CURTAIN OF FIRE BARS NAZIS FROM CITY OF LONDON

"Reprisal" Raiders Beaten Off

SHELLS SEEN BURSTING IN ALL DIRECTIONS

One Big Load Of Bombs Dropped

LONDON, Sept. 5.

A wall of metal flung up by anti-aircraft guns on Wednesday night barred the German raiders who appeared over the London area a few hours after Hitler's threatened reprisals for R.A.F. raids.

The anti-aircraft fire was the heaviest London has yet experienced. Shells were seen bursting in all directions, sometimes as many as six bursts appearing in a cluster around planes, which were merely specks caught in the glare of countless searchlights.

The constant rumble of gunfire replaced the roar of the London traffic, most of which halted.

Several raiders dropped bombs before fleeing, pursued by lights and shells.

The raid lasted one hour 40 minutes. Over 100 bombs were dropped in one area. One enemy parachute flare set fire to a food building.

It is authoritatively stated that the blitzkrieg against R.A.F. aerodromes in the south-east of England has thus far failed to drive the British fighter opposition from this corner of Britain nearest to the enemy.

It is not denied that several advanced aerodromes have been severely hammered, but not one has been out of commission for longer than "a very short time."

Gangs of men with plenty of material are continually ready to fill in any craters in the runways.

Naturally, there have been some changes in the dispositions in the last fortnight in order to meet the intensification of the enemy onslaught, but the first line fighter defence over the south-east coast remains as tough and trustful as ever. This is illustrated by the sharp increase during the past week in the number of escort fighters which the Germans are compelled to send to get any of their bombers through. The proportion of Messerschmitts to Dorniers has reached five to one.

The British fighter losses have increased as a result of this strengthening but our pilots are still harassing the enemy bombers as well as the fighters.

The combined fighter and anti-aircraft defence is breaking up the enemy formations more and more swiftly and London's daytime air alarms are becoming correspondingly shorter.

MANY FIRES STARTED

LITTLE DAMAGE IN LONDON

LONDON, Sept. 5.

An Air Ministry communique says that shortly before dark on Wednesday the enemy began a series of scattered raids on England which lasted the greater part of the night. Bombs were dropped at many points, including the London area. The raids caused a number of casualties, some of which were fatal.

Incendiary bombs started a large number of fires, which were quickly brought under control. Houses were damaged in many areas.

Most of the casualties and damage occurred at two towns in the north-west and a town in the south-west. The damage was small in the London area and the casualties very slight.

THREE DESTROYERS SAIL

Departure For Canada

WASHINGTON, Sept. 5.

Three destroyers sailed from Boston today for Canada with skeleton crews. The authorities indicated that Boston will be the clearance port for all destroyers, 25 of which will be cleared within a fortnight.

After a conference at Washington with President Roosevelt at which Congressional leaders were given the inside story of the destroyer negotiations, Senator Bankhead stated that the United States did not contemplate acquiring additional naval or air bases at present.

The transfer provoked a heated debate in the House, Republicans charging the President with violating the law in failing to consult Congress.

FRANCE BREAKS WITH THE NETHERLANDS

GERMAN PRESSURE RECOGNISED IN DECISION

LONDON, Sept. 5.

Diplomatic relations between the Netherlands and France are being suspended to-day.

The Dutch received the decision of the Belgian Government regretfully, but felt it was acting only under strong German pressure.

The presence at Vichy of Netherlands enjoying diplomatic privileges with freedom confidentially to inform their Government of the French situation could evidently be tolerated no longer.

POLISH HOMAGE TO BRITAIN

"END OF TYRANNY IS IN SIGHT"

Greetings From Staunch Ally

Messages between the King and the President of the Polish Republic were made public on Wednesday night.

The Polish President telegraphed the King as follows: "On this day, which marks the anniversary of the entry into the war of Britain in coming to the assistance of Poland, a victim of brutal attack, I beg his Majesty to receive the homage of the whole of the Polish nation. Poland is a faithful ally and is full of admiration for the great British nation which, in concert with her sister nations of the Empire, bears without shrinking the immense weight of the responsibilities contracted for the safety of Christian civilisation menaced by the tide of barbarism."

"I am convinced that the day is near when, thanks to the common effort of the nations of the British Empire and the Allies, the world will be liberated from the tyranny now menacing it."

Polish Tenacity
In his reply his Majesty the King said: "I and my people in this country and overseas are filled with admiration for the courage and tenacity of the Polish people. We are proud to have at our side in the defence of these lands the Polish Army, Air Force and Navy, which have covered themselves with glory during the last twelve months. The stirring feats of Polish aviators in the air battles now proceeding over England are bringing new honour to Polish arms."

"I share your Excellency's conviction in the final defeat of the tyranny now menacing Europe and I look with confidence to the restoration of Polish independence and of the liberties of Europe."

NEW UNDER-SECRETARY OF SUPPLY

Lord Portal To Assist Minister

It is announced from No. 10 Downing Street that to assist the Minister of Supply in the supply and distribution of raw materials, including the work of raw-material control, the King has approved that Lord Portal be appointed additional Parliamentary Secretary to the Ministry of Supply.

BRITISH WARSHIPS BUSY IN NORWEGIAN WATERS

Big Nazi Troopship Sunk And Narvik Ore Vessels Torpedoed

LONDON, Sept. 5.

The Gothenburg correspondent of the British United Press says that Swedish fishermen report that British warships sank a 12,000-ton German transport off Skagenhorn. Fishermen saw the vessel sink rapidly; only about 100 persons were rescued.

