Japanese Newspapers Report Agreement

ARMS TRAFFIC TO CHINA

TOKYO, July 12.

The vernacular Press unanimously announced that the British Ambassador (Sir Robert Craigie) and the Japanese Foreign Minister (Mr Arita) have reached a basis of understanding for the suspension of the transport of supplies for Marshal Chiang Kai-shek through Burma.

They say that Great Britain has accepted the following Japanese demands:—

- (1) Great Britain will prohibit the transportation of arms, ammunition, trucks, or petrol.
- (2) If necessary, the Japanese Consular authorities at Rangoon will examine the actual results of such prohibition.
- (3) The Hong Kong authorities have already acted in prohibiting the traffic.

The Japanese newspaper "Nichi Nichi," in a leader, says that Japan should take over the Dutch East Indies and fight the United States should America interfere.

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WARM RECEPTION FOR FOOLHARDY INVADER AWAITS

Naval Actions Lessen Hitler's Chances

BLOCKADE CAN NEVER BE EFFECTIVE

First Lord Reviews Position

(British Official Wireless)
(Received July 14, 9.45 p.m.)

RUGBY, July 14.

An assurance that a warm reception awaited anyone who was foolhardy enough to attempt an invasion of Britain was given by the First Lord of the Admiralty (the Hon. A. V. Alexander) in a broadcast address.

"We have not been idle in preparing ourselves to meet the gambler's throw of an attempted invasion of our shores. For obvious reasons I cannot speak in any detail of the measures taken against landings in this country, but I can say that the preparation of the defences on our beaches and elsewhere has proceeded most effectively and has revolutionised the position.

"Our naval dispositions are such as to ensure the warmest reception for the various seaborne forces which the enemy might launch against our shores. In all these preparations the Admiralty works in the closest and happiest contact with the Air Ministry to ensure that we may have warning of enemy expeditions and destroy and drown them at sea.

"Lately the German propaganda machine has somewhat inconsistently boasted not merely of reducing us by a lightning stroke of invasion but of wearing us down by a blockade carried out by bomb and torpedo.

"As regards a blockade, let me say at once that in the face of an intensified attack by these weapons, which can only be temporary and not sustained, our mercantile losses have to some extent increased. We have to need to exaggerate this threat—the German communiques will do that for us," continued Mr Alexander. "Look at the facts: In the six weeks since the new wave of the U-boat campaign started the average weekly loss of British, Allied and neutral ships altogether has been 60,000 tons, which is only some 10,000 tons above the average weekly loss for the whole of the war. The chance of a ship in British waters being sunk are still only one in 681.

"Our sea ports bear daily witness to the fact that our great oceanic resources are still coming home with immense supplies of every conceivable war necessity from all over the world, and the coastal convoys are distributing these throughout the length and breadth of the land.

"The last three weeks, pregnant with grim issues, have borne witness to the deepening of the spiritual and moral forces of the British people. We are more than ever sustained here at home by our consciousness of a British Commonwealth of Nations united as never before in the defence of Christianity, of civilisation and of the kindly, tolerant way of life which has evolved through the centuries and which has developed an equally calm and fruitful benevolence among our sister nations in the British Commonwealth and in America.

Empire's Response

"The arsenals, factories and dockyards of the Commonwealth daily furnish more and more munitions of war. They are responding to all the calls without stint or hesitation. The flow of soldiers, sailors, airmen from these islands continues in an ever-increasing stream.

"In the name of the Navy I pay my tribute of admiration and sympathy for two fine ships belonging to the Empire naval forces which have recently been lost in the common cause—the Canadian destroyer Fraser, sunk in the face of the enemy during operations off the coast of France, and the ship Pathan, of the Indian Navy, destroyed by enemy mines while on patrol.

"Nor do I forget for one moment the loyal assistance given by the fleets of Australia and New Zealand, those island homes imbuing with the sea the seaman's and the spirit of independence which are tradition to all nations so happily situated by Providence.

"Every Dominion, every colony, is sending help. A cause which calls for such men, such effort, such devotion and such sacrifice can never be lost.

America's Part

"To those in the great United States of America whose sympathy recently has been lost in practical help have been welcome to us in our testing time, I say, Be of good cheer. I would, nevertheless, that the great American nations consider and recognise that the fight we wage today is as much a fight for the preservation of their national inheritance, born of sacrifices evoked by such men as Jefferson and Lincoln, and of the principles involved in the Declaration of Independence, as it is a fight for the preservation of England's green and pleasant land, of the Charter of Rummymede or of our free franchise, our social services and standards."

