Japanese Warning Of Naval Activity In Shanghai Area

NO RESPONSIBILITY FOR DAMAGE

Burma Route Argument Now Being Discussed

United Press Association—Copyright. (Received July 15, 10.45 p.m.)

SHANGHAI, July 14.

The Japanese Navy has notified foreign consulates that from midnight on Monday the Japanese will begin military operations in the Ningpo and Wenchow sectors of Shanghai. They reserve all rights to detain any vessels and they will not assume responsibility for damage to foreign property.

This is interpreted as another effort to cut off supplies for the Chinese capital of Chungking.

It is officially announced from Vichy that France has begun direct negotiations with Japan regarding the shipments of material to the Chinese Government across Indo-China. Japan has not occupied any part of Indo-China. France is following her own Far East policy, which is independent but closely parallel to the British and American.

The "Asahi Shimbun's" special correspondent from Amoy reports that British residents of the Kungang international settlement have completed preparations to evacuate to Manila in the event of "the worst" in Anglo-Japanese relations.

Mr S. W. Jones, acting-Governor of the Straits Settlement, in a broadcast from Singapore said that the British Government was at present discussing certain Japanese proposals regarding the Sino-Japanese war.

He added: "Believing that the Chinese and Japanese peoples desire an honourable peace, the British Government will go to the greatest lengths to avoid seconding and prolonging the war in the Far East."

"Britain must be allowed to concentrate on the struggle against Hitler's Germany until that struggle is won, even if the causes she has at heart must be sacrificed for a while," said Mr Jones.

An official of the "Central Daily News," a Chungking newspaper, strongly criticised Britain's appeasement regarding Burma and warned that if Britain accepted the Japanese demands Japan would shortly invade Burma and India.

It emphasised that Japan was merely bluffing and urged Mr Churchill to avoid falling into the trap, pointing out the necessity of Britain upholding her prestige.

It is reliably reported from Santiago, Chile, that the United States Ambassador (Mr Bowers) has delivered a note to the Chilean Foreign Office suggesting that the Havana conference should discuss the possibility of Pan-American Protectorate over European possessions in the Western Hemisphere for the duration of the war.

D.F.C. Winner Killed In Action

WIGRAM AIRMAN'S DEATH

Advice that his son, Flying-Officer G. W. F. Carey, D.F.C., has been killed in action was received today by his father, Mr W. B. Carey, general manager of the Kaiapoi Woolen Manufacturing Company Ltd.

Flying-Officer Carey was awarded the D.F.C. on January 12 for gallant conduct.

He began his training at Wigram two and a half years ago and has been with the R.A.F. since 1934. He was educated at Christ's College, which he left in 1934 after being a prefect and the rowing captain.

Dannevirke Pilot Killed

PILOT OFFICER VARTAN Attached To Coastal Command

Cable advice has been received of the death on active service of Pilot Officer Phillip Vartan, youngest son of Mr R. B. Vartan, secretary of the Dannevirke Returned Soldiers' Association and himself a veteran of the South African War.

Pilot Vartan, who was 22 years of age, was born at Dannevirke and finished his schooling at the Dannevirke High School. He later joined up with the Hawke's Bay Farmers' Co-operative Association before proceeding to England in September 1938 on a short-term commission in the Royal Air Force. He received his wings about 12 months ago and since then has been attached to the Coastal Command.

A SUBVERSION CHARGE SUPREME COURT HEARING

FIRST ON RECORD

Alleged Statements At Meetings

By Telegraph—Press Association. WELLINGTON, July 15.

Charges of publishing subversive statements at Wellington on May 19 and 26 were denied by Douglas Murdoch Martin, sociologist and clerk, when he stood trial in the Supreme Court, Wellington today before the Chief Justice (Sir Michael Myers) and a jury.

The case is the first of its kind in the Dominion to come for trial in the Supreme Court before a common jury, the accused having elected this course.

