It is authoritatively stated at Rome that the following disposition of France is proposed:

- (1) Germany to receive Alsace-Lorraine and a generous share of French colonial possessions.
- (2) Italy to receive Savoy (area south of Lake Geneva), part of Algeria, Corsica, Djibouti and other parts of the French Empire
- (3) Spain to receive part of French Morocco, and possibly part of the Basque country (south-western corner of France).
- (4) Japan to receive certain French possessions in the Far East and the Pacific, notably French Indo-China.
- (5) Belgium to receive certain French Channel ports providing that Belgium concludes a close military and political alliance with Germany

The Italian Stefani News Agency's Berlin correspondent says that Marshal Petain's request was for information; it was not surrender, therefore the military operations will continue.

"France voluntarily chose her destiny when, at Britain's orders, she took up arms against the German Reich's vital interests," adds the correspondent.

CONSCRIPTION MEASURE

Voluntary System May Be Brought To An End

MR FRASER'S STATEMENT

WELLINGTON, June 18. National Service Emergency Regulations made to-day by the Governor-General-in-Council provide for compulsory national service on the part of all persons resident in the Dominion over 16 years of age. These persons will constitute a general Reserve, said the Prime Minister (the Hon. P. Fraser) to-day in explanation of the regulations which have been

issued under the Emergency Regulations Act. Reservists may be required to join the armed forces for duty overseas or for home defence, or may be called on to undertake any other kind of national service within the Dominion which is essential and which they are capable of per-

The procedure for calling men up for service with the armed forces will be mainly on the lines followed during the World War. A register will be set up and divided into classes according to conjugal status, domestic responsibilities, age and locality. One or more of the different classes may be called up by proclamation by the Governor-General, and on this being done, the Director of National Service will issue certificates of enrolment to all reservists in the enrolled class or

Selections will be made by ballot and appeal boards will be set up to deal with appeals. Voluntary recruiting may be

"In the olden days in the Solomon Islands women were repressed and were the slaves of the men, being bought and sold in marriage," said the Rev. E. C. Leadley, a missionary from the Solomon Islands, who spoke to the members of the Methodist Ladies' Missionary Auxiliary yesterday afternoon.

"Women do the planting and the cooking, the mat and basket making," continued the speaker, " and though they are an asset to the community the men are angry at the birth of girls. One man, not so very long ago, gave his wife a thrashing because two girls were born in succession."

In the old days the men only carried their axe or spear, but nowadays a man can be seen carry. nowadays a man can be seen carry ing a child."

The speaker said that the health of the women on the whole was good, though they suffered from anaemia. Mothers were not far enough advanced at present to introduce the Plunket system—they fed their children how and when they liked. To assist the women gener-





THE WATER JUMP

In the race for the World Stakes, Germany, taking the bit in her teeth, crashed through the starting barrier in a flying start, and by jostling, interference and the illegal cutting of corners, has made remarkable progress over some difficult fences and is now well in the lead. But the race is not yet over, the winner can be determined only when the numbers go up—and there is still the water jump. The water jump? It is the place where many have come to grief during the past thousand years or so. It is the jump from the Continent to the coast of Great Britain.

The titanic struggle has now reached that stage. It must be perfectly obvious that there is an end to the staying power of even the most highly trained contender for world domination, and it can be more than suspected that the German entry is now under the whip, with the biggest obstacle yet to face. The blonde beast is tiring and will last the distance only

Leaving that homely figure of speech and putting the motto into plainer words, it may be admitted that Germany has exhibited diabolical ingenuity in her devastating advance through the French provinces. France has been brought to her knees after gallantly staggering under the weight of hammer-blows delivered by an enemy vastly superior in quantity and quality of equipment. The world is left with the spectacle of Great Britain having to fight a lone hand to preserve civilisation for posterity.

The full implications of the French appeal to Germany are not yet clear. Even after Marshal Petain's dramatic announcement that the fighting must cease, the fighting went on. If Germany insists upon complete capitulation, it is questionable whether France will regard that as an honourable peace. Germany is not in the least degree likely to compromise, so that some time may elapse before the situation is cleared up. Great Britain's offer of a Franco-British union seems to have been made on the assumption that France would fight on, and Marshal Petain's statement to his people altered the effectiveness of that offer. This tangled skein is in process of being straightened out; but in the midst of the confusion there is one truth which stands out "clear as the peak of a snow-capped mountain at dawn"—that truth is that Great Britain, never having learned to sound the retreat, will plant its Union Jacks along its shores and stand to their defence until death.

After all, we are British people and we know more about our own kith and kin than we do about either Belgians, Dutchmen or Frenchmen. We know and have faith to believe that our island home never did and never shall lie at the proud foot of a conqueror. The sight of the British lion, crouching on guard on the other side of the Channel, awake and alert, to deal with whatever may come, sets the blood pulsing more quickly and must call out the admiration of the world.