FRENCH EVACUATE PART OF TOULON

Four Hundred Miles An Hour In Air Battle

Young Pilot's Part In Combat Over The Channel

Sudden End

Messerschmitt Nose-Dives After Burst From Machine-Gun

(Received July 14, 7.30 p.m.)
RUGBY, July 14.

A young fighter pilot gave a broadcast account of his part in Wednesday's biggest air battle in the English Channel when 14 enemy aircraft were destroyed and 23 seriously damaged.

The pilot, whose squadron that day had shot down their fiftieth enemy aircraft, destroyed one Messerschmitt 109 and helped to destroy a Dornier 215.

Twenty-four Dorniers escorted by an even larger number of fighters were bombing a British convoy when the R.A.F. fighters went into action.

"The first bunch of bombers had already dropped its bombs when we got there," said the pilot, "and the second formation were about to go in. The third wave never delivered an attack at all.

"It was a thrilling fight. There were two distinct lines of disturbed water near the ships and just ahead were fountains of water leaping skywards from the bombs nearby. I had just attacked a Dornier when I saw a Messerschmitt 109 come hurtling at me from above. I made a quick turn and dived after him.

Streaked for Home

"I had to do 400 miles an hour to get him within range before I could fire. He flattened out no more than 50 feet above sea level and went streaking for home. I followed him and we were still doing a good 400 miles an hour when I pressed the gun button again very deliberately.

"Suddenly the Messerschmitt's port wing dropped down, its starboard wing went up and then in a flash his nose went down and he was gone.

"He simply vanished into the sea. I had not time to look round for him because almost at the precise moment that he disappeared from my gunights I felt a sting in the leg by a splinter from my aircraft, which had been hit by enemy bullets. There were some Messerschmitt 109's right on my tail. Just as I had been firing at the enemy fighter which was now gone, three of his mates had been firing at me. I did a quick turn and made for home."

MERCHANT SHIPS SAVED

SIX HURRICANES BEAT TEN HEINKELS

Quality Of British Pilots Again Proved

(Received July 14, 7.0 p.m.)
LONDON, July 12.

Eleven German raiders were reported to have been shot down over Britain today, at different points over the land or sea from Aberdeenshire to Hampshire.

To-day's attacks again proved the quality of the British fighter pilots. Six Hurricanes saved merchant ships from ten Heinkels. Four were shot down and the others driven off.

A little later two Dorniers attempted to attack the same convoy. A Hurricane pilot from the same squadron shot down one and damaged the other.

Another Hurricane surprised three Dorniers attacking shipping further south and sent one down in flames. The Hurricane was hit in several places, but landed safely.

France Still Able To Fight

DE GAULLE DETERMINED

(Received July 14, 9.35 p.m.)
LONDON, July 14.

General de Gaulle, in a broadcast, said that France had a considerable military force able to fight at any moment on land, on sea or in the air.

"French youth of magnificent quality continue to rally to us," he said. "They are detours or traitors who claim that France can exist under the German and Italian heel, who declare that the war is hopeless."

"July 14 is a day of mourning, but is also a day of dawnning hope. Victory will be ours and will be won with the aid of France in arms."

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Pétain Picks Laval As His Successor

GOVERNMENT WILL NOT YET GO TO PARIS

(Received July 14, 9.10 p.m.)
PARIS, July 14.

Marshal Pétain has issued a decree appointing Pierre Laval his ultimate successor, but in the event of M. Laval being unavailable his successor will be chosen by a majority vote of the Council of Ministers.

The Minister of Education has ordered the arrest of all officials in his department who have abandoned their posts during hostilities.

The Government has issued a communique declaring that Marshal Pétain will not transfer the seat of Government to Paris unless he receives "all the necessary guarantees assuring its complete independence."

GERMANS DISMAYED BY R.A.F. RAIDS

VULNERABILITY OF COUNTRY PROVED

(Received July 14, 9.10 p.m.)
ANKARA, July 13.

Travellers from Germany report that traffic in some parts of the Rhineland has virtually been brought to a standstill by R.A.F. raids. The population are increasingly dismayed by the discovery of their vulnerability.

