## Over 2500 Perished When Troopship Was Sunk By The Nazis

### 25,000 TON SHIP LANCASTRIA **VICTIM OF AIR TORPEDOES**

### Harrowing Scenes As Thousands Struggle For Their Lives

(United Press Association-Copyright.) (Received July 26, 11 p.m.)

LONDON, July 26. It is revealed that the 25,000-ton Cunard liner Lancastria which was sunk at St. Nazaire during the last days of the evacuation, with the loss of over 2500 troops, was ineffectually bombed by German 'planes for half an hour before

direct hits were scored. A heavy list hampered the launching of the lifeboats. The Germans machine-gunned the lifeboats and rafts on which the troops were endeavouring to escape. The Lancastria was anchored when the attack occurred. Three aerial torpedoes found their mark, one going directly down a funnel and exploding in the boiler-room. The ship sank within half an hour.

Two Church Army sisters rushed on deck when the order rang out, "Women and children first!" and jumped into the lifeboats, while the men slid into the sea by ropes. Others leapt overboard.

Blinded Soldier

An Army cook said: "I saw a soldier grab a young girl, both of whose legs were broken, and swim with her. Both were picked up. The girl died on board a rescue ship."

A member of the crew described how a soldier blinded by the first explosion was led to the ship's hospital, where a second explosion killed all there, including the doctor.



### NO U.S. ECONOMIC METHODS FOR EUROPE, SAY NAZIS

### Germany Is To Employ Her Own Conditions After A "Victorious War"

(United Press Association—Copyright.) (Received July 26, 9 p.m.) BERLIN, July 26.

"The United States must abandon the idea that she can force her economic conditions on Europe," declared Dr. Funk, the German economist whom Marshal Goering, the Nazi economic dictator, has ordered to prepare to reconstruct German and European economy after the war.

He added: "We do not need North American intermediaries to enable us to trade with the South American States. That trade must be based on free agreements with the South American States, or there won't be any trade. He asserted that gold would cease to be a basis of cur-

rencies within German political and economic spheres, and the reichsmark would be predominant in Europe, while the United States would be compelled to devalue the dollar. Germany did not intend to reintroduce entirely free currency nor to institute a currency union throughout Europe, because that presupposed a customs union. Germany would employ after a victorious war the same methods for European reconstruction which had resulted in her great economic success before and during the war.

Typical Design The typical tanker has her mach inery and funnel placed right aft, which obviates an oil-tight propeller which obviates an oil-fight propeller; shaft tunnel and allows the cargo space to be confined to one section of the hull. The cargo is thereby readily isolated from the engineroom and from the fore-peak by means of coffer-dams. These coffer-dams are narrow spaces of two forms widths extending right across frame widths extending right across the ship and can be filled with

water if necessary.
This arrangement also makes for simplification in the arrangement of the pipelines. The pump room is situated amidships and there is usually a "dry" hold forward for general cargo or for the storage of ship's gear. The cargo is divided into vertical tanks, usually about ten in the pumpler through which runs the number, through which runs the pipe system, the valves of which are

controlled from the deck.

The Port of London normally handles nearly one-third of Britain's handles nearly one-third of Britain's bulk petroleum supplies and among the many tankers regularly using the port are those of the British Tanker Company Ltd., which has a fleet of nearly 100 vessels, all bear-ing the prefix British, e.g., British Scout, British Fame, etc. The San Scout, British Fame, etc. The Sai tankers of the Eagle Oil and Ship ping Co. Ltd. are also frequently to be seen discharging at Thamesid oil depots, typical vessels of this line being the San Arcadeo and San Cirilo. The Anglo-Saxon Petroleum Co. Ltd., the Anglo-American Oil Co. Ltd., Oriental Tankers Ltd., and John I. Jacobs and Co. Ltd. are among other important tanker companies trading to London.

Sources of Supply London's principal normal sources of supplies are the Mexican Gulf ports of Galveston, Tuxpan, Beaumont, Houston, Tampico and New Orleans; Abadan in the Persian Gulf ond ports on the Black Sea. When this was accomplished, it would bring to the complished, it would bring to the close the first chapter, and one on which the British working people could look back with deep pride, in the story of how Britain organised

Increasing Arms Output

"The second chapter," Mr Morrison continued, "will be like the first in one respect at least: its main theme will be concentrated effort to increase our arms output by every possible means. Modifications of individual working hours in the factory will mean not relaxation but intensification of personal effort. The aim must be a rise, not a fall, in factory output."

A number of additional permanent steps are being taken to this end, he added, among which was the constitution of area boards in such a way as to include representatives of trade unions and managements, no longer in an advisory capacity, but

longer in an advisory capacity, but to take executive action.

"What I hope we may be beginning to shape on the anvil of the war," said the Minister, "is our own particualr British form of a cooperative society—a free partner-ship of fully active groups in which there will be no room for mutual economic opportunity. # CARTMAN SENTENCED TO DEATH

### Waikino Murderer Shows No Emotion

### Task After War JUDGE COMPLIMENTS POLICE

The closing stage in the trial of Douglas Herbert Cartman, miner, of Waihi, aged 22 years, on the charge that at Waikino on April 2, he murdered Mrs Elizabeth Agnes Hamilton, was reached after 3 p.m. to-day in the Supreme Court. After a retirement of three and a half hours the jury returned with a verdict finding the accused guilty of murder. Asked the usual question whether he had anything to

the accused did not reply.

Assuming the black cap, Mr Justice Fair pronounced

After the prisoner, who showed no sign of emotion, had been led away, his Honour thanked the jury for the care they had given the case and excused them from further jury

complete and thorough manner in which the case had been presented to the jury was also voiced by his Honour, who added his thanks to counsel for their capable conduct of both the prosecution and the defence.

In summing up, Mr Justice Fair warned the jury against allowing themselves to be influenced by various aspects of the case. It was necessary for the Crown to establish every fact essential to proving the charge of murder. The same rule applied in respect to the secondary charge of manslaughter.

ondary charge of manslaughter.

Mr Henry, for the accused, had said that for the Crown to succeed it had to establish beyond the possibility of doubt that death was due to blows from a tyre lever struck by the accused, also that it was necessary to show that Mrs Hamilton was alive when she reached Butler's Hill in the car. Both statements seemed to his Honour to be correct.

On the other hand, a tyre lever that could have inflicted the wounds was found beside the head and was bloodstained.

**Evidence Supported** 

His Honour said that Dr Gilmour's evidence was supported in the main points by the other two medical witnesses on the question that at least two of the wounds were caused by the tyre lever. On all points relating to the outrage the medical witnesses were agreed. The three medical witnesses were agreed that Mrs Hamilton was alive when the blows Hamilton was alive when the blows were struck, and it seemed to him that the able cross-examination of counsel for the defence had not shaken them on that point.

Finally, his Honour instructed the jury on the legal requirements for a verdict of murder—that the person charged did what he did when in a state of mind to know what he was doing. In this case the evidence showed that the accused was aware of the nature of his act. If the jury did not find the accused guilty on did not find the accused guilty on the main charge, they were entitled to bring in, if they thought the evidence justified it, a verdict of manslaughter by holding him guilty through negligent driving.

The jury retired at noon to consider the verdict.
