert, and making the swaggering boast: "You have lost everything"; to which King Albert replied: "But not my soul." The craven son should turn his father's portrait to the wall. It has been left to the people who have disowned a cowardly monarch to say that their spirit, despite his despicable action, is still undaunted.

The consequences of the hard and bitter blow which has been dealt by this unworthy son of his father will be serious. Many thousands of gallant British and French soldiers have been put into dire jeopardy by his unconditional surrender, and his name will go down as an offence to all decent people.

What is done is done, however, and all that remains is that more strenuous means, backed by an even greater devotion to the duty of preserving our heritage, must be taken by every one of British blood in order to see this thing through. How very small and petty all our little argumentations about party policies and intrigues look in the presence of the worldshaking events by which we are surrounded! Is it not possible that for this great once we may all rise to the height of the tremendous occasion, smash down the walls of partition between rival factions in the State, shake hands like brothers, call a truce to all internal strife and lay our heads together to find out what best we may do to bring nearer the end of the night of suffering and the dawn of the day of peace?

It is time that some of our legislators in the country learned to give credit for ordinary, decent motives to those who are seeking to help to create a unified public opinion on this great issue. They can have all the party honours they wish for—afterwards. But in the meantime they should strive, as others are striving, without self-interest and without self-seeking, to weld the Dominion into one fighting unit on all fronts-financial, dommercial, industrial, agricultural, military and all the rest.

We will admit freely that we have an axe to grind. But it is an axe which represents the determination of the Dominion as a whole to help the Homeland to win through. It is our sole endeavour to sharpen it so as to cut off once and for all the Nazi menace which threatens all that we have lived

Attorney-General Empowered To Seize Plant

STERN MEASURES TAKEN

By Telegraph-Press Association WELLINGTON, May 29.

Power was taken to-day under the Censorship and Publicity Regulations, 1939, Amendment No. 2, to suppress subversion in the form of the printed word.

The Attorney-General is empowered to order the seizure of any printing press which has been used for printing any subversive statement if he has reason to suspect that any further subversive statement may be produced.

The amended regulation also empowers the Attorney-General to order any periodical to cease publication if it has published any subversive statement and he has reason to suspect that it will publish further subversive statements.

The regulation provides that: "A periodical shall be deemed to preserve the same identity through succeeding issues thereof, so long as it continues to have the same proprietor or the same editor or the same printer or the same publisher, notwithstanding changes in any of the other persons concerned in these capacities and notwithstanding any change in the title, price, format, name, intervals of publication or place of publication; and accordingly, any offer or notice under this regulation shall continue to have effect notwithstanding any such change as aforesaid."

Further power is given to the Attorney-General so that where he is satisfied that any person has published or been concerned in the publication of any subversive statements in any periodical and he has reason to suspect a repetition of the offence, he may order that person not to publish or be concerned in the publishing of any periodical in New Zealand.

Any person acting in contravention of the order made under the amended regulation commits an offence against the principal regulations. Any order made under the new regulations may at any time be varied or revoked, and any person affected by the order may appeal to a judge of the Supreme Court, whose decision shall be final.

"The German Command agreed to the Belgian proposal, and the Belgian Army ceased to resist at four o'clock this morning.

"I have no intention of suggesting that we should attempt at this moment to pass judgment upon King Leopold's action in his capacity as Commander-in-Chief of the Belgian Army," said Mr Churchill.

"The Belgian Government has dissociated itself from King Leopold's act" (cheers) "and declared itself to be the only legal Government of Belgium, and has formally announced its resolve to continue the war by the side of the Allies, who came to Belgium's aid in response to her urgent appeal.

"The situation of the British and French armies, now engaged in a very severe battle and beset on three sides and from the air, is evidently extremely grave," Mr Churchill added. "The surrender of the Belgian Army in this manner adds appreciably to their grievous peril, but the troops are in good heart and are fighting with the utmost discipline." (Cheers).

We further view with alarm the wide space given to certain organisations and their leaders in the daily Press for their deliberate "back door" methods of attacking the Government under the guise of alleged patriotism and extra war effort.

