Vigorous Southward Expansion

BRITAIN AND AMERICA TO BE IGNORED

Navy Maps Out First Steps

United Press Association-Copyright. (Received July 13, 0.30 a.m.) SHANGHAI, July 12.

A reliable Japanese source states that the Japanese Army and Navy have agreed upon a programme of vigorous expansion in East Asia and the South Seas, regardless of the risk of colliding with British or United States interests.

The Navy is reported to have agreed to the following steps:—(1) Take over the foreign Concessions of China; (2) an intensified blockade of Hong Kong and the eventual occupation of the town; (3) the armed occupancy of Indo-China; (4) the penetration shortly of Shuichi.

Mr Sako, former Ambassador to Poland and now Ambassador to the Dutch East Indies, is to conduct diplomatic negotiations in ambassadorial ranks in view of the greater importance

NAZIS SEIZING WEALTH OF FRANCE

Ominous references in German and Italian broadcasts suggest that the activities of the Petain Government are being viewed with increasing disfavour in Berlin and Rome.

Meanwhile, signs of friction between the civil authorities and the German Army in occupied France are accumulating. The latest of these is a protest to the German armistice delegation regarding an order foreshadowing the seizure by the Nazis of all valuables in French banks. The text of this is embodied in a communication made by General Weygand

The order announces the taking over in that part of France occupied by German troops of the control of foreign exchange and all banks, including branches and agencies in Paris and in the Department of the Seine. They will be required to submit a statement of their position on June 14, 1940, in regard to:

(1) Foreign exchange excluding the formation of new assemblies, and after their formation in the event of any external or internal crisis.

Senate deputies are meeting only when summoned by the Chief of State.

(5) Securities in the form of foreign assets.
(6) Precious stones and rough or unset diamonds.
(7) Bank notes in reichsmarks.
Until further instructions it is forbidden to dispose of the securities mentioned above

on behalf of the French Finance Ministry to the French delegation on the armistice commission in Weisbaden.

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



FOLLOW THESE INSTRUCTIONS FOR KNITTING AN ATTRACTIVE MOSS-STITCH WAISTCOAT.

These instructions, simply given, are for a man's waist-coat in moss stitch which would be a certain favourite because of the extra warmth which it provides and because it has also four useful pockets.

The back of the waistcoat is knitted in stocking stitch, and the front in moss-stitch with double wool. The tension of the former should be about 8 sts. to one inch and of the latter about $6\frac{1}{2}$ sts. and 11 rows to one inch.

If this tension is followed the measurements of the waist-coat are:—Shoulder to lower edge, 23 inches; round waistcoat below armholes, when fastened, 39 inches.





"Ever since the outbreak of the war," said Mr Butler, "Britain has had to guard against this danger when making her military plans. It is natural that our staffs, who in totalitarian war have to consider all tuture hypotheses, should consider now to counter Russian assistance to

The war has caused a shortage of fish throughout New Zealand, and particularly at Wellington. This is caused by the diversion of trawlers from fishing to mine-sweeping and other war purposes and by the restrictions placed upon the

Nearly 70 per cent. of Wellington's fish supply before the war was provided by the Cook Strait trawlers, which are no longer operating; a further 27 per cent. was taken by long lines, and the remainder by set nets and seines used for drawing the beaches. The principal exponents of these latter methods were Italians of the Island Bay fisher colony, who are now fishing under supervision and in conformity with certain restrictions imposed upon them.

As a result, the quantities of fresh fish being landed in port have dwindled enormously. Trawler supplies, which had hitherto continued intermittently, recently ceased altogether, and the supplies available are therefore reduced to available are therefore reduced to fish taken by launch fishermen, and even their production is affected to some extent, the majority being

Italians.

ON BOMBING RAIDS WITH R.A.F.

Pilot-Officer Tacon Describes His Experiences

THE COASTAL COMMAND

Vitally interesting are letters written to his parents in Hastings by Pilot Officer E. W. Tacon, D.F.C., who is flying a Lockheed Hudson bomber with a Coastal Command stationed in Scotland. His accounts of raids on Germany and Nazi-occupied territory provide a background for cabled messages appearing daily in the Press.

In his letters, Pilot Officer Tacon, who was recently decorated, mentions Pilot Officer L. J. Ewing, who has since been reported missing. He speaks also of his companion, "Dopey," who is Pilot Officer Edwards, a Canadian.

Blaze of Light



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
