RECORD "BAG" OF NAZI RAIDERS IN SUNDAY'S BATTLES

185 Enemy 'Planes Down Over England

Small Groups Of Bombers Attack London

BRITISH LOSSES SMALL

(United Press Association—Copyright.)
(Received September 17, 1.10 a.m.)

LONDON, Sept. 16.

It is officially stated that 185 enemy 'planes were destroyed on Sunday, of which 131 were bombers. This is believed to be a record "bag" for a day. Five of our fighters previously reported missing now have reported at their bases. Our losses therefore are 25 fighters, but 12 pilots are safe.

Air attacks on Britain were continued at night time by a succession of small groups of bombers. These attacks were directed mainly against the London area and surrounding districts. A smaller number also were made in other parts of the country.

The attacks on London were spread over a wide area. Houses, commercial premises and other buildings were damaged, also three hospitals. Two houses in south-west London were demolished by bombs last night. Several injured were extricated. It is feared that there were some fatalities.

A heavy bomb fell on a business building in central London and considerably damaged the two top floors and also shook a nearby hotel. Vast lumps of zinc from ventilators on the roof of the building were blown several hundred feet into a neighbouring street.

The official report states that in the afternoon raiders bombed several points in and around the London area and many in the south-east of England, causing small fires and damaging houses and industrial and municipal buildings. In eastern and north-eastern London casualties are not numerous. A heavy bomb hit one of London's oldest hospitals, completely wrecking the medical block and injuring the medical officer, but it missed the wards on either side. The patients had been removed to the basement earlier.

ENGINEERS' COURAGE BOMB TAKEN FROM NEAR ST. PAUL'S

Historic Church Saved Destruction

LONDON, Sept. 15.

An amazing act of heroism, the removal three days ago of a huge German time bomb, the explosion of which would almost certainly have wrecked St. Pauls Cathedral, is described in London.

The bomb, which fell at the west end of St. Pauls Cathedral, did not explode immediately, and the Bomb-Disposal Section of the Royal Engineers began to look for it.

They first found that it had severed a six-inch gas main, and three of the engineers were gassed. Then the gas caught fire, and the gas company employees were sent for to assist in the struggle to extinguish the fire.

Neither the Gas Company employees nor the Royal Engineers had any idea how close the flames were to the bomb. The fire was, however, extinguished, and the engineers went on with their job digging.

Eight Feet Long

They dug 27½ feet before they came to the bomb—and what a bomb it was! It was eight feet long, and weighed about a ton. It was set with fuses that made it deadly dangerous to touch, and its rush through the air and penetration into the soil had given it a high polish which made it slippery and difficult to handle. But it had to be handled. The engineers went on with the job. They secured it with special tackle and then two motor trucks were brought along, and very slowly and very carefully it was hauled out of the hole. At any moment it might have exploded.

Then all the streets in the vicinity of the route between St. Pauls and Hackney Marshes had to be cleared. This was a route of several miles. The bomb was then lifted on to the truck and Lieut. Davies, the commander of the Bomb-Disposal Section of the Engineers, got on to the truck and drove it as fast as possible to the marshes. It was then tipped, and it made a crater 100 feet across.

Had the bomb been left in position near St. Pauls, there is no doubt that it would have destroyed the masterpiece of Sir Christopher Wren and the seventh largest church in Christendom.

BRITISH BOMBERS DEAL WITH NAZI INVASION MACHINE

Barge Concentrations Effectively Smashed By Raiders

ENEMY SHIPPING ATTACKED

(British Official Wireless.)

RUGBY, Sept. 15.

Large forces of British bombers ranged on Saturday night over Germany, France, Belgium, and Holland, systematically seeking out and breaking up the German High Command's invasion machine. Flying through appalling weather—the aircraft were struck by lightning and radio aerials were burned off in a violent electric storm and many machines were iced up—the raiders struck heavily at the invasion's front line in the Channel ports of Holland, France and Belgium and attacked bases, railway junctions and transport centres in Germany whence come its reserves and supplies.

One of the night's most devastating onslaughts was made on Antwerp. Havoc was caused in the vast network of docks, warehouses and petrol sheds on the banks of the Scheldt and shipping lying in the stream as large forces of bombers dropped nearly 40 tons of high-explosive bombs and over a 100 incendiaries in an attack lasting from 11 o'clock until 1.30 a.m. on Sunday.

Port shipping, long-range guns, anti-aircraft batteries and searchlight concentrations at and around Calais were all bombed heavily from 8.30 until nearly 11. While some of the raiders attacked harbour and shipping concentrations inside it, others sought out the big guns nearby and started fires in these target areas.

A huge fire was begun after one aircraft had attacked barges in Calais Harbour and another pilot flying through cloud into the moonlight clearly saw and bombed the various basins.

Big Explosion

Bombs which burst on wharf buildings and barges in No. 6 dock suffered particularly severe damage. One pilot reported that some minutes after he had dropped high explosives among the barges there was a big explosion from the middle dock and flames shot upward.

Another said: "I could actually see my bombs burst right on a concentration of barges on the east side of No. 6 dock. The last two scored a direct hit on a 5000-ton merchant ship at the north end of the dock, and clouds of dense smoke began to come out of her."

"No. 6 dock was filled with barges and I estimate that there were about 300 of them."

One aircraft was held in the blinding glare of 10 searchlights. It was hit in several places and there was intense tracer fire. All the same, the pilot made his attack and hit the north end of the Carnot Basin.

Large numbers of barges were found in Ostend Harbour, where the defences have been considerably strengthened during the past week. Many barges were in the outer harbour and the main west dock and basin No. 1, and these were all bombed.

ENGINEERS DEAL WITH UNEXPLODED NAZI BOMBS

St. Paul's Saved From Destruction

LONDON, Sept. 16.

With pictures and prose the newspapers applaud the courage of the "suicide squads" who, under the more prosaic title of bomb disposal squads of the Royal Engineers, have dealt effectively with many delayed action bombs. The bomb removed from St. Paul's was one of the largest dropped on London.

The official account of its removal by a squad under Lieutenant R. Davies is among the most remarkable stories of the Battle for London. The Ministry for Home Security states: "Only the courage and tenacity of Lieutenant Davies and his men prevented St. Paul's from being levelled to the ground."

India Admires Britain

NATION'S BRAVERY Disobedience Will Be Curbed

GANDHI'S APPROVAL

BOMBAY, Sept. 15.

The executive of the Congress Party to-day passed a resolution withdrawing its conditional offer to co-operate with Britain in the prosecution of the war, and invited Mr Gandhi to resume the leadership of Congress. Mr Gandhi later told the All-India Congress Committee that he had received an invitation to interview the Viceroy.

If agreement were not reached on the constitutional position, said Mr Gandhi, he would seek freedom to carry on a strictly non-violent campaign against India's participation in the war.

