Unabated Fury In Third Week Of Nazi Raids

LONDON'S STREETS EMPTY ON SATURDAY

Extensive Attacks Throughout England

(United Press Association-Copyright.) (Received Sept. 23, 0.5 a.m.)

The blitzbombing of London entered the third week with unabated fury. The nocturnal blasting from guns and bombs and the usual visitation shortly after nightfall on Saturday provided the now familiar scene of completely empty streets. The sky was lit by flashes and heavy detonations were heard.

The raid began after a brief preliminary in which 60 or 70 raiders attempted to fly up the Thames Estuary. Some penetrated to the western and south-western suburbs and dropped bombs. Another batch of 50 Messerschmitts on the south-east coast turned tail without fight on the appearance

London's second raid seemed to come in from several directions. The bombs started fires, none of which survived an hour. A raider is believed to have been hit and exploded in mid-air over the western suburbs.

The night raids were extensive over the south-east of England. Bombers raided 20 towns and villages. They also attacked a number of north-eastern towns and visited the south-west and north-west.

Australian Labour's Chances

(United Press Association-Copyright.) (Received Sept. 22, 10.30 p.m.) SYDNEY, Sept. 22.

The loss of four Government seats to Labour, with good prospects of Labour winning six other Government seats and the loss of three Labour seats to the Government, was the conclusion reached when the counting of votes in the Federal election ceased early on Sunday morning. There is a possi-bility that two other Labour seats may also go to the Government. Labour expects to gain considerably from the soldier votes when they are counted.

If Labour wins all the seats in which there is doubt, it would have a majority in the House. A gain of seven seats would place the parties as follows:—
Labour 39, United Australia Party and United Country

However, the position is so doubtful that the present Government may be returned, but with a small majority.

There was a definite swing to Labour in New South

Wales, but this was not apparent in the other States.

The outstanding feature of the polling was the reverse suffered by the "new blood" candidates who stood under the United Australia Party banner.

It appears that the Prime Minister (the Rt. Hon. R. G. Menzies) will secure an absolute majority in his electorate, Kooyong, but the Postmaster-General (Mr Thorby) will probably lose his seat at Calare. The seats of all the other Ministers seem safe. Even Sir Frederick Stewart, at Parramatta, who was hotly opposed because of his administration of the Department of Supply. has a good majority.

The former Premier of New South Wales (Mr B. S. B. Stevens), who was hailed by the United Australia Party as the coming Federal Treasurer, failed badly against the sitting Labour member for the Lang electorate.

a letter received from an unnamed Norwegian shipping magnate describing Germany's recent plans to invade England, in which, he asserted, Hitler was reputedly willing to sacrifice 80 per cent. of his attacking force for the purpose of establishing a bridgehead.

He said that the Germans had requisitioned 10,000 Norwegian and other hulls, the motors of which were being maintained in immaculate repair. They had installed wheels in the bows of the boats to enable them to be driven ashore at enable them to be driven ashore at full speed carrying 35 men.

Each German would wear British uniform, he reported.

The Germans plan to approach the British Isles from all directions whenever the weather is foggy, concurrently with 11,000 aeroplanes. The Germans calculated that the invasion would be successful if 20 per cent. of the attackers landed, although they anticipated that 50 per cent. would succeed.







MR NASH AND THE MOTOR INDUSTRY

In his reply to the demand for a more liberal petrol ration, Mr Nash covered familiar ground and again took the stand that the restrictions imposed were vital to New Zealand's war effort. It would have been more satisfactory if he had been able to state publicly what were the stocks, the consumption, and the storage capacity of and for motor

spirit in the Dominion, but we must accept his assurance that in the public interest the information must be withheld.

We do not question Mr Nash's sincerity. As Minister of Finance, he has the most difficult and responsible job in New Zealand to-day. Few would have the courage to offer to change places with him. It is much easier to find fault with what he does, and it says a good deal for his courage and steadfastness that he faces up to the blast of hostile criticism and cannot be deflected from his purpose, which is to provide the means of financing our participation in the war, without unduly disorganising the Dominion's internal economy.

