New Tax Operates From Monday

CENSUS POSTPONED

By Telegraph—Press Association. WELLINGTON, July 17.

Authority for the Government to borrow £40,000,000 for war purposes at a rate of interest to be prescribed by the Minister of Finance, and £18,000,000 for various other purposes, is contained in the Finance Bill introduced in the House of Representatives to-night.

The War Expenses Act passed last session empowered the Government to borrow £10,000,000 for war purposes, but this has now been increased by an additional £30,000,000.

The National Security tax of 1/4 in the £ on salary, wages, and other income is imposed by a clause in the Bill. The tax will operate as from next Monday.

The new tax, the proceeds of which will be paid into the War Expenses Account, will be assessed and collected with the Social Security charge.

The Bill also levies the additional 5 per cent. sales tax. Another clause empowers the Minister of Finance to acquire shares in New Zealand Woolpack and Textiles Ltd.

Authority is taken to postpone the five-yearly census which should normally be held next year.

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"Eight small and defenceless nations and now France lie in agony in the ashes of totalitarian destruction," continued the Senator.

FIGHT FOLLOWS Grenades Thrown In Street

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The plant of the American-registered Chinese newspaper "Shunpafo" was bombed a few hours after the legal representative, Mr. N. F. Allman, and five other Americans had been ordered to be expelled from the International Settlement.

"During a subsequent gun battle in the street 20 were injured, eight of whom were admitted to hospital. Four grenades were thrown, two exploding in the street where the majority of the injuries occurred."

It is believed that one terrorist has been arrested. A cordon has been placed round the "Shunpafo" building.

AMERICAN AIR ROUTE

Only Eight Days From Auckland

OFFICIAL SCHEDULE

By Telegraph—Press Association. AUCKLAND, July 16.

Eight days after leaving Auckland by the American Clipper on Saturday, Mr. A. L. Lewis, a Pan-American Airways official, hopes to be in Manila.

Travelling by air on seven of the eight days, he will have covered approximately 12,000 miles on his arrival.

For the past seven months Mr Lewis has been air base manager for the company at Auckland, and he is going to Manila on promotion as section operations superintendent.

Taking into account a day's stay at Canton Island, Mr Lewis will reach Honolulu four days after leaving Auckland. He will then travel by the company's North Pacific route to Manila in a similar period, making stops at Midway Island, Wake Island and Guam en route.

Originally Mr Lewis had intended to travel to Manila by sea, via Honolulu, a journey which would have taken about 33 days. By the more direct sea route, via Australia and Singapore, the journey would take about three weeks.

Hitler To Speak To The Reichstag

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It is reported from Zurich that the Italian Foreign Minister (Count Ciano) is en route to Berlin for the Reichstag meeting, at which Hitler will announce an ultimatum against Britain.

The correspondent of "The Times" on the German frontier says that a spokesman in Berlin declared: "Mr Churchill expressly stated in his broadcast speech that every house and street in London would be defended to the last. Therefore it is impossible to consider London an open city."

The German wireless stated: "Mr Churchill has not heeded the fate of Warsaw and Rotterdam. Unfortunately, those Londoners who will become the victims of his amateur strategy cannot find out for themselves what a terrible distress the senseless defence of a large city causes."

Neutral subjects arriving at the German frontier from Berlin declare that Hitler has chosen July 27 for his triumphal entry into Berlin after the occupation of London. Many windows along the procession route are reported to be already broken.

"The Times" says: "Because Hitler seems to be devoting attention to the 'New Europe,' some people in Britain talk as if he were not simultaneously preparing for an assault against this country. This is exactly what the German propagandists want them to say. It is always Hitler's way to preface an attack by a false lull."

R.A.F. Targets "The R.A.F. communicates afford the best proof that the lull is only false. It is not accident or mere caprice that British airmen are steadily bombing small shipping in the mouths of the German and Dutch rivers and canals. These targets, and also docks, petrol stores, aerodromes and marshalling yards, are well chosen on the basis of the most exact evidence."

"After the collapse of France," "The Times" continues, "the Germans needed some time to reorganise their forces for an attack against Britain. Goering is reported to have asked Hitler to give the air force a slight respite for repairs and replenishment and also to rest as many men as possible."

Hitler's Character "The German propagandist is trying to make the respite appear an indefinite lull, and is also spreading a report that Hitler is too clever to try to invade Britain. This report conflicts not only with Hitler's character, but with known preparations across the Channel and the North Sea."

"Because he knows something of Britain's strength, Hitler has held back his forces to reorganise better. Hitler wishes to keep South-Eastern Europe quiet and draw from it all possible resources of food and raw materials. Hitler hopes thereby to leave Germany's hands free to exploit France and no less free to develop an attack on Britain."

HITLER'S RAMSHACKLE EMPIRE

British Blockade Can Still Deal Deadly Blows

THE NAVY IS ON TOP

(British Official Wireless) (Received July 16, 7.45 p.m.) RUGBY, July 16.

Following last week's secret debate in the House of Commons on the economic warfare, the weekly journal, the "Economist," devoted two articles to a carefully reasoned survey of facts and figures affecting the prospects of continued pressure by Britain on Germany by the blockade.

"Hitler's military victories," it says, "have radically changed the political map and the strategic disposition in western Europe. German propagandists are already claiming that Britain's weapon of the blockade has been decisively blunted, but the claim is premature and its refutation can be simply summarised. The new, ramshackle Empire of Nazi Germany is a little nearer self-sufficiency in essential war materials than the Third Reich was a year ago. However, Britain's superior strength at sea, which is the basis of the blockade, is still not visibly impaired, and she can still cut off the flow of overseas supplies to the enemy."

