London Skies Splashed With Metal

MAMMOTH BATTERIES IN ACTION

Nazis Forced To Fly High

LONDON, Sept. 26.

London's barrage was splashing the sky with metal ceaselessly for hours last night while the raiders were doing their utmost to reach the central area. The wisdom of the millions who have adjusted their routine to enable winding up the day's doings before dark was justified when the guns blazed almost as soon as daylight had left the sky. The raiders opened the nineteenth night attack with the usual battle with the ground defences. They first attempted to come into central London from the north-west and south. Single planes, apparently testing the vigilance of the guns, took no chance with the capital's mammoth battery and flew higher than usual in an effort to evade the terrific response from below. Londoners underground felt the city shaking as the guns gave a hot reception to the early scouts. Night raiders were over Wales, the north-west and the Midlands and dropped many bombs, particularly in a north-west town, which experienced its 121st raid since the outbreak of the war. The Air Ministry states that 26 raiders were shot down yesterday.

An Air Ministry communique says: "The enemy continued its offensive, dropping many bombs on parts of England and Wales but London and suburbs surrounding that district bore the brunt of the attack. Fires were started in several London areas but were soon under control. Towns in the south-east of England were also bombed, with some damage but few casualties. Soon after midnight on Tuesday the Nazis launched one of the most frenzied air attacks yet made on London. Sections of the raiders sought out an important part of central London and also a famous shopping area. They first rained down hundreds of incendiary bombs and circled round their targets, and then dive-bombed, swooping recklessly under the balloon barrage, and joined in a series of furious attacks. Valuable stained-glass windows were blown in at an historic central London Church. A bomb blew out the interior of a bank a few yards from the church.

Ring of Fires
Fire bombs dropped in Central London started a ring of fires with a radius of a quarter of a mile, six of which were blazing simultaneously, enveloping a college, business premises, and furniture depositories, in which there were highly inflammable goods. Many nearby buildings were evacuated. Fire-fighters worked on through a hail of shrapnel. Daylight found only the shells of buildings standing in one well-known street, and the walls continued to collapse in clouds of dust, debris, and smoke. In a south-west suburb, a line of three shops were wrecked. The adjoining three were wrecked a few nights ago. A particularly heavy high-explosive bomb caused great damage and many casualties in one of London's most popular centres, while residential areas elsewhere were again damaged.

Bristol Bombed
Renewing their daylight raids on a scale bigger than on any day since September 15 (when 185 of their machines were shot down) the Germans to-day made the city of Bristol, instead of London, the main object of concentrated attacks. A special communique issued last evening states: "Enemy aircraft crossed the Dorset coast and attacked Bristol. Bombs were dropped near the coast and on the outskirts of Bristol, causing some damage and killing and injuring a number of people. There was also some minor enemy activity over south-east England, but reports indicate little damage and few casualties. Selfridge's in the West End is among several departmental stores which have suffered damage in the course of recent enemy night bombings.

Expected Agreement With Japan
Authoritative Tokyo advices state that Italy is becoming a signatory to the Japanese-German alliance, which thus far has not been ratified but agreed to in principle.

Soul Of India Threatened By Nazism

FREEDOM IMPOSSIBLE WITHOUT VICTORY

The Minister of India (the Hon. L. C. M. S. Amery), in a speech to the Overseas League at London, referred to the meeting which Gandhi will have with the Viceroy of India in the next few days. "One can only hope," he said, "that the outcome of the discussions may be an agreement consistent both with Gandhi's conscientious objections to war in general and with the Viceroy's no less conscientious conviction and duty to allow nothing to stand in the way of India's whole-hearted effort to play a part in the struggle which concerns her present welfare and security and all the ideals her peoples hold dear."

Dealing with the constitutional position, Mr Amery said that the main, permanent framework of the future constitution of India as a Dominion was now a matter for Indians to settle for themselves. "The whole constitutional field is open to re-examination," he stated. "Only, as in the case of every Dominion, there must be that measure of agreement between the main constituent elements that have in future to live and work together which is a preliminary condition to free self-government."

Nazi Doctrines
"It is obvious that a change so far-reaching cannot take place at a moment when the whole commonwealth is in the throes of a struggle for its existence." He added that the Nazi doctrine of direct attack upon the spiritual basis of all religion "is as profound as it is opposed to Islam, with its insistence on the equality of all men before God, or to Hinduism, with its deep-seated hatred of violence and cruelty, as it is to Christianity. The Nazis' onslaught threatens the soul of India as it threatens ours, and there is no India who does not realise that menace."

German Armoured Cars In Spain

SURPRISE DECISION

War Against France Not Desired

POSITION EXPLAINED

LONDON, Sept. 25.

It is authoritatively stated that General de Gaulle, leader of the Free French forces, has decided to abandon his operations for the occupation of Dakar, French West Africa. It is understood that the decision was made because the operations threatened to develop in a direction not envisaged when the expedition was launched.

The British Ministry of Information states that to pursue the action would lead to a major operation of war. It was not the intention of the British Government or of General de Gaulle to cause bloodshed among the French forces.

It is learned (says a British Official Wireless message) that the British force which accompanied General de Gaulle to Dakar to lend him support is now being withdrawn following the general's own withdrawal of troops and ships. This fact was revealed by a Ministry of Information statement detailing the circumstances leading to the Dakar expedition.

The statement says: "General de Gaulle had reason to believe that a large proportion of the French population of Senegal supported the Free French Movement and would welcome his arrival and a similar situation might be established there to that which exists in French Equatorial Africa. He therefore proposed to Britain that he should proceed there with some of the troops at his disposal, with the goodwill and support of Britain. Britain was all the more ready to afford General de Gaulle this support as information had reached the Government that German influence was spreading to Dakar."

No Hindrance
"Meanwhile, while the expedition was on its passage the Vichy Government dispatched three cruisers from Toulon, which passed through the Straits of Gibraltar and eventually arrived at Dakar. It is no part of the Government's policy to interfere with the movements of French men-of-war as long as they are not destined for any port under German control."

"For this reason, no hindrance was put in the way of the vessels passing through the Straits of Gibraltar."

"When, having done so, they pursued a southerly course, they were permitted to proceed. They therefore reached Dakar without interference. "When they later put to sea again, steering south, it was thought that they were intending to intervene in the situation existing in French Equatorial Africa which had already declared for General de Gaulle. Ships of the Royal Navy intercepted their passage and insisted on their reversing their course, which they eventually did, two of them returning to Dakar and the third, which was suffering from engine trouble, being escorted by one of His Majesty's ships to Casablanca."