The Crown Prosecutor (Mr W. H. Cunningham) conducted the Crown case. Mr W. P. Rollings appeared for Martin.

The Crown Prosecutor quoted the regulations under which the charges were laid and said that they arose from two meetings of which the accused had been chairman.

The meeting on May 19 was called for the express purpose of protesting against the imprisonment of two persons, the Rev. O. E. Burton and Mr H. G. Lyttel, who had received sentences for obstructing the police in the course of their duty.

The meeting on May 26 appeared to have been called under the auspices of the Peace and Anti-conscription Council.

Speeches Recorded

There would be little dispute as to what was said, because an expert shorthand writer accompanied the detectives to the meetings, and verbatim reports of the speeches were taken. The issue was whether what was said would bring the accused within the scope of the regulations under which the charges amounted to subversive statements.

The reports of the speeches made by the accused were read to the jury by Mr Cunningham. At the first meeting Mr Martin had said that its purpose was two-fold. Mainly the purpose was to protest against the imprisonment of Burton and Lyttel. Martin said that the second purpose was to draw attention to the increasing danger of the introduction of conscription and to organise against it.

At a meeting on May 26, the accused said they were there to protest against Fascism and against the introduction of conscription.

Address to Jury

Addressing the jury, Mr Rollings submitted that neither of the objects of the meetings had been the sentence of certain men. He submitted that the introduction of conscription ought to be considered improper or subversive.

"For 250 years, ever since the case of the seven bishops, it has been the privilege of the people to protest against various aspects of the administration of justice," he said.

"That right has been pointed out by English judges from time to time. The second topic of the meetings was the question of conscription. When these speeches were made, conscription was a matter of debate. It was not thought at the time to be in accord with the policy of the Government. The speaker, in effect, was saying, 'Conscription is not the policy of the Government today, but beware. We are warning you that if you do not oppose the introduction of conscription, it will be brought in before you know anything about it.'"

Mr Rollings drew attention to a proviso in the regulations that "reasonable and temperate discussion, in good faith, of any existing laws should not be deemed to be a subversive statement. That proviso gave the express right to discuss the laws of the land. The jury should not consider isolated sentences in the speeches, but whole speeches. It might be said that some different standard should be applied because these were troublesome times, but proceedings like these were only brought in troublesome times.

His Honour will sum up when the court resumes to-morrow.

Vatican's Policy Defended

CATHOLIC LOYALTY

Not Supporters Of Petain

LONDON, July 13.

The Roman Catholic Archbishop of Westminster, Cardinal Hinsley, issued a statement that certain newspapers had recently quoted Vatican sources as suggesting that the Holy Father himself had expressed support for the Petain Government.

"Actually this impression is based on articles and talks which were not official," said Cardinal Hinsley. "They do not bear the hallmark of the Holy See. It is clear to us all that we are fighting the ageing struggle for the freedom of Christ and Christendom against violence and tyranny."

"It is therefore my privilege to assert our undivided loyalty both to our ancient faith and to this our native land."

EMPLOYMENT PREFERENCE

Penalty For Refusal To Work Extended Hours

NOTICES POSTED UP

By Telegraph—Press Association. AUCKLAND, July 15.

Members of the New Zealand Waterside Workers' Union who refuse to work extended hours when called upon in future will be deprived of preference of employment thereafter, according to an announcement made by the chairman of the Waterfront Control Commission (Mr R. E. Price).

Notices to that effect have been prominently posted on the Auckland waterfront.

This action has been taken by the commission following the difficulty over the working of the cargo on the Matson liner Monterey.

Mr Price visited Auckland to deal with the anticipated trouble, and by the use of non-unionists the vessel was enabled to leave for Sydney at 11 p.m. on Saturday.

In reply to an inquiry regarding the difficulty and its solution, Mr Price said that the commission had received advice in Wellington on Thursday that it was doubtful whether certain Auckland members of the union would work extended hours on the Monterey. He accordingly came to Auckland on Friday as representative of the commission and at 7.30 a.m. on Saturday addressed a mass meeting of the men, explaining the necessity for greater effort in the dispatch of ships.

