The Turkish Government has banned exports to Italy. Russia and Turkey have withdrawn their heavy troop concentrations from the mutual frontier in the Caucasus. The withdrawals were made as a gesture of good faith after the improvement in relations. Turkey greatly welcomes Russia's support, for otherwise she is unprotected.

SYMPATHY RISING FRENCH SAY SOMME FRONT IS HOLDING WELL

Huge Masses Of Tanks Thrown In By The Germans

United Press Association-Copyright. (Received June 7, 10.10 p.m.) PARIS, June 7.

French military circles regard the situation on the Somme front as generally satisfactory despite the withdrawal, as the enemy losses have compensated for the French loss of

The unprecedented masses of armoured vehicles which the Germans hurled against the French defences dwarfed even the forces used along the Meuse, where the invaders broke through on May 15.

The French night communique states: "The battle continues on all fronts between the sea and the region of the Chemin des Dames. The enemy has thrown in masses of tanks in groups of 200 to 300 at numerous points. It is estimated that there are over 2000 German tanks engaged.

"Our divisions have fought magnificently and tenaciously and have clung to strong points. Battalions, companies, platoons, and batteries faced up to the onslaught of the tanks and smothered them with their fire. Several hundred tanks were destroyed.

"An unprecedented German onslaught submerged and outflanked certain French units, particularly in the region of the Lower Somme, where enemy elements penetrated as far as the Bresle River.'

Tanks advancing through openings encountered successive "support points" like field fortifications. The first points were armed with anti-tank guns on the banks of numerous canals and streams. Behind them were gun nests at crosscads and high grounds Hidden arroads and high grounds. Hidden ar-tillery farther behind stopped any anks which succeeded in getting this far.

Tactical Withdrawal

The French military spokesman said that the enemy on the Lower Somme had pushed forward a great number of tanks, suggesting that his principal effort was being made in this sector. The French advance posts withdrew, but the movement was purely tactical.

The Germans on the other wing, to the right of the Ailette and Chemin des Dames, launched an artillery bombardment from guns of all calibres in the neighbourhood of Rethel.

The spokesman added that the

Germans were employing smoke shells on a vast scale. The battle field was covered with thick, acrid smoke, which hampered air recon-naissance and screened the enemy shock troops

Three Thrusts

The British military spokesman stated that the battle resumed on Thursday morning with the same in-Thursday morning with the same intensity, and had even been extended on the two wings. The Germans, in addition to Wednesday's three thrusts in the regions of Amiens, Peronne, and the Ailette, had attacked on the Lower Somme and launched a heavy artillery bombardment in the province of Champagne, which seemed to be preparation for an attack.



These garments had all been made by the guides, rangers and brownies and included a delightful array of baby garments; cardigans, pullovers, dresses, hats, caps, stockings, nightgowns, and pyjamas for girls from one year to 12 or 13; boys' shirts, trousers, underwests sox, etc. Gloves, mittens, scarves, and face cloths were also provided. The majority of the blankets were lated from norgatic squares.

First Of A Series Of Approved Knitting Patterns

> MAXIM: DO NOT KNIT IN HASTE. COMFORTS MUST BE WEARABLE

Men in the fighting services want more and more knitted comforts and women in all parts of the country have realised that there is no more useful spare-time work than helping

to provide these knitted garments.

Women are cutting down their expenses to buy wool to make items not only for individual friends, neighbours, and relatives on active service, but for men of whom they have never before heard. For those who are unable to supply wool but who are willingly giving their time there are branches of the Red Cross Society and Patriotic Committee to help distribute the wool.

Townsfolk have little difficulty in acquiring patterns for their knitting, but for the country folk it is less easy, and so it is hoped to publish a series of designs approved of as correct for the services.

There is one maxim never to forget—"Don't knit in haste—comforts must be wearable."

CRITICAL DAYS

Although the latest news from the French war front is couched in language which gives room for hope, it would be foolish to minimise the gravity of the situation. As early as September last the opinion was ventured in this column that this war would bear but little resemblance to the last. The only point of similarity so far has been found in the loss of the precious lives of men, women, and children. Otherwise, it is not the same kind of war at all.