The Stockholm correspondent of "The Times" says that British naval and air activity is making German navigation precarious on the entire Scandinavian coast. Six merchantmen were destroyed outside Oslo during the week ended August 26. An oil-tanker of 10,000 tons was also sunk in Oslo's inner fiord.

Hundreds of bodies of German soldiers have recently been washed ashore between Trondheim and Tromso.

It is believed that British submarines are sinking the ships which are transferring men and materials from the Narvik area.

Berlin Uneasy At Success Of R.A.F.'s Repeated Attacks

ADMISSION THAT DEFENCES NEED STRENGTHENING

Leipzig Fair Visitors Spend Sleepless Nights

"The Times" says that a German news agency statement that the Berlin anti-aircraft defences have been rearranged, "thus baffling the enemy," is very significant in view of the High Command's recent assertion that the anti-aircraft defences are so effective that they have prevented R.A.F. bombers from reaching their objectives.

A dispatch from Zurich says that many more anti-aircraft batteries have been established at Berlin, Magdeburg, and Leipzig. The German Press assures the people that British planes henceforth will be prevented from reaching Berlin.

Reports from various sources indicate that the R.A.F.'s hammering at Germany is disillusioning the population as to Goering's boast of the country's invulnerability.

A Bucharest message states that a Rumanian visitor to Leipzig stated that the Autumn Fair was a complete failure because of the British air raids. The fair closed two days early and many visitors cut their stay short because of sleepless nights.

The Berlin correspondent of the Swedish newspaper "Dagens Nyheter" reports that Berliners are in an extremely nervous condition and stay awake for long hours expecting raids. The Government's promise of an extra coffee ration as a stimulant is most welcome, because Berliners have long been short of coffee.

A flight-lieutenant who participated in three raids on Berlin declared that the black-out was extremely good. He added that the black-out throughout Germany was generally better than that in Britain, where there was sufficient light in the towns to enable them to be picked out. The headlights of cars moving along the road could be observed.

EXPLOSIONS IN THE FORESTS

NAZI ARMS DUMPS BOMBED

Extensive Damage By The R.A.F.

Details of raids made by the R.A.F. over Germany on Tuesday night state that as well as bombing Berlin, another section of the night's raiding force concentrating on a large oil refinery and storage plant at Magdeburg, started a line of fire across the target from south-east to north-west. These fires, which broke out some time after the flames from the bursting incendiary bombs had died away, had obviously gained a firm hold. Other bombs burst in the centre of the plant, and at 12.5 a.m., nearly an hour after the first bombs had fallen, late arrivals could still see the glow of fires in the target area.

The crew of one aircraft detailed to attack the Magdeburg oil refinery spent more than half an hour cruising over the district trying to find the target. When finally defeated by ground haze and darkness they located the city's main railway junction and dropped their bombs on the tracks.

Included among the objectives of Tuesday night's raids were armament factories and munition stores hidden among the dense forest of the Hartz Mountains, in north-west Germany, these being attacked for the first time. Hundreds of incendiary bombs were dropped and great tracts of surrounding pine-woods set on fire. As these fires spread, vivid flashes and explosions betrayed the presence of the secret military objectives which the pilots had gone out to attack.

Guns Reply
One pilot commented on the corroboration which was forthcoming of the military character of the objective he was instructed to attack. He observed on his return: "There was something important there, because the anti-aircraft fire started coming up at us, and you wouldn't normally expect a lot of guns crackling off at you from the middle of a forest."

This was the second night in succession on which R.A.F. bomber crews had attacked military objectives concealed in the forests. On the previous night raid they had covered a large area of the famous Black Forest to the east of Baden Baden, and also the Forest of Thuringen. Numerous fires were then started, many of which were seen to gain a good hold. In at least one case an ammunition dump is believed to have been hit.

Forest Still Ablaze
Two of the force of bombers sent out last night were detailed to make a reconnaissance of the Black Forest area which had been attacked on Monday night. The crew of one of these aircraft reported that part of the forest was still blazing from the night before, while in another area they were able to make out the still-smouldering embers of a fire which had devastated an area of forest land estimated to be a mile long and a mile and a-half wide.

The raid on Berlin was the fifth made on the German capital in nine days.

A power station situated in the Berlin suburbs was repeatedly bombed in a series of shallow dive attacks, and though low clouds prevented detailed observation of the results, the flash of many bomb bursts was seen within the target area.

Another power station was bombed from 7500 feet, and when a gasworks was struck by high-explosive bombs, a large fire broke out, accompanied by heavy clouds of smoke.

EMPIRE READY TO MEET "THAT BAD MAN"

Mr Churchill Feels Unworried

The Rt. Hon. Winston Churchill, addressing the New Zealand troops, said: "We are now bearing the accumulated weight of the enemy's malice and tyranny, but we do not feel overwhelmed thereby."

"When you first arrived four months ago a comparatively small enemy might have wrought havoc before they were finished off, but now we have the most powerful armies, and if some people think that that bad man is inclined to try his venture I feel sure we will give a good account of ourselves."

"We do not feel lonely when sons from the Dominions overseas, where they breed the finest fighters, come here or go to other parts of the Empire to bear their part in this the greatest of all the wars we have ever fought."

"None has been nobler or more righteous than this, and from none shall we emerge with a greater sense of duty done."

Check Placed On Inflation

BRITISH MEASURES Profiteering Under Control

Reviewing the effect on the Stock Exchange prices of the first year of the war, the "Daily Herald's" City Editor points out that a comparison of the quotations on the last day before the war and on August 31 reveals an appreciation of Government stocks—war loan 31 per cent has risen from 90½ to 101½—and a heavy decline in industrials, especially armament commodities and gold shares.