He also made it clear that the commission was the sole authority for determining the urgency and need for working extra time.

Mr Price continued that all the men employed on the Monterey on Saturday morning were non-unionists with the exception of less than a dozen. When it was necessary to work after 6 p.m. this minority was not called upon to continue, and other men were taken on to make up the full complement. Under a previous arrangement, members of the crew drove the winches and the loading was completed in time to allow the vessel to leave on schedule, and the shipping company expressed itself as very well pleased with the way in which the men had worked.

War Needs

"Apparently a group within the ranks of the union and forming a minority of the total membership has failed to realise the necessities of the war situation and the obligation to comply with the orders of the commission, which are directed toward increasing the national effort," said Mr Price. "Steps have been taken to restrict preference of employment to those members who are prepared to carry out the orders of the commission."

"Workers who are not prepared to do so will no longer be allowed to enjoy the privileges granted by the commission, for they will be replaced without difficulty."

"The national executive of the union is co-operating fully with the commission in this matter."

Orders Given

"The national president (Mr J. Flood) addressed the men in the lunch hour to-day and read a statement from the commission to the effect that his orders and instructions must be carried out. This statement has been endorsed by the national executive of the union."

"Members all over New Zealand have worked extended hours on more than 200 occasions," Mr Price added, "and the dispatch of a large number of vessels has been accelerated in consequence. The great majority of them realise that their security and standard of living depend on victory against the forces of destruction—material, mental and moral—and are directing their effort on lines that will assist the national effort to the utmost."

"Those who fail to recognise their obligations will soon have plenty of time to reflect on their folly. They will not be allowed to bring discredit on their organisations or to frustrate the efforts of those who possess a higher sense of citizenship."

WAR NO HINDRANCE TO HARVEST

Smallest In Years GRIM POSITION IN EUROPE

British Crop Good

WASHINGTON, July 14.

The Department of Agriculture said today that, on the basis of the meagre advices available, Europe's 1941 wheat crops will be the smallest for ten years, although the anticipated yield is only about 10 per cent. under the average crop.

The forecast crop is 1,360,000,000 bushels for the whole of Europe, compared with last year's bumper crop of 1,700,000,000 bushels and the average of 1,500,000,000 over the period from 1930 to 1934.

Except for the recent occupation of Bessarabia, it appears that harvesting operations have not been notably hindered by military activities.

It is noted that, due to increased seedings, the British Isles are expecting a crop above the average.

NIGHT RAIDERS OVER BRITAIN

Five Bombs Dropped From Great Height

LITTLE DAMAGE DONE

LONDON, July 15.

Night raiders over south-east England dropped five bombs from a great height, shaking buildings without doing damage. Fighters drove them out to sea.

Night raiders also appeared over Wales and were driven off by anti-aircraft fire.

An official statement reports that a few enemy aeroplanes crossed the coast during the night. Bombs were dropped at isolated points in the south-east and south-west of England. No serious damage was done.

ROOSEVELT EXPECTED TO ACCEPT

THIRD TERM PRESIDENTIAL NOMINATION

Mr Farley Not A Supporter

CHICAGO, July 14.

It was regarded as a foregone conclusion to-night that the Democratic convention opening to-morrow will offer re-nomination for President to Franklin D. Roosevelt. It is also widely believed that he will accept, but Mr James A. Farley (Postmaster-General) insists that his name will be submitted regardless of Mr Roosevelt's decision.

Mr Farley indicated that he will refuse to direct a third-term campaign and instead will "retire from Cabinet" and from the chairmanship of the Democrat National Committee.

Senator Bankhead will make a keynote speech to-morrow night. The convention will consider the platform on Wednesday and the ballots for presidential nomination will be taken on Thursday.

HEAVY CASUALTIES INFLICTED

CHINESE CLAIMS IN ICHANG SECTOR

Many Japanese Prisoners Captured

LONDON, July 15.

