Recipes for the Enterprising Housewife

Bananas Should Be Served Now While Other Fruits Are Scarce

BANANA AND JAM PIE

Take 12ozs. short crust pastry, 4 bananas and raspberry jam. Method: Line a pie plate with half the pastry, cover with the bananas and raspberries.

GINGER BANANAS

Take 6 bananas, 1 gill cream, 3ozs. preserved ginger, apricot jam, a few almonds, castor sugar, vanilla. Method: Blanch and chop the almonds and brown a little in the oven.

BANANA SANDWICH PUDDING

Take a few slices of bread and butter, 1 egg, sugar, 1 cupful milk, bananas. Method: Slice the bananas and make sandwiches of them with the bread and butter.

Bananas are adaptable in the hands of an imaginative cook. They, can, for example, form the base of a delicious curry.

Bananas are a fruit that is nearly always plentiful, and so are especially useful when other fruits are scarce.

BAKED OR FRIED BANANAS

To bake bananas, slit the fruit in its skin, place one or two dabs of butter on top of them and sprinkle with sugar.

BANANA CUSTARD

Take 1 pint milk, 2 eggs, 2 table-spoonfuls sugar, 2 table-spoonfuls cornflour, 3 or 4 bananas sliced thickly. Method: Heat the milk in a double boiler, add the cornflour and sugar.

BANANA CAKE

Take 1 cup sugar, 2 table-spoonfuls butter, 3 bananas, 1 egg, 13 cupfuls flour, 13 table-spoonfuls baking powder, 2 table-spoonfuls milk, 1 small table-spoonful bicarbonate of soda.

ARTISTIC DECORATIVE WORK AT SPRING FLOWER SHOW

Women's Part In Horticultural Society Show In Hastings

The artistic floral work done by the women of Hastings has always been the centre of much admiration and praise, especially as it is so often a very attractive feature of weddings, balls, and all kinds of meetings and other special occasions.

Needless to say, the spring season, with so many beautiful flowers, gives encouragement to all floral work, and these two reasons—lovely flowers and artistic fingers—combined to make the women's decorative section at the Hastings Horticultural Society's spring flower show, held yesterday in the Assembly Hall, the centre of much admiration.

The only regrettable feature of the show was the fact that in the decorative classes the entries were small and one felt that many more women could have exhibited in these classes.

One of the finest displays of the show was that arranged by members of the garden circle of the Hastings Townswomen's Guild. A huge three-tiered stand had been set in the centre of the hall and this was decorated in two distinct colour schemes.

On the opposite side were huge bowls of Iceland poppies and others of yellow forsythia, with smaller bowls of primroses, lachenalia and wallflowers.

In the section for the best decorated mantelpiece first prize was awarded to Mrs. Innes Campbell's lovely exhibit. Here the colour scheme was flame and bronze tones and brass bowls and vases held forsythia, lachenalia, margold, iris, wallflower, daffodils and banksia blossoms with a very tiny touch of blue forget-me-nots and grape hyacinths, intermingled with bronze and green foliage.

Mrs R. Kirkpatrick's second prize exhibit was in pink and old-rose shades with green containers arranged with brimble camellias, apple blossom in two shades, pussy willow sprays and coarse fern, the effect being delightful.

Mrs Innes Campbell also won first prize for her decorated table, a lovely dainty exhibit with a centre crystal bowl and four miniature crystal bowls containing pink flowering currant, camellias, hyacinths and cyclamen with delicate green winter roses and maidenhair fern.