"We wish to point out that if this subversive propaganda is allowed to go on, it will, in our opinion, definitely and very soon cause trouble in New Zealand which the Government

would find it hard to combat. "We further demand that the Government should not acquiesce in the campaign for a coalition Government by profiteering organisations, as the people of this country have given a mandate to the present Government in no uncertain manner at the general election 18 months ago, and a coalition

would be a betrayal of the electors. "In our opinion the present propaganda should be suppressed, as it is only an attempt by war profiteers to get busy

The meeting also passed a resolution expressing its misgivings at what it claimed was an attempt on the part of some people to stampede the Government into unnecessary interference with social and industrial conditions.

interference with social and industrial conditions.

"We are definitely of the opinion that the policy followed by the Government is the correct one and the one designed to give the greatest possible satisfaction as well as creating the fullest war effort, and is such as warrants full and unqualified support by all sections.

"The "scaremonger" is, in our opinion, the real enemy of the people in the present hour of crisis and the one deserving of the severest censure and condemnation." the resolution added.

£3366 REACHED A TOUR THROUGH NORWAY FROM OSLO TO NARVIK AT HASTINGS

Experiences Of A Napier Man In The Land Of The **Vikings**

One of the most interesting addresses yet delivered to the Napier Round Table Club was given this week by Mr G. H. Bell, who described the experiences of himself and a friend during a visit to Norway about four years ago.

Mr Bell introduced his subject by mentioning the mixed feelings of deep sympathy and horror he felt at the barbarities perpetrated in a country that had so greatly impressed him, and against a people so hospitable to a stranger

As an illustration of this extraordinary hospitality, the speaker told of an incident when well up in an inland town. His friend had fallen down a steep slope and suffered certain injuries, necessitating medical attention. The nearest doctor was 35 miles away, representing a train journey of five hours duration. This may appear a very slow service, but the diffi-culties of the country for railroad construction are tremen-

The doctor was a kindly young ports to be built at the same time as the ship in which Lief Ericksen in 999 A.D. sailed completely across the Atlantic and discovered America.

Being rather worried about the non-receipt of an account, Mr Beil's

friend wrote for the doctor's bill, and in reply received a letter in somewhat the following words:— "You are a foreigner in my country who has been hurt; it is my duty and privilege to do all I can for you and your comfort."

This was typically symbolic of the general attitude of the people.

Narrow Straits

Their visit was commenced by leaving by steamer from a small German port on the Baltic and proceeding to Oslo. Between Denmark and Sweden the straits were of an approximate breadth of two and a-half to three

miles, and averaged in width not more than two miles. Oslo itself has a very ancient history, having been founded 1000 years ago by a Norwegian feudal lord, Harold Hadrada, the same who took part in the invasion of Engand at the time of William the Con-

queror.

One hundred years ago it was devastated by fire. A few of the older stalwarts remained behind and gradually rebuilt the town, but many of the former inhabitants left the site of the old town and commenced to build the new town of Christiania. Both grew rapidly, and by 1924 they both merged into one in the same manner as Buda and Peste merged into the one town known now as Budapest. known now as Budapest.

Cold Not Heeded J. Cold Not Heeded

Although it was early spring, it was still intensely cold, with large masses of unmelted ice still remaining in the harbour. This, however, seemed not to deter the hardy Norwegians, and Mr Bell saw at the time not only a rowing crew of four exercising on the harbour stripped to the waist, but also small children diving off fishing smacks and swimming in water which could not have had a temperature much above freezing-point.

100 Acres Of Land To Be Planted, To Yield Over £600

An offer of 100 acres of hill and flat country to be planted in wheat or barley, the profit to be contributed to the patriotic funds, has been made to the Hawke's Bay Council of Primary Production by Mr N. M. Campbell, Awanui. When the offer was considered at yesterday's meeting of the council at Hastings, the chairman (Mr J. W. Palmer) stated that the profit was likely to be between £600 and £1000.

The Hawke's Bay Agricultural Contractors' Association

had offered to do the sowing and the cartage, and would cut, thresh and bag the crop, said Mr Palmer. The Government would supply the seed, manure, and the bags.

This was the first donation of this kind to be made, said Mr Palmer. He stated that a merchant at Has-The Mayor stated yesterday that advice had been received from the National Patriotic Council that the Hastings zone's quota for gift parcels to go overseas would be 168.

He stated that a merchant at Hastings indicated that he would supply the seed at cost. "Personally, I'm very thrilled by the whole thing," said Mr Palmer.