The war that was meant to be fought east and west is now being fought north and south. By the cowardly defection of Leopold of the Belgians the Maginot Line has been made to look like a monument to futility, and the two systems of opposing fortifications have for the moment been left completely out of the picture. A twisting and turning line of attack is now menacing Paris in an attempt to engineer an encircling movement. The possibilities are laden with the most dire consequences, and few of us will forget Mr Churchill's assertion that if need be the British people "would fight alone." If France can hold out for a few months longer, the war is won for the Allies, and speedily. If not, the war will drag on while that little island Home in the North Sea whence our ancestors came holds out to the last ounce of its strength. It was said a while ago that if the Germans should win the battle of the Channel ports they would not necessarily win the war. To that it can be added that even if they conquer France they have still a long way

There is not the slightest justification for anything in the nature of a defeatist attitude, despite the definite setback which has been given to the Allied arms. It is inevitable that as the German technique reveals itself, the issues become more and more simplified. They had some surprise moves organised by "Fifth Column" and other agencies which took the Allies unawares. The miraculously swift swoop through Belgium and the unexpected surrender by Leopold at the critical moment undoubtedly gave the enemy an advantage which was exploited to the fullest extent. But now, when the parachuting and similar infiltration methods are no longer applicable to the same degree and when the Germans are face to face with people determined to defend their native soil without question or hesitation, things are simpler. The battle-fronts are now reduced in number, and therefore the straight issues are clearer. There will no longer be any large scope for the carefully prepared German plans which seemed to be designed to bewilder and "flummox" their opponents.

By now we know what they are likely to do and are prepared to meet their every move. There is a limit to even the most inhuman ingenuity, and we may confidently discount any further rumours of more secret frightfulness. Let us beware at all times of those who are willing to give credence to the latest rumours of "something new" which the Nazis have up their already full sleeves. Those who pass on such rumours may not be members of the official "Fifth Column," but unwittingly they may be performing its work.

It has been revealed in this war that the German is the same methodical and systematic sadist as ever he was. He loves to work to plan. Even his "strafes" to-day, in places where the front is more or less stabilised, are according to the strict schedule of a time-table. It has taken longer this time to grasp the system upon which the enemy is working, but our leaders are now in the position to forestall his every move. Germans are by no means super-men. Their fighting forces to-day are for the most part raw youths, and their commanders have expressed amazement at the physique and fighting spirit of the British.

Refugee Children For The Dominion

NEGOTIATIONS UNDER WAY

Influenza Epidemic Situation Not Serious

THE ADDRESS-IN-REPLY

By Telegraph—Press Association PARLT. BLDGS., June 7.

When the House met at 2.30 p.m. to-day, several petitions were presented urging that refugee children from Great Britain and the countries invaded by Germany should be sent to New Zealand.

The Prime Minister stated that the matter was at present under consideration by the Government and that a cable had been received on the subject from the British Government. Further details would be following by air mail.

The New Zealand Government, he added, would see that anything that was done would be done as a result of organ-

ised effort rather than in a haphazard manner.

Mr Fraser also made a brief statement on the position in regard to the outbreak of influenza in the various military camps throughout the Dominion, stating that the present

position was reassuring and by no means serious.

In the course of an urgent question Mr W. J. Broadfoot (Waitomo) asked the Prime Minister if he would take immediate steps to intern all aliens of doubtful origin and keep them interned until their bona fides were proved beyond doubt. He said that it was alleged that many of this type doubt. He said that it was alleged that many of this type first migrated to Australia and then entered New Zealand as of Australian origin, and added that many of them were stated to be distinctly hostile to our system of government, although they had allegedly sought sanctuary with us.

Replying, the Prime Minister mentioned the precautions

taken regarding the entry of aliens into New Zealand. Every possible care was taken to ensure that the provisions of the Immigration Restriction Acts were not infringed in any way. Every alien in New Zealand on the outbreak of war was required to register at the nearest police station within 14 days. Every alien was issued with a certificate which contained his personal description and a duplicate was filed at police headquarters.

At the present time, every report made to the police, no matter how remote, was investigated and reported to the Commissioner of Police, who saw that wherever there was the slightest cause for suspicion they were kept under the closest observation.

The Government did not hesitate to take full action where it was warranted.

where it was warranted.

In moving the Address-in-Reply, Mr A. F. Moncur (Rotorua) said that Parliament was meeting under extraordinary conditions and would take part in momentous discussions. He congratulated Mr Fraser on having attained the position of Prime Minister and said that he had assumed office in difficult times when the whole effort of the country was in the direction of winning the war. Congratulating members of the House who had enlisted, he stated that Parliament had done its part and had set an example to thouside community. FOUR COMMUNISTS **GAOLED**

Publication Of Subversive Statements

VICTORY BEING HINDERED

By Telegraph-Press Association

AUCKLAND, June 7 Reserved judgment was given by Mr F. H. Levien, S.M., in the Police Court in the case in which four men were charged on Tuesday with publishing subversive statements alleged by the Crown to be breaches of the Public Safety Emergency Regulations Act, 1940.

The defendants were: Thomas Stanley, secretary of the Auckland General Labourers' Union, who was charged that on March 26 he published a subversive leaflet, "The Real Criminals," and also that he requested publication of a subversive statement; John Reginald Angelo, Ron Hurd, and John Langdon, who were each charged that on April 5 they published a subversive statement, a speech at a meeting in Cobden Street.