"Herald" suggests, is a direct result of Government control of finance and industry, which has checked inflation and profiteering.

NEW NAZI WARPLANES ROUTED

Spitfires And Hurricanes Break Up Formations

TWENTY-FOUR SHOT DOWN

The most outstanding feature of Wednesday's air battle over Britain is described by the Air Ministry News Service as the rout of the new Messerschmitt Jaguar fighter-bombers.

Over the borders of Surrey and Essex, above the quiet fields and copses country of Kent, the Jaguars circled, forming close protective rings as the fury of the Spitfire and the Hurricane. Twelve of them fell to the bullets of 12 Spitfires of one squadron and another 12 were the victims of two Hurricane squadrons.

The 12 Spitfires first sighted 15 Jaguars and another 15 with 30 Dornier 17 bombers further south. Three of the Spitfires tackled the first Jaguars and nine of them took on the other formation of 50. They not only destroyed 12, but helped fighters from another squadron bring down two more and a Dornier 17 as well. Not one of the 12 Spitfires was hit.

Not all the Spitfires and Hurricanes met the enemy over the weald country. Some went south to challenge them on the coast. While the rest of the squadron defended their Surrey aerodrome, three Hurricane pilots were sending two Messerschmitt 110's into the sea off Rye and Beachy Head.

The Spitfire squadron went even further south and broke up a formation of 40 Dornier 17 bombers 10 miles south of Beachy Head and sent one bomber and two protecting fighters down from 14,000 feet into the sea.

Chased to France
Earlier in the day a Spitfire squadron fought the enemy the whole way from the Thames estuary nearly to the French coast. At least two of the enemy were destroyed. One of the pilots chased a Messerschmitt 109 to within five miles of the French coast, where it caught fire and crashed into the sea.

A Hurricane squadron took on a large formation of Messerschmitts and shot down five. One pilot saw black smoke coming from a Messerschmitt 109 which he had attacked, then from a height of more than four miles the Messerschmitt plunged into the sea just over the Kent coast.

Universities throughout Britain will, under a new scheme, co-operate in placing the feet of young officers on the first rung of the Army ladder.

Because of the constant expansion of the Army, which is to be increased by 500,000 to 2,000,000 in the coming winter, the War Office announces a scheme to obtain a large number of young officers with scientific and mathematical qualifications who are required for the engineers, artillery, and signals. The scheme will be open every six months to 1200 men aged from 18 to 18½. Those selected will serve in the ranks for four months before going to the university for six months' free tuition, ultimately joining an officer cadet training unit.

NEW RATIONING PLANS FOR BRITAIN OUTLINED

Restriction On Tea Included In Check On Some Luxury Foods

While making it clear that there are adequate supplies of food in Britain, and that there was no question of anyone "going short," Lord Woolton, the Minister of Food, introduced new rationing plans on July 12. Britain, he said, would have to develop powers of abstinence, to be prepared to do with fewer luxuries but with more simple food, and to live a "harder life gastronomically."

"The time has come," he said, "when we must ask everyone to go on to 'hard living' and to cut out all luxuries. The present position is, in fact, better than when I gave my assurance some time ago that food supplies were adequate, and we are bringing into this country every ounce of food we can buy.

But the Ministry takes the view that we are in for a long effort of siege. We are now alone, and every effort will be made to bring us to our knees. We are led to expect an active submarine and bombing campaign. The person who can last a week or half a week longer than the other fellow will win, and I have every intention that we shall be able to last the longest.

In addition to meat, butter and sugar—which have been rationed for some months—tea, margarine and cooking fats are also to be restricted. The tea ration is 2oz weekly. That for butter and margarine is 6oz, and for cooking fats, 2oz.

Hotel and restaurant meals are being restricted by an agreement which hotelkeepers have reached with the Ministry. This will prevent the serving of both a fish and a meat course in the same meal, but there is no restriction at present on other courses—such as hors d'oeuvres or soup—where use can be made of food that might otherwise be wasted.

Criminal Offence

The possibility that food wastage may be made a criminal offence is being seriously considered by the Minister, who is examining how

ODDS AND ENDS OF SCIENCE

Little Bits Of Everything

"Liquid" coal can now be used as fuel for your automobile. A stock car, standard in every respect except for one fine-screen filter removed, ran with each of three types of colloidal coal fuel. A suspension is made from specially prepared coal ground to three hundred mesh mixed with gasoline, fuel oil, and lubricating oil, or with Diesel oil or light oil. Though not yet ready for the market, this fuel would be desirable for home owners for heating or for anyone using oil burners.

ABOUT RUBBER Rubber is composed of long, flexible, chain-like molecules which are normally in a more or less coiled up condition. When the rubber is stretched the long molecules are simply uncoiled. Some, but not all, substances with long chain-like molecules have rubber-like properties. Examples of which are the various synthetic rubber substitutes recently developed.

FACTS ABOUT WEATHER

Dr Glasspoole, the British meteorologist, has found a relationship between the weather of the British Isles and that of eastern America. There is an inverse relationship with rainfall; that is, in the period of years from 1838 to 1932 the dry years in Britain were wet ones in America and vice versa.

WOUNDS THAT HEAL

Wounds in the Russian Arctic heal more rapidly than usual if they are stitched, but less rapidly if they are left open. This is explained by the relatively germ-free Arctic and the fact that germs in closed-up wounds cause inflammation but on minor, open wounds help the natural healing process.

