LONDON, May 30.

Although German sources earlier claimed that the Allied armies were hemmed in and must surrender or die, the latest dispatches show that remnants are fighting desperately.

A fierce rearguard action was fought around Lille and the city has now fallen—or is on the point of falling—to the Germans as the Allied troops have slowly withdrawn.

The French military spokesman to-day said that the French Army commanded by General Prioux was furiously trying to cut a way through Germans barring access to the coast at Cassel and Montkemmel-hills dominating the Flanders plains-where the main German attack is con-

British and French naval engineers have fortified Dunkirk and the admiral commanding the operations reports that he is satisfied with the situation. Marines are entrenched in the town and ships are bringing in a steady stream of food and war supplies.

Strong forces of warships of all classes are raining shells relentlessly on the Germans to cover the retreating army. The British and French air forces have co-operated in keeping communications open around Dunkirk.

French and British troops fighting in northern France are maintaining with heroism worthy of their traditions a struggle of exceptional intensity," says a French communique. "For a fortnight past they have been fighting a battle separated from the main body of our armies by German formations which are being constantly reinforced. Although ceaselessly attacked on their two flanks from the east and the west, they are disputing every inch of ground to the enemy and are clinging to their ground or counter-attacking with as much stubbornness as bravery.

'While they were facing this armed assault, the army which, under the direct command of King Leopold, was defending positions on the Scheldt and the coast north-east of Ostend received from its King the order to cease fire, thus opening to the enemy the road to Ypres, Furnes, and Dunkirk. Since then, our troops, under the command of General Blanchard and General Prioux, in close collaboration with the British Army under Lord Gort, has had to face increased danger.

"Showing in these grave circumstances indomitable resolution, they are making every effort to manoeuvre towards the coast at the price of very hard fighting. The French Navy, in defending ports and lines of communication, is the leading power of support. Under the command of Admiral Abrial, with a large number of ships, it is engaged in supplying the fortified camp of Dunkirk and the troops in it, in co-operation with land and naval aircraft that are perpetually in action.

LONDON, May 30.

The Minister of National Service (Mr Ernest Bevin) announces that the Ministry intends to train workers for the arms industries at the rate of 100,000 a year, instead of 40,000 as hitherto.

Sheepfarming Land

To the majority of people in New Zealand the Falkland Islands, the lonely group off the coast of South America, are of interest only because they are the site of an important British naval base, and because the same of a south of the same of the portant British naval base, and because they were the scene of a smashing British naval victory in the last war. Mr Weir left this country in 1936 as agricultural adviser to the Falkland Islands Government, on loan land Islands Government, on loan from the Department of Agriculture, and was entrusted with the task of organising an agricultural department in the colony.

FRANKNESS NEEDED

Why is it that some of our politicians cannot say in plain words what they mean? Why is it that when they are advancing to their political objectives there is always a protective barrage of saving clauses, or that when they are retreating they are careful to blow up their previously mined bridges?

The point of these questions is this: When it became evident that the people of the country, because of the desperately grave nature of the news coming from the war fronts overseas, were roused to such a pitch that they got together as citizens to make representations to the Government to show a greater liveliness in prosecuting the war effort, Mr Fraser made a statement over the air which to the average listener meant that the people's demands were to be met.

Unfortunately, however, there were little phrases interspersed here and there whose significance is that what was asked is not to be fully granted. There is a stubbornness in Mr Fraser's attitude which is surprising in the face of the grave international situation. Most of us failed to catch the significance of the difference between a War Cabinet and a War Council; but that difference is now patently evident. It involves all the difference in the world.

By the demand for a War Cabinet the people meant a thoroughly representative and small group of five or six men with full authority in all matters pertaining to the conduct of the war-a group of experts skilled in war in all its economic, financial, and military aspects. The people have asked for bread and they have been given a stone. They have been given a War Council to consist of six members of the Executive Council, three of the Opposition, two from primary industries (one employer and one workers' representative), two from secondary industries (on the same basis), one representative of the Returned Soldiers' Association, and "one returned soldier selected by the Government."

This is not a council. It is a crowd. No quick and lively decisions can be expected from such a heterogeneous collection of individuals representing varied and specialised interests. And where is its authority? "With the concurrence of the Government" is the phrase used to describe its possible functions in relation to the all-important question of funds, which are the sinews of war.

If the country is to be led along right lines in these dark days, there will have to be a good deal more of frankness and national comradeship in the hour of peril. As a party politician Mr Fraser (like the pedestrian who crossed the intersection well within the white lines and was knocked down by a car) may be dead right; but if the Juggernaut of the German or any other military machine grinds him and his party and all parties into the dust of defeat, he will be just as dead as if he had been dead wrong. And there will be no post-mortem if the Nazis win.

With all earnestness it may be emphasised again and again that no loyal New Zealander wishes to embarrass the Government in such critical times. All that is desired is that the Government should rise above mere party opportunism and establish a small and competent body of men which will be capable of quick and knowledgeable decisions—as required, and at the very moment when they are required.

Mental mobility is one of the greatest needs of the Dominion. Hide-bound party allegiances, with their consequent exclusion of available skilled assistance, are our greatest enemy. The example of the Old Country still stands as a glowing instance of what can be done by the consecrated efforts of a people in earnest to preserve their heritage. Thinskinned resentment of constructive suggestions or instant suspicion of the motives of those who make them will get us



Parliament was officially opened this afternoon. Brilliant sunshine favoured the ceremony, but the effect of the present grave crisis was noticeable in the smaller crowd which gathered in the grounds of Parliament Buildings to witness

The attendance at the ceremony in the Upper House chamber when his Excellency the Governor-General read the speech from the Throne, too, was smaller than customary.

His Excellency, with an escort provided by the Police Department, left Government House at 2.15 and arrived at Parliament Buildings a few minutes before 2.30. At the foot of the steps he was met by the heads of the three defence services, Major-General Duigan, Commodore Parry, and Group-Captain H. W. L. Saunders, and after inspecting the guard of honour provided by the Royal New Zealand Artillery, proceeded to the Legisletive Council chamber, where he lery, proceeded to the Legislative Council chamber, where he read the Speech from the Throne.

A noticeable feature of this ceremony, which lasted 15 minutes, was the absence of her Excellency, Lady Galway, and the fact that his Excellency and members of his staff were in service instead of the usual dress uniforms.

Immediately on the conclusion of the reading of the speech, members of the Lower House assembled, several of them who are serving with the Third Echelon being in uniform. The new member for Auckland West (Mr Peter Carr) was sworn in, and it was noticeable that Mr J. A. Lee had changed his seat from immediately behind those of the members of Cabinet to the cross benches.

Rapidly Increased Production Is Aim Of The New 4F Scheme

To accelerate the production of primary produce in the next season and for the remainder of the war period, the Government is putting into operation an amended 4F Scheme. Whereas the original 4B Scheme provided for the breaking-in of new land, the new scheme allows for maintenance work to be carried out with the labour provided.

It is understood that this is part of a campaign to induce men formerly on farms to return to the land. The Rural Housing Scheme has been framed to provide accommodation for married men on farms, a difficulty which hitherto has been a stumbling-block for farmers and workers.

The 4F Scheme provides for the training of unskilled men of 20 years and upward in farm work, and it is to be put into operation immediately. "The Government has indicated that it will purchase all primary produce over and above that rey produce over and above that re-ired by the United Kingdom and quired by the United Kingdom and for local consumption," states a letter from the Hastings placement officer (Mr H. S. Robinson) to the Farmers' Union and the Sheepowners' Federation. "The farmers are, therefore, assured of a market for all the primary produce that they can grow."