He added: "I feel that even the fall of London or of England would not mean the defeat of the British people."

Mr Gandhi has approved of a resolution sympathising with the British. The resolution, which is to be submitted to the All-India Congress Committee, says:—

"Members of Congress cannot withhold admiration for the bravery and endurance of the British nation in the face of danger. Members of Congress have no ill-will towards Britons.

"The spirit of insistence on truth prevents Congress from doing anything to embarrass them. This self-imposed restraint cannot be taken to extend to self-extinction.

"Congress does not desire at present to extend non-violent resistance beyond what is required for the preservation of the liberties of the people."

RHODESIA AVOWS HER LOYALTY

Jubilee Celebrations 50-YEAR-OLD FLAG AGAIN FLOWN

Aid In War Effort

LONDON, Sept. 16.

The Governor of Southern Rhodesia has replied as follows to the King's message of congratulations on Southern Rhodesia's jubilee: "Your Majesty's gracious message was read by me to a large gathering at a ceremonial hoisting of the same flag which was hoisted here 50 years ago.

"Your Majesty's words of appreciation and encouragement were received with respectful gratification. They will inspire your Majesty's loyal subjects in this colony to unremitting endeavour to show themselves worthy of your Majesty's confidence and approval, both in the prosecution of the present war and thereafter when your Majesty's arms have achieved final victory."

AMERICAN TENNIS CHAMPIONSHIPS

AUSTRALIAN AID FOR AIR RAID VICTIMS

Many Thousands Given And Money Still Pouring In To Victorian Fund

MELBOURNE, Sept. 16.

Since Thursday, £130,000 has been subscribed in Victoria in aid of victims of the bombing raids on Britain. The organisers of the fund stated to-day that money was still liberally pouring in.

A collection taken in one group of theatres on Saturday night realised £1000. Suburban municipal councils are considering a plan to add one penny to rates and to give the proceeds to the fund. All newspapers have opened funds. The "Argus" already has raised £15,000 and the "Sydney Morning Herald" £7000.

Evidence Of Egyptian Confidence In The British Navy

Red Sea Control

Somaliland Withdrawal In No Way Affected Crossing

LONDON, Sept. 15.

The confidence which the Egyptian Government clearly places in the British Navy has enabled the Mecca pilgrimage, in which the faithful cross the Red Sea between Suez and Jeddah, to continue to be made.

The Egyptian Premier on Friday instructed all Mudirs and Governors to announce to the nation that persons desiring to make the pilgrimage should submit an application in the usual way.

The Egyptian Prime Minister (Hassan Sabry) by this decision gives further proof that the necessary withdrawal of British troops from Somaliland in no way reduced effective British control of the Red Sea.

ITALY PREDICTS QUICK VICTORY

Will Be In Alexandria In A Month

WAR IN THE EAST

(United Press Association—Copyright.)

ROME, Sept. 16.

It is reported in official circles that the Italians hope to reach Alexandria in a minimum of a month and a maximum of two months.

An R.A.F. communique issued in Cairo states: "In the Western Desert where Italian bombers were active on the night of September 13 our bombers made a successful attack on concentrations of enemy motor transport in the Sollum area.

"Bombs in one case fell on vehicles, a number of which were hit. In another case bombs fell among troops and vehicles, a fire being started."

In the Sudan enemy aircraft dropped bombs at Khoryabis in south-east Khartoum. No material damage was caused. Our aircraft made attacks on Gura Aerodrome, a direct hit being observed on the hangar and other buildings and a number of intense fires were started. Our bombers again raided Assab.

A Cairo communique states: "The penetration of Italian forces into the desert area evacuated by the British continues. Camps are being constructed in the neighbourhood of Birnum, seven miles south of Sollum. The enemy has suffered severe handling by aircraft and armoured fighting vehicles, and columns descending to the coastal plain at Halfaya suffered heavily from our artillery fire.

"While our casualties continue to be insignificant, the enemy is believed to have lost many men and vehicles. Another raid has been brought down by anti-aircraft fire over Mersamatruh. There is nothing to report on other fronts."

New Restrictions On Journalists

EFFECTS OF RAIDS IN GERMANY

LONDON, Sept. 16.

"The Times" publishes a report from Berlin stating that foreign correspondents have been informed that tours of inspection of bombed areas have ceased. Any correspondent attempting an unauthorised visit to these areas or sending out reports differing from the official accounts will instantly be expelled from Germany.

No correspondent can send out accounts of raids before the official story is dispatched.

The public also are prohibited from visiting bombed areas.

Insurance Building Destroyed

FIRM'S CABLE TO N.Z.

WELLINGTON, Sept. 16.

The New Zealand office of Wellington of a firm of insurance brokers has received from its London office a cable which admirably expresses the spirit in which the people of London are taking the terrific hammering which is being dealt them at the present time.

Last Thursday a cable from the London office of the firm advised that the building in which they were situated, which is only about 30 yards from the city end of London Bridge had been totally destroyed.

The manager in New Zealand immediately cabled the managing director of the London office expressing from the whole of the organisation in New Zealand sympathy and gratitude that the whole of the London staff was safe. The cable concluded by asking: "How can we assist you?"

This morning the answering cable, lodged in London on Saturday, advised that the London office was already reorganising. Their records are safe, and they have moved to a new address. The reply concludes: "You can only assist in the capacity of navy work. All are cheerful."

Hungary's Allegation

SECRET ORDER BY AUTHORITIES

LONDON, Sept. 15.

A semi-official statement issued in Budapest accuses the Rumanian Army of a ten-days' reign of terror against Hungarians living in the territories ceded to Hungary.

"Hungarian political circles were at first inclined to believe that the atrocities were the work of irresponsible, but the latest news suggests that a secret order was given by high authorities," says the statement.

"Hungary's regret at these events is heightened by the fact that Rumania is oppressing 700,000 Hungarians. The Rumanian-Hungarian crisis plainly continues."

BOMBERS' RAID ON BOULOGNE

Congratulations By Commander

RUGBY, Sept. 15.

The Commander-in-Chief of the Bomber Command, Air Marshal Sir C. F. S. Portal, to-day sent the following message to the Officer Commanding the Bomber Station where Polish squadrons which took part in Saturday night's raid on Boulogne are based: "Hearty congratulations to your Polish crews on the successful completion of their first operation on Saturday night."

Saturday night's successful attacks on Boulogne, in which the Polish bomber squadrons co-operated with R.A.F. units, was the first raid against the enemy to be carried out by Polish bomber crews operating from Britain.

The two squadrons from which the crews were drawn were formed only three weeks ago. The pilots who took part in Saturday night's raid are between 26 and 28 years of age, and like the members of their crews have all had previous fighting experience in the Polish Air Force.

