Biggest Battle Of All Time Being Fought In France

FRENCH HOLDING EVERYWHERE

"Nazis Seem Intoxicated By Danger"

ISOLATED TANK UNITS PIERCE FRENCH LINES

Massed Intervention By Allied Air Squadrons Assist The Infantry

FRENCH TROOPS COUNTER-ATTACK FIERCELY

LONDON, June 9.
 "The Battle of France" has reached the culminating point," said the French military spokesman last night. "The battle is the biggest of the war—the biggest of all time. The new German attack is the most formidable in military history. Nearly half a million more men and 4000 tanks attacked at dawn over the whole front of 94 miles. This long battle is continuing and we do not know the result, but the situation is satisfactory. There is no retreat, only a strategic withdrawal along the Aumale-Noyon line."

The battle, according to well-informed French military circles, eclipses the biggest encounters of the last war in violence and ferocity. The German soldiers are marching shoulder to shoulder "like the Teutons who were their ancestors." They seem intoxicated by danger as they march against the withering fire of the French machine-guns and cannon.

With reference to the French withdrawal to several strong points between the sea and Soissons, the British spokesman said that the situation was serious but the French were holding everywhere. He added that the opposing forces were still grappling with ever-increasing violence. The French had repulsed repeated attempts to cross the Aisne west of Soissons after bitter fighting. General Weygand is satisfied at the manner in which the battle is developing.

The Saturday morning communique from Paris states that enemy armoured units reported last evening towards the valley of the upper Bresle have increased their progress. Some advanced detachments are thrusting forward and have reached the region of Forges les Eaux. The situation is the same on all the rest of the front. (Forges les Eaux is a small spa on the Paris-Dieppe road 38 miles south-west of Abbeville and 30 miles south-east of Dieppe.)

The military spokesman said that a group of German tanks had succeeded yesterday in infiltrating through the French defences, but the group had been isolated and were deprived of infantry support. The French Command has organised an extensive round-up against the group.

Authoritative circles in London state that it is thought that this infiltration is the penetration to the region of Forges les Eaux mentioned in the French communique. Any form of infiltration, it is stated, must cause alarm, but the French statements indicate that the German armoured units concerned have overrun themselves and are being held.

Reports indicate that over a million Germans are engaged in the present battle. It is still thought that the main German attack may yet be unrevealed.

A French wireless commentator said that the front now goes from south of the River Bresle to south of Ham, and continues on the high land to the north of Soissons, where it rejoins the course of the Aisne. This reduces the length of the front.

The French spokesman earlier stated that the re-drawing of the French line in the centre of the battlefield in the region of Amiens, Peronne and Ham was effected in order to straighten out the line following German progress on the two wings to the west of the Somme to Bresle and to east from Allette to the Aisne.

The latest French communique states: "The Germans debouched at dawn from the region southward from Amiens from Roye and made a mass attack on the French positions on a 60-mile front between Aumale and Noyon. They met fierce resistance and suffered enormous losses in the face of point-blank fire from automatic arms and massed intervention by the Allied Air Force, which is literally dominating the battlefield, repeatedly operating from a height of 65 feet. French bombers are co-operating with the British and, protected by fighters, are attacking in squadrons of 150 machines.

THE CRUCIAL DAY IS AT HAND

WEYGAND SAYS THERE MUST BE NO RETREAT

"To-day will be the crucial day," said the official military spokesman at Paris this morning.

General Weygand has sent a message to his armies saying: "Men, you must fight without thought of retreat."

"Despite numerical inferiority, the French troops did not hesitate to leave their entrenched strong points to free their positions by short but terrible counter-attacks. By the end of the afternoon they were faced by a veritable flow of German forces and the High Command gave the order to fall back. This was carried out in perfect order and although the Germans secured the advantage, they have not broken through.
 "The fighting on the Aisne was equally terrible, and the Germans by the end of the afternoon had consolidated their hold on a bridgehead where the French are violently counter-attacking.

