

French Leaders Not All Agreed On Peace

LONDON, June 20. The Berlin radio says that the war with France con-

tinues; members of the French Government are not all agreed on the question of laying down arms.

The Vice-Admiral commanding the Toulon naval base in a proclamation said that Toulon will be defended with all available means if attacked.

The French radio reports that German advanced forces have occupied Lyons. There have been no fresh negotiations with Germany.

The plenipotentiaries are remaining secret for the present. The Bordeaux correspondent of the British United Press says that French plenipotentiaries have gone to meet German

representatives to discuss Germany's terms for an armistice.

Agreement Signed With

The Foreign Under-Secretary (Mr R. A. Butler) in announcing the signature of an agreement between the Japanese and British Governments on certain local questions relating to the British Concession at Tientsin, stated in the House of Commons that these questions included mons that these questions included police arrangements for the suppression of terrorist acts and more affective maintenance of law and order, the circulation of currency in the Concession, and the disposal and custody of the silver reserves in the Chinese banks in the Concession.

The arrangement covering the latter part, said Mr Butler, had received the assent of the Chinese Government. One-tenth of the silver would be used for humanitarian purposes among the famine-stric-ken population of north China, while the balance would remain under seal in the banks until its disposal was later decided upon.

The British Ambassador (Lord Lothian) in an address at Yale University, commenced with a warning that if Hitler destroys or captures the British and French Fleets he will possess building facilities that will enable him vastly to outbuild America and to own defensive preparations for a long time to come

America and to own defensive preparations for a long time to come.

"The United States cannot depend on the British Fleet coming to Canada or that it will make its way easily to the United States," he said. "Only if the British are beaten down and the greater part of the fleet sunk in action will the remainder leave home to assist in the defence of Canada, Australia, New Zealand South Africa and other parts of the Empire. There would be little left for you.

"If Britain can hold out until

Christmas, I believe that the tide will be turned, and this is possible only if American supplies, ships and aeroplanes pour across to Britain. Then the brazen front of tyranny, timid as always in the face of fearless resistance, will begin to doubt

A communique issued by the Ministry of Home Security states that enemy 'planes attacked Britain again last night and dropped bombs on the east coast, Lincolnshire, the south of England, and south Wales. Three towns were damaged, but the fires which were caused were all brought under

Six civilians were killed and 60 injured. The anti-aircraft guns went into action and fighters engaged the raiders. At least three German 'planes were shot down and others were damaged.

Last night's air-raid warnings embraced a much wider area than Tuesday's, extending from the east coast of Scotland to southern England. Bombs were dropped in northeast England and a heavy explosion was heard in Lincoln-

The raiders again flew at a great height.

The German raiders who escaped from the British anti-aircraft guns fled back to their bases at dawn.

An Air Ministry announcement shortly before midnight warned Britons of the approach of the raiders, who appeared in small waves. The alarm lasted five hours. At some points 'planes flying high were heard all night, also the intermittent thuds of bombs.

North-eastern residents had the longest period in their air-raid shelters. Bombs dropped regularly until the searchlights cross-fixed one

until the searchlights cross-fixed one bomber, while the ground defences put up a terrific barrage, after which the British fighters took up

the chase.

A high-explosive bomb hit a house in northern England and killed a mother and daughter and seriously injured the father. Two other houses were completely demolished. FOOD FOR EMERGENCIES

(British Official Wireless) (Received June 20, 9.10 p.m.)

Replying to the House of Lords debate, the Minister of Food (Lord Woolton) said that even if nothing more came into Britain, there were sufficient food supplies for weeks

"All the essential things are there and it is a constant care that these stocks should be kept as high as possible," he said. "We have put up and down the country "iron rations' of food, to be used only in great emergency. In addition, we have prepared in all areas round about the vulnerable centres of population other rations, which will be used in the event of a mass evacuation.