Describing their raid on Boulogne an observer in one of the Polish bombers said: "The searchlight and anti-aircraft opposition was every bit as bad as we have been led to expect, but these aircraft of yours are good, and we were able to evade most of it. We saw our bombs striking the harbour works and bursting on the basins, and we came home very much happier than we had been for a long time."

Child Evacuees

MINISTER REGRETS DELAY

Information Awaited

WELLINGTON, Sept. 16.

No definite information is yet available of the probable date of the arrival in the Dominion of British children to be officially evacuated.

The Minister of Internal Affairs (the Hon. W. E. Parry) stated tonight that beyond advice that an evacuation scheme has been prepared and will be carried out, no other information could be given at present.

"The keenness of interest evinced in the scheme by New Zealanders," Mr. Parry added, "leads to very many inquiries daily by members of the community anxious to have children in their homes.

"I wish it were possible to let them have some definite news. This, however, will come later and the Government will be prompt in supplying it to the people."

STRANGE LETTER FROM NEGRO RELIGIOUS LEADER
'Father Divine' Mentioned In Australian Court Case

"AS I AM so will I you to be, as this leaves ME Well, Healthy, Joyful, Peaceful, Lively, Loving, Successful, Prosperous and Happy in Spirit, Body and Mind, and in every organ, muscle, sinew, joint, limb, vein and bone, and even in every fibre and cell of MY Bodily Form."
"Respectfully and Sincere, I AM, "REV. M. J. DIVINE
("Better known as FATHER DIVINE.)"
This extraordinary paragraph ended a letter from the famous American negro, Father Divine, to a firm of solicitors, says the Melbourne edition of "Truth."

When it was read over by Mr Justice Lowe in the Practice Court, his Honour winced several times and remarked simply: "Can anybody tell me what that last paragraph means?"
There was no reply, and the remarkable story of the will made by old and tiny Mrs Catherine McElroy, Melbourne, went on with its astonishing disclosures.
The old lady abandoned her own orthodox religious faith and became interested in spiritualism, but ultimately renounced that for the "teachings" of the American negro. When Mrs McElroy died, it was revealed that apart from a £250 legacy to her illegitimate son, and a gift of furniture to one of her executors, she left the residue of her £4000 estate to Father Divine.

"I do not desire," she said in her last will and testament, "to make any provision for my husband, John Henry McElroy, because he has for many years made no attempt to maintain me, or my two children, because I have already tried to make provision for them."
It was this clause on the old lady's will that brought it before the Court under the Testators' Family Maintenance Act.
Her widow and the two children made application to the Court for an order directing that some provision should be made for them out of the estate.
Naturally, Father Divine had to be advised of the contents of Mrs McElroy's will, and a letter together with a copy of the will was dispatched by the solicitors to the executors.
Back came the "Father's" reply, with its classic closing paragraph. It got away to a good start with the date line "May 23, 1940, A.D.F.D." This means Ann Dominant Father Divine.
Here is the letter:—
"... I received your letter and

the enclosure of the 12th of April and appreciate it, and for the sake of the deceased, her goodwill and endeavours, I will endeavour to comply with her wishes. Just now I cannot say that I could appoint a trustee over the estate for the children's home, but I acknowledge and accept and appreciate the good wishes of the person and persons who are concerned and will endeavour immediately to carry out the plan according to the wishes of the same when time and convenience permit.
"Although I do not receive love offerings, remunerations, donations and compensations for MY Spiritual Work and Service, as this is not for ME Personally, but for the benefit of others, and I AM appointed only as Trustee, I will endeavour to secure someone to take care of the interests, and the welfare of the said estate.
"Then Father Divine ends with the long paragraph in which he says, in effect, that he is doing well and hopes that the recipients are similarly situated.
In an affidavit Mr McElroy said that his wife became interested in the teachings of Father Divine.

Banquets For Followers
"She had the house painted and arranged seating accommodation at considerable expense," went on the affidavit, "and at many of the meetings she provided banquets for a large number of people."
In her affidavit, Miss McElroy said: "My mother told me that Father Divine's movement was the greatest ever known to the world." She said that Father Divine was the saviour of the world."
His Honour directed that lump sums amounting to £1600 be paid to the testator's survivors, so that after the payment of the testator's debts totalling £1715 and the deduction of costs there was not a great deal for Father Divine after all.

Raider Mistaken For Friend
MISSED OPPORTUNITY
Ship Believed To Have Sunk Turakina
Behind the mining of the Niagara and shelling of the Turakina by a raider may lie a story of a missed opportunity on the part of the captain and officers of a British merchant vessel, says the Sydney "Sun."
News has reached Sydney from New Zealand that a strange vessel was sighted near the Bay of Islands of one of the small islands of the lonely Kermadec Group, to the north of New Zealand.
The captain and officers mistook the vessel for a British ship that they knew well. They were bound from New Zealand to islands further north. Later during their voyage they saw the British ship and at once realised that the vessel near the island was a stranger.
On returning to New Zealand they reported the sighting and the circumstances placed a strong suspicion upon the stranger. But by that time the Niagara had been mined off the New Zealand coast.
In New Zealand, among merchantmen, there is a belief that the one raider accounted for both British ships, although the Niagara was lost on an enemy raider. The Turakina was not shelled until August 20.
Officers of one British vessel claim that they struck a mine just before the Niagara went down and that the mine did not explode.
One night, when close to the spot where the Niagara sank, they felt two bumps, one coming quickly upon the other from forward.
One of the mines recovered off the coast later had two of its horns missing. The detonators had failed to explode to the charge.
Referring to the presence of the raider in the Bay of Islands, the author of the "Crucible of the Sea Raider Wolf," who was a prisoner on the Wolf for nine months in the last war, said that although a raider would be more handicapped now than the Wolf was, by the greater development of radio, if the raider was an oil burner she would have a much greater cruising range than the Wolf, which used to strip ships' bunkers before sinking them.

"Bristling With Guns"
Another Sydney story says that a mystery vessel, "fairly bristling with guns," was sighted off the New Zealand coast on August 14 by an American ship. This was reported by a Sydney shipping agent, who returned from Tahiti in the liner "one of the Matson vessels which had been on an island cruise."
The sinking of the Turakina on August 20 by an enemy raider, the Tasman naturally aroused keen interest in Australia, and there was some caustic comment at the release of the news in New Zealand before the newspapers in Australia were allowed to mention it. The shipping official said the mystery vessel passed within ten miles of the American liner.
The line officers and passengers got a good view of the ship through strong glasses. She carried no identification marks or flags and was about 16,000 tons. Neither the raider nor the liner signalled each other or changed course. The sea meeting occurred when the American liner was about 26 hours from Auckland, from Suva.