EMOTIONS

Strong emotions, such as fear, elation and anger are bound to make the fingers cold. Temperature differences of twenty-four degrees Fahrenheit have been noted in some cases. This difference occurs even when the persons hide their emotions from themselves.

SKIN TEMPERATURES

Skin temperatures of women are higher in warm air and cooler in cold air than those of men.

Ajax As Good As Ever

NOW WON £38,025 Underwood Stakes Win Impressive FINISHED BRILLIANTLY

Ajax showed all his old time brilliance in winning the Underwood Stakes at Moonee Valley on August 24, states the Sydney "Sunday Telegraph." El Golea, though one of the greatest milers in the land, could never close on the flying chestnut and was virtually run off his legs.

Alax ran the mile in 1.37 1/2, which is only half a second outside the course record. He ran the first two furlongs in 25sec., first three in 37, and the first half-mile in 52, and came home the last half mile in the phenomenal time of 45 1/2.

His rider, Harold Badger, said: "I was never in doubt at any stage about the result. "Aurie's Star led me for about half a furlong, but I easily hit the front, and he went kindly throughout.

"I cooled him along once we turned for home. For I thought he wanted a bit of extra work. "Ajax, in my opinion, is as good as ever he was, and I do not think any horse will beat him up to a mile."

By this win Ajax passed his sire, Heroic, in the list of stake winners, an assumed fifth place behind Ph. Lap, Amouins, Gloaming, and Limerick. His total winnings are £38,025, and he is only £4 10/- behind Limerick, whom he is certain to pass during the spring carnival.

Ran His Own Race

A great tribute was paid to Ajax by Norman Creighton, rider of El Golea, who rode a good second.

"I ran my own race. Everything was made to order, and when I turned for home and ran to Ajax I thought I might beat him, but Badger just shook him up and that was the end of it."

"Don't forget that my fellow had two races under his belt. What more can I say. He is just a champion." Arthur Dewhurst, who rode Aurie's Star, said: "I intended to break Ajax by getting a decent lead on from the start. My fellow was flat out, and you know how fast he is, but he couldn't live with Ajax for a furlong. That's how good he is."

Perhaps the best tribute paid to Ajax was that of the former champion jockey Frank Dempsey. He rode all the best horses, including Euphonic and Manfred. Dempsey said: "Well, I've ridden some great horses in my time, but this fellow measures right up to them. He is one of the best horses up to a mile that I have seen, and I think he's loved to have been ridden."

Ajax created an Underwood Stakes record. This made his third successive win in the race. Whittier, Hall Mark and Young Idea each won the race twice.

Light Programme

Ajax has six other engagements during the spring and it is considered that he will be vastly improved by his race. Victorian critics say he will dominate the w.f.a. in his home State, with El Golea likely to be his only serious rival unless Inter-State opposition arrives. It is certain that he is still the champion that he was last year, and the year before.

Veteran trainer, Frank Musgrave, said the champion's spring programme had been mapped out, and he had recommended no inter-State trips.

Musgrave said he would have liked to have taken on the best in Sydney at the Red Cross meeting at Randwick on September 21, but he thought that a Victorian programme was much more suitable for Ajax.

Part-owner Mr A. W. Thompson later confirmed Musgrave's statement. "We are going to race Ajax only in Victoria this spring, but he may go to Sydney in the autumn," said Mr Thompson.

"Ajax is always a drawcard wherever he races, and his appearance means riches at the paddock and increased profits for the clubs."

"As all the Victorian clubs are devoting their total profits to patriotic funds, Ajax is doing his bit in Victoria in that direction.

"Ajax can still earn money in Victoria for patriotic funds just as he can in any other State," said Mr Thompson.

QUICK REMEDIES FOR SMALL PROBLEMS

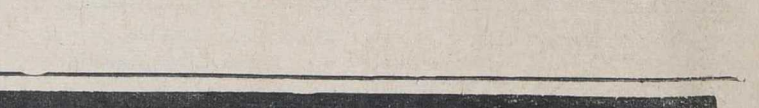

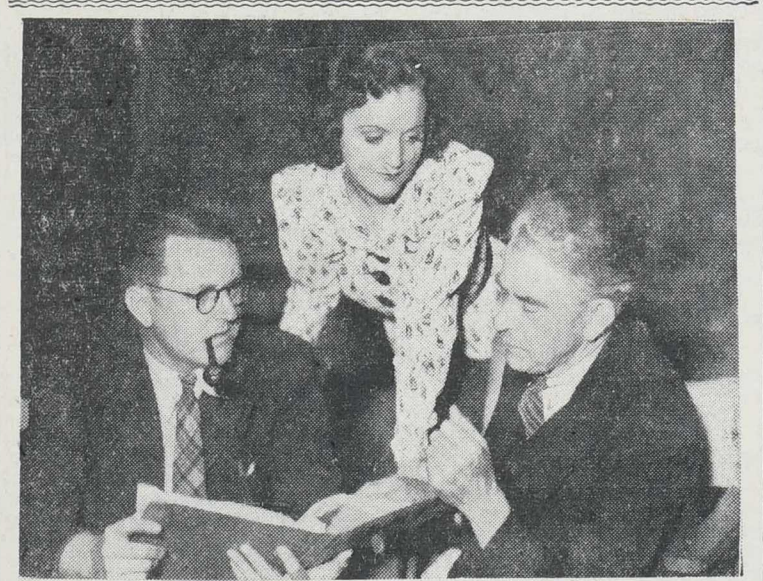

THE ECONOMIC CONFERENCE

When a Government is in a serious dilemma it usually appoints a Royal Commission or calls a conference, and the bureaux of Ministerial offices in Wellington are stuffed with the reports of former commissions and committees of experts.