The Chinese Embassy in London claims nearly 9000 Japanese casualties in heavy fighting in the Ichang sector between July 6 and 9. The Chinese are vigorously attacking.

In eastern Honan the Chinese occupied points southward of Kaifeng and captured 20,000 of the "Puppet" Government's troops with Japanese equipment.

EXPANSION OF COLD STORAGE

Export Trade's Needs

MEAT PRODUCERS CONFER

Changes Suggested

By Telegraph—Press Association. WELLINGTON, July 15.

Representatives of freezing works owners, the New Zealand Meat Producers' Board and stock producers attended a conference recently to discuss the question of cold storage space in New Zealand for the country's export products. The decisions of the conference have not yet been reported to the Government.

The necessity for expansion of refrigerated storage was pointed out by the speaker. It was stated, and some improvement had been made. However, recent developments had suggested the possibility of an increased call on the Dominion's cold storage facilities and attention was given not only to the building of additional storage but also to the more effective utilisation of existing chambers. It was considered that a change in the methods of stacking and better planning within the stores might make more space available.

Italians Sink Persian Ship

TWO MEMBERS OF THE CREW KILLED

JERUSALEM, July 15.

An Italian submarine torpedoed an Iranian freighter 50 miles from Haifa, killing two members of the crew. Eighteen others have reached Haifa.

ONLY AMATEUR SPORT PERMITTED

LONDON, July 14.

M. Ybarregaray, who holds the portfolio of Youth and Family in the Petain Cabinet, has announced the suppression of all professional sports in France. He added: "This decision arises from the conviction that sports must be amateur if it is to be sincere."

He outlined plans to develop all kinds of amateur sports, with a secretary-general for each branch. Jean Borotra's appointment causes no surprise in French circles in London, where his Fascist sympathies are known. He was a member of Colonel de la Rocque's Fascist organisation, the Croix de Feu, and is a friend of M. Ybarregaray.

AMERICAN CLIPPER EATS UP THE MILES

ON AUCKLAND RUN

Nearly Two Thousand Miles Covered In Hop To Canton Island

YESTERDAY'S FLIGHT

By Telegraph—Press Association. AUCKLAND, July 15.

By covering the distance of 1915 miles between Honolulu and Canton Island today, Pan-American Airways' giant American Clipper completed the second stage of her 8000-mile flight from San Francisco to Auckland.

The American Clipper left Honolulu at 5 a.m. (New Zealand time) and reached Canton Island at 5.5 p.m. (New Zealand time).

The flight will be continued to Noumea to-morrow and the flying-boat will reach Auckland about 2.30 p.m. on Thursday after laying over for a day at Noumea.

Twenty-five passengers were carried by the Clipper to Canton Island. Eleven disembarked there and the remaining 14 are travelling on to New Zealand.

There is a crew of 10. Two of the through passengers are Mr W. Miller and Mr F. Stevens, both of whom are representatives of the United States Civil Aeronautical Authority.

Pan-American officials making the trip include Colonel C. Young, Pacific Division manager of the company, and Mr Harold Gatty, New Zealand representative, who is accompanied by Mrs Gatty.

Other employees of the company are: Messrs T. R. Ramsey, G. Angus, K. Morris, G. Gardner, F. Laidlaw, and M. Thompson.

The last named will be stationed at Auckland. The remaining Auckland passengers are Messrs L. Ashwell, W. Frank and D. Cornwall, all of the United States.

Shipping Bombed At Tobruk

R.A.F. COMMUNIQUE

Italian Raid On Malta Fails

United Press Association—Copyright. (Received July 15, 2.30 p.m.)

LONDON, July 14.

The R.A.F. communique issued at Cairo states: "El Aden, El Gubbi, and Bardia were raided by bombing aircraft of the R.A.F. during the weekend and shipping was attacked in the Libyan base of Tobruk harbour. The extent of the damage could not be observed owing to poor visibility, but three fires were started at Bardia."

