# Indo-China Rejects Japan's Demands

### TRANSPORT OF TROOPS

Shanghai Concession Prepares For Trouble

## STREETS BARRICADED

(United Press Association-Copyright.) (Received Sept. 4, 11.55 p.m.)

SHANGHAI, Sept. 4. It is officially reported from Saigon that Indo-China has rejected the Japanese ultimatum to permit Japanese troops to traverse it.

A communique announced that the Governor-General had been advised from Vichy of the conclusion of a Franco-Japanese agreement granting to the Japanese certain military privileges under conditions which the Vichy Government is to specify, and this will then become the subject of negotia-tions between the French and the Japanese military authorities in Indo-China

Without awaiting the negotiations the Japanese military mission insisted on an agreement being signed before midnight on Tuesday last, granting immediate right of passage

The Saigon Government, by nine votes to two, decided that it was unable to accept the ultimatum's terms.

The authorities in the French Concession at Shanghai

have erected barbed-wire barriers and barricaded cross streets throughout the Concession and have redoubled the police patrols.

# It was officially stated earlier at Saigon, Indo-China, that the French authorities on Sunday refused a Japanese ultimatum for the passage of Japanese troops through Indo-China. China. A message from Tokyo says that Japanese 'planes are permitted to land at Hanoi on the Japan-Formosa-Thailand service. Permission for such landing was one of Japan's recent demands on Indo-China. The Hong Kong correspondent of the Tokyo newspaper "Asahi Shimbun" says that the Vichy Government is making desperate efforts to retain control of Indo-China. It has telegraphed to the naval and military commanders messages urging loyalty against the separatists. 

## TRANSFER TO BRITAIN

(United Press Association-Copyright.) (Received Sept. 4, 11.45 p.m.)

WASHINGTON, Sept. 3. The Navy Under-Secretary (Mr Forrestal) announces that the first group of over-age destroyers for Britain, consisting of eight destroyers at present at Boston, will be ready on Friday and will be sailed to Canada by American crews and there taken over by the British.

It is understood that the destroyers will be turned over fully armed and equipped and ready for action.

Mr Forrestal announced that a board of Army and Navy experts was leaving to-day for Bermuda to examine sites for the American naval air bases which will be taken in exchange. The Navy Department at Washington announces that Admiral Stark certified that the destroyers were not essential for the defence of the United States.



### BARTER ON A BIG SCALE

America's policy in relation to material support for the British cause has taken a dramatic turn, and it is with a sense of the utmost satisfaction that the news will be received that the British Fleet is now strengthened to the extent of fifty American destroyers. Over-age they may be, but they will be sufficient to cause some more scratching of the Nazi square heads and of the Mussolini bruiser type of square chins. A glance at the map will show that America has bartered the destroyers for a curved line of British naval and air bases in the Caribbean Sea situated on six islands and representing, with existing American defences, a complete outpost system to protect the northern approaches to the vital

It has been hinted more than once that despite doubts to the contrary, this plan was likely to go through. Now that it is an accomplished fact, its implications will be noted by the anti-British Powers. It means that America realises her peril. She has been glad to avail herself of more defensive bases. It means that America realises Britain's sea-power and the need for putting it beyond all shadow of doubt by increasing it still more. To barter destroyers for defence bases is to strengthen both countries at the same time, and this move proves more clearly than any other that America knows the implications of the question: "Who lives if Britain dies?" The agreement constitutes a definite step forward in American policy in regard to taking a firm stand against Nazism and Fascism.

The writing is on the wall for the Continental bullies to read. Their hopes of victory are fading with every day that passes. The English-speaking peoples of the world are against them. These destroyers will not only be of invaluable assistance in convoy work, but will push still farther back into the realms of improbability the vaunted German invasion.

The psychological aspect of this important exchange should not be lost sight of. Although British crews will hereafter man the American ships taken over, the intimate associations of the American people with the ships concerned will give them a new sense of nearness to the great conflict being waged on the other side of the Atlantic and will help still further to strengthen the ties of friendship and mutual interest between the two countries.

It is to be noted also that Canada, on parallel lines, is negotiating for the purchase of American tanks for training purposes. The two movements endorse the truth that defensive measures in the Western Hemisphere must be one unity.

Reference was made in this column yesterday to the gradation from moral, through material to manpower support. This great instance to-day is one of moral support expressed in material terms, and there is but a thin partition to the third step. No one need gird at the Americans for not sending manpower in the meantime. There is scarcely standing-room for the 3,000,000 trained soldiers now on British soil, armed to the teeth and ready to fight. But when the pressure is relaxed as Mr Churchill's "compressed spring" is unleashed and the British counter-offensive begins, who can say that America will not come fully to the aid of the Old Country, as it did before?

This exchange of fighting ships for protective bases would never have been possible but for a definite leaning toward the British side on America's part. It may, after all, be but the beginning of a process that will be enlarged and developed as the war progresses, until the day arrives when America will have little more than men to give.

The significance of this deal far outweighs the apparent set-backs which have happened in Europe. Great Britain has never for a moment taken her eyes from the main issue -her command of the seas. Mr Churchill has said to the American State Department that the British Empire will never surrender or scuttle her fleet even in the event of defeat. That is Mr Churchill's way of saying that it will be a fight to a finish. America has noted that and has acted accordingly.

Economic Conference Addressed

AN OUTLINE GIVEN

BY MR NASH

WELLINGTON, Sept. 4.