Despite the fact that they seldom influence Government policy to any material extent, how never dies that one day a conference of laymen will really be able to tell the Government of the day what it should do in a difficult situation.

The economic conference which met on Wednesday has been set a problem which can be simply stated, but which raises issues of such complexity that it would be foolish to be hopeful about the findings.

Briefly, the conference is asked to tell the Government how the Dominion can make an adequate contribution to the Empire's war effort without depriving anyone of some of those things which go to make up the present standard of living.

Possibly the Government has come to the conclusion that there is no satisfactory answer to the question, but feels that it would be helpful, in the circumstances, if a conference representing all sections of the community shared the responsibility of saying so, and of recommending measures involving the sacrifices we all agree to be inevitable, but are reluctant to share personally.

The phraseology used by the Prime Minister in his opening address indicated some confusion of thought. He put forward a plea for the "stabilisation of costs, wages, and prices," and the grouping of these three things implies a definite relationship between them, and a dependence of one upon another which does not always exist.

"Costs" is a very comprehensive term. Everyone in business knows what it means in his particular case, and he also knows that it is a fluctuating quantity. "Prices," although mainly related to costs, are also affected by supply and demand.

Last year potatoes were bringing about three times what the growers are getting this year, and nobody complained about the high cost of producing them. Wages, as a writer pointed out yesterday, have the same relationship to costs and prices as interest and taxation, and in the last analysis are paid out of the product of industry.

When the Government is able to "stabilise" taxation, it will be easier to stabilise a few other factors in production.

The opening speeches at the conference indicated that the delegates representing particular sections knew just where their own shoes pinched, and some were quite vocal about it. Unanimity existed on one point only—that there must be a considerable expansion of national production to feed and properly equip and maintain the military forces without reducing the rations or diminishing the amenities of life enjoyed by the rest of the community.

Back of the Government's mind there is, probably, a belief that the solution lies in a planned national economy that is incompatible with privately controlled productive enterprise.

Control and regulation by the Government of the machinery of production is now so complete that it could not be carried much further without eliminating individual enterprise altogether, and that would mean a slide into Socialism, for which both the Government and the country are hardly prepared.

There has been a ready surrender of rights and privileges to help in winning the war, but most of those engaged in directing the productive activities of the country look forward to the time when their former freedom will be restored. Certainly no endorsement of Socialism can be expected from the present conference, which contains such irreconcilable elements that we shall be surprised if agreement is reached on anything of importance.

N.Z. SOLDIERS READY FOR ACTION

Detachments "In The Field" In Egypt

VALUABLE EXPERIENCE

EGYPT, Aug. 7. New and valuable experience of active service conditions in the desert has been gained by the hundreds of members of the Second New Zealand Expeditionary Force in Egypt who have carried out special duties in the background of British land operations on the Egypto-Libyan border.

However far removed the New Zealand detachments have been from the actual scenes of border raids and clashes, they are correctly regarded as having served "in the field."

Their tasks in the Western Desert have been arduous and important. They are perhaps best compared with the assembly and maintenance of some of the vital parts of a machine which must stand ready to be pressed into top speed at the touch of a button.

The New Zealanders proved this fitness to assume these responsibilities. After long months of training in the Cairo area, it has been heartening to the whole of the First Command to know that the activities in the field have earned the satisfaction and the praise of high authorities in the Middle East Command.

It is reported that the work of one New Zealand detachment, calling for a large degree of skill and specialised training, was described by an English officer of important rank as unsurpassed by any of its kind which he had previously seen.

In another case, that of a detachment engaged in a different type of assignment, open amazement was expressed by an inspecting officer at the amount of work which the New Zealanders had completed in a short space of time.

A Practical Phase. This more practical phase in the military career of the contingent must add considerably to the background of experience which it has been steadily building up in the advanced training programmes of the past half year.

Some of the detachment members have carried out their tasks in relays; one or two have been engaged continuously for several weeks.

Some have had to forego comparatively few of the comforts and amenities they knew in the camp near Cairo, while others have had a fuller taste of the hardships which operations on the vast desert area must entail.

The degree of experience varies, but every officer and man has enriched in some way his knowledge of his job and his understanding of the desert.

By the nature of their work, the only contacts which the detachments have had with the enemy have been more or less indirect, through aerial bombing raids concentrated for the most part on relatively distant targets.

A few of their members chancing to be in the neighbourhood of raided towns or other points, have had a more real experience of air attacks. Protection measures taken by each detachment, however, have ensured the safest possible living and working conditions.

These precautions include the digging of shelter trenches and the sand-bagging of tents. Field offices, as another instance, are frequently built partly or wholly underground.

Privileges Extended. The privileges of a free cigarette issue and free postage—two letters by surface mail each week—are enjoyed during service in the field, and canteen facilities extend well up towards the border.

With the assistance of the National Patriotic Fund Board, the New Zealand Y.M.C.A. has been active in this respect, and it has lately purchased and equipped a truck to facilitate its work on the Western Desert.

From the point of view of physical well-being as well as that of increased military experience, many of the New Zealanders have gained much by their service in the desert. Their work has often brought them within easy reach of the Mediterranean Sea, and regular swimming, together with the change in atmosphere, has seen them become fitter and more bronzed than ever.