Attempt to Land
"On the morning of September 23," the statement adds, "emissaries of General de Gaulle, flying the Tricolour and the white flag, attempted to land at Dakar and met with a hostile reception. They were on and seriously wounded. The port batteries opened fire on one of General de Gaulle's warships, and subsequently on his Majesty's ships, which were standing by in order to render General de Gaulle support and assistance if needed."

"Before returning the French fire, the admiral commanding made the following signal in plain language: 'Will be compelled to return fire unless your fire ceases.' As the fire of the shore batteries did not cease, it was returned, and both His Majesty's ships and the shore batteries scored hits and incurred casualties."

Submarine Attacks
"The British naval commander warned the French authorities that the French submarines would be engaged if they left harbour. In spite of this warning three submarines made attacks on our ships and active measures had to be taken against them, with the result that two were sunk, but the entire crew of one were fortunately saved, and they will be repatriated at the first opportunity."

"The forces of General de Gaulle attempted to make a landing, which was not successful, and, when it became plain that only a major operation of war could secure a landing at Dakar, it was decided to discontinue hostilities, as it had never been the intention of the Government to enter into serious warlike operations against Frenchmen who felt it their duty to obey the commands of the Vichy Government. General de Gaulle himself was most anxious that he should not cause bloodshed to his fellow-countrymen. The forces concerned, therefore, are now being withdrawn from the region of Dakar," the statement concludes.

NAZIS HOODWINK FRENCH IN MOVES TO GAIN DAKAR

Keypoint In Hitler's Web Of Crooked Strategy

ESSENTIAL TO "NEW ORDER"

"The events in Dakar," says the "Yorkshire Post," "must be viewed as part of a wide web of strategic manoeuvre stretching from Africa through the Mediterranean to Indo-China."

"In the view of the Axis Powers and Japan, the French Colonial Empire is ripe for dissolution. Germany and Italy mean to use some of it for establishing a new order in Africa and the Near East; Japan dreams of a new order in Asia, which will include the Dutch East Indies and perhaps the Philippines. The privileges she is trying to secure in Indo-China are not required merely to help her war on the Chinese."

"These far-reaching prospects are hidden from the people of France, who are told that the Vichy Government is determined to keep the French Empire intact. All the men at Vichy, in fact, are doing is to preserve all they can for the convenience of the aggressor countries, whose intrigues they are powerless to restrain."

"Ribbentrop's visit to Rome was concerned with Axis plans for action throughout the vast area from Syria to Dakar. Senior Sauer in Berlin is receiving instructions as to the role mapped out for Spain in these ambitious undertakings. She is to be given territory in French Morocco in return for assisting the assault on Gibraltar."

"Mussolini wants Tunis and Syria from France, together with Egypt and the Sudan. West Africa is preserved for Hitler. He would then be able to look across the Atlantic towards the Americas, a prospect which the "New York Times," writing on Dakar, has not overlooked. He would be well placed also to set about 'liberating' South Africa, with General Hertzog's aid."

"Dakar is the keystone to these widespread schemes. If General de Gaulle's action eventually turns out well not only will West Africa be saved for France but the rest of the French Colonial Empire will be powerfully influenced to abandon the useless protection of Vichy."

PROUD TO FIGHT FOR LONDON

CANADIAN SQUADRONS IN ACTION

Fine Reputation Against The Nazis

The reputation of the Royal Canadian Air Force has been further enhanced by details of its participation in the air battles over England given by the Air Ministry News Service, which says: "One of the German bombers, a Dornier 215, was attacked by two Hurricane pilots of an R.C.A.F. squadron. When they came back to their base they found Air Marshal Bishop, V.C., a famous Canadian fighter pilot of the last war, and now Director of Recruiting for the R.C.A.F., waiting to meet them. Between them Canadian pilots were slightly disappointed that they could not say they had destroyed the enemy, because they had not been able to see it drop into the sea, but a few minutes later a message came through from a Coastguard station that the Dornier had been seen to plunge into the Channel."

100 Successes
Six times during the past fortnight Canadian pilots fighting with the R.A.F. have helped to save London from attack. Between them these Hurricane squadrons—the original "All-Canadian Squadron" of the R.A.F. formed in England and a squadron of the Royal Canadian Air Force formed in Canada—have already destroyed more than 100 of the enemy. Well as the All-Canadians did over Dunkirk, much of their fine fighting has been over the streets, docks and houses of London. The Royal Canadian Air Force Squadron, which came into action in August, has done all its fighting on home defence. In their last six flights the All-Canadians have now destroyed 55 of the enemy against the loss of only two of their own pilots. The R.C.A.F. Squadron, more newly arrived, is proud that it came to England as a complete unit with Canadian-built Hurricanes, a full supply of spares and its own motor transport. Eighty-three of their ground staff learnt their knowledge of fighter aircraft under the Emboire training scheme. Like all the Canadians, the R.C.A.F. Squadron is proud to have fought for London.

NORWEGIANS REFUSE TO TOE THE LINE

GERMANS ADOPT STERNER MEASURES

Royalty Is Exiled And Politics Suppressed

OSLO, Sept. 25.

The German Commissioner for Norway (Franz Terboven) in a broadcast admitted the failure of the negotiations to bring the Norwegian political parties into line with the German demands. For this reason the Germans had issued the following three decrees:—

(1) The Royal House is abolished and the Royal Family and Norwegian Government abroad permanently exiled.

(2) A German-controlled State Council of 13 members has been appointed.

(3) All political parties are dissolved. Terboven said that the political parties had hitherto prevented the people from learning the truth about the German aims and had consistently aimed at a pro-British reorientation.

It is officially stated at Helsingfors that Finland has permitted the transit of German troops and supplies into North Norway. Finland's action is similar to the Swedish-German arrangements made in July.

Route to Narvik
The arrangement is apparently designed to give a safer route for German troops to Narvik owing to the heavy losses suffered from attacks by British submarines on transports.

The British Minister to Helsingfors (Mr. G. G. M. Vereker), has been instructed to protest strongly to the Finnish Government against its action (says a British Official Wireless message). This Finnish action constitutes a clear breach of neutrality and international law.

The Helsingfors correspondent of the "Daily Telegraph" says that great military activity is reported from Northern Norway. Strongly-reinforced troops are occupying important points up to Kirkenes, near Vadsø, at which there is an extensive works for the extraction of iron ore. The haste with which the invaders are improving railways and roads, says the correspondent, shows that considerable importance is being attached to the district.