There may be a heaven-born financier concealed amongst the rank and file in the House of Representatives, but Parliamentary debates have failed to reveal him, and looking back over the past twenty-five years, it is fairly safe to say that in point of ability Mr Nash is head and shoulders over most of his predecessors. It does not follow, however, that he is always right, and the stronger the personality of a Minister, the greater the danger that he may be a bit ruthless-and Mr Nash is all that. His hand has fallen heavily on the motor trade, and unless Cabinet can find a way of easing the situation, the losses to one of the largest industries in the country

will be staggering in their magnitude. As we pointed out on Friday, the jobs of over 8000 workers are directly affected, and the numbers indirectly concerned must be far larger. Apart from the scanty petrol ration, which has curtailed motor transport so severely, the embargo on imports and the failure to provide the motor engineering shops with alternative work must inevitably spell ruin to businesses that have taken years to build up. In England, the motor manufacturers have turned their plants over to Government work, and in some cases are operating with two or three shifts daily. Ours are almost idle and men are being discharged in hundreds. New Zealand is paying very dearly for its failure to develop an iron and steel industry, but even though the raw material had to be imported, we do not see why our engineering shops could not be given munition orders for parts which could be shipped to England for assembly. Australia is not only shipping large quantities of iron and steel to England, but is filling huge orders for munitions, and the effect of this on Australia's foreign exchange position is obvious.

No country can wage war on a large scale unless its war expenditure is mainly within its own borders and has the effect of keeping its own nationals in employment. Our war effort is based too largely on the volume of our primary production, and our machine shops, which ought to be in it "boots and all," are reduced to the position of spectators, whose ordinary business threatens to disappear "for the duration." In justice to the Minister of Supply, who must also be an overworked man these days, it is only fair to say that neither he nor Mr Nash should be held wholly responsible, but it is a matter for Cabinet to consider and see what can be done about it.

SOLDIERS' LEISURE TIME

We in New Zealand know something of what it means to scan the news horizon for tidings of battle; but what must it be for our men overseas, who are close to the epoch-making events and within actual hearing distance of the fray? Soldiers of the last war recall that the most difficult of their experiences were those long periods of enforced inactivity which nevertheless demanded constant and unflagging alertness. They constituted possibly a greater nervous strain than an actual battle.

It is good to know, therefore, that the account of the New Zealand and other soldiers' "grouse" against inactivity has been answered almost at the same time as it has been uttered, by the assurance given by Mr Anthony Eden, Minister for War, that everything is being done to fill up the waiting time by the provision of interesting occupation and entertainment.

Some of us here may be inclined to think that the longer the period of the soldiers' boredom lasts, the better it will be for the ultimate good of the world, but it is good to know that that period is being enlivened by sound psychological means so that the soldiers' time, in one way or another, will be fully occupied.

Fifth-period import licences will be issued next week, said the Minister of Finance (the Hon. W. Nash) to-day. The schedules will provide for increases in some commodities and corresponding reductions in other lines, chiefly luxuries.

The Minister said that he had spent the past week in consideration of the schedule. It had been found desirable to make increases in certain lines which were valuable in production or which were wanted in New Zealand because they were vitally necessary and could not be made here. He could not indicate specifically what type of goods would be affected by the increase.

Overseas Reserves

Discussing import control generally, Mr Nash said that, due largely to fortuitous circumstances, New Zealand had been able to build up substantial sterling reserves and other overseas credits. Many people oelieved that New Zealand could aid Britain in her war effort by taking more British goods as well as sending more New Zealand products to Britain, but the truth of the matter was that Britain did not want credits in New Zealand; she wanted them in foreign countries where credits would do more good.

"I venture to say that nine out of ten people in New Zealand would want the Dominion to send Britain all she wanted, even if Britain could not pay," declared the Minister. "We can help Britain by taking imports of commodities of which she has a surplus, but Britain certainly does not want New Zealand to take other products which could be more effectively disposed of in foreign markets."