"Ammunition dumps and a petrol store near Assab, Southern Eritrea, were raided, and one fire was started. One of our fighters is missing. Enemy aircraft raided Aden on Saturday. Slight damage was done to property. Two natives were killed and four wounded."

"In a successful attack against Massawa aerodrome Eritrea, several direct hits were scored on the hangar and aerodrome buildings. Considerable fighter opposition was encountered, and one of our aircraft has not returned."

"A raid on Malta was attempted by three formations of enemy fighters, but was unsuccessful owing to interception by our fighters."

Unidentified planes bombed Gibraltar three times to-day. The shore batteries and warships put up a heavy barrage.

A communique issued at Cairo on Sunday states: "Our garrison is still holding out at British Moyale on the Kenya-Abyssinia border, against the Italian attack. Severe fighting continues between the nearby Italian and British reinforcements."

"The enemy attacking in considerable strength, captured the small frontier post of Abdul Ghadir, in Somalia."

"Casualties were again caused to Italian motor transport columns attempting to supply Fort Capuzzo in the Western Desert."

U.S. Marines In Brawl

FIGHT WITH JAPANESE

Beer Bottles Thrown In Cafe

SHANGHAI, July 15.

Three United States marines and several Japanese civilians became engaged in a fight in which beer bottles were thrown, at the Japanese-owned Oriental Cafe last night.

An official at the Japanese Embassy said that intoxication on both sides was responsible. The case will probably not be serious.

TEETH INTO IT

Here, if ever there was one, is a rallying place for the determination and the consecrated will of the British peoples all over the earth to "suffer the slings and arrows of outrageous fortune," to fight, to endure and never to yield.

We may well be profoundly thankful for such leadership. The utterances of the British Prime Minister are those of a man who brushes aside the pettifogging political essentials and who, when he speaks (in Carlyle's phrase) "not only strikes the nail on the head but with crushing force smites it home and buries it."

For the stiffening of our moral muscle and the hardening of our determination he has just said words that have rung with a clarion note over the seven seas and that have awakened a corresponding response in the heart-strings of all Britons in the world.

That was a courageous thing to say. From the point of view of international diplomatic relationships it might not be regarded as the acme of tact (for France, for instance, was listening, too).

He made it clear by implication that although the British people have as much love and veneration for the priceless historic treasures of which the metropolis of London is the world's largest storehouse, there will be no repetition of the "walk-in, walk-out" policy adopted in the case of Paris.

Great Britain is no rat in a corner, forced by terror to make a last bid for her life. Rather, the old lion is at bay, with her sturdy cubs around her, her eye wary and alert for every move of the enemy, ready and willing not only to defend her own but to sally forth and carry the battle forward into the enemy's territory.

The battle is not always to the strong, nor is the race to the swift. Nor is it always true that "God is on the side of the big battalions."

BE SILENT

Printed up on all the transport trains which carried the troops through France in the last war was this terse notice: "Be silent. The ears of the enemy are listening."

In our case "the enemy" may be those of our own household or they may be friends or casual acquaintances—those people who carelessly hand on inaccurate versions of bits and pieces of news, unconsciously distorting them so that they are eventually, by the passage from one to another, distorted out of all semblance to reality.

When the Prime Minister spoke over the air the other evening he made a special point of mentioning "rumour-mongers," and what he said should be most carefully noted by all sections of the people. "Evil is wrought by want of thought."

Our duty is clear, but it must be pointed out again and again. That duty is to combat with all our power the irresponsible chatter of ignorant, however well-meaning, rumour-mongers. The human failing to make a thrilling story out of a half-heard or partly understood item of news is being evidenced every day by people who love to find themselves the centre of attention for the time being, as possessing special information.

Such loose talk endangers morale. It is un-British and altogether reprehensible. Here is something that each and every one of us can do for our country. We can keep a guard on our tongues and also see to it that restraint is placed upon the foolish and unfounded utterances of others.