MERCHANT CRUISER TORPEDOED

Carinthia Sunk Off Ireland With Loss Of Only Four Lives

LONDON, June 8.

A U-boat torpedoed and sank his Majesty's armed merchant cruiser Carinthia. Two officers and two ratings were killed, the remainder being saved.

Over 200 members of the crew have been landed from a warship in Britain. Another warship is bringing 100.

The Carinthia was afloat for some time after she was hit. The warships went alongside, took off the crew, and towed the Carinthia, which sank before reaching port.

The Carinthia was a Cunard-White Star liner of 20,277 tons and is the second British armed merchant cruiser to be lost during the war, states a British Official Wireless message. The other was the Rawalpindi, which went down last December with colours flying and guns blazing in a one-sided battle with the pocket battleship Deutschland.

The German High Command announces that a U-boat sank an enemy auxiliary cruiser of 4000 tons north-west of Ireland.

BOMBING OF ROME WILL BE SIGNAL FOR LONDON RAID

Italy Gives Warning Of Five-To-One Reprisals

ART GALLERIES GUARDED

ROME, June 9.

The "Giornale d'Italia" threatens that five English cities will be bombed for every Italian city bombed. It adds that the bombardment of Rome would be the signal for a greater bombardment of London.

Special measures are being taken throughout Italy to protect monuments and art treasures. The principal art galleries have been closed and the pictures have been removed.

The Economic War Bureau report, just issued, emphasises Italian grievances against the Allied blockade, describing the blockade as intolerable.

New laws allot £125,000,000 to the Air Force and £25,000,000 for the Navy spread over three to four years respectively.

The semi-official Italian review "Relazioni Internazionali" states: "On the eve of a solemn event for the Italian people it is opportune to recall for the benefit of foreigners these simple final points:

(1) Italy, under Signor Mussolini, has for the past 18 years followed a revisionist policy for peace.

(2) France and Britain, either openly or secretly, have opposed this policy.

(3) When the Italian people ask for soil to till they are offered deserts and when they want to settle the question of Abyssinia they are subjected to sanctions.

(4) France and Britain belittled everything Italian, both in their home and foreign policy.

(5) This war must settle for the Italian people the outstanding territorial questions of Nice and Corsica. Tunisia and Jibuti must also be free from European domination by a nation which has established a hegemony over and a monopoly in raw materials.

(6) The Italian people must ensure for this nation and empire independence on the seas.

"This new war that the Italian people must make is a war of supreme independence."

Troops Near France

The Associated Press correspondent at Belgrade says it is reliably stated that the Italian forces have been moved to the French frontier from Fiume, for which reason the Yugoslav War Ministry has released 120,000 reservists, although the frontier garrisons are undiminished.

The Associated Press Alexandria correspondent says Italy has declared that she will not infringe the Egyptian frontiers in the event of going to war against the Allies. Egypt has informed Britain but the Premier to-day declared that Egypt would fulfil all her obligations under the alliance with England.

Thousands of children are being evacuated to-day from Alexandria to the provinces. Seven hundred undesirable have been removed from the city and are being interned in Upper Egypt. One hundred cabaret artists, mostly Hungarians, have been deported.

Officials of the Italian Shipping Line at New York stated on Friday that all Italian ships now in neutral ports had been ordered to suspend

their sailings, and that all ships at sea had been ordered into the nearest neutral ports. They stated that all Italian ships were either in home or neutral waters. Cargo boats in American southern waters had been ordered to put into various United States ports from Key West, Florida, to Cape Hatteras by noon to-day.

The Turkish Government has banned exports to Italy.

The road running parallel to the Suez Canal from Port Said to Suez has been closed to all persons except British and Egyptian army officers.

TWO ARMEN WIN V.C.'S

LED BOMBING RAID ON BRIDGE BOTH MISSING

Four Out Of Five Planes Lost In Raid

LONDON, June 9.

Victoria Crosses have been awarded Flying-Officer Donald Edward Garland and Sergeant Thomas Gray, both of whom are posted missing.

