SLOW BUT SURE PROGRESS TO THE COAST \*

LONDON, May 31.

Through the ever-narrowing corridor north-east of Lille to Dunkirk, the rearguard of the B.E.F. and the French forces is still fighting grimly to join the troops already evacuating. The Germans are reported to have launched 1,000,000 men and entire armoured divisions in the final assault on the line across the corridor 12 miles north-east of Cassel to Poperinghe.

A French military authority said that the vanguard of General Prioux's army, which is fighting the chief of the isolated rearguard actions outside the narrowing perimeter around Dunkirk, had blasted its way from the German trap in a furious tank battle to reach Dunkirk. The remainder are reported to be following, although it is admitted that the Germans advancing in the vicinity of Cassel threaten to isolate this force.

Midnight reports from military circles in Paris said that the British troops were resisting behind the flooded Yser region, protecting the flank of the French forces in the corridor.

Dunkirk is holding out magnificently despite attacks by hundreds of German 'planes. The Allied action in flooding regions round Dunkirk is taking effect. The whole area south-westward of Dunkirk from the neighbourhood of Gravelines to St. Omer has reverted to the huge marsh of twenty centuries ago, when it held up Caesar's legions.

North-eastward the waterline stretches from Nieuport to Ypres along the Yser Valley, its width being two to three miles. Thousands of tons of water have been pouring into this region each tide for 48 hours. The countryside is flooded several feet deep, checking the advance of the German tanks and infantry and allowing the release of troops to assist in the defence of the

The spokesman said that every hour the hills were held gave General Prioux's army a greater chance to escape. His troops were literally cutting their way through the German troops, often fighting on all sides simultaneously. Progress was slow, but they were moving and leaving behind little centres of resistance amid the network of canals and towns, which are breaking the German pressure on the main force.

"I was in the last war, but I never saw anything like the slaughter. We were heavily outnumbered both on the ground and in the air."

# COURAGEOUS STAND AT CALAIS

Hard Pressed Garrison Holds Out Grimly

### ADMIRAL'S STORY

(British Official Wireless)

(Received May 31, 9.10 p.m.) RUGBY, May 31.

A visit to Calais was described in a broadcast talk to-night by Vice-Admiral Sir James Somerville, who said: "I know that British courage, British resolution, and British refusal to admit defeat will to-day, as in the past, bring us victory, however hard, however fierce the struggle. I say this with confidence and with increased certainty because, for the last week, I have been on the south-east coast and have seen with my own eyes how the British face up to adversity.

'I went over at night to Calais in one of our destroyers, arriving when the garrison was hard-pressed and surrounded by superior forces but holding on grimly.

"As we made fast alongside the quay we came under heavy fire. With shells bursting alongside and on the quay, the captain gave the order to cast off the wires and, with coolness and precision, backed his ship clear of this unhealthy berth and brought her alongside at a spot less exposed to fire.

"He realised to the full the situation in which he was placed and the need for the maintenance of defence to the last minute. His quiet confidence, his grim determination to hold out to the last man was an inspiration to everyone there. He had no thought of surrender, no thought but to serve his country to the utmost of his endeavour and to







### ALL TOGETHER

Much has been heard during the last day or two about certain politicians who have changed their minds in one way or another. In point of fact, it is one of the highest virtues and one of the best proofs of clarity of vision and sincerity of judgment to change one's mind in accordance with changing circumstances. As Emerson said: "A foolish consistency is the hobgoblin of small minds"; or as Ruskin said when one of his pupils in an economics class challenged one of his remarks as contradicting what he had said some years before: "If I cannot change my mind, my mind is dead." All honour to the men or women of all shades of political opinion who have seen the wisdom of unified effort and the necessity for a common aim and purpose to see us through the present terrible trouble.

A united national effort inevitably means the temporary sacrifice of cherished opinions. It takes a great tragedy to dig down to the roots of our common human stuff and to appeal to those impulses and sentiments that are fundamental—behind and beyond prejudice and party and greater than both. When the forest fire is raging, the hare and the hound, the lion and the lamb, will seek a common refuge and call a truce to their instinctive enmities. So it is that in the face of danger (although in this case it is not fear which is at the basis of it) unity of interest becomes a paramount

In the present crisis each one may at the same time fight for himself and for all. For war knows no distinction of creed or belief. One of our correspondents put it neatly the other day when he said that Hitler will not ask us whether we voted Labour or National. In the grim (and as yet unlikely) event of a German victory, there would be neither National nor Labour. Party politics belong to the piping times of peace, and their true insignificance emerges when the country as a whole is threatened.

