RUGBY, July 27. Two broadcast items from different parts of the vast network of German and German-controlled wireless propaganda when brought into juxtaposition throw light on the way in which the Nazis are bringing badly needed relief to the food shortage they have created for the German people by depriving the peoples of the occupied territory of their rightful supplies.

On the night of July 26 the German-controlled Brussels wireless apologised for the acute shortage of butter in Antwerp and, to a lesser extent, all over Flanders. It was stated by the announcer that the reason for the shortage was that only a small part of the local butter supplies were pur-chased for the German army. The disappearance of the commodity from the town markets was principally due, he suggested, to the fact that "a gang of criminal dealers" had purchased butter at the dairies and from farmers.

Dumplings Give Necessary Nourishment Needed In Cold Weather

FOUNDATION DOUGH

(1) Take alb. flour, 1 teaspoonful baking powder, 5oz. finely minced

Mix well together and make into a dough with milk or water.

(2) For serving with meat, take 4oz. flour, 12oz. suet. 1 teaspoonful chopped parsley, } onion finely chopped, a teaspoonful baking powder, salt and pepper.

Mix all the ingredients together with cold water to form a soft dough. Divide into 12 balls, flour each and place in the boiling liquid with the meat.

To make dumplings for soup take 1½oz, fine b readcrumbs, 1 egg, 1 teaspoonful minced parsley, 2 dessertspoonfuls milk, ¾oz. butter, pinch of salt, grated nutmeg to taste.

Soak the breadcrumbs in the milk beat the butter to a cream, add the beaten egg, then stir in all the other ingredients. Shape into small balls, cook in salted boiling water for 5 minutes, lift out and drain.

CHEESE DUMPLINGS

Take the ingredients for a suet dough and add to it 2 tablespoonfuls of grated cheese. Mix in the usual way, roll out thinly and cut into four-inch squares. Fill each one with a teaspoonful of grated cheese, pinch the corners together, and steam for 20 minutes over plenty of boiling water. Serve with tomato sauce and garnish with watercress.

DUMPLINGS WITH PORK

Apple dumplings or onion dump ings are excellent when served with oast pork. Make them like this: For apple dumplings, take some

suet paste, stir into it one cupful of finely chopped apple and a little cinnamon, and make the mixture soft enough to drop off a spoon. Drop in spoonfuls into the hot fat surrounding the pork and cook for about 10 minutes before dishing up

For onion dumplings take some suet dough, roll out and cut into squares. Take some medium-sized, mild-flavoured onions and partly boil them. Cut into quarters, place on the dough, put in a small piece of butter, pepper and salt and paprika to taste. Fold the corners of the dough over and bake or steam or 20 minutes.

Every housewife realises that there are many foods which must be eaten at certain times of the year. Apart from such fruits and vegetables which can only be obtained in definite seasons there are many dishes which prove much more appetising if eaten in cold weather, just as there are those which can only be enjoyed in the warm summer time warm summer time.

In the present cold weather one food which will greatly appeal to both children and adults is dumplings. These are particularly nourishing and satisfying for a good healthy winter appetite.

These may be varied in dozens of different ways to serve with soups or meat dishes and they are also excellent for the sweet course served with jam or golden syrup.

Dumplings, when properly cooked, are particularly good for growing children, but they should be served more frequently as a sweet than in the first course where spice is included.

BOILED APPLE DUMPLINGS

NORFOLK DUMPLINGS

These are made with yeast, and are excellent to serve with any kind of boiled meat or with stews. They

may also be served as a sweet with golden syrup or jam.

Take 1lb. flour, 1 compressed yeast cake, 1 teaspoonful of salt, 1 pint warm water, 1 teaspoonful

Sigar.

Sift the flour and salt into a large bowl. Mix the yeast and sugar together until they become liquid and add half the tepid water. Make a well in the flour, strain in the yeast mixture, and with a wooden spoon mix together until it is a soft, smooth dough using as much water as required. Knead for a few minutes, put back in the bowl, cover with a clean cloth and set to rise until double its size. Then form into small balls. Put these into a large saucepan of fast-boiling water and cook quickly for 15 minutes. Drain well and serve at once.

fat, 1 egg, pinch of salt.

Cream the yeast with a teaspoonful of sugar, add the warm milk and pour into the centre of the flour.