WASTE WORDS ARE OUT
CHURCHILL WANTS CRISP REPORTS
Problem For Whitehall Officials
Officially the tendency towards bringing simplification of phraseology into effect is approaching a stage where it can be regarded as nearing completion.
Frederick, called the Great, bore up against a Europe in arms with a bottle of prussic acid in one pocket and a sheaf of bad French verses in the other.
Downing Street officials face a falling world with a gas-mask in one hand and a bundle of reports full of such words as "whitheries" as: "Enemy elements accentuated their pressure" in the other.
Recently the British Prime Minister (Mr Churchill) asked all Government departments to put reports simply and simply cutting out what he called "officialsese" language.
He wants brief, crisp paragraphs, and asks officials not to shrink from using a short, expressive phrase, even if it is conversational.
Mr Churchill wants to see an end of such remarks: "It is also of importance to bear in mind the following considerations" (any self-respecting official would write "relevant considerations"), or "considerations" (any self-respecting official would write "possibilities of carrying out effect").
Here again, the consideration would, in an official report, have to be either careful or comprehensive, or both.
Mr Churchill, who in his wordy youth spoke of a lie as "a terminological inexactitude," might well even now take an odd sip of his own medicine. In a recent speech, for instance, he said:—
"I have no hesitation in saying that this process of bombing the military industries and communications of Germany, and the air bases and storage depots from which we are attacked, which will continue on an ever-increasing scale until the end of the war, and which may in another year attain dimensions hitherto undreamed of, affords one of the surest, if not the shortest, of all roads to victory."
Or take this sentence from the official Admiralty account of the River Plate battle, belatedly issued in June by Mr Churchill's Government:—
"it would be difficult to over-estimate the difficulty of controlling a ship by this means during a fleet action, with personnel exposed to eight-inch gun blast."
Rear-Admiral Harwood, in his dispatch speaks of the efficiency and courage of his officers and men, but the official publication insists on personnel.
Finally, we are told: "These tactics were then exercised by the squadron."
How do you exercise tactics? You can use them, or practise them. What is meant is, perhaps, that the squadron then used these tactics.
Few politicians, or officials, could outline the tactics of a general, or a commander, Mr Churchill's predecessor, Mr Chamberlain, who reached a high level with this lucid sentence:—
"The unity of view of the participants in the conversations has been established regarding the exceptional importance of the present time of an all-embracing collective organisation for security on the basis of the indivisibility of peace."
On the same day that Mr Churchill gave his warning against wooliness in speech, Mr Hoye-Belshina told the House of Commons that the Italian advance in Somaliland "removes to a greater degree of improbability the long-awaited Abyssinian revolt." In fact, it makes the revolt less likely.
As another orator said: "That our present position is far from satisfactory will hardly be denied."
On the other hand, Mr Churchill's colleague in the Supply Committee (Mr Herbert Morrison) told the Prime Minister's precept into practice that very day. His example of how to do it included this sentence of a dozen words of one syllable each:—
"there are still gaps, but we are on top of the job."
But then it was Mr Morrison who found the motto for Supply in the words of the poet:—
He did not say:—
"Personnel must use the maximum exertions in order to produce the greatest possible amount of material."
Mr Morrison never had much education.
On this same day, the Foreign Office spokesman in far Japan said, if we are to believe a cabled report: "The action would be justifiable from the standpoint of geographical propinquity."
So near in spirit, and yet so far from geographical propinquity.
On the same day the Australian Prime Minister (Mr Menzies) was reported as having said in Canberra:—
"Before I entered the political maelstrom, and enjoyed a comparatively peaceful and substantial practice in the High Court of Australia, I had a complete file in my office of the decisions of the Supreme Court of the United States."
If Mr Menzies really said that, it was obviously not what he meant. That day, too, came the report from Gaza:—"The possibility that the Italian drive in East Africa may presage sterner work for the Allies has given a fillip to training."
Do the Allies really talk of presaging sterner work of of filips, a word which means a snap or blow with the end of a finger?
It may confidently be asserted, without fear of successful contradiction, that Mr Menzies' action presages the finalisation of a tendency towards the simplification of phraseology.

A WAR SAVINGS PLAN
PROVING POPULAR
IN AUSTRALIA

A big War Savings Certificates scheme inaugurated by the Australian Federal Government is proving the tremendous extent to which people in the lower income groups can assist in financing the Commonwealth's war effort. Already 10,811 war savings groups have been formed, with a total membership of 832,500.

A statement issued by the Australian Trade Commissioner in New Zealand explains that it was originally proposed that an objective of £10,000,000 should be set, to be attained by June 30, 1941. But the sales campaign, inaugurated to wards the end of May, met with such an immediate and widespread response that it was decided to raise the objectives to £15,000,000.

In under two months, more than two-thirds of that total was reached, purchases to the end of July having amounted approximately to £10,500,000—representing sales at the rate of about £206,000 a day since the campaign was officially opened.

Group schemes for the purchase of War Savings Certificates sponsored by companies, institutions and other large employers of labour have helped to swell the total materially. This form of voluntary financial sacrifice, which provides for the deduction of a certain amount each week from the pay envelopes of employees, is particularly valuable in that it means a direct contribution from current savings.

As in Australia, the people of Canada have been afforded the opportunity to lend their savings through purchase of War Savings Certificates. In its monthly letter for June, the Royal Bank of Canada emphasises that it will be of no service to his country for the depositor in a bank to use his balance to buy Savings Certificates or Government Bonds, if he does not accelerate and increase his savings.

There seems to be some misunderstanding, says the Royal Bank of Canada, as to the source of the funds which the Government may require. Sound finance demands that the principal source should be savings, and although past accumulations provide a good base from which to start, these must be supplemented and augmented by increasing current expenditures, particularly on non-essential goods, and withholding from use for consumption purposes the income from increased industrial operations due to the stimulus of war demand.

"This," the bank adds, "does not necessarily mean that persons previously unemployed and perhaps in relief, and others whose standard of living was formerly below the subsistence level, are not to improve their position, but it does mean that any increases in income which accrue as the result of the war effort should not be used for luxuries and pleasures which hitherto could not be afforded."

In Canada, as in Australia, there has been some criticism of the remarks of those who have urged the necessity for regulated spending in existing circumstances. The underlying thought in most of this criticism is that as long as unemployment remains, private spending should be maintained at a high level to keep business active and to increase employment.

Industry Lacks Skilled Men
AUSTRALIAN MINING

Coalmining in Australia is threatened in the near future with a serious shortage of skilled miners, according to evidence given before the Royal Commission on Pensions for Coal Miners by Mr. James Harle, a deputy, of Cessnock.

This situation, he said, was being created by the employment of miners over 60 years of age, because of the absence of a pension scheme. The result was that young men were not getting the experience they should.