"The first question is whether Germany's conquests have yielded supplies of the basic materials of production to make up her former deficiencies, and the answer is an encouraging one, except in the important instances of iron, steel and aluminium."

After reviewing the considerable accessions to iron ore supplies and steel industry capacity which the Nazis have secured, the "Economist" goes on to recall that the problem of alloys for munitions steel remains. Both Germany and German-controlled Europe are seriously deficient in manganese, nickel, tungsten and chrome; France, being the world's largest producer of bauxite, there will henceforth be no shortage of aluminium for Hitler's war planes, but war planes need oil and petrol and Germany can obtain no more than twelve million tons a year, even assuming that every ton of Rumanian oil goes to the Reich.

While the normal peacetime consumption of Europe without Russia is considerably more than twice that amount. In sum, the "Economist" finds that Germany's gains are short-term gains; while her last Germany is undoubtedly stronger, but it now becomes the task of the blockade to ensure that she will never be so strong again and to make sure that, encompassed by her conquests, she will become progressively weaker.

"The final question, therefore, is: Has the strategic position at sea been altered?" says the "Economist." "It is a question of sea power and air strength and it will be decided in battle," but the considered view of the journal, after setting out Germany's gains from the sea warfare and Britain's losses, is: "Germany cannot beat the blockade; she can only try to defeat the blockade."

Nino Martini Schools Freely (By MOTUROA.)

Padishah was the centre of interest at the Hastings track yesterday morning, and the Grand National topweight worked in a reassuring manner over a round and then sprinted home six furlongs with Lambourn. Padishah pulled up well, but it will not be until next week that a decision will be possible in the plan to take him to Riccarton to defend his jumping titles.

Owner-trainer John Hennah told me yesterday morning that, while the fact that Padishah bled at Trentham last week was disconcerting, it must be remembered that the Chief Ruler gelding bled before his second start in the Auckland Cup. He recovered from that, so there is no reason to think otherwise than that he will "clean up" as the result of his slight bleeding last week.

After all, it must be remembered that Padishah, who has always been troubled by bad going, had not raced over fences since his brilliant National double nearly 12 months ago. He was thus set a difficult task in a fast-run race in such bad ground, and as he had to be hard ridden for seven furlongs to take third money, the extra exertion found out his weak spot.

It is reasonable to assume that Padishah will be a many pounds better horse as the result of that race and it must also be remembered that he will find better track conditions on his favourite course next month. All true sportsmen will wish further success for this truly great horse, who has been such a good advertisement for Hawke's Bay in recent years, but early speculators should await the decision of the Chief Ruler gelding's owner.

Mr Hennah regards Padishah as a real pet and he will not take on the Nationals unless he is convinced that his fine horse is in the condition to run out the gruelling Grand National Steeplechase journey. Indeed, such a commendable spirit could be well patterned by many other owners racing to-day.

GREAT HORSEMAN LOST TO TURF "BROWNIE" CARSLAKE RETIRES FINE CAREER
Leading Rider In Many Countries

The war has had an upsetting effect on racing in England, and its curtailing probably expedited the retirement from race-riding of Bernard Carslake, the Australian-born jockey. By his decision the Turf is all the poorer.

Now 54 years of age, Carslake can look back on a lengthy association with racing with considerable pride and satisfaction. Unfortunately, the bugbear of keeping his weight down told against his health.

It was after riding Ipswich first past the post at Alexandra Park on April 20 that he collapsed after fighting out a finish in which heads started the placed horses. He had found it increasingly difficult to ride at even 90, and there was an occasion when he gave the following reply to a query as to what he had for breakfast.

"A slice of optimism washed down with a cup of hope." He had just come from the Turkish baths, and every ounce of moisture had been dried out, but he could not have even a drop of tea. That cup of tea might have sent his weight up as much as 5lb, yet he did not weigh as heavy during the winter as P. Beasley, R. Jones, J. Marshall, and C. Smith, who usually tip the beam at 100 while living the normal life during the off-season.

Yet those same horsemen ride at anything from a pound or two over 8.0 up to 8.7, in the flat-racing season. How they manage it is something of a mystery. The present champion, Gordon Richards, and the former champion, Steve Donoghue, never had any weight worries.

Richards may have to get off a few pounds just prior to the opening of the season, but he does it by natural means. He never goes further than to deprive himself of breakfast. Donoghue was in the happy position of being able to live a normal life, and for over 30 years his weight did not vary more than a pound or two.

Joe Childs, who rode for the King, retired because he found it difficult to keep his weight down during the season, but he was one of the exceptions who put on weight when he was riding.

Rode In Many Lands Now the same cause has forced another brilliant horseman to forsake the ranks, but he does so in the knowledge that he has superiors and but one or two equals among the jockeys of the last 20 years. He has ridden in many countries, and when the Great War broke out in 1914 he was riding in Austria-France. He escaped from Austria disguised as the fireman of a railway engine and reached Rumania, where he rode a number of winners in 1915.

Later he journeyed into Russia, where he became champion jockey, but had to flee when the revolution broke out in 1917 and made his way back to England. In 1918 he was the St. Leger on Lord Derby's Keysoe, and since that date has won most of the important races in England. In 1928 he tried training, but returned to the ranks of horsemen.

A year or two ago Carslake stated in an interview that of all the horses he had ridden up to that stage the one he loved best was the grey Tetraetra, sire of highly-regarded Flameur, St. Leon, Thelco, and Ed. I always believe that he used to watch the starter, for before the gate was due to rise, he would fill his lungs with a great breath of air, and as the gate went up, let it with a sigh and start off with a terrific push.

NINO MARTINI WILL IMPROVE CREDIT TO OWNER