There could be nothing more inconsistent with and antagonistic to the regulations than the speeches and the leaflet which formed the basis of the charge, said the Magistrate. "The whole tenor of the Act was that every effort should be pledged to victory in the war and people, whatever the opinions they held, should not allow them to impede these efforts. pede these efforts.

pede these efforts.

"The Administration, here as in Britain," the Magistrate continued, "has become a machine devoted to the task of meeting a deadly national peril. Those of us who cannot see their way to assist its working can at least refrain from applying sabotage to the machinery. I am dealing with the attitude taken by the Communist Party, of which the defendants are admittedly members, and the probable effect of the circular and the speeches, which contain certain teachings, one of which is to certain teachings, one of which is to organise the workers of this and all other warring countries to 'put a stop to this bloody and senseless war.'

Dangerous Opinions

"The expression of such opinions may become dangerous when they offend against the war regulations and are likely to interfere with the expressed intention of Parliament."
Each defendant, he concluded, would be convicted.

One man who saw a great deal of service in the last war was rejected on account of a hammer toe, a defect which does not in any way affect his ability to march long distances. He strongly insisted that if New Zealand were in danger of invasion the authorities would not

invasion the authorities would not stop to ask questions about his toes, but would provide him with a rifle

but would provide him with a rifle without delay.

Tests of heart, lungs, eyesight, colour sight, blood pressure, etc., are of a similar high standard, and large numbers of the men fail short in one way or another. The remark has frequently been heard that overseas service and home defence are two very different things, and should be treated accordingly.

The psychological effect of being rejected for service is also a serious one in the case of many returned men, who are understandably depressed at the thought that ably depressed at the thought that in spite of their qualifications the country does not require them.

Sir,—The following passages from Elwyn Jones' book, "The Attack From Within" (Penguin Special), might afford a little enlightenment to the public mind in these darkened days. "Democratic opinion abroad must be mobilised by strengthening democracy at home. The tendency in Britain has been in the opposite direction—a tendency grimly reminiscent of one of the most reactionary periods in British history. A new six Acts have been passed—the Police Act, 1919; the Emergency Powers Act, 1920; the Officials Secret Act, 1922; the Trade Union Act, 1927; the Incitement to Disaffection Sir,—The following passages from 1927: the Incitement to Disaffection Act, 1934; and the Public Order Act, 1936. The old statutes of the old French Revolutionary period have been dug up and made use of after a century of disuse. It is a danger ous tendency and one that will be intensified in time of war."

This book was published in the early part of 1939. The British people must beware of the danger that the defence of freedom from external attack may, in the hands of a reactionary administration, involve the betrayal of freedom from

A century ago Heine remarked that the Englishman loved liberty like his wedded wife, and that some day he might take her to Smithfield with a rose rand her polyand sell. with a rope round her neck and sell her! That is what Hitler wants Britain to do. He desires the sup-pression in this country of demo-cratic ideas and methods which he decounted as "demonstratic price"." denounces as "democratic poison.

The answer to Hitler's threat is not to stretch the letter of gag law like the Official Secrets Act to suppress criticism, not to use as an inpress criticism, not to use as an in-strument of inquisition legislation designed to counter espionage, not to bring pressure on the Press to tone down criticism of the dictators or refrain from criticism of a policy of "appeasement" of them, not to use film censorship to keep out films which show up dictators to the world. We must avoid the span folly of going totalitarian in an effort to avoid it. In the light of everyday events we may well ask, "In the effort to avoid Nazism are we not going Nazi ourselves?"—I am,

Rising Costs Of Production Arouse The Concern Of Growers

Concern at the rising costs of production in the fruitgrowing industry was expressed at the annual meeting of the Hawke's Bay Fruitgrowers' Association last night. Speakers pointed out that, while growers were receiving a fixed price under the Government marketing scheme, overhead costs in the industry had risen, seriously reducing the margin of profit.

A number of remits were dealt with by the meeting. Those adopted are to be considered at the Hawke's Bay provincial conference of fruitgrowers.

The rise in the costs of material in the past season as affecting the orchardist was spoken of by Mr Dingwell supporting a remit from the Pakowhai Club, which urged that the Government set up a commission to inquire into the matter. mission to inquire into the matter. He quoted figures, illustrating the rise in the costs of materials such

as paper, nails and cases.
Coupled with this remit was a second remit, asking that the price of fruit be adjusted to approximate the costs of production. The remits

the costs of production. The remits were adopted.

A remit from the Pakowhai Fruit-growers' Club, "That this club reaffirms its belief in Government control," was adopted and is to be forwarded in an amended form.

Mr A. Lowe said that he had discussed the question with many fruit-growers and that they were unanimous that the scheme was desirable in the present war situation. This in the present war situation. This did not infer that orchardists were in favour of Government control of the industry for all time.