If a pension scheme existed and men 60 years and over had to retire, youth would be absorbed in the industry and would gain greater efficiency. As matters stood today most youths were employed as trappers until they attained the age of 21 years and they were then dismissed.

Lack of Experience
"I do not know of any employee," added the witness, "who to-day has the same chance of getting the experience that I had. I was taken right through the industry, but the youngsters to-day do not get that experience."

Mechanisation had resulted in greater production but lessened employment. "I agree with mechanisation," continued the witness, "because I believe the machine should take the hard, laborious work, but it has certainly reduced the number of employees in the industry. If the men at 60 years of age were retired it would do away with the present system of putting off youths at 21, and would make for greater efficiency."

Nice Young Stock By Phalaris Horse

Commencing his third season at the Stud in New Zealand, the Phalaris horse Gynerium is one of the most improved entries in the district and when I saw him over the week-end I was agreeably surprised at his all-round development, since going to the Richmond Park Stud at Longlands. Since becoming acclimatised Gynerium has come down into a handsome stallion, showing great bone, splendid quarters and shoulders and a fine middle-piece. Gynerium is truly a magnificent and masculine horse and it is little wonder that Mr Alf Symes is pleased with his importation.

Gynerium is leaving his stock very true to type. His yearlings, most of whom were fairly late foals, are well grown and they display nice flat bone. His latest crop of foals is especially good and I was most impressed by La Moderne's first filly, who is not yet three weeks old. La Moderne, who won the St. Ledger in record time, is a great type of brood mare and she should produce something really good to Gynerium. Her previous foals were Gay Son, Gayest Son and the un-raced Travel Talk.

Painted Screen has a nice filly, though not as good as the La Moderne youngster, while the Chief Ruler mare Version foaled a fine filly recently, and an Onyx Brooch mare also has a brown filly.

Attractive Yearlings
Mr Symes has half a dozen good yearlings, two or three of which will be sent to the Gynerium's first batch at the 1941 National Yearling Sales.

The pick of these is a neat bay colt from Lila, a young mare by Gainscourt from Te Aupaki, the dam of that high class galloper Toxema. This youngster is full of quality and it will surprise if he does not make a great galloper.

The best paddock-galloper is a good-boned brown filly from the Lord Quex-Chantry mare Nimble. This filly handles well and should grow into an attractive youngster.

The brown colt from the King Mark mare Queen's Ferry, is a racy looking youngster. He is a bit on the leg, but has plenty of room for development and he leaves the impression that he would come to hand early.

WOMEN IN WAR TIME

Although in the midst of the hurly-burly of war in which we are living it is traditional and natural that the bulk of the rough work should be done by men, it is nevertheless necessary to pause at times to realise the nature of the unique services that are being rendered by women. There are departments of service to humanity wherein the mere man is nowhere and must stand humbly back to allow the woman to pass forward to her rightful sphere.

Perhaps the greatest service is being given by the devoted women and girls who serve under the banner of the red cross of St. George. They are close to the ugly realities of wounds, disease and death, and many of the things they do are comparable only to the things that are done by the men who, on the actual field of battle, have brought back the honourable scars of their conflict. It is significant that when the story of the Crimean War is recalled, the first fact that leaps to the mind is that it produced "the Lady with a Lamp." Many tributes are being paid to the work which women are doing in other ways to help along the cause which we all have at heart, but woman is at her best as a succourer of the suffering, and no praise is too high for the skilled and tireless services which are even now being rendered to the stricken as they come from the battlefields on land, at sea, or in the air or from the bombed areas where Death is sowing the red rain that will make the harvest of retribution grow.

Down the centuries man has been the dominating partner in human relationships. From the cave days he has been the fighter and the forger, the defender and the attacker according to his need or the pressure of circumstance. But equally long is the story of woman's instinct to assuage the wounds of the conflict, to bind up the hurts of the fallen, to use her gentle powers to bring back life from the jaws of death. Under the Red Cross, men are but the hewers of wood and drawers of water for the women who do the real work of healing. Without minimising the skill of our surgeons or physicians, or the strenuous work done by ambulance men, stretcher-bearers and the like, it can nevertheless be said that the work of all these is but preparatory to the patient, diligent and sleepless service of the women who must start where they leave off.

So much for actual war work on active service. In other fields of endeavour during the present conflict, women have earned and are earning enduring laurels. By her long training, the average woman is much better than the average man at arranging and organising those small details of the daily routine which may make such a difference in the aggregate of national effort.

At much sacrifice of time and trouble our women have rallied in splendid fashion to the call for service as sellers of the honourable badges indicating donations to the various fighting funds. They have organised themselves into committees for the collection and sale in "shops" of valuable products in the way of helping the war effort, and they have, by their constant and consistent courage and cheerfulness made it evident that within the limits of the work they are allowed or asked to do, they have stood in magnificently on the side of the cause of righteousness. They have made many other sacrifices which do not see the light of publicity. Their vivid imaginations visualise their men-folk wherever they are, and their instinct to serve those whom they love is something that goes far beyond the mere bounds of rules and regulations created by men. It is not too much to say that their mothering instinct applies even to those who make the rules and regulations and that the age-old principle that "love will find a way" applies to all their activities.

PARCELS FOR TROOPS DAMAGED IN TRANSIT

More Careful Packing Urged To Ensure Safe Delivery

By Telegraph—Press Association WELLINGTON, Sept. 16.

The Post Office again emphasises the necessity for securely packing parcels for soldiers serving overseas. Advice has been received from the base post office in Egypt that, while parcels are in the main received in good condition, a small number arrive damaged or with the address missing, due to being wrapped in flimsy paper and tied with thin twine.

When parcels are insecurely packed and wrapped the net result is waste of time and money by the sender and disappointment to the intended recipient.

It is desirable that parcels should be enclosed in strong calico, linen or canvas securely sewn up. Soft articles and perishable goods should be enclosed in tins with the lids soldered on.

Parcels should be addressed in block letters. It is most important that the number of the Echelon be included. In addition, a slip of paper bearing the complete name and address of the soldier and of the sender should be enclosed.

It is advisable not to include tobacco or cigarettes in post parcels for soldiers in Egypt as the addressees are required to pay a high Customs duty on such items.

Finally, the Post Office suggests that Christmas parcels for the forces in Egypt and England should be posted not later than during the last week in October to ensure delivery at the appropriate time.

RAIDERS TORN TO PIECES FIERCE DOGFIGHTS OVER LONDON

Hurricanes Hotly Attack Bombers

United Press Association—Copyright. (Received Sept. 16, 11.5 p.m.) LONDON, Sept. 15.

When the sound of dogfights was heard over London this afternoon, the air raid shelters emptied faster than they had ever filled. Bombs, fire, shrapnel, and machine-guns were completely forgotten, and cheers went up from every street when British fighter planes were literally tearing the raiding planes to pieces.