A recent order issued by the Gestapo forbidding Germans to disclose by telephone or post the results of British raids is having the opposite effect, since whispered reports tend to become exaggerated.

INDIA'S WAR EFFORT GATHERS MOMENTUM

Production Of Supplies Increased And Army And Air Force Being Strengthened

(British Official Wireless)
(Received July 14, 7.30 p.m.)
RUGBY, July 13.

Information is now available of the further efforts being made in India to assist in the successful prosecution of the war. For the purposes of the War Supply Board a census of machine tools and certain other essential equipment is being undertaken, and reserves of timber, pig iron, and other materials are being built up.

The Department of Supply has taken over five out of eight ordnance factories.

Two main branches have been created for the production of supplies and munitions, the latter branch undertaking the production and control of all metal, general engineering, and shipbuilding. The appointment of six provincial controllers of supplies has been sanctioned and those for Calcutta, Bombay, Cawnpore, Madras, and Lahore have been appointed, together with provincial advisory committees for war supplies.

The chief orders recently received include engineering stores and butting for the Middle East, textiles for Britain, Australia, and South Africa, medical stores for Somaliland, handbags for Egypt, and foodstuffs for Aden.

Legless R.A.F. Pilot Shoots Down Nazi Raider

Passed For Active Service With Metal Limbs

Fine Athlete

Human Story Of Determination And Pluck

(Received July 14, 9.5 p.m.)
RUGBY, July 14.

Behind the report that an R.A.F. Fighter Command pilot who lost both his legs in a pre-war air crash had shot down a Dornier 17 into the sea recently while piloting a Hurricane, lies a human story of pluck and determination.

After passing through the air training school with a great reputation for athletic achievement, the pilot was commissioned in the R.A.F., and crashed heavily after losing control of his machine. As a result, both legs were amputated, one completely and the other at the knee.

The pilot was invalided out of the service, but increasing skill in the use of metal legs enabled him to play games again and when the war broke out he so impressed the medical board that he persuaded the doctor to send him for a test to the central flying school.

The pilot was passed for active service with a fighter squadron and began flying Spitfires. Now he is leading a squadron.

Thirteen Men Spend Six Days On Raft

U-BOAT INSPECTS VICTIMS AND TURNS AWAY

Happy Ending To Wartime Ordeal

(Received July 14, 7.10 p.m.)
RUGBY, July 14.

The adventures of a German U-boat of a raft on which 13 seamen had been clinging for nearly six days have been described by a survivor who recently landed in Britain. After the ship had been torpedoed the men on the raft drifted aimlessly, and on the third day saw a liner, but were not themselves seen owing to the rough sea.

On the sixth day a German submarine appeared and approached to within twenty yards. The men on the raft saw that the machine-gun on the U-boat bridge was trained on them and they ostentatiously threw overboard the one rifle they had with them.

The U-boat circled slowly close round the raft and then the commander waved and went away.

The survivor said that the seamen were relieved at not being taken prisoner rather than despairing at not being rescued, and they celebrated the event by a double ration of water.

Later in the day they were rescued by British destroyers.

"CLOSER RELATIONS IN EVERY SPHERE"

Mr Sullivan In Australia

MATERIALS TO BE SUPPLIED

Valuable Contacts Made

BRISBANE, July 14.

"I am looking forward to the development of closer relations in every sphere, including defence and trade, between New Zealand and Australia," said the Hon. D. G. Sullivan (Minister of Supply) before leaving Brisbane after spending two days in consultation with State officials.

"We are one people," he said. "I found everywhere great interest in New Zealand and a keen desire to draw closer in this hour of crisis. The contacts made here have been most helpful and I have made arrangements for Australia to assist New Zealand by supplying materials the shortage of which is causing anxiety."

Germans Feel "Protective" Towards Eire

The Berlin radio denies that Germany is planning to violate Eire, but adds: "Any attempts to reshape relations between England and Eire will inevitably help to extend the theatre of war."

R.A.F.'s TALLY ON SATURDAY

Only One British Fighter Missing

ATTACKS ON SHIPPING FAIL

(British Official Wireless)
(Received July 14, 9.10 p.m.)
RUGBY, July 13.