Now that Parliament is in session and we may hear something of the thoughts passing through the minds of our legislators, it may not be out of place-and we hope that it will not be misunderstood-to make a serious and earnest appeal for the co-operation of all kinds of opinion in the direction of a concerted effort to do more than ever to help the Allied cause.

We have received much in this favoured little country, and from us much is rightly to be demanded. Apart from the wider issues of the gigantic struggle now being waged in Europe, wherein our kith and kin are fighting desperately against a ruthless and callous enemy, we may look around at our heritage in New Zealand and ask ourselves if it is not well worth defending to the last ounce of our strength. Surely never while there is a true New Zealander left fit to fight, will the filthy hand of a Nazi conqueror be allowed to pollute the Dominion by its touch.

We have just celebrated our Centenary. These many years ago, our forefathers the pioneers came from the other side of the world to make the crooked places straight and the rough places plain. They toiled to create a delightsome land in which their children and their children's children might live in peace and security. There is still sufficient of the blood of the British pioneers in our veins to enable us to say that New Zealand, while a man of worth and courage is left, will never lie at the proud foot of a conqueror.

Let us all realise that the appeals that are going forth for service to aid in the cause of winning the war also refer to the preservation of what we actually now enjoy. All parties can find a common ground in their love of the Dominion. Let the new all-in party slogan be: "New Zealand for the New Zealanders."

# ENLISTMENT BADGES FOR VOLUNTEERS

## A Crown To Be Worn In The Coat Lapel

### STRICT PROVISIONS

By Telegraph-Press Association WELLINGTON, May 31.

"The emergency regulations to authorise the issue of a special enlistment badge to persons volunteering for service in the armed forces are published in a Gazette to-night," said

the Minister of Defence (the Hon. F. Jones) in a statement. "The regulations provide that a badge may be issued to men who have been honourably discharged from his Majesty's naval or air forces or the Second N.Z.E.F. and have been accepted or provisionally accepted but whose service has not commenced or has been temporarily suspended, and to men who have volunteered for service and have been rejected because they are not up to the medical standard of fitness required.'

"Only men within the age categories laid down for each service and who are not suffering from some obvious physical or mental defects will be carridered guelfed to fects will be considered qualified to receive the badge," said the Minis

"At all times the badges remain the property of the Crown and must be returned at the expiry of the period noted in the certificates or, if no such time is notified, then on the death of the holder or when noti-fication of recall is received from the issuing authority.

fication of recall is received from the issuing authority.

"The design of the badge, which will be Crown copyright, consists of a "V", symbolic of the fact that the man has volunteered; through this a fern leaf is interwoven and the "V" is surmounted by a crown. The badge will be worn in the lapel of the coat."

With every badge a certificate will be issued which must be carried at all times when a man is wearing his badge. Police officers or officers of the naval, military or air forces in uniform will be entitled to ask a badge-wearer to produce his certificate and all badges and certificates will bear corresponding numbers.

Careful Check Careful Check

Severe penalties are provided for the unlawful vearing or illegal manufacturing or sale or possession of badges, on which a most careful check will be kept.

check will be kept.

"Already there are many men qualified to wear the badge," added the Minister, "and requests for them should be made to the Army, Navy or Air Force authorities concerned. The badges will not be issued to those medically rejected for either the flying or the non-flying sections of the Air Force who are eligible for service with the Second Expedition. service with the Second Expedition

"As a result of the declaration of war last September, and the subsequent complicated negotiations for the sale of wool, meat, and other primary products, the president, secretary, and advisory board of the federation have been involved in much additional and difficult work, requiring frequent conferences and travelling at short notice," said the president (Mr F. N. H. Beamish) in reviewing an active and successful year in his report placed before the 30th annual meeting of the Hawke's Bay Sheepowners' Union at Hastings yesterday

The membership totalled 248, representing an increase of 20 during the year. The balance-sheet showed a surplus of assets over liabilities of £664 19/3, compared with £646 9/11 on March 31, 1939, an increase of £18 9/4.

"In view of the widespread feeling among farmers that there should be more co-ordination of effort and policy among the various farmers' organisations, and less overlapping, steps have been taken during the year to reorganise and strengthen the Primary Producers' Council, a body which has been in existence for some years with its headquarters in Wellington," added the president.

At a conference with the Work-"At a conference with the Work-ers' Union in July last the shearers' and drovers' awards were renewed practically unaltered, the former for a period of three years and the latter for one year.