British reconnaissance and bombing flights to North Norway are being intensified.

It is reported from Gibraltar that 100 French planes from Morocco yesterday afternoon subjected the Rock to the most severe attack since the outbreak of war. They dropped about 300 bombs of various sizes, many falling in the sea and on barren areas. Buildings, roads and old defences were considerably damaged but little damage was done to military works or personnel.

A small ship was hit and sunk. There were a number of civilian casualties, some fatal. Anti-aircraft guns shot down three and possibly five planes. A number of bombs fell in La Linea, in Spain.

It is reported from La Linea that planes circled The Rock in waves of ten for over two hours. Smoke enveloped the arsenal and flames leapt from the base. Many fires were observed. The Havas agency reports that 100 tons of bombs were dropped on Gibraltar.

Italian Shot Down
One Italian plane was shot down and two damaged in a raid on Malta. Another was seriously damaged and is unlikely to reach its base.

This was the second raid; the first was made on Tuesday. To-day's raid lasted 2½ hours. It is officially stated at Gibraltar that 20 or more planes of a French type dropped 100 bombs from a height of 20,000 feet on Tuesday, killing four and injuring 12 people. Anti-aircraft guns from the ground and warship, shot down at least one plane. One raid lasted four hours. It was the longest yet.

INDO-CHINA CHEERED

Must Remain Independent Of Nazis

CONFUSED WAR REPORTS

NEW YORK, Sept. 26.

The "Daily News" says that the Indo-Chinese representative in Washington (Colonel Jacomy) is going to Hanoi by air bearing promises of help short of war from the United States, including permission to buy war materials conditional on Indo-China fighting effectively and remaining independent of Nazi influences. The "Daily News" added that the French General Decoux had expelled the fears that he is a Nazi puppet. It is now hoped that he will lead the fighting and inspire the remainder of the French colonials.

The Domei Agency correspondent at Langson states that an amicable agreement has been reached on the spot and hostilities have ceased. The Domei Agency's southern China correspondent says it is officially announced that the Japanese forces landed peacefully near Hainan this morning.

The Central News Agency says that Chinese troops are preparing to enter Indo-China. The Chinese Foreign Office has instructed the Hanoi consulate to arrange the urgent evacuation of Chinese from Indo-China, also to negotiate compensation for all Chinese losses as a result of the fighting.

Border Battle
It was earlier officially stated at Hanoi that border fighting between the French and Japanese in Indo-China was continuing along a 50-mile front centred on Langson. The reports were that the Japanese vanguards had reached Khe along the Langson-Cao Bang highway, and also that they had reached the vicinity of Lac Binh along the Langson-Mokay highway.

It was officially announced at Hanoi that the French withdrew from Langson while the Japanese were encircling it with superior numbers. The French Foreign Ministry meanwhile, announced that General Nishihara, leader of the Japanese mission to Indo-China, had negotiated a termination of the Japanese aggression at Dong Dang, thus ending the border fighting.

French official circles at Hainan declare that, since the Japanese are continuing to infringe the terms of the Hanoi agreement by trying to enter Indo-China forcibly, the French regard the agreement as cancelled. It is officially stated at Hanoi that the French remain firmly decided to carry out the terms of the Hanoi agreement. However, Indo-China cannot tolerate the position that an agreement hardly signed should be broken by the initiative of the Japanese China Command.

Mrs Hedley Harvey's Interesting Talk In Hastings

Methodist Guild Sister Guild Entertained At Happy Afternoon Gathering

A happy and most successful gathering was held in Hastings on Wednesday afternoon when the members of the Methodist Ladies' Guild entertained the members of all the sister guilds in the town, those present numbering about 160.

For the occasion, Mrs D. Sutherland had decorated the Schoolroom most attractively with lovely spring flowers.

Mrs C. H. Olds was in the chair and she appealed to everyone to sing the National Anthem as a prayer. She then conducted the decorations and welcomed all guests and guild members.

With Mrs Olds on the stage were the guild secretary, Mrs D. Osborne, and the treasurer, Mrs H. Ainsworth.

Mrs H. Sims entertained with a humorous monologue and afterwards Mrs Rees Kemp sang "Bless This House" and an encore.

Mrs Joseph Wilson presented lovely floral sprays to Mrs Sims, Mrs Kemp and also to Mrs Hedley Harvey, the speaker for the afternoon. On behalf of the women of the Methodist Church she told Mrs Rees Kemp, who leaves this week to live in Wellington, how very much she would be missed and she expressed their appreciation of the willing way in which she had always consented to sing for them in the choir.

Mrs Hedley Harvey was then introduced to everyone and her splendid talk about chapels, churches and cathedrals which she visited in England when there last year was heard with great interest.

Mrs Harvey said that when she visited the churches she tried not to go as a tourist but rather to sit down and meditate upon the great part that religion had played in the life of the Empire and how all the good things of this life sprang from Christianity. By the many chapels, churches, and cathedrals in England it was evident that the people appreciate the part that Christianity played in their lives.

The speaker said that many of the present day churches in England were really relics of other days, many having been destroyed at the time of the Reformation and their contents smashed or burnt. Many were repaired or replaced, others were not.

The speaker described generally the form of the churches and their build, mentioning some of the features, wonderful carvings, banners and coats of arms common to them all. She said that in each church she visited the places of interest connected with that particular church.

Mrs Harvey then described quite a number of the churches which she saw—Westminster Abbey, where while doing reinforcements recently Roman traces were discovered in the chancel, St. Paul's Cathedral where she saw the original picture, "The Light of the World," a replica of which had been given to the Hastings Methodist Church by her grandfather.

She saw also Sir Christopher Wren's tomb at Winchester Cathedral, where people had worshipped for 1300 years, and it was here that the first King of England had been crowned and Philip of Spain married, while Royalty had worshipped there throughout the ages.

At Salisbury Cathedral she admired the tallest and most beautiful spire in England, the beautiful entrances with figures from the old and new testament carved in stone and the Chapter House prayer stools of handmade tapestry depicting scenes from the old testament.

At York, one of the oldest and quaintest towns in England, Mr and Mrs Harvey attended York Minster on military Sunday when a congregation of 7000 were present. York Minster was not destroyed during the Reformation because Cromwell used it to stable his horses.