They were the pilot and observer respectively of the leading plane of a formation of five which successfully attacked a vital bridge over the Albert Canal, which was allowing the Germans to enter Belgium.

Orders were issued that the bridge must be destroyed at all costs. A squadron of the advanced striking force undertook the task. The crews were selected by drawing lots. Only one of the five planes returned.

Garland was born at Wicklow, Eire, in 1918, and his home is in Yorkshire. Gray was born in 1914.

Much of the success of the attack on the bridge was due to Garland and Gray, who led the formation in such a manner that all the planes were able successfully to attack the target despite heavy subsequent loss, adds a British Official Wireless message.

37-Ton Tanks Being Built In Canada

CANADIAN PRIME MINISTER'S WARNING

Strategic Position In The New World

OTTAWA, June 8.

The Prime Minister (the Rt. Hon. W. Mackenzie King) in a broadcast said: "Every port will become another Calais, every harbour another Dunkirk before we will surrender to Nazi brutality."

He warned that hostilities might break out in "entirely new theatres of war," but asserted that new and old friends would rise to help us.

"We are on the bridge between the old and new worlds—a bridge which joins the freedom of the North American continent with the ancient freedom of Britain which gave it birth," he said. "We will stand resolute to defend its approaches and abutments."

The Premier reviewed Canada's war programme, and claimed the air training scheme would yet be a decisive instrument in victory.

Nazi Terror Raid On English Towns

ROOF-TOPS SPRAYED

Third Successive Night Of Bombings

NO DIRECT CASUALTIES

LONDON, June 9.

The Germans' first terror raid against England occurred before midnight on Saturday at a south coast town, when an enemy plane swept along the seafloor. Empty cartridges were heard falling on rooftops and streets. It seemed as if the raider was actually spraying the roofs and chimney pots. He even potted at a small group of men talking in the street. Several saved themselves by flopping on the pavement, while others ran for cover.

The raider was engaged by machine-gun fire from the ground.

The raider also machine-gunned a lifeboat crew who were called out to find a missing yacht. Only one or two bullets struck the rudder.

Kent, Hertfordshire and the north Midlands also had alarms during the night.

A Yorkshire woman, aged 61, collapsed and died in an air-raid shelter during an alarm in the early morning. A man aged 61 died while taking refuge in a neighbour's shelter.

Enemy planes raided Lincolnshire for the third successive night and dropped high explosive bombs, many of small calibre. Windows were blown out. Bombs fell in the street of a Northamptonshire town, shattering all the windows on either side. Another fell near a swimming pool and a third in a garden. There were no casualties.

For the most part the raiders flew at a great height.

German Statement

The German High Command states: "In the course of armed air reconnaissances against the east and south coast of Britain bombs were dropped on English aero-

dromes; also at the Port of Dover. Enemy night raids against our home territory caused only unimportant damage. Ten civilians were killed in a residential quarter of one town. "The enemy's total air losses up to June 7 are 71 machines; five of ours are missing."

Two bodies have been recovered from a Heinkel which crashed yesterday near the old rectory Suffolk. A third man over six feet high was taken prisoner. He had an automatic revolver fully loaded and another eight rounds in a spare magazine. He struggled violently as he was taken to hospital, declaring that he wanted to continue to fight. It is believed that he left his machine before the crash in a parachute.

A police inspector who first reached the crashed bomber says that the German tried to draw his revolver but was overpowered. He had one leg broken. A house was badly damaged by the crashed bomber.

LIFE IN A BRITISH SUBMARINE

WHY "LEISURE" IS ENCOURAGED

PEACE AND WAR

Essential Qualifications For Men Aboard

In time of peace, submariners of officers and ratings do not live in their submarines. Except for an occasional patrol exercise, which may last up to 10 days at sea, or some special cruise, or on passage between ports, the crew of a submarine will be found in her only during working hours.

A man may have his midday dinner and possibly his tea aboard before returning alongside the depot ship after a day's exercising, but the depot ship is the submarine sailor's home, writes H. de L. Standley (Lieutenant-Commander R.N., Ret.) in the "Sydney Morning Herald."

