# Six Hurricane Pilots Tackle 80 Nazis

# RAIDERS PUT TO FLIGHT

Victorious Battle Fought Over The Channel

# PARTICIPANT'S STORY

(British Official Wireless) (Received July 22, 7.45 p.m.)

RUGBY, July 21. Six Hurricane pilots took on 80 German shipping raiders over the English Channel on Sunday afternoon. A quarter of an hour later they landed at the aerodrome after sending a Messerschmitt 109 rushing into the sea and had seen their bullets drilling holes in several other German bombers and

The Dornier 17 bombers came on in waves of eight or ten and at once the Hurricanes split into two sections. Three of the 'planes tackled the Dorniers as they dropped their bombs and the other three climbed up higher to attack the 40 Messer-schmitts. One observer saw a Mes-serschmitt 109 that he had singled out for attack crash into the sea. In the heat of the fight none of the other Hurricane pilots saw its end so, by strict Fighter Command rules for claiming victories, it goes down as "unconfirmed."

Two Seen To Crash

While he was noting this crash the others were swinging in and out past the Dornier and Messerschmitt formations. One shot up two Dorniers and another tackled two Messerschmitts. # German Troops On Vistula's Banks As Italians Strengthen Their Frontier

United Press Association-Copyright. (Received July 23, 0.40 a.m.)

LONDON, July 22. "The Times" Belgrade correspondent says that evidence of Russian-German tension continues to be collected in the Balkans. It is reported that the Italian-German decision to demand an immediate clarification of the Soviet policy was followed by Russian-German frontier incidents, including the partial destruction of the railway station at Minsk (in White Russia, east of the old Russian-Polish frontier), causing trains to make a detour of 200 miles to transfer oil. It is also stated that 16 Soviet oil trucks crashed into a German train. The Soviet attributed both incidents to Polish sabotage

but the Germans are convinced that the Russians are guilty. About the same time several portions of the railway between Minsk and Warsaw were interrupted by Polish sabotage. Two German frontier guards were shot dead in an incident with Russians on July 6 near Brest-Litovsk (near the present Soviet-Polish border) and four Soviet guards were killed and several wounded in an affray the following day. Germans shot down a Soviet 'plane over Widminnen.

Considerable fresh German troop concentrations are reported along the Vistula, including four armoured divisions. Italian fortifications on the west bank of the Tagliamento (near the former Austrian border) from the sea to the Gerfrontier are believed to be designed against a possible Axis-Soviet conflict in the Balkans.

A British bomber got home safely after raids on naval dockyards and other targets in north-west Germany on Saturday night, though its wings were torn and the rudder and both airscrews damaged by shell splinters.

The aircraft was one of a raiding force which attacked

the dockyard at Wilhelmshaven. None of the crew was injured, but the navigator found shrapnel in his flying suit. Another aircraft over Wilhelmshaven came down so low to attack two warships lying at anchor by the wharf that it nearly collided with a church steeple.

# ANTI-DEFEATISM

It would be plain foolishness to minimise the powerful influence of propaganda, including German or other foreign brands. After many years of close study and wide practice, propaganda is not the crude and blatant thing which it once was—a transparent tissue of easily recognisable lies. There is subtlety in it now, and a diabolical ingenuity at times, which will baffle even the shrewdest patriot.

The seed-bed for propagandist effort is to be found among the defeatists of any country: and there are defeatists in all countries. These defeatists are not always deliberate saboteurs. They may be well-meaning people who just happen to have the knack of holding apprehensive views about most things. They may be people who have failed to make any headway in life themselves because they lacked the courage to take time by the forelock or to say with Napoleon: "Circumstance? I make circumstance." They may be people lacking in that full and enlightened knowledge which makes the true patriot. They may be old people, or mentally sick people, or people who are at all times too easily gulled and to whom every small, fleecy cloud is an approaching storm.

There is no doubt possible that Hitler's latest speech was broadcast over the fertile fields of defeatist mentality. His propagandist guns were trained on the nervous, the fearful, and the hesitant elements that are to be found in every nation. His previous victories have been won mostly by the use of such weapons, and it is but natural that he should try them

He knows, however, that the internal Fifth Column methods which were so successful in other countries can have little hope of success in the average British community, and so he makes a flanking movement and, by means of an ostensibly sincere offer of peace, seeks to weaken the will-power of people who have no desire to cause needless suffering and bloodshed.

It was once said on a famous occasion that Hitler had "missed the bus." At any rate, we can say now that his bus is late. His carefully regulated time-table of all-conquering advance has been thrown out of gear. During the pause, while he is waiting at the bus stand, he is endeavouring to impress the world with the assertion that he is nevertheless certain to get to his destination, basing his assertion on the evidence that he has not failed so far. But already, it can be said in reply, he has at least partially failed. His waiting interval is imposed upon him by no humanitarian motives or impulses. He is for the moment thwarted, baffled, and enraged at the delay. His testing time has come and he hesitates on the last desperate throw. The whole pool is at stake and his bluff has been finally and irrevocably called. The next move is his, and he must make it soon or perish.

Let those who are inclined to be even a little doubtful of the final issue cut out this sentence from the virile speech made by General Smuts, published this morning, and let them paste it up on their walls: "If the German Air Force and Army together could not succeed in their attack against a single point like Dunkirk, how can they fairly hope to attack successfully a huge area like Great Britain, where every physical and moral factor will favour the defence? If the German attack fails, Hitler has lost, and all Europe-indeed, the whole world-will be saved. If Hitler does not attack Great Britain, he is equally lost."

And let it be added that Great Britain's soldiers this time have no longer their backs to the sea. They have the sea in front of them and their homes, their women and children, and all that they hold most precious behind them. Even if the German forces land, their biggest problem will be to get away again-if that problem ever arises for any possible survivors.



WELLINGTON, July 22. The prospective value of the Pan-American trans-Pacific service in promoting closer friendship between the people of the United States and those of New Zealand is noted with friendly anticipation in a letter received by the Rt. Hon.

P. Fraser from Mr J. L. Van Norman, president of the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce. The letter was brought by the American Clipper on its inaugural flight last week.

"With the taking off of the Pan-American airplane from Los Angeles this afternoon, July 12," Mr Norman wrote, "New Zealand will be brought within four days of Los Angeles, and you good people under the Southern Cross will

WAGES DEDUCTION

New National Security Levy On Income

Salary and wage-earners will henceforh find that they have less to spend each week, for the national security tax of 1/- in the pound on income will operate from yesterday. As far as the tax affects income other than salary and wages, however, it will be charged from July I. Emanating from the recent Budget, the new tax has been placed on the Statute Book through a clause in the Finance Bill which was adopted by Parliament last week. It will be assessed and collected with the social security tax, and the proceeds will be paid into the War Expenses

The tax is equal in amount to the existing social security tax. As far as the individual is concerned, deductions from his salary or wages each week will therefore be exactly double the amount in the past.

Soldiers Exempt Members of the Expeditionary Force, both in camp in the Dominion and overseas, are to be exempt from the payment of a national security tax on their military pay, according to a statement made by the Minister of Finance (the Hon. W. Nash) in an interview. He said that the application of this tax was exactly similar in all respects to that of the social security tax. social security tax.

"The exemption from social security tax of members of the forces is effected by regulations gazetted last year," the Minister said, "and, s it is specifically provided in the inance Act which imposed the national security tax, that it is to be assessed, collected and recovered in brecisely the same way as the social security tax, the soldiers are thus exempt from this charge.