Spitfire and Hurricane pilots of the R.A.F. again inflicted heavy damage on the German Air Force to-day. In two attempts to raid shipping in the English Channel this afternoon 10 Nazi bombers and fighters were shot down into the sea. The total number of enemy aircraft destroyed to-day is 12 and several others were damaged. Only one British fighter is missing.

The first big action of the day was fought out between British fighters and Dornier bombers protected by fighters. The battle began more than four miles up over the sea, when a small Hurricane patrol engaged about 20 enemy raiders and shot down a Dornier bomber.

While this fight was in progress other Hurricanes from the same squadron engaged the protecting Messerschmitt twin-engined fighters. They shot down two and damaged others.

Spitfires and Hurricanes from other squadrons shot down a Messerschmitt 109 and a Dornier bomber, which also attempted to attack shipping in the channel.

Two hours later British fighters and anti-aircraft guns were in action off the south-east coast against a formation of Junkers 87 dive bombers protected by fighters. They shot down three Junkers 87's and two Messerschmitt 109's. They attacked at 12,000 feet and chased the rest across the Channel, shooting one down into the sea.

Early this morning Hurricanes attacked a Heinkel 111 bomber over the Channel. Although it made a desperate attempt to take cover in cloud it was caught and sent crashing into the sea in flames.

Lone Raider

Enemy raiders dropped bombs over north-east, south-east and south-west Scotland and north-east England.

A lone raider dropped three bombs on a corporation housing estate in a town in south-west Scotland, and wrecked a three-storey building containing six flats.

Two were killed and some injured. Seven whistling bombs fell in a village in Wales from a raider which was being pursued by a fighter. No houses were hit, but windows were blown out. One civilian was killed in the raid.

The landlord of an English inn and his companions rushed to a Heinkel machine which had made a forced landing in an adjoining field and found one dead and one seriously injured. They captured the other three.

This week has been a costly one for the Germans. The British Air Ministry says that the Germans have lost 79 planes between July 4 and 12, and that Britain has lost 56. The Air Ministry figures are confined to German planes whose fate is undeniably proved. Scores of others are badly crippled and unlikely to have reached home.

The Air Ministry says that the Germans are consistently manipulating their communique to produce an imaginary ratio in losses of 5 to 1 in their favour.

MEDITERRANEAN FRONT

AIR RAID MADE ON ADEN

LITTLE DAMAGE

Brave British Garrison On Kenya Frontier

(Received July 14, 11 p.m.)
LONDON, July 13.

Air raiders bombed Aden, killing two natives and wounding three slightly.

A British corporal was also slightly wounded.

One anti-aircraft gun drove off raiders to the sea.

A Cairo communique states that the small British garrison, though heavily outnumbered, is holding all the positions at Moyale on the Kenya border and inflicting severe casualties on the enemy, whose attacks continue.

A Rome communique states that Italian continued to bomb enemy naval formations and that at least two enemy cruisers and one battleship were repeatedly hit by heavy bombs.

One Italian destroyer was sunk following an enemy bombardment, but the crew was saved.

PAINT USED TO HIDE BAD WORKMANSHIP

Soviet Industry

STIFF PENALTIES TO BE IMPOSED

(Received July 14, 9.5 p.m.)
MOSCOW, July 14.

The Moscow radio, commenting on the heavy penalties the Soviet is imposing on the manufacture of defective goods, says: "The low quality and output in many branches of Soviet industry frequently impairs the national defence. Machine tools, chromium steel and other steel alloys, cotton goods and synthetic fibres are all suffering from poor quality."

"Tractors are sometimes delivered with leaks in the petrol tanks skillfully covered with paint. The Moscow factory has been turning out watches which will not go and alarm clocks which will not ring.

"Criminal neglect of quality by many industrial managers cannot be tolerated. Their place is in gaol."

Clipper On Way To Auckland

HONOLULU REACHED

High Altitude Flying To Start Next Year

LOS ANGELES, July 13.

The Clipper took off at 4.5 p.m. on Friday for Auckland.

She landed at Honolulu at 8.30 a.m. on Saturday and will depart for Canton at 5.30 a.m. on Sunday.

Mr Juan Tripp (president of Pan-American Airways), when farewell-ing the Clipper, announced that high altitude flying would be introduced in the spring of 1941 and would reduce the Los Angeles-Honolulu hop to nine hours.