When they were again driven underground at nightfall, the people, who have passively resisted the most murderous onslaught ever aimed at a civilian community, had something tangible to grin about: they had seen with their own eyes a sample of the R.A.F.'s power, which was later expressed by the official bag for the day of at least 175 German planes.

London's skyline is unchanged after a week in which alarms have totalled no fewer than 70 hours. The fact that it is still possible to see the hackneyed phrase "St. Paul's silhouetted against the sky" is not the least of the Londoner's joys.

Survivors Meet Again Many of the raiders were turned back. The survivors were fought again over London. A general squadron after squadron of fighters flying fresh into action. Finally, they were chased back again and out over the Channel from whence they came.

A squadron of Hurricanes which destroyed nine of the enemy began the fight over London and ended up over the cliffs of Hastings.

Another chased a group of bombers over the Thames at Hammer-smith to Beachy Head, shooting down five on the way.

A formation of Hurricanes which caught some of the enemy just as they were coming up the Thames handled them so roughly that they piloted thought it unlikely that any of the bombers would reach home, five Dorniers being definitely shot down.

Divide Hurricane Pilot who took part in the first stage of this attack described the Dorniers broke formation, trying to dive for the clouds, pursued by Hurricanes. When the remaining Dorniers began their flight to the coast they were no longer a formation, but merely the centre of a general melee through which Spitfires and Hurricanes were flying at will, choosing whichever target pleased them.

The great air battles fought today made it one of the most costly days for the German Air Force for nearly a month, states the Air Ministry news service. During the day, between 250 and 400 enemy aircraft were launched in two waves against London and the south-east coast. The great majority of the German raiders that escaped were thwarted and harassed at all stages.

The first wave came in the morning about 11.30 a.m., when about 200 bombers and fighters began to cross the English coast in about eight or 10 different groups. They streamed in above the cliffs and beaches between Dover and Dungeness.

Smaller Attacks The second attack began about 2.15 p.m., when about 10 groups of bombers and fighters totalling from 150 to 200 crossed the same stretch of coast. Later in the afternoon two smaller attacks were made on the Portland and Southampton areas.

In every case, fighter patrols were ready to meet the enemy. The two main attacks on the London area received such a grueling answer before Spitfire and Hurricane squadrons, many of them veterans in the defence of London, fought them over the Kent coast, Maidstone, and Canterbury, above the Medway and the Thames Estuary.

WARPLANE LOSSES TO FRIDAY

Comparative warplane losses to midnight on Friday are as follows: Germany 4105, Britain 1244, Italy 126.

These Air Ministry figures, covering only definitely destroyed planes, must be added to the already announced destruction of at least 153 German and Italian planes by the Fleet Air Arm and warships' guns.

In the week Germany's blitz-bombing of Britain was carried out at a cost of 263 planes, many of which were bombers with multiple crews. Britain lost 62 defending fighters, but many pilots and gunners were saved. Even including British raiders lost over Germany and German-occupied territories, the British losses have only been 92 for the week.

SALARIES OF NURSES

TRAINEES HIT BY TAXATION

Hawke's Bay Hospital Board Comment

"I am of the opinion that nurses in training are entitled to an increase in their salaries," said the chairman (Mr. C. Lassen) at yesterday afternoon's meeting of the Hawke's Bay Hospital Board at Napier. With the 5 per cent increase in taxation the salaries of the young nurses had been greatly affected and the present rate of pay gave little inducement to girls to enter the profession, he believed.

The Hospital Board's Association of opinion of boards whether it was desirable to grant a general increase of 5 per cent to be made retrospective to August 12, to members of the nursing staff and other staff not covered by the order.

Mr. Lassen explained that the new nurses were affected far more than those who, with more experience, were receiving more adequate salaries. The trainees, he considered, should receive an additional 5 per cent annually to meet the extra taxation.

A proposal to this effect was moved by Mr. R. Harding.

In view of the benefits that the trainees were receiving nowadays in the interests of their careers, Mr. M. E. Edgley said he would be inclined to hesitate before paying the extra wages.

Mr. Wallace maintained that the board should not rush into making a decision in the matter, but should wait to see what boards in other centres were doing. After all, it was a national matter and in view of this the motion should be deferred.

The decision of Mr. Lassen it was decided to make a recommendation to the Hospital Board's Association that in view of the comparatively small salaries being paid to trainees the 5 per cent taxation from their wages be reinstated to them.

Mr. Harding's motion was held over pending a reply from the Hospital Board's Association concerning the matter.

LONDON'S NEW DEFENCE

BETTER NIGHT FLYING FIGHTERS

Nazis Fail To Shake Morale

British Official Wireless. (Received September 16, 12.45 p.m.) RUGBY, Sept. 15.

Both in the Press and among the general public, the latest phase in the Battle for Britain—the savage attack on the people of London—is the subject of much speculation both as to its purpose and the reason it has been adopted by the German authorities.

A number of conclusions are generally reached:— bombs indiscriminately over the metropolis, which no-one can imagine to be an important target in the purely military sense, is taken to be a confession of failure on the part of the Luftwaffe (German Air Force) to do substantial damage to the main centres of Britain's war production, to be a confession that the attacks which have been attempted on Britain's military targets have been too costly, and that the German Air Force is beginning to feel the strain of such heavy losses.

Weakest Point 2. That, having lamentably failed to inflict serious damage to Britain's war production, Germany has now turned the force of her attack against what she hopes will prove Britain's weakest point—namely civil morale. At the same time, London is the centre of communication, the centre of political life, and representative of the nation in a way which is true of the capital of no other country. By destroying London, the Nazis might well hope that the rest of the country would be paralysed and the way for invasion rendered easy.

But the morale of London so far is untouched, and everywhere the opinion is confidently expressed that it will require bombing on a scale vastly more widespread and more intense before the nerve of Londoners can be crushed, on a scale which the London defences will never permit the Nazi to achieve without inflicting terrible losses.

Many different weapons have been brought to the defence of London against the constant night raiders. There are night-flying fighters, of which, informed correspondents suggest, a superior new type is already in production; anti-aircraft guns capable of putting up a formidable barrage of fire and steel; and there are searchlights and barrage balloons of an improved new type which have already claimed one victim.

Damage to London certainly has been done and much suffering has been caused.

The general life of the capital proceeds uninterrupted, and the capacity of the people to adapt themselves to the new mode of life is astonishing.

Confidence is widespread in the power of Britain to defeat this last as she has defeated former methods of Nazi attack.

HIGH POST FOR SIR ANDREW RUSSELL

INSPECTOR-GENERAL OF N.Z. FORCES

Experience Will Be Useful

By Telegraph—Press Association. WELLINGTON, Sept. 16.

Major-General Sir Andrew Russell, of Taranaki, Hawke's Bay, has been appointed Inspector-General of the New Zealand Military Forces.