The Minister of Finance (the Hon. W. Nash) addressing the Economic Conference, gave a general outline of the economic and financial position of New Zealand.

Dealing with the economic position, he said that exports for the year ended June, 1939 were £57,892,000 and exports for the year ended June, 1940, £65,859,000, representing an increase in values of 13/6 per cent.

In December, 1938, overseas assets in all the banks in New Zealand amounted to £6,807,000. In December 1939 the figure was £15,811,000, in June, 1940, £27,382,000, and in July, 1940, £25,574,000.

This showed that the price

This showed that the crisis in the overseas funds position which had occurred towards the end of 1938 had been met. It did not mean, however, that the country had ample overseas funds for all its needs. It was fortunate for New Zealand that the Government had perfected a method of allocation for overseas funds before the war broke out. This meant that the whole of the New Zealand economy needed no radical change, because overseas trade and remittances money were all under control.

Thus, not only all imports but all payments for debt of all kinds, besides methods of sending money away, were subject to Governmental

sanction.

Compared with the demand for overseas funds on account of consumer goods, raw materials for industry and equipment, the supply of overseas funds was insufficient. It was therefore, quite apart from war purposes, necessary to control the allocation of overseas funds so that only commodities essential for New Zealand should be brought under control. This also made it easy to allocate funds for goods necessary for war purposes. for war purposes.

Import Policy

Import Policy
Mr Nash also dealt with the Government's long-term import policy. He said that imports for the year ended June, 1939, amounted to £56,500,000 and for the year ended June, 1940, to £46,070,000, a reduction of 18½ per cent. This showed the operation of the import selection programme. Unfortunately, the latter figure was swoollen somewhat because of the upward trend in prices of imported goods. Thus, motor spirits were reduced 25 per cent. in quantity, but there was a rise in value of motor spirits of nine per cent. Goods formerly supplied by many European countries were not now available. This must be taken into account in examining the future course of New Zealand's economy.

Mr Nash also submitted a table showing the rise in wholesale prices from June, 1939, to June, 1940.

# Prime Minister's Address To **Economic Conference**

DELEGATES' DUTIES

WELLINGTON, Sept. 4. The work before the Economic Conference was outlined in detail by the Prime Minister (the Rt. Hon. P. Fraser),

addressing the delegates to-day. He emphasised the fact that economic difficulties were not insuperable if there were the spirit of willingness on the part of all sections of the community to make equal sacrifices

whenever and wherever they were required. Mr Fraser said that it appeared that the value of goods available for consumption in New Zealand had fallen from about £133,000,000 last year to about £114,000,000. On the tace of it, this meant a decrease in the general standard of living, but the conference must examine how this decrease was accounted for and what types of goods had been cut down most. Had they been luxury items, or goods for every-

day use—goods for consumers or goods for capital purposes? "While the question of the standard of living is, in total, entirely dependent on the amount of goods available, the standard for the individual is the question of what he can get out of the general pool of goods and services. This is a question of distribution and is dependent on incomes and

"Although the total of goods and "Although the total of goods and services for civil use has decreased by some 14 per cent," Mr Fraser continued, "the amount of money that is available for spending by individuals after taking account of the increased taxes is still about the same this year as it was last year. A situation like this no doubt means that prices must tend to increase that prices must tend to increase with the increased pressure of purchasing power on the goods to be

ought.
"That, I believe, is the situation with which we are faced to-day Price increases bring forth a de mand for higher incomes which, if obtained, again force prices up and put stability as far away as ever, and so it goes on. The situation would undoubtedly be relieved if would undoubtedly be relieved if there were more production of the right kind or if spending power could be diverted to savings, but to the extent that these fail to bridge the gap, the question arises as to how the remaining sacrifice should be spread equitably over the community."

Production Side

Mr Fraser said that on the production side, the limiting factors in our war effort were our capacity to our war effort were our capacity to supply all our armed forces and to supply Great Britain with all she required of us. When those condi-tions were satisfied, did we still have productive capacity to spare? That was something which the con-ference would wish to find out.

### HOW HASTINGS PILOT MET HIS DEATH

Henry Miller Killed In R.A.F. Accident

"I want to tell you how proud the Air Force is of the New Zealanders and what fine stuff they think them." These were the words of a squadron-leader instructor, speaking to a friend of Mr and Mrs McNair Miller, Hastings, after the inquest on their son, Sergeant-Pilot Henry Miller, who died as the result of an aircraft accident in the R.A.F. on August 13.

The Millers' friend, writing from England, said that he attended the inquest, and gave an account of

inquest, and gave an account of the proceedings. The squadron-leader said that Sergeant-Pilot Mil-ler crashed on his first solo flight in a certain type of aircraft, and that he himself had been up with him 20 minutes before, passing him as competent for solo flying in that

though the machine climbed to about 250 feet, this altitude was insufficient to manoeuvre on one engine alone, and the crash resulted. The entire machine had been ex-The entire machine had been examined by technical experts of the Air Ministry, and no reason could be given for the engine failure.

A flying officer described how he saw from his office window that the port engine had stopped, and he summoned the ambulance, which was on the spot as soon as the 'plane reached the ground.

A doctor gave evidence that Ser-geant-Pilot Miller suffered a severe racture of the skull, and that although everything possible was done, he died several hours later. The crash occurred at 2.30 p.m., and death took place late that night, the patient remaining unconscious throughout.