Two Demonstrations
HASTINGS GUILD MEMBERS
Mops And Felt Slippers

MUMMY BUYS THE LOVELIEST SOAP FOR ALL OF US—**Knights' Castile**



Members of the Arts and Crafts Circle of the Hastings Townswomen's Guild profited by two splendid demonstrations on the making of wool mops and felt slippers which were most ably shown at their meeting yesterday afternoon. The circle leader, Miss M. Sowersby, presided and with her was the secretary, Mrs T. Beaton.

Early in the afternoon all members answered a roll-call. "My Christian name and what I think of it," many answers being most humorous.

Mrs A. E. Price gave a splendid demonstration on how to make a mop from any scraps of old or new wool. She showed first how she winds this several strands at a time in any colours round a piece of wood about six inches in width until it is quite thick and then cuts it once and ties it to form a very large tassel.

After making several of these she took an old mop head with a groove down the centre and by means of wire and staples she attached tassels the full length of the mop head. Mrs Price advised the members to use soft wire rather than coarse, as fine wire cut the wool. Her finished mop was quite perfect and was very greatly admired.

Just before tea a competition was held. This was guessing the names of jumbled kitchen goods and was arranged by Mrs W. A. Bryant, the winner being Mrs Campbell.

The second demonstrator was Mrs L. W. Goldfinch, who showed very carefully how to make children's slippers from old felt hats. She had several completed pairs to display and all were really beautiful.

Mrs Goldfinch said that the first step was to scrub the old hats very well with warm, soapy water and when still wet iron them with a very hot iron and they will become quite flat and firm. This part needs care and attention and they should be well stretched with the iron. She advised her listeners to use an old ironing sheet and blanket as the dye frequently came out of the felt.

Mrs Goldfinch had several different paper patterns which she gave to the circle. She showed how to cut the slippers, how to make them up and to line them, demonstrating each step very carefully. She said that very often two hats were needed for one pair and they should be matched if possible or a different shade used for the soles. Any decorations should be completed before sewing up the slippers and she showed how to do various decorations.

It was decided that at next month's meeting there would be a competition for a wool mop (prize donated by Mrs E. A. Price) and for a pair of felt slippers (prize donated by Mrs L. W. Goldfinch), the slippers to be donated to the Lady Galway Patriotic Guild.

For those not able to do either a competition for a fancy coathanger would be held.

The results of the competitions were as follows: Arrowhead, Mrs Bowen 1, Miss M. Sowersby 2, Miss Ebbett 3; sox, Miss Ebbett 1, Mrs W. A. Bryant 2; mittens, Mrs Vogther 1 and 3, Mrs W. A. Bryant 2; balacavas, Mrs W. A. Bryant 1, Miss M. Sowersby 2 and 3.

Members decided to meet in the guild room on Friday next to cut out their slippers.

The afternoon closed with a vote of thanks to the two demonstrators and a reminder of the special spring meeting for the whole guild at the general gathering in October.

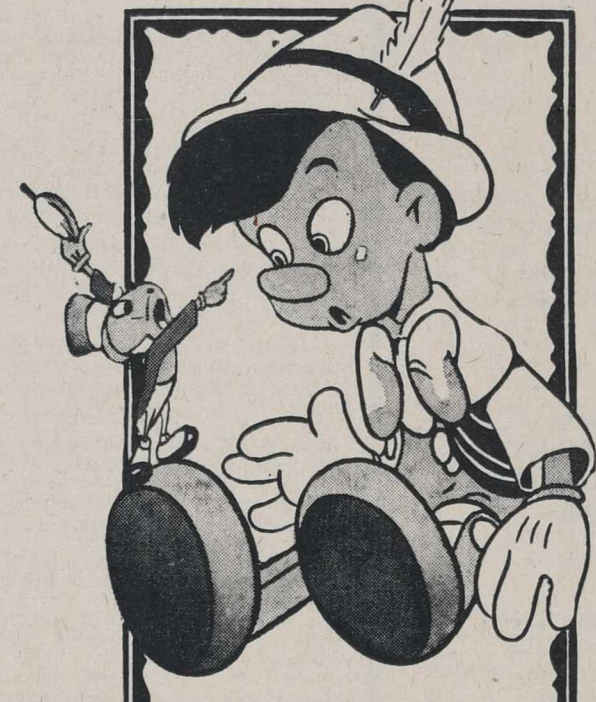

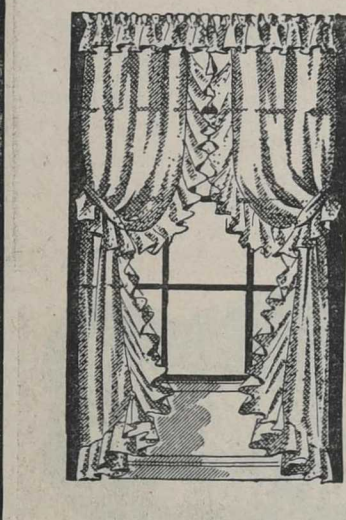

NEWSPAPERS AND THE PUBLIC. The rights and privileges enjoyed by free men in a free country are only valued at their true worth when they have just been won and when they have been abrogated by an authoritarian regime.

Hitler's unhappy victims in a fool's paradise. They had the time, the means, and the opportunity to defend and preserve their freedom, but they forgot the lessons of the past, and their slackness has been their undoing.

No such sweeping change could have been made in a totalitarian State, because, short of armed revolution, there is no means by which public opinion can express dissatisfaction with the rulers. We enjoy the priceless privilege of a free expression of opinion, whether it is favourable to the Government or otherwise.

It is a little open to doubt whether the public of New Zealand fully realises what it owes to its newspapers. Every day they publish speeches and opinions which, in Germany or Italy and in the countries occupied by them, would land the speakers in prison along with the printers and publishers.

The moral to be drawn from the fate of the Press in Europe to-day should not be lost on the citizens of those democratic States which are fighting Hitlerism to the death. The growing intolerance of politicians and Governments to newspaper criticism is not a good sign.

The newspaper Press under totalitarian conditions cannot publish reports of events as they happen, but only such versions of those events as suit the propaganda department. As often as not, that version has little relation to fact, and a diet of lies and distortion furnishes a poor meal for news-hungry readers.

The growing intolerance of politicians and Governments to newspaper criticism is not a good sign. Admittedly, many newspapers are unfair, and their opinions often display a party bias which is as regrettable as it is impolitic, but the right of individuals, whether editors or ordinary citizens, to a free expression of opinion is one that should be jealously guarded, and any attempt to curtail it should be resisted to the uttermost.