In war time, conditions are, of course, vastly different, for the submarine then becomes both "home" and "office" for she can remain at sea operating without support or assistance for a longer period than any other type of warship. Her range of action, considering her size, is enormous; but living conditions are severe. Space is cramped, there is no comfort, and opportunity for exercise simply does not exist.

When a submarine leaves her depot ship and proceeds out of harbor, she is manoeuvred by her electric motors. This is done because the Diesel engine, her normal surface motive power, are not designed to go astern. Directly she is in clear water the engines are clutched up to the propeller shafts.

Engines in Operation. There is a muffled roar as the diesels start and the submarine plods on her noisy vibrating way to the exercise area. When the engines are running there is a powerful draught down the conning tower hatch into the boat for the Diesel, having an internal combustion motor, requires air. Should the conning tower hatch accidentally be shut, the engines would use up all the air in a few revolutions and would stop, having created a partial vacuum. Once, this did happen.

The officer of the watch put his face to the control-room voice pipe to pass an order from the bridge. So strong was the vacuum that his head became firmly held in the mouth of the voice pipe and he had the greatest difficulty in getting away from it.

Generally, fair warning is given before a submarine is required to dive. The men can be sent to diving stations in plenty of time. Diesels can be stopped and de-clutched from the propeller shafts, ventilation closed down, and the conning tower hatch shut in a leisurely way. In a crash dive this is all very different. ("Crash dive" is the navy's slang for the evolution of submerging in the shortest possible time.)

Vessel Shudders

With the first sound of the klaxon hooter, men literally leap to their stations. Ventilation valves are rapidly shut; valves controlling the flooding of the tanks are quickly opened. The whole vessel shudders as the engines splutter and stop. Then quiet comes. After all the jarring and clatter the stillness is almost uncanny. It is broken only by the low hum of electric motors, the splash of the sea on the hull, and a gentle hiss of air escaping from tanks into which the ocean gurgles to destroy the buoyancy of the submarine.

Down the conning tower ladder comes a cascade of gear from the bridge—the bridge compass, charts, parallel rulers, and other navigational instruments, signal hand flags, flashing lamp, and other oddments. These are followed by the signalman himself.

The captain waits till he is certain the engines have stopped before he steps into the conning tower and closes the hatch after him. By the time he reaches the control room reports are coming through that the ballast tanks are full; the needles of the depth gauges will be on the move showing that the boat is going down.

Leisure While Diving. Life is "leisurely" while diving. Unless an attack is being made and torpedoes are going to be fired—when all hands will be at action stations—very few men are required on watch at the same time once the boat has got her depth and the trim has been properly adjusted. There is little for those off watch to do except eat, sleep and read.

During a long dive the crew is encouraged to keep as quiet and still as possible, for a man exerting himself in any way and moving about uses more oxygen than he would do sitting still and doing nothing.

After all, a submarine has only the air she had in her hull at the time of diving, and she cannot ventilate again until she comes to the surface. For this reason, too, cooks

Here are some samples of their wit, ascribed to the "Paris-Soir":—"Here is a joke about Germany, where it can only be whispered, but which doesn't prevent its being a roaring success. God gave the German people three special qualities—honesty, intelligence, and Nazism.

"But no German can possess more than two at the same time. If he's honest and a Nazi, he can't be intelligent; if he's a Nazi and intelligent, then he must certainly be no Nazi!"

Churches Are Ready To Assist

HELPING CHILDREN

By Telegraph—Press Association. AUCKLAND, June 7.

Homes for 548 refugee children from the war zones have now been offered by residents in the Auckland metropolitan area and of several districts in the Auckland province. The offers from country districts totalled 86.

Among the offers received was one from Bishop Linton to accommodate 25 refugee boys in the Takapuna orphanage and 15 girls in the Howick institution.

