MATCHING POLICY WITH GERMAN-ITALIAN AXIS

Following an ultimatum being presented by the Soviet to Rumania, requiring her to hand over the northern provinces of Bessarabia and Northern Bukovina, Constanza, the principal Rumanian port on the Black Sea, and three ports on the Danube, it is stated that Russian troops will invade Rumania at 4 p.m. to-day. They will occupy at first strategic points, including the capitals of Bessarabia, Bukovina and ports at the mouth of the

After a lengthy Cabinet meeting at Budapest the Foreign Officer said: "Rumania will make a fatal mistake if she considers by satisfying Russian claims she can escape Hungarian claims, which will be fulfilled when the time is ripe. Hungary is matching her policy with that of the German-Italian Axis.

"Rumania for 20 years has emphasised that she would defend her territorial integrity. King Carol only last week declared that Rumania would not surrender an acre. Rumania now has abandoned this policy and thus created a new situation. Soviet Russia profits from the present European situation."

On the contrary, she is the outpost of civilisation the world over. She is a strong point that will hold on and hold the enemy while the rest of the world mobilises its resources for victory.

This conception of Britain as an outpost was a practical fact, for Britain was drawing increasingly upon world-wide resources, continued Mr Morrison. For instance, Canada had shell-filling and explosive plants, a fine Bren gun factory now in production, and aircraft factories delivering to the United Kingdom Hurricane fighters and other machines, and was now at work on the execution of ever-increasing the execution of ever-increasing British orders.

Canada was seeing to it that the available war plant should work absolutely to full capacity on two or three shifts a day. There also were Canada's stocks of weapons and munitions which we had been able to draw upon. The vast Canadian resources of copper, nickel, zinc, aluminium, timber and wood-pulp were well known.

South Africa was doing much to meet her heavy responsibilities to her own armed forces. Some of them now are actively and gallantly engaged with the Italians but she also was able to make some direct.

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
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

How To Knit For

FOLLOW THESE INSTRUCTIONS FOR KNITTING A BALACLAVA HELMET

Materials: 4oz. 4-ply wool, set of 4 No. 10 bone needles with points both ends, set of 4 No. 13 steel needles with points

Measurements: To fit an average to large-size head. Tension: 9sts. to 1in. measured over the unstretched rib. Using No. 10 needles, cast on 180 sts. (60 on each of three needles), and work in rounds of k. 2, p. 2 rib for 7in., finishing at the end of a round.

Next round: Rib to last 24 sts., turn, rib to last 24 sts., Now continue in rib on these 132 sts. (slipping the other 48 sts. on to one needle, and leaving for the present), but work backwards and forwards instead of in rounds for 4½in., ending with the inside of work facing you. Now place the 132 sts. all on one needle and turn the top of the head

1st row: Rib 43, k. 2 tog., rib 42, p. 2 tog., rib 1, turn. 2nd row: K. 2 tog., rib 42, p. 2 tog., rib 1, turn. Repeat the second row until all the side sts. are worked

off and 44 sts. remain. Now take the set of No. 13 needles and continue thus:-

With first needle rib 22, with second needle rib remaining 22 sts., then on to same needle pick up and knit 44 sts. down side of flap, with third needle work in rib across the 48 sts. left on the No. 10 needle, with fourth needle pick up and knit 44 sts. up the other side of flap and on to same needle rib across the 22 sts. on first needle (180 sts.). Continue in k. 2, p. 2 rib for 1in. Cast off in rib. Press lightly under a damp cloth with a warm iron.

N.B.—When working flap on two needles, place small corks on ends of needles to prevent sts. slipping off, or use spare pair of No. 10 needles with knobs at ends for this part

THE PARTY LINE

People in the country districts know all about the party line, telephonically speaking. They reply only in response to the particular ring representing their private code. The present Government is in something like the same position. It is developing the habit of answering only those calls that come within the circuit of its own friends. But the difference between the party line system and the political party lines drawn by the Government is that the former is legitimate while the latter is not. The ear of the Government should be open to each and every call that comes from the

There can be no doubt that the call of the people of the Dominion to-day is for a genuine national unity of spirit, aim, and purpose. Mr Nash, who said not long ago that he saw no earthly reason for the establishment of a coalition, has just made an appeal to the people to stand in, all together, to shoulder the heavy burdens chiefly related to the War Expenses Account. He is, in fact, in a position to make more than a mere appeal. As Minister of Finance and on behalf of the Cabinet, he has laid down the action which must be taken by the people to foot the war bill.

Obedience to the demands of the Budget will be willing and unquestioning. The people know quite well how serious the situation is, and although all classes are asked to bear heavy hardships in addition to those already borne, there will be no complaints. The rank and file of the electors know perhaps more about the real spirit of unity of effort and sacrifice than does the Government, and under the present financial regulations they may be able to show an example to the Government which it could well follow.

There is far too much equivocation in the attitude of the Government to those who are willing to stand in on a co-operative basis to give assistance in these days of dire peril. The offer of help is received by the Government, which immediately accepts it with such conditions that the whole offer is thrown out of focus. The political party line cannot be tapped. The Labour Government is a close corporation which must maintain supreme party control and, in the words of a recent resolution passed by some of its followers, those "outside of the ranks of Labour" cannot be allowed any say in the actual government of the country in war time.

The day when we can realise the consummation that "all are for the State and none is for the Party" seems to be yet a long way ahead in this country. The bewildering success achieved by Labour at the last election seems to have left it in a state of high tension in which it is regarded as a sacred duty to man the walls on all four sides lest marauding thieves break in and steal.

Much that is good has been done by the present Government, but not for a moment will they slacken their grip on party power. Even a world war and a threat of the ruination and damnation of the British Empire do not seem to be regarded as such a serious matter as the intrusion of an Opposition duckling in the clutch of Labour eggs that are in process of hatching out. And until the day comes when we can all depart from party prejudices and shake ourselves free from the incubus of purely party government in a time of grave emergency, we shall continue to flounder along in a morass of cross-purposes, suspicions, half-truths, and party

A healthy spirit of initiative and co-operation should characterise any Government worthy of the name, and if those at present in power do not measure up to the size of their responsibilities, the people may have some definite things to say on the matter before long.

Rugby Union Members Believe That Some Casualties Are Unavoidable

A letter from the Hawke's Bay Hospital Board referring to the number of footballers who have received in-patient or out-patient treatment at the board's institutions came before the management committee of the Hawke's Bay Rugby Union last night.

The board asked that more strict supervision of games should be undertaken, as the hospitals were very crowded and accommodation was severely taxed.

Mr H. F. Forster queried whether the position was really as stated by the Hospital Board. According to their insurance claims there had not been any unusual number of injuries as compared with other years.

The chairman (Mr B. Tweedie) remarked that probably not all the players admitted to hospital had been covered by the union's insurance scheme.