The standard of newspapers is being maintained in New Zealand, and a wonderful news service is being given to the public under great and increasing difficulties. A Government-controlled radio competes with the newspapers for advertising and filches a large amount of revenue that would otherwise go to them.

By charging excessive licence fees, the Government takes an enormous amount of money from the public and spends it on costly buildings, publications, and highly paid executives, while the programmes give more and more ground for dissatisfaction, and the official propaganda grows more boring and tiresome than ever.

It may be thought that in calling attention to the trend of events a newspaper is largely actuated by motives of self-interest. Even if it were true, it would not alter the fact that the public has a great deal more at stake than the newspaper owner when restrictions are imposed on the Press, and conditions are created under which it is impossible for newspapers to continue the services they have hitherto provided.

The newspaper proprietor may lose his investment, but when the freedom of the Press disappears, the people will witness the fall of one of the pillars of democracy.

ADVOCATED
British And American Interests
Are Identical

IMPORTANT MEETING HELD

WELLINGTON, Sept. 26.
New Zealand's desire to play its part in the utmost in the British-American co-operation movement which has for its object the strengthening of the mutual ties between the two great democracies and the promotion of a powerful Pacific pact that will assist towards the maintaining of world peace, was clearly demonstrated at the inaugural luncheon held in Wellington to-day of the New Zealand section of the movement.

The speakers were the Rt. Hon. P. Fraser and Sir Harry Battersbee, both of whom laid stress on the extent to which the two democracies had already co-operated to build a common frontier against aggression and tyranny.

Colonel C. H. Weston, president of the council of the New Zealand section of the movement, presided, and read the following message from Brigadier-General H. A. Goddard, C.M.G., D.S.O., V.D., president of the Australian movement:

"The American co-operation movement in Australia sends warmest congratulations on the auspicious inauguration of the movement in New Zealand. The work here is showing tangible results and is gaining daily support. Your effort will help considerably towards maintaining the status quo in the Pacific, this being the expressed policy of the U.S.A. and the Empire.

"You have set your hands to a great work for the future of the freedom-loving people of the world. Practical co-operation between the English-speaking peoples is the surest foundation and hope for civilisation."

Among those present were the Consul-General for the United States (Mr L. C. Pinkerton), the High Commissioner for Canada (Dr Riddell), his Majesty's Trade Commissioner (Mr R. Boulter, C.M.G.), Mr J. L. Menzies, representing the Australian Trade Commissioner, Mr Frank Jones, representing the district governor of Rotarua in New Zealand, Mr W. Earle, M.G., Mr J. Parker, Mr A. Glen. The chairman of the English Speaking Union (Colonel Weston) paid a tribute to Mr Leigh Hunt, chairman of the executive of the New Zealand Council, through whose efforts the New Zealand section had been founded.

Motor Trades
Protest

BAN ON CARS
Effect of Import
Restrictions
PLANTS MUST CLOSE

By Telegraph-Press Association.
WELLINGTON, Sept. 26.
The Motor Trade Federation wishes to make an emphatic protest against the closing down of their licences, according to the president (Mr C. R. Edmond), who, in a statement to-day, says that the restrictions will lead to the closing down of assembly plants and will probably mean that the trade will be unable to pay its contribution to the war purposes loan.

There is a slight easing regarding spare parts and tyres, but the trade considered that there should be no restriction, as when no new vehicles were coming it, it was necessary that spare parts should be available to keep up old ones.

Effect On Workers
The main issue, he said, was the total prohibition on the importation of cars for the whole of 1941, which would lead to the closing down of assembly plants and the dismissal of many workers. The importation of commercial vehicles would not provide much assembly work.

He emphasised that these restrictions had been placed on the industry at a time when British manufacturers were appealing for orders to keep up British trade.

Referring to the war purposes loan, Mr Edmond said that the year on which the contributions were to be completed had been a good one in the motor industry, but seeing that no import licences were granted in the last half of 1940 and now there would be none for 1941, he did not see how the industry was going to pay its share of the compulsory loan.

HASTINGS CITIZEN'S
DEATH

Mr W. S. Bennett
Well known for the prominent part he took in educational and friendly society affairs in Hastings, Mr Walter Sydney Bennett, of Kinga Street, died suddenly yesterday morning after a brief illness. Mr Bennett was born in New Plymouth in 1900 and entered the service of the Post and Telegraph Department when 16.

He spent five years at New Plymouth before he was transferred to the accountants' department of the General Post Office at Wellington, and 14 years later he moved to Hastings. At the time of his death Mr Bennett was head clerk and teller of the money-order branch.

For a time Mr Bennett was chairman of the Hastings branch of the Post and Telegraph Employees and Officers' Association. He was an enthusiastic and energetic member of the Ancient Order of Druids and was district president for the province. He was president of the Hastings district of the Friendly Societies Association.

As chairman of the Hastings Central School Committee Mr Bennett was a keen worker and he took a prominent part in the agitation for a new school. He was a prominent member of the Methodist Church, and for a term held office as a steward.

His leaves a widow and three sons. Don, Geoffrey, and Graeme. The funeral will be held at the Hastings Cemetery this afternoon at two o'clock.

GOOD SALVAGE
WORK

VALUABLE MATERIAL
ON PORT BOWEN
8000 Tons Will Be
Useful

WANGANUI, Sept. 24.
The Port Bowen wreck, which is being dismantled where it is lying close inshore at Castlecove, Wanganui, was paid a visit of inspection by the Hon. D. G. Sullivan, Minister of Supply, yesterday. Mr Sullivan said that he was immensely impressed with the value to New Zealand of the work being done and the progress made. The vessel, he said, contained 8000 tons of material, which was being reclaimed—material comprising steel plates, steel, angle iron and girders, machinery, refrigerating gear, nautical instruments and a considerable quantity of non-ferrous metals which are valuable in normal times but almost beyond price at present, when the difficulty of obtaining sufficient supplies of many things constitute a major problem to the Ministry of Supply.

Some 80 men are employed on the work, and the Minister was informed by the engineer in charge (Mr E. J. Dennis) of the Department of Industries and Commerce, that the completion of the "debulding" of the vessel will take many months. The Minister paid a tribute to Mr James Cable, of William Cable and Sons, who, as a member of the munitions committee, made a splendid offer to the Government, which offer was accepted, that the plant necessary for the "debulding" work should be supplied by his firm free of charge and that only five per cent return in wages be asked for.