Extended leave is now falling due to members of the detachment with the longest continuous service, and small parties are spending in rotation a full week's holiday.

A quantity of petrol was stolen from a garage on the premises of McLeod and Gardner, Ltd., Hastings, by an intruder at some time on Wednesday night. The petrol was stored for use in the firm's timber trucks. The affair is being investigated by the police.

To collect gift eggs for Great Britain a depot will be opened in the Havelock North Town Board Offices each Tuesday from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. when donations of eggs for this purpose will be received.

Injured Orchardist

The condition of Mr Simon Edillon, a Pakowhai orchardist in the Memorial Hospital, Hastings, was still fairly serious last night. Mr Edillon received broken ribs and shock when he was run over by a tractor on Wednesday morning.

Fire Inquiry at Wairoa

Detectives are still investigating the circumstances of the fire which razed the new messroom block at the Wairoa military camp early on the morning of August 28. Nothing has been found to prove conclusively that incendiarism was responsible.

The Swimming Season

Although Napier weather over the past few days has resembled winter much more than spring, a few hardy swimmers have been taking a plunge in the vicinity of the Marine Parade. So far however they have shown little enthusiasm, and it is reported that the temperature of the water is actually below the average for this time of year.

Golfers' Strange Attire

The wet weather prevailing for the last two days has resulted in some strange attire being adopted to meet the conditions by competitors in the Hastings women's golf tournament. A variety of goshes made their appearance on the first day, but apparently these were inadequate to cope with sudden and muddy greens. Yesterday several competitors played in long trousers made of leather.

Loss on Wairakei

The accounts of Wairakei Ltd. for the year ending June 30 show a net loss of £1967, against a profit of £2854 last year. The loss is shown after providing for depreciation and additional taxation. In the past three years the company has paid a dividend of 7 1/2 per cent but no distribution is recommended this year. The report states that the result was directly attributable to the cessation of overseas tourist traffic, consequent on war conditions.

Hitler Halts Japan's "Go-Ahead" Policy

INDO-CHINA QUESTION

Tokyo Decides To Withdraw Ultimatum

COMPLIANCE PROBABLE

(United Press Association—Copyright.) (Received Sept. 5, 11.55 p.m.)

It is authoritatively reported from Indo-China that Japan has withdrawn the ultimatum to permit the transport of Japanese troops across the country and has cancelled plans to evacuate Japanese nationals. It is believed that the action is prompted by French assurances that the demands will be acceptable when the details are worked out.

It is further reported that any Japanese invasion of Indo-China will be in defiance of Hitler's desire to keep Indo-China intact. It is said that the Japanese, since the collapse of France, have been vainly awaiting Hitler's "go ahead" signal in the Far East in return for past Japanese co-operation with the Axis.

Those well informed in Tokyo Government circles expect a satisfactory solution of the difficulties in Indo-China. Talk of a threatened Japanese occupation is "decidedly premature."

A Washington message says that the Secretary of State (Mr. Cordell Hull) has publicly notified Japan that any change in the status quo in French Indo-China or the Netherlands East Indies as a result of Japanese military operations would have "an unfortunate effect upon public opinion in the United States."

He revealed that the United States was standing adamantly on its refusal to allow Japanese troops to take over all the defence sectors in the International Settlement at Shanghai formerly patrolled by the British.

"During recent months the United States and others, including Japan, have expressed the desire that the status quo be respected and preserved in the Pacific with special reference to the Netherlands East Indies and French Indo-China," he said.

"In the absence of official confirmation of the reported Japanese ultimatum to the United States, the French Indo-China this Government is reluctant to give credence to the report. However, it is a matter to which the United States attaches importance and it stands to be served in the Pacific with special reference to the Netherlands East Indies and French Indo-China," he said.

MORE THREATS FROM HITLER

TALK OF "REPRISAL" RAIDS

Nightly Destructive Bombings

United Press Association—Copyright. (Recd. Sept. 5, 12.45 p.m.)

LONDON, Sept. 4. Hitler, in making an unexpected speech at the opening of the winter relief campaign today, said: "I know only one date, the date of the collapse of England. If it is said in England: 'Why doesn't it come?' then I say: 'Because it will come!'"

Hitler announced that hundreds of thousands of pounds of bombs would drop from the sky on England every night after this in retaliation for the British night raids.

He added: "For three months I have waited for the British to cease the nuisance of their nightly haphazard bomb-throwing. Now we will give answer night after night."

"If the British have thrown down 2000 to 3000 kilograms, we will unload 150,000 to 180,000—yes, 200,000. If the British attack our cities, we will simply erase theirs. We will call a halt to the night pirates."

"Hour Is Coming" "The hour is coming," said Hitler, "when one of us will break up. It won't be Nazi Germany."

The Berlin correspondent of the Associated Press says that Hitler, who spoke at the Sports Palace, made fun of England when he was not threatening her. He described General Bluff as his chief ally and General Winter and General Hunger as his second and third allies.

He added: "The British ought to make General Bluff their Reichsmarschal."

According to a later version of the speech, Hitler declared that Britain described General Revolution as her chief ally, then General Winter, and thirdly, General Hunger. He added: "The British should not forget to raise their most important general—General Bluff—to the rank of Field-Marshal of the Empire. When the hour comes, we shall substitute General Fact for all these generals."

Hitler asserted that the R.A.F. bombed Germany at night time because it was unable to fly over the Reich during the day.

Most of the speech was devoted to contrasting Nazism with British plutocracy. Hitler urged the German people to make a renewed effort for the most gigantic social work of all time.