Advice was also received that Bishop Cherrington had arranged that the Waikato Diocese would make itself responsible for a minimum of 25 children. This offer would in no way preclude people of the Church from making individual offers.

WAR-TIME PASTIME

French Wits Jest At Nazi's Expense

It was only a matter of time after the outbreak of war, when French newspapers would begin a none-too-gentle castigation of the enemy. In French journals of recent date, several columns have been devoted to this typically French art.

Here are some samples of their wit, ascribed to the "Paris-Soir":—"Here is a joke about Germany, where it can only be whispered, but which doesn't prevent its being a roaring success. God gave the German people three special qualities—honesty, intelligence, and Nazism.

"But no German can possess more than two at the same time. If he's honest and a Nazi, he can't be intelligent; if he's a Nazi and intelligent, then he must certainly be no Nazi!"

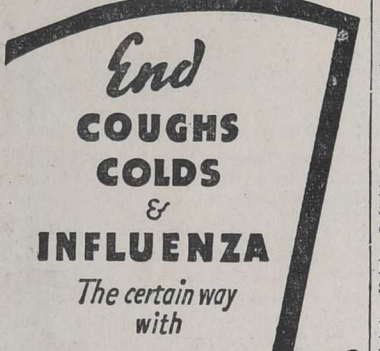

(1) As a Socialist for more than half a lifetime, I am opposed to any compromise, either with the Nationalists or the Communists, for the sake of political expediency.
(2) The Labour Government, having been returned by an overwhelming majority to the Treasury benches, it would be a betrayal of trust on the part of its members, which may lead to much disaffection in the ranks of the masses, at a time when the consolidation of our movement is of paramount importance, both at home and abroad.
(3) Moreover, it would mean the repudiation of the decision of the special conference of the Labour Party (rank and file members) held in Wellington on Saturday, June 1, for their representatives to coalesce with the Opposition.
(4) As members of the Opposition are in constant touch with the Minister of Defence and his Government, it is obvious that they can submit any constructive suggestions they may possess to the Minister as effectively as if they held Cabinet rank.
(5) So in conclusion, sir, it seems to me that the best results can be achieved, and the solidifying of our other efforts brought about by giving our undivided support to his Majesty's Government of New Zealand as at present constituted. And as we are at present engaged in the most critical stage of the conflict it would not be wise to change horses while crossing the stream.—I am, etc.,

Devastating Work On French Front HARASSING MOVEMENTS

British Official Wireless. (Received June 9, 7.30 p.m.) RUGBY, June 9. Throughout Friday afternoon, enemy forces engaged in the Somme offensive were continually harassed by medium bombers of the R.A.F.

Troop concentrations and mechanised columns in the immediate rear of the battlefield between Le Prepost and Amiens were subjected to repeated attacks at short intervals by sections of the aircraft.

Road and rail communications in the back areas were systematically bombed and the towns and villages in which the troops were massing were wrecked and set ablaze.

Other strong forces of medium bombers, ranging over the enemy's immediate back areas, were meanwhile attacking columns of tanks, cavalry and supply wagons on the move and infantry concentrations assembled at crossroads and villages.

Direct hits with heavy bombs were registered in the centre of Vismes and houses were demolished by aerial bombardment to block the strategic roads near Mianny, and elsewhere important roads and railways were successfully bombed.

Six heaps of ammunition boxes stacked alongside a wood to the east of the river Bresle were bombed by one aircraft that afterwards came down within 100 feet of the ground and put an anti-aircraft gun and its crew out of action by machine-gun fire.

Enemy fighter opposition encountered in many of the areas was attacked. The war cry of the R.A.F. ground staff is "Keep the fans turning."

Wireless maintenance men checked up the sets, armoureds went over the guns and put in fresh ammunition for eight machine-guns in each Hurricane and Spitfire.

Fighting Spirit. The spirit of all ranks was the same. Each had only one thought—to keep the fans turning, to send out the pilots with the aircraft on the "top line" in every detail. It is this, among other things, that contributed to the feeling of superiority.