FIFTY KILLED IN ERUPTION

DISASTER ON JAPANESE ISLAND

(Received July 14, 7.30 p.m.)
TOKYO, July 13.

It is reported that 50 have been killed and 50 are missing at Kiyake, an island village, as the result of the eruption of Mt. Yuzan. It is the first eruption since 1874.

The navy has dispatched the destroyer Okishima with provisions and medical supplies, also a mine-sweeper to rescue the islanders, who have taken refuge temporarily in Izu village. The steamer Dai-fuku Maru is also proceeding to the scene.

FOOD SUPPLIES FOR GERMANY

The Budget debate on Friday afternoon made sorry hearing and even worse reading. The sensitiveness and "touchiness" of the present administration have never been more clearly exemplified.

We may "give it in" that nerves are highly strung in these critical times and that nerves are frayed on account of the general situation, but the people, too, have their nerves, and their patience is not inexhaustible.

"Stupid and ignorant tripe" was Mr Fraser's comment on Mr Doidge's references to the Socialistic policy of M. Leon Blum in France. But vituperation is not argument, and the country is in no mood to tolerate such a pitiful waste of time and temper.

The word "complacency" has been used to describe much of the Government's attitude, and the use of the word has been bitterly resented. But it may be used again in relation to the official attitude to perfectly legitimate criticism.

When Mr Speaker, according to the report, called Mr Fraser to order for the use of the words alluded to, the Prime Minister immediately rose to a point of order and asked "if such statements as had been made by Mr Doidge were in accordance with the dignity of the House."

Little Britons: Over 50 applications have been received by the Hastings Borough Council from people wishing to take British children into their care. This response indicates that the applications will be in excess of the quota for Hastings.

Dam at Taupo: Large quantities of cement and other materials have been recently passing through Rotorua en route to Taupo, where they are to be used on the dam which is to be built for hydro-electric power purposes at the outlet of the river from the lake. Much excavation work has already been done.

Huts for Trentham: Carpenters are now adding to the hut accommodation at Trentham camp and further blocks of these buildings are rapidly nearing completion. The sudden increase in the population of the camp caused by the recent short-notice mobilisation of forestry, railway and engineering companies made it necessary to provide temporary tent accommodation for a number of men, but they will be transferred to permanent huts as soon as possible.

No Saturday Deliveries: Wanganui merchants have notified that deliveries of goods will be discontinued on Saturdays, states the "Wanganui Herald." It is explained that the Saturday deliveries are mostly in small orders, and one firm ceased to make these deliveries 18 months ago. The cutting out of the Saturday delivery is also a means of conserving the petrol supply. The men usually employed on the delivery will work in the stores, and the offices will remain open as usual.

American Viewpoint: A glimpse of the United States isolationist viewpoint was given last night in the course of a broadcast news bulletin from an American shortwave station. Describing the latest defence measures, a Senator was credited with saying that in six years the United States would have a larger fleet than those of Germany, Italy and Japan combined, "and then," he said, "we will be able to make faces at the whole of Europe."

The Team Paid: Members of the visiting Army team which played at Napier on Saturday all insisted on paying at the gate, the proceeds being devoted to patriotic funds. Their action was the subject of laudable comment by Rugby Union officials at Napier. After the match members of the Hawke's Bay team met the visitors at dinner at the various hotels at which they were billeted, and the team was afterwards entertained at a dance. The visitors left Napier at 10 o'clock yesterday morning on their return to Trentham, travelling by special bus.

Bride's Generosity: A postman found himself a guest of a wedding breakfast for some minutes, when he called at a house in Sneyder the other day doing his part of the work in the one-day house-to-house canvass for patriotic funds. The wedding breakfast was in progress when he arrived. He was invited inside, and his box was further round to every guest. Every one present subscribed, making a total contribution of about £1. The bride then escorted him to the door again, and as he left put another £1 into his box. The total of the generosity with which people have contributed to the postmen's drive at Christchurch. The total return so far is £2109.

Access to Aerodrome: A statement that it was hardly feasible for a bumble bee to land there, let alone a military aeroplane, was made by Mr J. O'Grady in expressing concern at a meeting of the Waipawa County Council at the fact that there was no access in wet weather to the aerodrome at Mohaka. Mr O'Grady said the Government had spent thousands of pounds in the construction of the aerodrome, and asked if it was going to get it lapses for want of access. "We are told by experts that it is the best wet-weather landing aerodrome in Hawke's Bay," added Mr O'Grady. He expressed the opinion that the bridge at Mohaka should be reconstructed on the road metalled, and both if possible.