A HUGE TOTAL

Figures Over The Whole War

BRITISH CRASHES

United Press Association—Copyright. (Recd. Sept. 5, 12.45 p.m.)

LONDON, Sept. 4. The Air Ministry told the Associated Press today that, from the outbreak of the war on September 3, verified German air losses in all campaigns except that in Poland totalled 3620. It is believed that the number would be nearly doubled if German losses in the Battle of Britain were included.

British losses everywhere except in the Middle East were 1045 for the same period.

Germany, between the outbreak of war and September 3, had lost 1500 bombers and fighters; in attacks against Britain, 1460 of which had been shot down since June 18. British losses in the Battle for Britain were 389 fighters, but 175 pilots had been saved.

Italy, from the time of her entry into the war to August 31, had lost 131 planes, and probably 200 with the exception of those grounded.

British losses in the Middle East up to August 31 were 30.

Since May 10, the R.A.F. has bombed about 500 separate targets on the Continent, of which 200 were Germany. Raids made total over 1500.

"No appeals against being called up can be considered unless and until reservists have been selected in the ballot," said the Hon. R. Semple, in a statement concerning the recent issue of certificates of enrolment to reservists of the first division of the General Reserve.

"When that happens," the Minister continued, "there will be plenty of time and opportunity to submit to the properly constituted tribunals appeals for exemption on one or more of the several grounds upon which the appeals may be based. I desire to make it perfectly clear that my department cannot take any action in regard to appeals the determination of which rests wholly with the tribunal referred to. A realisation of these facts will, I hope, result in the complete cessation of the flood of letters that have for days poured into hundreds of Post Offices."

Mr Semple explained that there had been an avalanche of letters from reservists protesting against their inclusion in the first division and desiring to lodge appeals against being called up for military service.

Although the position in respect to appeals had been frequently stressed and it was necessary again to state that reservists writing to the Department on that subject were merely adding to the tremendous pile of similar letters which simply could not be satisfactorily answered for the reasons had emphasised—that no appeals could be considered until after the reservists had been selected in the ballot.

Referring to letters reporting non-receipt of certificates, the Minister stressed the necessity for prompt notification of change of address and said that a great proportion of the certificates failed to reach their destination because of that fact.

BALLOT NECESSARY FOR TERRITORIALS

Vacancies In Forces BRINGING UNITS UP TO STRENGTH

A ballot to provide men to bring certain territorial units up to strength is to be taken shortly, according to a statement made by the Minister of Defence (the Hon. F. Jones) in a telephone conversation with the "New Zealand Herald" from Dunedin on Wednesday night. The Minister said that the men would undergo intensive training.

"Some units are not up to their required strength, and it will be necessary to take a ballot," Mr Jones explained. "We are waiting at present for the completion of the register so that the ballot can be taken, and the shortages made up in these particular units."

PETROL RATIONING HAS MORE CONSEQUENCES

Motorists Allege That N.Z. System Is Unfair

STRINGENT RESTRICTIONS

Widespread dissatisfaction with the present system of petrol rationing is being expressed by motorists and garage-owners in Hawke's Bay, and it is contended that unless some relief is afforded in the near future serious trade dislocation must result.

Disappointment has been expressed that the authorities could not make available the four gallons monthly which were recently deducted from the allowance. It is pointed out that New Zealand's restrictions are much more stringent than those operating in Britain or any of the other Dominions.

Illustrating this point, the following table comparing New Zealand, Great Britain and Australian rations in gallons has been supplied to the "Daily Mail":

Federation's Views: Replying to a statement made by the Minister of Finance (the Hon. W. Nash) on August 29, the New Zealand Motor Trade Federation has issued the following statement:

"In the opinion of the federation, the statement made by Mr. Nash is not in any way clarifying the situation. He stated that the reason for the restriction on the use of petrol was the imperative necessity of building up reserves for the defence of New Zealand. Secondly, it was essential in the interests of the United Kingdom to conserve dollar exchange.

"In reference to the first reason given by Mr. Nash, the New Zealand Motor Trade Federation joins issue with him on this matter, because during the first 10 months of war no real effort was made by the Government to build up reserve stocks of petrol. It is doubtful if the building up of these stocks has been in operation. Stocks of petrol in New Zealand are dependent entirely on the policy of the major oil companies who import petrol from the United Kingdom. Normally, stocks are dictated by monthly sales. When, under rationing, sales fell, stocks naturally fell also.

"Even today the improvement in the stock position is not because of any action of the Government, but because the oil companies have at their own expense imported greater quantities of petrol into New Zealand than their sales justify. This is the express purpose of creating a defence reserve.

"Mr. Nash went on to say: 'There has never been any restriction on the importation of petrol into New Zealand. All that there has been is a restriction on the use of it for the reason that it is not paid for until it is sold for use.'

"From there being no restriction on the importation of petrol into New Zealand, the Motor Trade Federation says that there is the greatest restriction—that is, the restriction arising out of the refusal of the Government to pay for petrol as it is received. But for the willingness and ability of the oil companies to carry large stocks (far beyond their present needs) without payment, the Government's present policy would deprive the country of any safety margin whatsoever.

Dollar Exchange: "With regard to the second reason, that is, the conservation of dollar exchange, the truth of this matter is still obscure. It has been stated that 69 per cent. of the petrol imported into New Zealand comes from the Dutch East Indies. In an article in the Sydney "Sun" of August 2, the following statement is made: 'Cable reports indicate that the embargo by the United States on aviation petrol will not prevent Great Britain from securing supplies from the Dutch East Indies and paying for it with sterling. It was pointed out in official circles that payment for petrol imported from the East on this basis would not impose the huge strain on non-sterling resources that would exist if payment were made directly in dollars.'