Forecasts Conscription By Selection

INFORMATIVE ADDRESS

Mr E. L. Cullen, M.P., Speaks At Napier

THE WAR SITUATION

"Members of your association at present enjoy a 40-hour week, but it is probable that before long all industries will have to work longer hours," said Mr E. L. Cullen, M.P., speaking at the jubilee re-union of the Post and Telegraph Employees' Association in Napier on Saturday night.

Mr Cullen referred to several aspects of the war situation, and his speech was of particular interest as the first delivered in this district since the secret session of Parliament last week.

"It was wonderful to hear in the course of the secret session what the Government was doing," he said. "I am satisfied that the training of troops in this country is on a grander and better scale than was the case in the last war, and the troops going overseas are better equipped for what will be required of them."

"The Government has taken 'all-in' measures, including the conscription of all our resources, wealth, and manpower. It has taken power—and will use that power—to introduce a class of conscription. But it will be conscription by selection."

The speaker did not define the latter term, but remarked that if he had been Minister of Defence they would have had a measure of compulsion before now.

"If British goes down we will go down too," he continued. "It would be our duty to fight to the last. However, I am confident that such a position will not arise. What we require at the present time is confidence, and if I had my way all the pessimists would be put into His Majesty's boarding-house for a spell."

Forces "Let Down"
Mr Cullen referred in glowing terms to the feat of evacuating the British forces from Dunkirk. He would not say who was responsible but would say that the forces had been let down.

"Jerry is no idle foe, and he is one we will have to deal with," he continued. "We have to face the possibility of a long war, and one that will weaken the British Empire as well as other empires."

"We must assist and support not only the Mother Country but also the boys who have already gone, so that we will have something for them on their return."

Effect On Department
Reference to the war situation was also made by Mr H. M. Patrick, senior inspector of the Post and Telegraph Department, who deputised for the Inspector-General of the Department at the gathering.

Over 1000 employees of the department had volunteered for the service and had gone or were going overseas. "Women were at present being trained to work as temporary employees in the positions becoming vacant.

The conditions following the last war would not be repeated, and every man who went away would come back to his job.

The employees could assist in this direction by doing a little extra work in addition to their normal duties while the war emergency lasted.

Support Offered
Mr T. Falconer (Hastings), Dominion president of the association, expressed regret that the jubilee celebrations were being held under the shadow of war. He read a resolution which had been forwarded to the Minister offering the co-operation of the association to the department in every way possible.

A number of employees of the department had volunteered for service, and there would also be service for those remaining behind. The speaker said he had informed the Minister that he need only ask and they would respond 100 per cent.

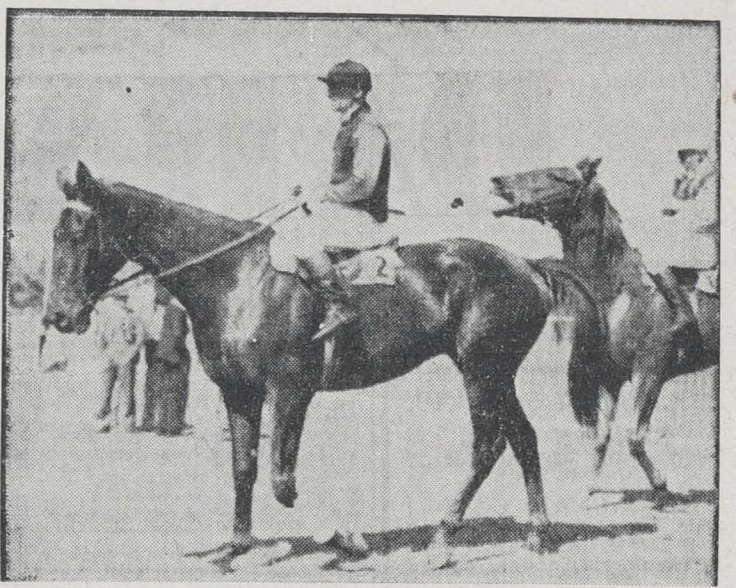