Regarding Sir Andrew's appointment, the Minister of Defence (the Hon. F. Jones) said that for some time the Government had been considering a programme of extending and strengthening the military forces. Seven army officers were engaged in organising, equipping

and administering the training of the much-increased Territorial army, as well as maintaining a regular flow of reinforcements for the forces overseas.

In order to assist these and to relieve the pressure of work, and at the same time to utilise fully his experience and capabilities, the Government had decided on Sir Andrew's appointment.

Other important changes were at present under consideration.

A Napier-Born Soldier

HARROW EDUCATION

Major-General Sir Andrew Russell, K.C.B., K.C.M.G., was born in Napier in 1868, and was educated at Harrow School, England, and Sandhurst. After Sandhurst he joined the Border Regiment in 1887, but resigned in 1892 to return to New Zealand, where he and Sir William Russell were in partnership at Taranaki.

In 1900 he joined the Mounted Rifles Volunteers, with the rank of captain, and in 1911 he was lieutenant-colonel in command of the Wellington Brigade.

At the outbreak of the war in 1911 he enlisted with the Main Body of the New Zealand Expeditionary Force as colonel of the Mounted Rifle Brigade, and the following year he took over command of the division with the rank of major-general. He served in Egypt, Gallipoli and France, returning to New Zealand in 1919.

Sir Andrew assumed control of Taranaki in 1909. This station is one of the best-known stud Southland farms in New Zealand, and also bred stud Friesian cattle.

"The New Zealand £100,000, which it is anticipated will be collected for the purchase of fighter aeroplanes for the Royal Air Force, will be allocated on a provincial basis to the United Kingdom Government will be asked to name the planes after the district where the funds are collected.

"In these circumstances, provided that the £6500, which you suggest, is raised in the Hawke's Bay district, you may be assured that the United Kingdom Government will be asked to name at least one 'Spitfire' to your district. No difficulty will arise regarding the remittance, and it is proposed to remit the £100,000, assuming the contributions reach this amount, immediately after the close of the appeal."

A survey of the Hawke's Bay Spitfire campaign is now being undertaken by Mr. Maddison, who is communicating with the mayors of other towns in the province to ascertain what sums have been collected in these centres. It is hoped that the campaign will be brought to a close at the end of this week.

At the crossing of the international dateline between Canton Island and Noumea, King Neptune, impersonated by Captain Beer, held his court and everybody had to submit to the usual initiation ceremony, which provided a great deal of fun for everybody.

Earlier the same day as the Clipper was passing south-east of Howland Island Mrs. Adams, as honorary vice-president of the Women's International Association of Women's nautics, cast into the sea a large wreath of bronzed mangrove leaves in tribute to Amelia Earhart Putnam, the American aviatrix who was lost in that part of the Pacific in 1933 with her co-pilot Fred Noonan.

"The seriousness of the position was emphasised by Mr. R. Harding who suggested that a letter be forwarded to the architects, requesting that preliminary work in connection with the Memorial Hospital building programme be expedited.

"The longer this work is delayed the more costly it will become," he added.

"It seems to me that we are not getting anywhere," commented Mr. S. J. McKee.

"This delay is a serious matter for the community and the board," said Mr. W. E. Bate, in suggesting that the chairman and the deputy chairman should make representation to the architects concerned.

TRAVELS IN THE NORTH (OF FINLAND DESCRIBED)

Country That Depends On Forestry As Its Main Industry

Some little-known facts about the Republic of Finland were recounted by Mr E. C. Boyes, headmaster of the Napier Intermediate School, in an address at yesterday's luncheon of the Napier Rotary Club. Mr Boyes, accompanied by Mrs Boyes, made a tour of Scandinavia about two years ago, and in a previous address had described the voyage up the coast of Norway.

Leaving the ship at the northern tip of Norway, they travelled by motor bus over 30 miles to the northernmost railroad in Finland. The road was entirely within the Arctic Circle, and they experienced sunshine for 24 hours of the day.

Reindeer were very numerous, some of the animals running wild being most handsome, with a huge spread of horn. The reindeers in captivity were, however, very poor specimens.

Finland had a population of 3,000,000, said the speaker, or about twice that of New Zealand. Only about one-tenth of its area was cultivated, the remainder being mostly forest and marsh land.

Most of the industries of the country were connected with forestry, and every river and lake seemed to be filled with floating logs. Mr. Boyes said he was impressed with the skill of the lumberjacks in making and breaking up log rafts.

MR. JULL STILL OBJECTS

ACTION OF NAPIER HARBOUR BOARD Ruled Out of Order By Chairman

A letter from Mr A. E. Jull, M.P., to the Minister of Marine was mentioned at yesterday's meeting of the Napier Harbour Board, when the chairman (Mr T. J. Gellie) ruled that reference to the letter was not in order.

At its previous meeting the board adopted certain amendments to its by-laws relating to pilotage and insurance of cargo. Mr Jull being the only dissident.

The question was raised at yesterday's meeting by the receipt of a letter from the Hon. W. E. Barnard forwarding ministerial approval to the proposed amendments.

Mr Jull then stated he had written to the Minister giving his reasons for objecting to the alterations, and said it was only fair that members should know the reasons for his objections.

"I rise to a point of order," said Mr P. F. Higgins. "Mr Jull is only looking for an opportunity for further propaganda. The by-laws have already been properly dealt with and with the Minister's acknowledgment and not with Mr Jull's protest."

The chairman upheld Mr Higgins' protest, stating that the matter had been properly dealt with and advertised, and notwithstanding Mr Jull's objection, it had received the approval of the Minister of Marine.

Mr Jull then said he would hand the matter to the press, as he was rather a good teller, he added amidst laughter.

Publicity Desirable The chairman agreed that the fullest publicity was desirable in such a case.

The following was Mr Jull's letter to the Minister:—"Hon. the Minister of Marine, "Wellington.

"Dear Sir,—The Napier Harbour Board, at its meeting on the 19th instant, adopted a number of amendments to their by-laws relating to pilotage rates, pilotage and other charges.

"I am a member of the board, and I was the only member present who opposed the resolution.

"I feel, however, that the unfairness of the proposed charges are so glaring that I am taking the course of protesting to you as Minister, against ministerial approval being given to these proposals, in particular the pilotage and wharfage rates proposed.

"At the July meeting of the board the chairman presented a report to members from which I will quote two or three paragraphs:—

"Pilotage: On page 4 of the report it was stated: 'The proposed revision of ships' charges includes the institution of compulsory pilotage and will increase the board's revenue from ships engaged in the wharfage trade.'

"For over half a century ships have been able to use the anchorage without being compelled to use a pilot. Any service performed by the harbour master by signals or otherwise are, however, paid for.