"The making of this work in this way is of great value to the nation," concluded the Minister.

Uneventful Trip From
Noumea

After an uneventful trip from Noumea, the Honolulu Clipper, of Pan American Airways, arrived at Auckland at 2.29 p.m. on the conclusion of a flight from San Francisco. The trip from Noumea was covered in 6 hours 59 minutes, which was stated to be well within the average scheduled time.

The Clipper is scheduled to leave on Saturday morning on her return flight to San Francisco and her passengers are likely to include several who are due to arrive on the Hastings flying boat from Sydney tomorrow afternoon.

AN UNUSUAL
SCENE

SOLICITOR-GENERAL'S
DOUBLE ROLE

Appears For Prisoner
And The Crown

WELLINGTON, Sept. 26.

A full court hearing of the appeal of Teaira Masters, a native of the Cook Group, from a sentence of 10 years imprisonment imposed for the manslaughter of his wife produced the unusual spectacle of the Solicitor-General, who appeared for the Crown, advancing argument for a reduction of the sentence of the prisoner.

The prisoner, aged 41, was married in April, 1939, to Tara, aged 23 at Rarotonga. Tara was the mother of a child of about six years. The prisoner was formerly employed on a trading schooner and from December, 1938, had been unwell from the results of carbon monoxide poisoning contracted in the engine room of the schooner. He entered hospital at Rarotonga for treatment early in June, 1939, and was discharged on July 13. On Sunday, July 16, he was at home with his wife when other members of the family went to church. When they returned home they found the prisoner acting strangely, but no trace of Tara. Later, her dead body was found under the bed on which the prisoner was sitting.

An Argument
Subsequently, the prisoner made a statement to the police that an argument had arisen over the church to which the child of Tara was to go, and he had seized his wife by the throat and accidentally throttled her. Medical evidence established at the trial before Chief Judge Ayson at Rarotonga that the prisoner was suffering from carbon monoxide poisoning, which produced melancholia and nervous debility. The prisoner was found not guilty of murder but guilty of manslaughter and was sentenced to 15 years imprisonment, to be served in New Zealand, the Chief Judge, however, remarking that if the prisoner proved satisfactory and circumstances were favourable, the prisoner might after five years be sent back to Cook Islands to serve the balance of the sentence.

On that sentence the prisoner appealed to the full court of the Supreme Court of New Zealand, which is the appellate tribunal for appeals from Cook Islands. The prisoner was represented by counsel, so the Solicitor-General made submissions on his behalf as well as submissions for the Crown.

For the prisoner, he submitted that the sentence was excessive, as the evidence had established that the prisoner was in a very indefinite state of health when the offence was committed. The effect of carbon monoxide poisoning was to create haemorrhages in the brain, putting portions of the brain out of action. Doctor Gray, of the Mental Hospitals Department, had examined the prisoner since his arrival in New Zealand and had given a report that, although the prisoner was not insane, there was definite mental deterioration.

Was Provoked
On the morning of the tragedy Tara had been provoking her husband and it seemed from the evidence that she temporarily lost control of herself.

On the other hand, he pointed out as counsel for the Crown that the Chief Judge was a man of great experience with the natives, and that was in command of the trial to the matter. His summing up at the trial was a model of fairness. Moreover, imprisonment in Cook Islands was more technical than actual, as prisoners there were allowed a considerable amount of liberty.

The court reserved its decision.

Pilot Officer Denton was born in Greymouth 23 years ago. He was one of the first trainees at Greymouth under the civil reserve scheme, and received further training at the Tairāne aerodrome. He completed his New Zealand training at Wigram and left for England last December.

An account of his wartime experiences was given by Pilot Officer Denton in a broadcast from London last week.

**NEW CALEDONIAN
FRONT QUIET**
Impression Gained By
Visitors

The impression that all was now quiet at New Caledonia, following the appointment of a Governor who supported a Free France was brought by passengers who arrived by the Honolulu Clipper. They explained that since they were accommodated on the Pan-American Airways yacht, Southern Seas and could spend only one night at Noumea, they had comparatively little opportunity of studying the situation, but they were convinced that the people were now satisfied. The passengers reported that the French sloop that had been at Noumea had now left. They also brought a story suggesting that some of the supporters of the Vichy Government had also left the island.

Questioned concerning the future of New Caledonia's nickel trade, the passengers contradicted the popular claim that Japan was likely to obtain the bulk of the ore. They said that the United States seemed likely to be the major purchaser.

FINANCE REGULATIONS
AMENDED
Compulsory Loan Requirements
Stressed

IN PROPORTION TO MEANS

WELLINGTON, Sept. 26.

Regulations amending the Finance Emergency Regulations, 1940, issued in June, were published in to-night's Gazette. One of the new regulations deals with fixed deposits payable in foreign currency and requires the owner of every such fixed deposit to furnish to the Minister of Finance or his directs, information and particulars thereof by October 15, 1940, or within 14 days after the date on which he becomes the owner of the fixed deposit, whichever date is later.

The Minister of Finance (the Hon. W. Nash) explained this evening that he had delegated his powers under this regulation to the Reserve Bank of New Zealand. Returns should accordingly be made to the Reserve Bank. The regulation was complementary to the existing regulations requiring holders of foreign securities and foreign currency to make returns of such foreign securities and currency to the Reserve Bank.

Another of the new regulations amends the clause in the principal regulations which states that if the Minister of Finance has reason to believe any person has not subscribed in due proportion to his means to any war purposes loan, the Minister, by notice to such person, may require him to subscribe for any specified amount to such war purposes loan.

RUGBY, Sept. 26.
The nineteenth successive air raid "alert" sounded in London on Wednesday and Londoners resigned themselves to an orchestra consisting of the British anti-aircraft barrage punctuated by the crash of humble homes hit by bombs dropped indiscriminately from German aeroplanes. This bombing seemed even more senseless and criminal than on Tuesday night, when several more homes were hit.

Citizens of the metropolis who are proverbially kindly natured and little prone to anger, are now growing indignant at the lack of any pretence at decency on the part of the Germans in their hideous campaign against civilian populations. The Germans do not realise, according to neutral observers, that instead of producing horror among Londoners they are making them extremely angry and when Londoners are really angry, "they are a tougher proposition than the Germans can deal with."