Surely this great spectacle should call out the best that is in every one of us to set aside every weight of prejudice that besets us and to stand in a common effort to assist those of our blood to win their way through the greatest time of difficulty which has ever confronted the Empire. The Government of New Zealand has announced a measure of conscription without any flourish of trumpets and it will be watched carefully as to its actual application. It is a good move in the right direction.

The need is greater than ever, and it will be insisted upon until it disappears, for a departure from the political point of view while running a war. Even the Old Country is willing to adopt a Franco-British union, having already appointed a non-party Cabinet. But the New Zealand Government seems to be still swayed by the warning from some of its supporters that Labour must monopolise the war legislation.

An amendment of the Public Safety Regulations empowers the Attorney-General to declare any organisation o be subversive if he is satisfield to be subversive if he is satisfied that any of its purposes, methods or activities have a subversive tendency or may be injurious to the public safety or likely to lead to attempts to influence public, government or any local authority or public body otherwise than by lawful and constitutional means

Where an organisation is declared where an organisation is declared subversive, no person may sum-mon, conduct, attend or invite any other person to attend the meeting proposed to be held for the purposes of the organisation, nor may anyone use or let any premises for the pur-poses of the organisation or display poses of the organisation or display any notice or sign indicating that the premises are used by it. It is also forbidden to participate in the activities of or to aid, abet or en-courage the organisation or by any badge, symbol, uniform, flag, banner or other means identify himself with express approval of it.

Supply of Money
Regulation IV of the principal regulations applies to subversive organisation. It prohibits the furnishing of money to such organisation and enables the Commissioner of Police to stop any bank account to which he suspects moneys have been paid for subversive purposes. Where the organisation is declared subversive, payments may be made to any creditor not being an officer or member of the organisation for any debt lawfully incurred before it was declared subversive, or tion for any debt lawfully incurred before it was declared subversive, or to such patriotic purposes within the meaning of the Patriotic Purposes Regulations, 1939, as are approved by the Attorney-General, but otherwise shall not be made without the Attorney-General's consent.

The Primary Industries Emergency Regulations provide for widespread organisation of land, materials and men. The essential purpose aimed at is to ensure the maximum supply of all products which Great Britain and this Dominion urgent-

ly require to sustain the civil population. Under the main regulations the production, processing, manufacturing, packing, freezing, chilling or storage of primary products may be regulated and controlled; amending regulations ensure that any persons who are or should be engaged in any phase of primary production will carry on business in accordance with the directions of the Minister or Controller. The directions may relate to the manner in which land is cultivated and managed or to the use to which it is put in the production of primary products.

Occupiers of premises capable of being used for any phase of primary production may be required to regulate employment in accordance with the directions of the Minister or the Controller; if the directions of the Minister or the Controller are not complied with a suitable representative may be authorised to carry out those directions as the agent of the producer, and he will be paid for his services out of the funds of the business, if necessary.

For the efficient prosecution of the war or for the maintaining of supplies of primary produce, land, buildings, goods and machinery may be requisitioned and used in such a manner as the Minister thinks fit.

Compensation

Compensation Any person having an interest in any requisitioned property will be entitled to compensation for any loss suffered by him by reason of such requisition. If the amount of the compensation cannot be mutual.

A STEADY GROWTH TERRITORY OF FORMER FIERCE HEAD-HUNTERS

Solomon Islands' Missionary Describes Interesting Archipelago

Six years spent as a missionary in the Solomon Islands have provided the Rev. E. C. Leadley with a wealth of interesting information about this little-known group, which he described to members of the Hastings Rotary Club yesterday. The Solomons, he said, were situated to the east of New Guinea, not far from the Equator; there were about one

thousand islands of every size and shape, stretched out in a

double chain. Most of them were uninhabited. The climate was bad: it rained practically every other day, and the humidity was such that it was hard for white people to enjoy life. These weather conditions had a very depressing effect, Mr Leadley explained; the temperatures varied comparatively little throughout the year and the heat pressed down like a blanket. White people tended to become nervous and irritable after a time and could benefit only by a

The chief products of the islands were copra, shells used in the making of buttons, a little kauri timber, eache de mer and similar trifles or which there was no little sale. The chief town, said Mr Leadley, had a population of some 50 white people and a number of Chinese; the next in size had about 25 white inhabitants.

The head mission station was in the centre of the chain of islands, where 50 years ago the natives had been fierce head hunters. After raids on other tribes they would return loaded with heads as trophies and bringing slaves

The traders in those days had an exciting time, said Mr Leadley, describing the precautions taken against treachery by the natives.

Traders then went from island to Island in their launches, seldom landing, but dealing, from their heats island in their launches, seldom landing, but dealing from their boats with the natives. Hatchets, Mr Leadley instanced, were never sold whole; the native was given the head only, and left to fit a handle when he reached the shore. This was done to prevent treacherous use of the hatchet on its original owner after it had changed hands.

By 1902, however, head-hunting raids and similar practices had been largly suppressed by Government action. 