Electric Traction: Tests with the "Ed" class electric locomotives, which will ultimately haul all trains between Wellington and Paekakariki, were advanced a further stage last week. Since Monday the Napier express, leaving Wellington at 9.40 a.m., has been operated under the new system. During the previous week tests with heavy loads were satisfactorily carried out and the Napier express last Monday was the first express to leave Wellington under electric power. The change-over from steam to electric traction on the 243-mile section between Wellington and Paekakariki is being made gradually. So far, 19 to 20 trains are being hauled daily by electric engines.

Unusual Accident: An 18 months-old Maori child, Ansie Pore, Bridge Pa, was admitted to the Memorial Hospital, Hastings, on Saturday night suffering from burns to the chin and chest, received when she spilled hot cocoa on herself. The child's condition is not serious.

Alleged Disturbance: The sequel to a number of incidents which occurred in Napier on Saturday night will be heard in the Magistrate's Court this morning when two Taradale men will be asked to account for their behaviour in Dalton and Dickens Streets.

Permanent Promotion: Advice is contained in a recent gazette that Sergeants Ian McLennan (Napier), John Ryan Greenfield (Napier), Harold Robertson (Hastings) and Sergeant Major Douglas Roy Graham (Hastings) have been permanently promoted to the rank of second lieutenant.

Careful Americans: Visitors to the Midhurst oil bore will be able to distinguish the American experts in the drilling staff, states the "Taranaki Daily News." They wear steel helmets and steel caps. Spring-like Weather: Bright sunshine, lack of wind, and clear skies induced many to go out of doors in Hawke's Bay yesterday, which was one of the mildest days of the winter. In the pleasant conditions parks and gardens were exceptionally well patronised during the afternoon, and many were heard to comment on the spring-like warmth of the day.

Match Yields £229: Red Cross funds benefited to the extent of £229 as a result of the Rugby match between the Army and Hawke's Bay at Napier on Saturday. Some £200 was paid for admission to the match. The Red Cross Society president (Mr M. S. Spence) expressed the society's appreciation of the co-operation of all who played in the game and of those who were responsible for the organisation. At the match items were played by the 1st Hawke's Bay Regimental Band.

Tins Not Wanted: Tobacco tins will have no place in the campaign for the conservation of waste, said Mr J. M. Dlott, a member of the National Council of the Reclamation of Waste, speaking to the Mayor of Hastings (Mr G. A. Maddison) last week. This news no doubt will come as a surprise to the many Hawke's Bay residents who have been saving tins, and some who have sold them for money. It is stated that empty toothpaste tubes will be included in the list of materials suitable for the national council's purposes. Further information on what is required will be released this week.

Iron as Bed-Warmer: The shortage of hot-water bottles which is beginning to become noticeable in Hawke's Bay has been countered by one ingenious woman who has made use of an electric iron for bed-warming purposes. The iron is heated to a reasonable degree and wrapped in flannel, and is laid to bed in the usual manner, and is used as cold nights.