Owing to Government subsidies, the price of milk, bread, meat and bacon had risen only eight per cent., he added. Without the subsidy it would have increased 30 per cent. POOR Uncontrolled foods had risen by 40

Lord Woolton said he had been trying to use the £60,000,000 per annum which the Treasury was spending in subsidising foods so that it should go to the people who most needed it. Food manufacturers had decided in large numbers that they decided in large numbers that they would be prepared to produce goods without profit for some portion of their productions, if these could be distributed to the poorer sections of the population without undue extra charges.
"I am trying to secure that, with-

out any charge to the Exchequer, these people of the poorest classes shall be cared for during war time,"







COURSING EXPLAINED

Plumpton or enclosure coursing, properly controlled, as it is in New Zealand, is one of the finest and most thrilling sports. Such big improvements have been made in the system of training and coursing the hares that nowadays the risk of killing the hare before it reaches the escapes is reduced to a minimum.

The catching of the wild hares is accomplished by means of long nets, which are erected at right angles to a wire netting boundary fence. It is into this enclosure that the hares are driven by a long line

Men concealed near the nets easily secure the hares once they have been entangled. They are then brought to the coursing enclosure, which is a field generally about 600 yards long and 200 yards wide.

The narrow end is fenced from the rest to make a home paddock for the hares, where artificial or natural food is provided. For some weeks the hares are allowed to wander in and out of the home paddock until they are familiar with the ground.

The home paddock, which extends the full width of the ground, is secure from the entry of any dog, but allows the hares to enter freely when coursed. The fence between the open plumpton and the home paddock is termed the "escapes."

In front of the "escapes" a baulk is erected to hamper further the greyhounds and to facilitate the escape of the hares into the sanctuary of the home paddock. However, before the hares are coursed by greyhounds they are regularly driven through the "escapes" by sheep dogs or greyhounds muzzled.

Preparation of the Hares for the Actual

Coursing.

On the actual day upon which coursing is to take place the hares early in the day are locked in the home paddock, where they are easily driven into long boxes, each in a single compartment. The boxes are then taken to the end furthest away from the "escapes."

The dogs entered for the Centennial Cup or any other coursing event compete against each other in pairs as in an ordinary knock-out tournament. When the particular two dogs that are running are harnessed

in the slips a single hare is released and given about a 100 yards start. The two dogs are then released together by pulling a cord, and the course is on.

The dogs generally overhaul the hare before it reaches the "escapes," but its marvellous turning ability causes the dogs to overrun it. Again and again the hare saves itself by its lightning turns each time. the hare saves itself by its lightning turns, each time getting nearer to the escapes, until it finally darts under the sheltering baulk, and the puffing greyhounds return to their owners. Needless to say, the object of the club is to get the hare home safely, as the value of a trained hare is considerable.

The dog which obtains the most points in a course is declared the winner, and the points are allotted as follows:

SPEED, estimated as one, two or three points, according to the degree of superiority shown. The TURN, one point. THE GO-BYE, two points, or if gained on the outer circle three points. WRENCH, half a point. THE TRIP, one point. THE KILL, two points or in a descending scale according to the degree of merit displayed.

A STORY AND A MORAL

A sharp shock of dismay, followed soon after by a long sigh of relief—that describes the experience of most people when the news of the sinking of the Niagara was announced. And most of us, when the final news arrived, made use of the well-worn phrase which has so often comforted us and said that "it might have been worse."

The dramatic story contained almost miraculous features. Although the gallant old ship went down with a valuable material cargo, not one life was lost. The disaster occurred near our shores, the weather was perfect, there was time to send out signals and to receive answers, and competent help was close at hand so that in a matter of hours all came safely to land at Auckland. Had the distance from New Zealand been greater, had the seas been rough, had the explosion occurred in a more vital part of the ship and had speedy help not been available, the moral of the tragic story might have been stronger still—although it is strong enough.

This event has brought home to the people of the Dominion not only the fact that we are at war, but that we are in the war zone. Nothing is to be gained by speculating as to how the mines got there. They were there, and there may be some more there, and that should be enough for any of us, without scaremongering guesswork, of which we have already too much. "An enemy hath done this thing," and we must therefore be more keenly on our guard.