EXPERT**
AUSTRALIA AND N.Z.
TO BE FILMED

Cameraman Now On
The Job

AUCKLAND, Sept. 26.
Mr Victor J. Jurgens, the "March of Time" cameraman, reached Auckland by the Honolulu Clipper on his way to Australia. He will fly to Sydney on Saturday by the Tasman Empire Airways service.

Many thousands of miles have been covered by Mr Jurgens on assignments for the organisation with which he is associated, and he has made films in various parts of North and South America, Japan, Guam, Hong-Kong and the Dutch East Indies. With him he has brought separate documentary films in both New Zealand and Australia depicting particularly the war effort of the two countries, as well as their industrial and commercial life and something of their scenery.

"I want to try to convey something of the size of Australia," Mr Jurgens said. "The film will also deal with the Navy, Army and Air Force, major industries, and also to some extent with the ordinary life of the people. It is intended to be a record of modern Australia."

"After about two months there, I intend to come to New Zealand and make a similar picture of the Dominion. It will be quite separate from the Australian picture."

COMMENT ON WAR
LOAN

Much Hardship On
Business

AUCKLAND, Sept. 26.

The war-loan terms are condemned as too drastic by the chairman of the Auckland Stock Exchange (Mr J. W. Frater), who said that compulsion would have an adverse psychological effect and would result in considerable hardship on business and industry. Compulsion had not been tried in any other part of the Empire so far, and it was equally unnecessary here. The terms were a blow at patriotic incentive, which was strong in New Zealanders' hearts.

The restriction on the death-duty clause would have the effect of weakening the market for scrip, thus compelling holders who had to sell to accept a loss. He considered that a straight-out loan of 2 1/2 per cent, involving £200,000 a year in interest, would have met with a splendid response and would have obtained a great deal of hardship.

Special Levy
"What has been done is, in effect, to levy a special income tax on those who in February, 1940, paid over £50 of income tax," said Dr H. A. Cunningham, an authority on taxation. It was not merely a loan, because the stock received in exchange, being free of interest for the first three years and afterwards carrying a low rate, was probably worth little more than half its face value. That represented a serious added burden in the case of many taxpayers, particularly business people who had been recently assessed under the new provisions relating to the valuation of stock-in-trade.

He pointed out that in the case of previous loans, taxpayers could appeal to a specially-constituted board of appeal and afterwards to a judge of the Supreme Court. It was now left to the Finance Minister to decide whether a person had subscribed in due proportion to his means.

**EGYPT REGARDED
AS FOREIGN**
CENSORSHIP RULING
FOR PHILATELISTS

Private Stamp Exchange
Not Allowed
Although New Zealand troops are in Egypt, and although that country's tendencies are acknowledged to be pro-British, still to the Dominion censor, Egypt is apparently regarded as foreign.

This has been forcibly brought home to philatelists who have endeavoured to exchange stamps with Egypt and who have been refused a transaction is carried out by a recognised stamp dealer collector is no longer permitted to do so. It will be remembered that recently regulations were introduced forbidding the exchange of stamps with foreign countries except through recognised dealers, and Egypt, according to the censorship authorities, is included in the word "foreign."

Although naturally the regulations will mean difficulties ahead for individual collectors who have worked up a connection with collectors in all parts of the world, a member of the Bay of Plenty Philatelic Society commented that the best of his knowledge no other member had so far been affected by the ban upon exchanges with Egypt.

Experience of Hawera Man
The experience of a Hawera collector demonstrates the effect of the regulations in this respect. For more than five years he has conducted correspondence with an Egyptian living at Minia, Upper Egypt, the two men exchanging stamps throughout the period without incurring the premium, which a recognised stamp dealer would claim.

Correspondence of this type was continued after the regulations were put into force, two letters being received from Egypt and two being received from Hawera. The letters were censored and no exception was taken to the inclusion of stamps for exchange. Recently, however, a third letter bearing the Egyptian address was posted at Hawera, and some time later stamps enclosed in the letter were returned to the sender from the Dead Letter Office.

Censor's Explanation
"The accompanying postage stamps are returned at the direction of the censorship authorities for the reason that it is not permissible to forward used or unused postage stamps to foreign countries," stated an accompanying notice. "The letter has been released for transmission with a suitable note explaining that the stamps were abstracted and returned to the sender."

The sender of the stamps wrote to the controller of censorship, Mr G. McNamara, pointing out that since the declaration of war two letters were received from Egypt containing stamps and that two were despatched from New Zealand without any interference on the part of the censorship authorities, and asking for a definite ruling whether Egypt was a foreign country.

"It is regretted that only recognised stamp dealers may send postage stamps from New Zealand to foreign countries," replied Mr McNamara. "Egypt is included for this purpose to be a foreign country."

The question is being asked what the position will be if Egypt declares war on Italy.

**WOOL LEVY RATES
ANNOUNCED**

The rates of the levy on all wool produced in New Zealand are announced in a Gazette notice to-night. The levy is 10 per cent on the value of the wool, plus a penny per bag or sack.

These rates will apply on all wool produced in New Zealand which at any time during the season commencing October 1 this year is exported from the Dominion or is delivered to the wool manufacturer for use in New Zealand.

PREVENTION AGAINST THE
MENACE OF FOREST FIRES

Comprehensive Regulations Now
Gazetted To Cover All
Eventualities

By Telegraph-Press Association
WELLINGTON, Sept. 26.

New regulations designed to prevent forest fires are gazetted to-night. The regulations have been framed with a view to providing the utmost protection to forests consistent with as little interference as possible in the normal life of the community.

The general effect, in brief, will be to impose on the State as well as on owners of private forests and all neighbours and users of such forests the mutual obligation to safeguard one another's interests.

In an explanatory statement concerning the regulations, the Hon. F. Langstone says that he is convinced that New Zealand's present fire incidence could be reduced by at least 75 per cent, with the support and co-operation of all patriotic New Zealanders, and the Minister appeals for every possible assistance in the national campaign against forest fires.

Under the new regulations, forest officers are given power to enter private lands for the suppression of fires where State forests or fire districts are endangered. Engines of all kinds operating in State forests or in fire districts from August 1 to April 30 must be equipped with spark arresters, and in addition, steps must be taken for the prevention of the escape of fire and live coals from ash-pans and fire-boxes. Certain relaxations are granted in respect to milking machines and shearing plants, etc.

As a further safeguard, the Director of Forestry may, during periods of extreme fire danger, suspend logging or sawmilling operations. A further provision makes it an offence for any person to throw or drop any kind of smouldering substance in a State forest or fire district from August 1 to April 30, and it has also been made an offence to enter a State forest or any exotic forest in a fire district without a permit.