Cover with a little flour and leave for 20 minutes in a warm place to rise. Work in the fat and egg and beat till the mixture leaves the hands clean. Form into 12 balls. Place these on a greased baking tin, and set to rise until they have doubled their bulk. Melt 10z. of butter in ½ pint of milk. When boiling, pour this over the dumplings and place in a fairly hot oven and cook for 25 minutes. Serve with jam or jam sauce.

BAKED APPLE

DUMPLINGS

Take ½lb. short crust pastry, 3 apple completely. Peel and core the apples, place them on the rounds of pastry. Fill the centres with sugar, a pinch of cinnamon, or one or two cloves, and shape the pastry over. Place sealed side downwards on a baking tray and cook in a hot oven from half to three-quarters of an hour.

MOUNTS FOR SKY-RIDERS

The super-colossal mentality of the American people is now being directed into a most useful channel. Nothing of a sneering nature is intended in that remark, inasmuch as it is recognised that the population of the United States is far greater than that of either Germany or Great Britain. America is accustomed to think out things in a big way and to act them out in an even bigger way. It seemed to be a staggering proposition when President Roosevelt asked the American Congress for 50,000 'planes in a year, but, like the British Budget, these figures are being seriously questioned and have become a matter of complaint on the part of those who know the capabilities and capacity of American industrialism.

Uncle Sam can do much better than that. It is said that two of the motor magnates in the United States have declared that if they have the time to prepare and the means available, they can turn out one thousand machines for every day in the year. That is big thinking, and it gives rise to big thoughts.

There need be no breach of diplomatic relations due to the fact that a Hawke's Bay morning daily has ventured the opinion that America is rapidly qualifying for the description of "a nation of shopkeepers," which was once applied to England by Napoleon. We may also be allowed to say that, whereas the other countries of the world, when they are planning great efforts, speak in terms of shipping tonnage, numbers of articles, and so on, America has the habit of prefixing the dollar sign to all her activities.

It is now quite evident that the present war may make good business for the United States. At present the question is under consideration as to whether Great Britain can be supplied with 3000 'planes a month at so much each, plus the cost of the factories which Great Britain is willing to build in America. America said the other day by the mouth of one of its spokesmen that there was every reason to believe that Great Britain could foot the bill for goods supplied. That being so, America is now willing to lend every possible aid in the combat against the enemy of democracy—always provided that no actual man power is asked for. The United States will fight in the factories to produce goods on order and to rake in the profits accruing thereunto.

But this, too, can be said. The United States knows full well that on the odd chance that the British people should be beaten, she will need all the aeroplanes, guns, ships, and even men, that she can raise. Her service is by no means unadulterated service on behalf of democracy, inspired by democratic ideals and the fight for freedom. There is an element of self-defence in it, and not a little of the ordinary commercial desire for profit.

Even at that, we may be glad that America is at any rate prepared to do a business deal with the Old Country where, after all, the same language (or something like it) is spoken, and where the same ideas and ideals (or something like them) prevail, even although, both from the point of view of language and of ideals, they have slightly varying

Great Britain, in plain words, has declared herself the champion of democracy against the totalitarian menace, and without equivocation or hesitation has defied the enemies of free institutions to do their worst. Under the bludgeonings of chance she has not winced nor cried aloud. Her own gallant and four-square attitude has made its own appeal to the Western Hemisphere, and on the assumption that a little is better than nothing at all the Old Country has gladly accepted the assistance that is forthcoming.

The United States, on the other hand, clinging with both hands to the Monroe doctrine, must realise that by helping Great Britain she is at the same time helping herself. With Hitler's boast of the British Empire destroyed accomplished, there would be nothing but the start of a new world war, the vortex of which America could not possibly escape. Every aeroplane and every item of war material which America can send across the Atlantic to the aid of Great Britain are so many premiums on her own life insurance. We may be grateful that America has seen the advantageous business side of the deal, for if she had not things might have gone hardly with the Empire.

This much may be added. We Britons have the men, whose quality is unsurpassed. We need the means to use the men and the means are now forthcoming. Material assistance is really all that is required at the present time, although no one may forecast future requirements. There will be, in the days to come, a certain amount of satisfaction that the flesh and blood courage and determination of the British people were, after all, the deciding factor in putting a final end to the Nazi menace. When America, in the days to come, sits back to enjoy her profits from armaments and war machines, she may take unction to her soul that she has at any rate, and at ordinary business rates, helped a desperately struggling people to shake off the shackles of an intolerable