No governmental enactment can substitute for the work which must be done by the individuals concerned. This duty is in reality a test of citizenship which should be applied by everyone to himself and to those with whom he is associated or over whom he has influence.

To track a scare rumour to its lair and to bring the culprit to book is a social duty which should not at any time be neglected. The present passing on of hearsay gossip and half-digested fantasies is a thing which cuts at the roots of public confidence at the very time that confidence should be most firmly established.

And so, be silent. Carried tales may cost lives.

Growers' Committee Meets

RESEARCH ORCHARD

The explanation offered by the fruit assembly officer, Mr W. Benzie, concerning the deductions on case fruit in the alternate year, was only very wrapped, the general committee of the Hawke's Bay Fruit-growers' Association at its monthly meeting decided that it would be useless to carry the matter any further, though it was recognised that the position was most unsatisfactory for growers thus affected.

A year-to-year lease of the Havelock North research orchard had been approved by the Lands Department at a reduced rental, it was stated. In view of the desirability of continuing the important experiments which are being carried out there this was considered satisfactory.

Assembly Shed Transfer

The transfer of the assembly shed, Karamu Road, Hastings, and the lease of the siding serving it, are now in hand and it is anticipated that in a short time the association will become legal owners of the shed.

It was decided to hold the association's annual meeting on Saturday, July 27. The report and balance sheet were submitted to the meeting and should be in the hands of all members by the end of the week. The balance sheet revealed a very satisfactory state of affairs, more particularly in view of present conditions.

The committee decided to make a substantial contribution to the war effort being sponsored by the Hawke's Bay Provincial Patriotic Council.

Visit By Minister

Towards the end of this month or early in August the Minister of Education, the Hon. H. G. R. Mason, is expected to visit Napier and Hastings in the course of a tour of the East Coast schools. The exact date of the Ministerial tour has not yet been announced.

Rail-Car Service

"As soon as the war is over, we will expect a better service," said a member of the Hastings Chamber of Commerce at last night's meeting, referring to the Government's refusal to consider the inauguration of a Napier-Wellington rail-car service. The authorities stated that there would not be sufficient traffic to warrant such a service in the present conditions.

Bravery At Dunkirk

Advice has been received by Mr E. O. Mason, of the Social Security Department, Rotorua, that his son, Sub-Lieutenant Jack Mason, has been awarded the Distinguished Service Cross in recognition of his work in the evacuation of the British Expeditionary Force from Dunkirk. On the outbreak of war, Sub-Lieutenant Mason trained for a commission in the navy, later being given command of the "Parker's" gun. The following report was received: "For further petrol restrictions become necessary, the authorities be requested to adjust rural petrol licences to permit of the farming community being placed in at least a favourable position as town-dwellers in regard to business and marketing facilities."

Art Union Winner

Second prize of £100 in the "Wish Me Luck" art union, drawn on July 5, was won by Mr C. Newton, Trafalgar Street, Onehunga, who held the ticket under the nom-de-plume of "Lucky Pound." Mr Newton, who has spent all his life in Onehunga, is a Maori interpreter in the courts and is well known as a tennis player. A daughter, Miss D. Newton, was girl tennis champion of New Zealand. Mr Newton stated that he had formed no plans as to what he might do with the prize.

Letters Returned

The postman delivered a surprising and rather unwelcome little packet to the door of a Hastings resident some days ago. Labelled "O.H.M.S." the packet contained letters which the man had written to relatives in Denmark several weeks before the Nazi invasion of that Scandinavian country. There was also a brief intimation that communication with persons in countries occupied by the enemy was not only practicable but of inquiring after the welfare of friends in such territory is through the International Red Cross at Geneva.

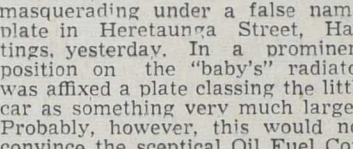
Tremor At Whakatane