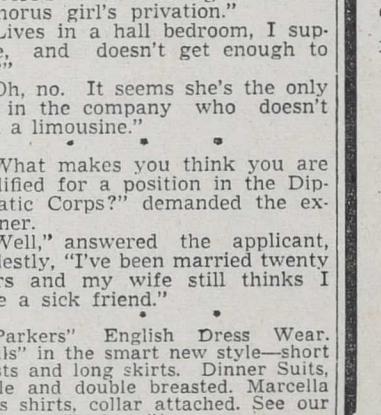

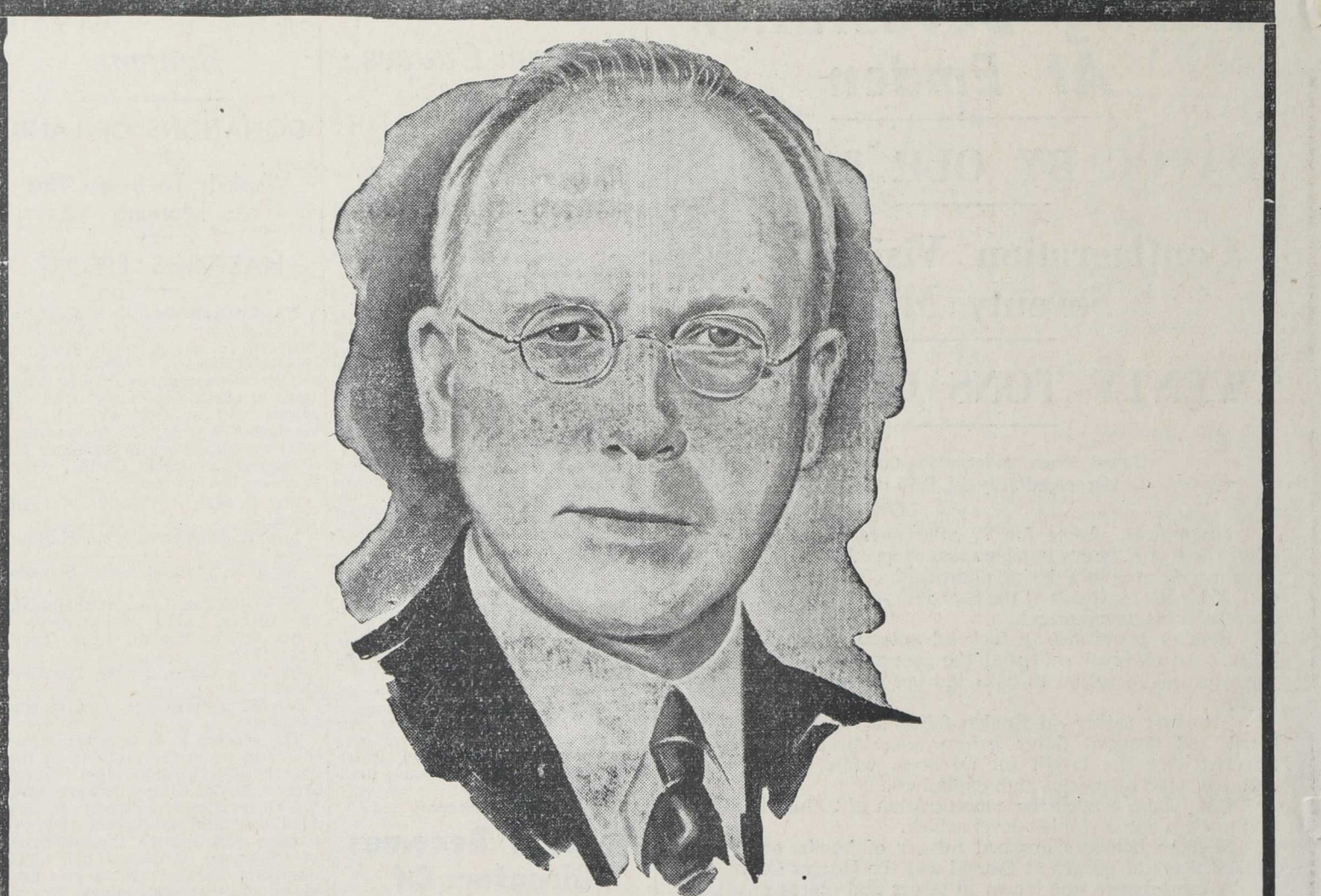

Aussie Ra ran past Soho and Curie at the last fence, but could make no impression on the leader and had to be kept going to hold second money. Jewelled Girdle, who finished resolutely to beat Curie for third money.

Blue Tiger impresses
Young Ced Shield rode a great race to win the July Steeplechase. Blue Tiger and he adopted a wise course in forcing Chat along when the Wellington Steeplechase winner ran up to the front during six furlongs from home. He had the mare scratching and was also troubling his only other dangerous opponent, Gay Boa. The tactics accounted for Chat under her extra weight and forced Gay Boa into several mistakes with the result that Blue Tiger was able to shake them off as they came down to the last fence to go on to a very easy victory.

Black Majesty Good
Proof of the class of the Hastings colt Black Majesty was evidenced by the manner in which he shouldered his 9.4 through the rain and mud to outstay Last Acre and the other runners in the Novice Handicap. Always in the leading division, Black Majesty went through at the false rail and he won the race by a margin of the post. Second in the Trial Plate on Thursday, the Hastings colt has now had four wins, and three seconds in his last nine starts.