This grave incident, coming as it did when the Empire is facing the greatest struggle in history, makes an opportune demand upon the concerted and concentrated effort of all our people. It is altogether futile that our legislators (on both sides of the House) should still be wrangling and argufying about the precise constitution of the committees which should be set up to stand between the Dominion and death. It will be utterly pitiful if what we hear of as "the deadlock" in regard to the war Cabinet should continue. Surely at such a time reasonable men, in the light of the present momentous circumstances, can find a way whereby to come together in a unified effort for the salvation of the Dominion.

The "mana" of party politics was never lower than it is now, and many are in the mood, as they look from one party to the other, to say: "A plague on both your houses."

Public opinion to-day, we believe, may be interpreted in this way: The important question is not so much who should lead in the carrying out of the war effort, so long as there is leadership upon which we may rely; not so much who should inaugurate the essential work of complete defence, so long as the work is tackled in a thoroughgoing manner.

Wherever the blame lies, there is not yet enough being done, and what is being done is not being done quickly enough. Surely the Niagara tragedy should bring it home to us that our shores are anything but inviolable and that we are by no means beneath the attention of a ruthless enemy.

New Zealand has prided itself on its initiative. With great unction and self-satisfaction we have pointed out to the rest of the world just how far ahead we are in many ways. Why, then, should we allow the enemy to assume the initiative because of lack of thorough vigilance?

We need internal defences and shore defences in very much greater numbers. If we have not sufficient camp room in which to house and train our men, then Mr Semple might be usefully employed in giving one of his demonstrations of how bigger and better work can be done by fewer men in a shorter space of time.

The fact is that this war is in a hurry, whether we are or not. It will stand still for none of us. Children's Home FARM WORKERS **SUBSIDISED**

ENCOURAGEMENT OF **LABOUR**

THE 4F SCHEME

Applications Made At Hasting

Although farmers are experiencing a quiet period at present, a number of inquiries have been made in Hastings already concerning the extension of the farm labour subsidy scheme recently introduced. Under this project, additional subsidies are paid for the employment of learners, in addition to a housing subsidy in certain instances for both learners and experienced men. So far applications for workers

So far applications for workers under the scheme, which was 4F, had not been particularly numerous, said the Placement Officer at Hast-ings (Mr H. S. Robinson) yesterday afternoon, but the possibilities were that farmers would be requiring more hands once the winter was over. Numbers of inexperienced farm hands were available under subsidised conditions.

The scheme had been enlarged

The scheme had been enlarged with the object of ensuring that labour for farming industries would be maintained, and if possible, in creased. In view of this, arrange ments had been made to place single and married men of 20 years and over on farms at an increased rate of subsidy, said Mr Robinson.

House Allowance

A house allowance of 12/6 a week A house allowance of 12/6 a week was made to married workers whether experienced or inexperienced, where suitable accommodation was unavailable for the wife and family to live with the worker on the farm. While the housing subsidy was paid to the experienced man under those conditions, no wages subsidy would be paid in regard to him. The housing subsidy was available for 12 months or until suitable married men's accommodation was made available.

The wages subsidy paid for inexperienced men was to be 30/- a week for the first six months, and 15/- a week for the second six months in addition to the house sub-

sidy where necessary.

Rates of pay to the men were fixed as follows: Dairy farm, men of 20 years, £2 6/-; 21 years and over £2 12/6. In addition, food and over £2 12/6. In addition, food and accommodation must be found, or an allowance of £1 a week made. Sheep farm: Men of 20 years, £1 19/6 a week; 21 years and over, £2 5/-. These rates are in addition to food and accommodation or an allowance of 17/6 a week.

The Conditions.

Mr Robinson explained that farmers' sons were not eligible to re-ceive a subsidy under the 4F scheme. To secure subsidies on the scheme. To secure subsidies on the wages for men as agreed to, a farmer must not dispense with any men at present in his employ. Those farmers desiring to apply for subsidised labour should apply to the registrar or the placement officer. He also pointed out that in cases where men are required to travel more than 30 miles to take over positions, the fare would be paid by the department. the department.

Apart from shepherds, many of whom had enlisted for service overseas, there was not a keen demand at present for other types of workers, added the placement officer.