"Since the publication of this statement in Australia, the petrol rationing plan there has been deferred until October 1, and the present basic ration has been more than doubled. So it would appear that there is truth in the statement that with the Dutch East Indies in the sterling bloc, it is possible for payment to be made in sterling. It will be noted that Mr. Nash did not deny this. He merely stated that he had received a cablegram from London which definitely discounted that belief.

"However, the case for the increase in the ration of petrol in New Zealand is not dependent on the argument about dollar exchange. The Government fixed 6,000 gallons per month as the quantity of petrol necessary to meet the essential needs of New Zealand. The usage permitted during July was considerably below this, and it is very likely that when the figures are available the usage in August will be lower still.

Defence Purposes: "These monthly figures include the greatly increased quantities of petrol required for defence training purposes in New Zealand; consequently, the Government is stretching the quantity of petrol it previously considered necessary for essential services in New Zealand to meet the extra and ever-increasing gallons required for defence purposes, and also the volume necessary to create reserve stocks. This the Government is doing at the expense of the commercial and private owners of motor vehicles and at great economic cost to the country.

DEALING WITH HAWKS

The liberation of brown trout fry by the Hawke's Bay Acclimatisation Society is to take place this week, it was stated at the monthly meeting of the society. The fry will be released as follows:—Dannevirke and Woodville, 20,000; Mangatapu 2000; Maraetotara, 6000; Waipukurau and Waipawa districts, 2000. The rainbow trout fry will be liberated later in the month in the following rivers: Tuki Tuki, 60,000; Ngaruro, 60,000; Esk, 20,000; Tutaeaki, 10,000; Mangaone, 10,000; Lake Tutara, 40,000.

The Department of Internal Affairs wrote asking for the society's recommendations regarding an application received by the Minister of Internal Affairs from a person asking for remission of a fine inflicted on him by the Magistrate at Hastings for shooting on the opening day of the season without the necessary licence. The society recommended that the remission of the fine be not granted, as plausible stories could be put across by anybody on the opening day of the season. The society pointed out that the minimum fine of £5 was intended to be a deterrent to poaching and in all cases the minimum fine would be insisted on.

A letter of congratulation to the society on the way in which it has cleared the hawk menace in the province, was received from a poultry farmer in Hawke's Bay. The farmer stated in his letter that before the society took on the job of destroying hawks, there were thousands flying about the district but now there was a decided decrease in the number to be seen. This had saved the lives of hundreds of fowls and ducks, which meant a great deal, particularly in time of war. "So I congratulate the society on the good work it has done," he concluded.

WANGANUI GUINEAS IS RUN TO-MORROW

First Classic Of Season

LIGHT SHED ON DERBIES IN THE PAST

Areas May Be A Handicap Horse

The Wanganui Guineas, to be decided at Awapuni to-morrow, as the first classic of the 1940-41 racing season, sees spring racing truly launched. Perhaps the least important of the three-year-old classics, this time-honoured event, which supplanted the Wanganui Derby in 1898, has nevertheless shed considerable light on prospects for the more important classics at Ellerslie, Trentham, and Riccarton.

To-morrow's race, despite the defection of Chary as the result of a training mishap, promises to provide as interesting a contest as any. The fact that Sir Beau is a hot favourite for the race will not detract from its interest, for Sir Beau rules the ante-post favourite for the Derbies and his form will be the cynosure of all eyes.

A glance through the records reveals the fact that many great horses have their names enrolled. There were not many better colts than the Hon. J. D. Ormond's Renown, but Achilles was a great middle-distance horse, and the mighty Treadmill followed him. Later came Aborigine; the dual Derby winner Danube; that good Treadmill filly Counterfeit; and that mighty all-rounder Bon Reve. Reputation won in 1914, and they followed almost in a line Nones, Estland, Gloaming, Duo, Razzle Dazzle, Lysander, and Eaglet. In more recent times there have been Cylinder, Croupier, Royal Chief, and Beaulive.

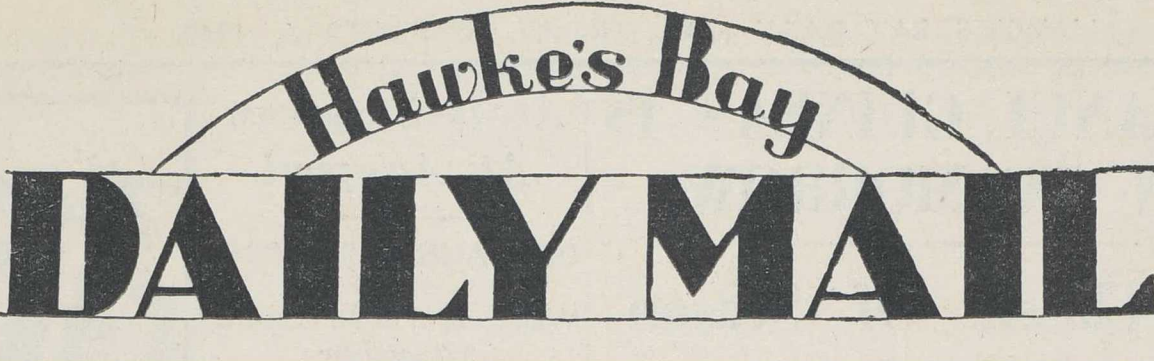
