The latest request from the military governor for all unmobilised Frenchmen over 17 years of age to depart gave further impetus to the evacuation.

Paris rapidly and steadily is being transformed into a fortress. Every village between it and the enemy has become a stronghold. The banks removed from Paris are operating normally elsewhere. Civilian Parisians who remain were reported during the day to be going about their business

"Every pound you subscribe," he said, "will be a demonstration of your hatred of the concentration camp and the brutal murder of your fellow workers by Hitler. As a socialist I feel now is the chance of saying to Mussolini: "We work, we fight, we save. we gave, and avenge the death of our great comrade Matteoti whom you brutally murdered."

It is appreciated in London that there was nothing in the situation in Norway itself which necessitated the withdrawal of troops and that this was due solely to the inilitary situation at more vital strategic points and is in no sense a victory for the German armies in northern Norway. On the contrary, the capture of Narvik, besides being a useful operation in itself, was a definite military defeat for Germany which has rendered the town useless to Germany for a year or more.

It is realised that to maintain, equip and provision a comparatively small body of men in northern Norway would have involved a dissipation of effort, especially in ships, material and aeroplanes, which was

pation of effort, especially in ships, material and aeroplanes, which was not justified either by the importance of Narvik once the port was destroyed, or by gains derivable from further successes in that area.

Hostilities Cease

An earlier message stated that the Norwegian High Command ordered the cessation of hostilities at midnight on Sunday. The announcement added that the negotiafors had left to discuss terms with

It is pointed out that recent experiments point to distinct possibilities for silico-superphosphate as a new fertiliser for New Zealand. Further, the extra ingredient exists in inexhaustible quantities in accessible localities in New Zealand and may be obtained relatively cheaply. Serpentine is a silicate mineral containing a considerable amount of magnesium, some iron and traces

of cobalt. Possibilities Noted Certain New Zealand workers, who were following investigations overseas, saw the possibilities of the use of such a material as serpentine some two years ago and have been investigating these possibilities

English work in 1927 had pointed to the possible role of silicates in plant nutrition, while Russian and German scientists made further studies, the results of which were published in 1932.

In Germany the effect of silicates on the uptake of phosphates by plants was reviewed, while in Russia attention was focussed on the use of dunite (a rock usually containing the mineral serpentine) as a conditioner for the rather acid type of superphosphate manufactured in that country. Comparatively small amounts of dunite were added to superphosphate for that purpose. The first field trials with the use of silico-superphosphate were laid down in New Zealand in July, 1939, in the North Auckland, Waikato, Waihi, King Country, North Tara-naki and Southland districts, on soil types considered to be those which lacked soluble phosphates or in forms unavailable to the plant. Results of these trials have shown that







NEWS-MONGERS

The boon of wireless, which has been rightly recognised as providing an excellent means of maintaining contact with current events, is by way of developing, in certain hands, into a curse. Those in this Dominion who fiddle with the knobs on their sets in the early hours of the morning are at one and the same time the admiration of their gaping audiences and the bugbear of those who really recognise the mischief they are doing.

The wonder of wireless has shrunk the world to very small dimensions, so that voices thousands of miles away are transmitted almost instantaneously from point to point of the globe. The mischief is caused by those who are not content to listen-in to the official broadcasts from reputable sources, but who must always be searching round the dial for something strange and new.

These amateur experts, who for the most part do not know the difference between a dull-emitter valve and a crystal, seem to take a great delight in sweeping up the garbage of Europe and elsewhere in order to have tall stories to tell later to their friends. What they do hear is generally transmitted, but what they hear loses nothing in the re-telling. A vivid imagination comes into play on the well-known psychological assumption that if a story is worth telling, it is worth telling well. Everyone knows the pleasant sensation of being the only one in a company who has something really new to say—especially about the war. And everyone knows that there is no subject of more absorbing interest at the moment.

Hence it is that what is heard from some secret station in Europe or from some other equally mythical source is magnified out of all proportion until the nerves of the hearers are strung to a high pitch of tension and "anything goes." What needs to be said is that such retailers of international propaganda (for it is more than mere gossipy news) should learn how to pull hard on the reins of their loquacity and refrain from spreading stories whose only effect is to increase public anxiety.

If the unintelligent users of wireless sets were the only culprits, nothing much more would need to be said; but unfortunately it has been proved in this country that Fifth Column activity is a reality. Government action is being taken in certain instances to put a check on subversive propaganda, but the people responsible are wily, and the general public is not yet fully awake to the insidious nature of this particular menace.

He is not always even the owner of a wireless set who spreads the stories of "what he heard last night in the short wave system." He may be a deliberate saboteur of the country's war effort. Likewise the casual remark thrown into a discussion on the war may be as real as an enemy attack when it comes to a matter of truth or falsehood.

Someone said that eternal vigilance is the price of freedom; and if the rank and file of the people of this country do not maintain their vigilance, their freedom may be filched

The slogan printed up in all the French troop trains during the last war, and familiar to all old soldiers, read: "Be silent. The ears of the enemy are listening." That slogan could now very well be re-written to read: "Refrain from passing it on. It may be the voice of the enemy speaking." We have sufficient reason by now to know the extent of the ramifications of Nazi preparedness, and we have no reason to suppose that these plans stop short on the present battlefronts of Europe. Therefore let each and every one of us beware of news-mongers.

leader in the bloodstock industry.

The Derby, as evolved to-day, can be regarded as the greatest means for achieving and sustaining improvement in the thoroughbred. It is on this race Bruce Lowe, Hermann Goos, and other great breeding authorities have founded their theories. On the Derby, to some degree, has been ascertained

the correct methods of breeding good class horses. Therefore, the result of the 1940 Derby will be awaited with interest throughout the world, despite the chaos obtaining in Europe. The complete field is not known in New Zealand, but it can be counted a certainty that the Derby competitors will be of great quality, a very true representa-tion of the thoroughbred strength in England to-day.

Although there is now an interregnum in racing in most of the districts, who now have only the Hunt meetings to look forward to before the new season, there is nevertheless much quiet but important activity in the stables with two-year-olds intended for early production in the arena, while several older horses who have been spelling have been taken up with the same purpose.