"The Minister of the chairman's report indicates the purpose of the by-law to be: to increase the board's revenue; there is not even a pretence that compulsory pilotage for vessels using the anchorage is necessary for the safety of the ships.

Additional Revenue "Wharfage: On page 4 of the chairman's report it is stated: 'In revising dues on goods the main consideration has been to obtain additional revenue in a manner that will impose wharfage increases on those goods which will receive the greatest benefit from the use of the new facilities.'

"The increase proposed are to be made entirely on export cargo which consists almost wholly of primary products, and will aggregate 10,500 per annum above the old rates.

"There are two portions of the harbour master's cargo which is shipped—one the Breakwater wharves new and building, and the Inner Harbour, which can only be used by lighters. These latter serve the ships at the anchorage and do not receive benefit from the new facilities; therefore, the major consideration alleged for the new wharfage rates does not apply.

Loading Charge "The goods from the Inner Harbour therefore, not only have to pay lighterage, but are to be subject to the extra rate of 4/- per ton on frozen meat, 6d per bale on wool, etc., the same as the cargo is charged where wharf loading without lighterage is practicable.

"The Harbour Board's Committee have advised the board that it is not practicable to allot for Napier loading only such ships as can make use of the Breakwater wharf. The extra wharfage on cargo from ships which cannot use the wharf is, I submit, quite unfair.

"Imports: A further paragraph in the chairman's report on page 4 says: 'As the bulk of imports have always come from the wharves and are not therefore subject to lighterage costs, it is not recommended that any change be made in import wharfage.'

"For the above reasons I do request you to withhold your approval to the proposed by-laws."

NAPIER'S FIVE TONS OF METAL

Useful Collection To Assist War Effort

SORTING IS UNDER WAY

"The response was really remarkable," said one of those responsible for the collection of scrap metal at Napier yesterday. It is estimated that about five tons of useful material was contributed, which will have the double effect of augmenting the Dominion's supplies of metal and of assisting the patriotic funds.

A large mound of metal, comprising every conceivable type of article, is now lying in the Borough Council's yards, where sorting is being carried out. Copper and brass are most in evidence, but there is no lack of aluminium, tin and other metals of paramount importance in the country's war effort.

It is estimated that the work of sorting will occupy about three days as each metal has to be kept separate, so far as is possible.

Brass ornaments and firescreens are plentiful, and it is evident that some family heirlooms will cease to be an eyesore in many homes from now onwards. An ancient radio set, complete with valves, lay among the other goods. In its day it probably cost a good sum of money, but now it is not even useful as scrap metal.

The recovery of the useful parts would be too difficult a task, it was explained.

A case from a 3-inch shell, evidently a relic of the last war, will go into the melting pot, along with shells from anti-aircraft guns, and with thermos flasks, electric heaters and a variety of metal separately made of lead, and a variety of other articles far too numerous to mention.

Aluminium pots and pans were there in profusion, some appearing almost new, and it was difficult to understand why these had been discarded.

Three pieces of aluminium were stated to be souvenirs from the first German Zeppelin raid down in the last war. In this case the Germans will be literally "getting some of their own back."

Some of the householders had shown great consideration in tying up each variety of metal separately an action which was appreciated by the men doing the sorting. Others had included unwanted items, such as torches and dry cells, cigarette and similar tins or old iron.

Householders who wish to make further contributions of metal may deposit it at the borough yards, using the entrance opposite Chaucer Road.

Many Years At Sea

VARIED LIFE ENDS Death Of Mr G. T. Cole

HASTINGS RESIDENT

Following a life in which he had spent most of his time at sea and on exploratory expeditions, Mr. George Thomas Cole, Hastings, died in Napier at the age of 86.

He was born at Bristol and became apprenticed to the printing and book-binding trade at an early age. Grippen by the love for adventure, Mr. Cole ran away to sea when only 15.

He sailed in all parts of the world on various sailing vessels and later went on the "Admiral" expedition up the Zambezi river, the party exploring parts of that country where white men had never previously penetrated. He then joined the White Star Line, and sailed in the "Eastland" to Africa.

Subsequently, he secured employment on the Mersey docks and harbour lightships. He was later appointed to the Liverpool landing stage, where he became a senior stowager. This position he held until his retirement in 1921. Three years later he came to New Zealand settling in Hastings.

Mr. Cole is survived by three daughters, Messrs. J. H. Philpott, Hastings, H. J. Maulder, Puketapu, and T. F. Killen, Wairoa.

The funeral took place yesterday at the Hastings Cemetery.

(Daily Mail Special Service.) AUCKLAND, Sept. 10.

Beau Leon confirmed the good impression he made in winning the Champion Hack Plate on the opening day, when he outstayed the opposition in the Avondale Guineas, a performance which leaves the conviction that he is the best staying colt of the season in Auckland province and the district's main hope against Sir Beau in the Derbies.

A half-brother to Princess Bede and Galilee (Avondale Stakes), Beau Leon is bred by his owner, Mr E. H. Cucksey, and he wound up last season's racing with a win over six furlongs at Avondale. This term he has run second at the Pakuranga meeting and scored two wins at Avondale this week-end in as many starts.

Lou Rosa, who was the champion two-year-old at the early part of last season, showed a return to form by finishing strongly down the middle of the track to take second money. He made up a lot of ground in the last quarter and should be borne in mind for the approaching meetings.

Sir Cameron improved his position across the top and momentarily threatened danger when he made a dab on the rails soon after they straightened up, but had to give way to Lou Rosa in the last few strides.

Saturday's impressive winner, Marshall Hall, tried to lead all the way, but he was throwing out distress signals a long way from home and he just struggled on for fourth money from Grandora, who did not appear to have a clear run as they came into the straight.

Phaloron occupied a prominent position on the outside of Beau Leon for six furlongs, but he failed to run on and Happicoat came up to beat him for sixth position. Rich Blood led to the straight and then stopped in a few strides, finishing a bad last.

The honours were all with Beau Leon for he gave nothing a chance in the final stages of the race. Furthermore, he appears to be thriving on his racing.

ROYEVURUS was ridden a quiet race in the Plumpton Handicap and his run was delayed until well into the straight, where he ran past Floodie and Flying Ace and immediately tackled the pace-maker Sly Fox. The last-named hung on gamely, but Royevurus had his measure below the distance and he won going away. The Surveyor horse is in great order for the approaching meetings and can be expected to go on improving.

Royal Lancer, who downed the hot favourite Pleading in the maiden event at Ashburton on Saturday, is a four-year-old gelding by Irish Lancer from Winsome Sister. He was four times placed last season.

Colombo Bay's form at the Avondale meeting was very disappointing. This Phaloron Bay filly looked as if her race in the Wanganui Debutante Stakes would have improved her, but it appears to have had the opposite effect.