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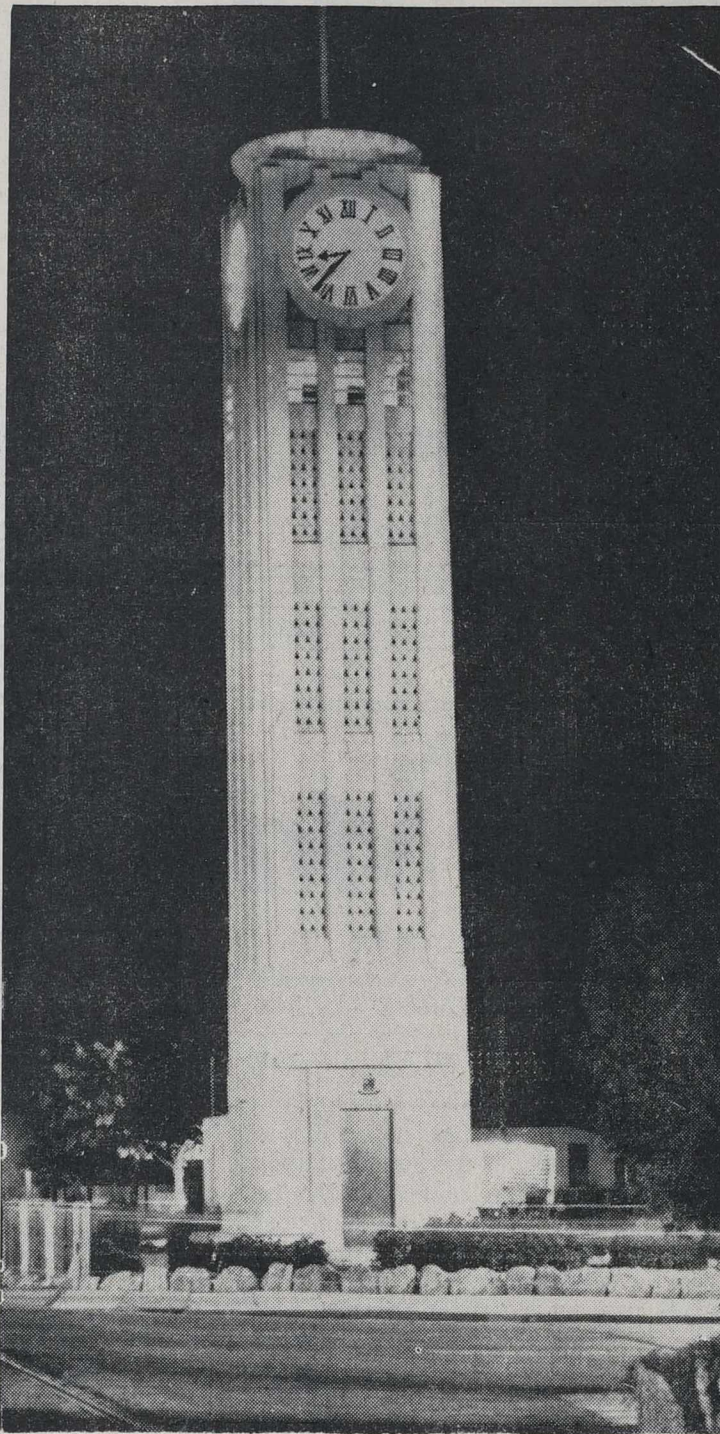

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FRUITGROWERS DISCUSS STATE MARKETING

Conference Delegates Report At Hastings Meeting

COOL STORE WANTED

A full muster of orchardists attended a general meeting of the Hawke's Bay Fruitgrowers' Association in Hastings last night to receive reports of delegates to the recent New Zealand conference at Wellington, and to discuss matters arising from the conference.

The most important topic was the disposition of the new season's fruit crop, and the marketing arrangements likely to be made.

In reply, Mr R. Paynter, one of the delegates, stated that Mr Nash had said he was not prepared to put forward a price proposal until he had seen the results from this season.

The other principal item was a resolution, moved by Mr A. L. Baumgart and seconded by Mr R. Paynter, which read: "That this general meeting of the Hawke's Bay Fruitgrowers' Association urge upon the Minister of Agriculture the extreme urgency of erecting up-to-date cool storage facilities in Hastings, more especially in view of the heavy pear crop now promising; and that a small sub-committee be appointed to interview Mr F. R. Picot, Director of Internal Marketing, in reference to this matter when next he is in this district."

Speaking in support of the motion, members made it clear that the question was regarded as one of great importance to the industry.

The opinion that the principle of Government marketing of fruit in the meantime was the only satisfactory method from the growers' point of view was expressed by Mr Paynter in his reply at the meeting.

"My own opinion is that Mr Nash's statement about growers making £1000 or more not receiving Government assistance was in the nature of an afterthought," said Mr Paynter.

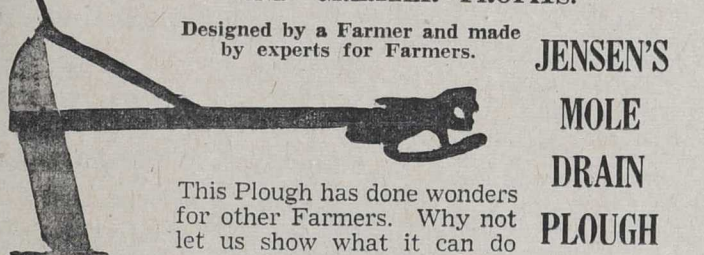
