Authority for the Government to borrow £40,000,000 for war purposes at a rate of interest to be prescribed by the Minister of Finance, and £18,000,000 for various other purposes, is contained in the Finance Bill introduced in the

House of Representatives to-night.

The War Expenses Act passed last session empowered the Government to borrow £10,000,000 for war purposes, but this has now been increased by an additional £30,000,000. The £18,000,000 it is proposed to borrow for other than war purposes is allocated as follows:

The new tax, the proceeds of which will be paid into the War Expenses Account, will be assessed and collected with the Social Security charge.

The Bill also levies the additional 5 per cent. sales tax. Another clause empowers the Minister of Finance to acquire shares in New Zealand Woolpack and Textiles Ltd. Authority is taken to postpone the five-yearly census which should normally be held next year.

However, Britain's superior strength at sea, which is the basis of the blockade, is still not visibly impaired, and she can still cut off the flow of oversea supplies to the enemy.

WE HAVE A WAR CABINET

The mills of democracy grind slowly, but they grind exceeding small. The National War Cabinet is now an accomplished fact. Without any "post-mortems" or references to what so-and-so said at such a time, it may be allowable to say that the public opinion of the country has once more prevailed over party partisanship. The institution of the War Cabinet is better late than never, and it will not have to look around for urgent and essential work that must be done. The appointment of the Fraser-Nash-Jones-Hamilton-Coates War Ministry is almost coincidental with the most vicious attack ever made on the sacred soil of Great Britain, and had the move been taken earlier it might have been functioning with well-oiled efficiency by now.

However, we need waste no time in discussing what should or should not have been done. The War Cabinet is here, and we are glad of it. It represents the most important points of view in the State and, in view of the serious nature of the business which these five men will have to discuss it is not likely that decisions will be made on merely party lines.

Mr Hamilton is to be congratulated on the firm stand he took up when he said that to be in a nominal office without portfolio did not meet the bill of the country's necessity. So also is Mr Fraser to be commended for having had the gracious good sense to realise that if he desired real co-operation he could have it only by putting his collaborators on the same footing as his own colleagues in the Labour Party. All the members of the War Cabinet have Ministerial rank, and

the lead of the Old Country has been followed. In passing, it may be said that although the Prime Minister has given the assurance that the War Council of fifteen members which was previously set up will continue to function "for the purposes for which it was set up," we may wish that body all the good luck in the world without expecting to hear very much more of it. In view of the existence of a War Cabinet manned by men of full Ministerial rank whose function it is "to decide and direct those matters concerned with defence, military assistance to Great Britain, production for war purposes, war financial requirements, and emergency regulations," it may safely be taken for granted that speedy and decisive conclusions will be reached and immediate action taken as each emergency arises.

It may be uncomfortable, as shaking some plodders out of their jog-trot stride, but it is nevertheless true that in time of war there must be a reorientation of political habits of thought and a drastic change in bureaucratic procedure. When the enemy is at the gate, a small, energetic, and efficient body of men to whom authority has been entrusted can achieve results of greater value and in a shorter space of time than is possible in the case of the unwieldy Parliamentary machine with its formalities and general rigmarole of committees, sub-committees, and sub-sub-committees characterised by rigid rules of speeches-in-turn whether anything worth anything has to be said or not.

The average man in the street will not fail to realise, either, that as national emergency increases, party politics fade more and more into the insignificance which is really characteristic of them at all times. One is sometimes forced to ask the question: "If such drastic departures from party procedure are seen to be necessary in war time, why should they be reverted to in peace time? Is the fate of the country from the economic point of view and apart from the menace of an opposing enemy, any the less vital in importance than a threat of invasion?

It will be with the liveliest interest that the country will observe the operations of the new War Cabinet. Its rulings will be accepted without question because of the fact that party interest has been practically ruled out. Recognition has been made of the fact that even those outside of the ranks of Labour have, after all, something to contribute to the war

Even although it is late in the day, we may be glad that our duty as citizens has now been made yet a little more clear. Mr Fraser is certain to have the widespread acceptance of his latest move, and the people of the Dominion will rally to a united leadership that is fashioned on the pattern of that in vogue in the Old Country. We may well pause to consider the fact that despite our national self-satisfaction with the social progress of which boasts have been made, we have, in point of fact, recognised the necessity for following the lead of the Mother Country when it comes to a time of crisis. So far as drastic measures of a previously unheard of nature were concerned, old John Bull left this Dominion standing, and we are now only in process of beginning to catch up



If war went on for any length of time the position would have to be faced, and he was sure that some form of capital levy or taxation of wealth would have to be imposed in

wealth would have to be imposed in this country.

An end must come to the borrowing system, and while we must borrow during the war period for war purposes, the fact remained that we could and must do more than that. If the Government, in the nation's name, took steps to protect the interest and equity of those who possessed considerable property, was it too much to ask for a contribution of a shilling in the pound of that property—five per cent. for war purposes?

The time might not be far distant when the House might have to face up to the problem and legislate for such a levy for war purposes.

Tribute to Churchill

Mr W. P. Endean (Remuera) paid a tribute to Mr Winston Churchill, stating that he had moulded together all sections of the British community and that we in New Zealand were proud that England was standing up to one of the greatest threats that had ever endangered civilisation.

There is \$1,000.000 less this year for housing on the Estimates than there was last year, but that does not mean that we will build fewer houses. We will spend less in other directions, such as the purchase of the continued and even speeded up.

He suggested that the railways might curtail the use of petrol by the Hutt Road 'buses, where the railway 'bus service ran

Mr Coates also drew attention to the fact that taxation was bearing very heavily upon people with lower incomes, particularly the family man. Family life, he said, was the basis of this country. The desire of every young man was to have a wife and family and to leave them better than when he started. He must not be taxed in such a way as to discourage him and to disinherit his family. Early Recruiting.

"Recruiting for these squadrons will be opened at an early date. In the meantime men of the following classes in the areas specified are invited to register their names at their nearest defence offices:—Returned soldiers, ex-territorials, members of rifle clubs, and deerstalkers.