The responsibility is placed on every person who works in or adjacent to a State forest or fire district or who happens to be within those areas for any purpose whatsoever, to tend and control forest fires.

LIQUOR TOKEN TO P.W.D. CAMP

SERIOUS OFFENCE AT WAIROA

WAIROA

"Liquor taken into Public Works camps like Tuai, where important and expensive work is being carried out, will not be tolerated, and the penalty for doing so must be a severe one," said Mr J. Miller, S.M., when convicting Ivan Ryder, a half-caste Maori, who appeared before him at the Magistrate's Court on Wednesday charged on three counts with selling liquor at Tuai.

On the first count Ryder was fined £30, and he was fined £5 on each of the other two charges.

"The whisky sold was of doubtful quality and very potent stuff," said the Magistrate. "We have heard of the effect it had on one man." Sergeant L. T. Moore told the court that inquiries were being made into a recent fire at Tuai and the investigations proved that a drinking party which had ended in a drunken brawl had taken place that night.

Ryder had visited Tuai that day and sold 12 dozen bottles of beer, for which he got 2/6 a bottle, and 24 bottles of whisky, getting 25/- each for these, netting about £48.

Ryder had visited Tuai on other occasions and sold quantities of liquor.

Continuing, Sergeant Moore said that when he took a glass of the whisky, it collapsed, and had to be put to bed.

"The bottles were not sealed," he added, "which leads one to believe that it was not proper whisky."

Ryder, in a statement to the police, had admitted selling liquor, saying that he was selling it for someone else, but he would not reveal the name.

Mr G. O'Malley, who appeared for Ryder and two other men who were involved, said that Ryder came to Wairoa about three years ago and had been unemployed since, but for the excepting for short periods at the freezing works.

He was approached by a man who asked him to take the liquor to the camp.

Pera Whatuira and Pera Te Oriki gave evidence that on three occasions they went to Tuai with Ryder in his car and helped to sell the liquor.

Whatuira and Te Oriki, who were each charged with aiding and abetting, pleaded guilty and were convicted and fined £5 each.

Sold Bottle Of Gin Pleading guilty to the charge of selling intoxicating liquor, Percy R. Walters, K. O'Halloran and H. J. Chong San was convicted and fined £10 and costs.

The police stated that on August 31 they visited the shop and the defendant admitted having sold a bottle of gin to a Maori. They searched the premises and found one bottle of Chinese gin.

The Bench said that it was not the usual case as only one bottle of gin had been found, but selling liquor was a serious offence and the licensing laws had been broken.

Defendant was represented by Mr C. V. Chamberlain.

Drink At Dances Leslie Ellis, Walter McAnaney, Thomas Kelly and Charles Allan Webb (Mr Chamberlain), jointly charged with having beer, gin and whisky in their control in the vicinity of the Gaiety Theatre while a dance was in progress there on August 30, were convicted and fined 30/- each.

Jerry Winitana was charged with having whisky in his control in the vicinity of the L.D.S. Hall, Nuhaka, on September 5 when a dance was in progress, and also with aiding some person unknown in the supply of liquor to a Maori for consumption off licensed premises. He pleaded guilty to both charges and was convicted and fined 30/- and costs on each count.

Dave Huka, for having whisky in his control in the vicinity of the L.D.S. Hall, Nuhaka, on September 5 while a dance was in progress, and also with supplying liquor to a Maori for consumption off licensed premises, was fined 30/- on each charge.

Johnny Walker, also charged with having whisky in the vicinity of the dance, and also with aiding Dave Huka in supplying liquor to a Maori for consumption off licensed premises, was convicted and fined 30/- on each charge.

Renata Joe was charged with being found without lawful excuse on the licensed premises of the Mohaka Hotel on August 11. Pleading guilty to the charge, he was convicted and fined 30/- and costs.

Henry Hodges was charged with procuring liquor during the currency of a prohibition order and was convicted and fined 30/- and costs.

John Walker, a Maori aged 22 years, was charged with stealing a bicycle wheel, tyre and a tube valued at £2, the property of Charles Leslie Foley, at Clydebank between April 24 and May 15. He pleaded guilty and was fined £3 and costs.

CHRISTMAS DELICACIES FOR THE MEN OVERSEAS

Hastings Women Have Worked Untiringly Preparing The Parcels

"With best wishes and good luck, from the people of Hastings," says a card included in the hundreds of parcels being despatched from Hastings in the next few days to gladden the hearts of New Zealand soldiers in England and Egypt this Christmas.

And a "Daily Mail" reporter who watched women of the overseas committee of the auxiliary corps hard at work preparing and packing parcels at the Hastings patriotic depot yesterday was sure that they would delight the hearts of the men wherever they may be.

Packing 360 parcels representing the quota of Havelock North and Hastings has been no easy job, but the 25 women have worked hard with an eye on the calendar and this week will see their effort completed. Not only the women have been engaged in this patriotic work, Hastings plumbers have worked with a will soldering the 720 tins to be contained in the 360 parcels, and the lights of the patriotic depot have burned late on several recent nights while these men have bent to their task.

The parcels contain an assortment of articles that are ideally suited to the needs of the soldiers overseas. A Christmas cake and a pound of biscuits are contained in sealed tins, and a tin of chocolates and 30 cigarettes will gladden any man in camp. A Christmas pudding, a tin of New Zealand fruit, and a khaki handkerchief complete the parcel, which is valued at about 12/6.

At Hastings every effort has been made to ensure that the parcels contain goods of the highest quality, no effort having been spared in this direction. The reporter who handled these articles yesterday was fully impressed with their high standard and suitability for inclusion in overseas parcels.

Each of the parcels is wrapped in hessian before being packed with five others in a benzine case. Although the parcels will not be individually addressed to the men, the cases will be branded "Hawke's Bay" to indicate their district of origin.

A tribute to the work of the women who were preparing the parcels was paid yesterday by the Mayor of Hastings (Mr G. A. Maddison). "I might say that they are setting the rest of the community a splendid example by their untiring efforts," he said. "I know that they have worked long and hard in the preparation of these Christmas gifts for our boys, imbued with a patriotic spirit that is well worthy of emulation."

CLASS HORSES DO NOT WIN N.Z. CUP

No Suitable Preliminaries

W.F.A. RACING HAS BEEN NEGLECTED

Australian Itinerary Is Better

(By MOTUROA).

Generally, it is accepted that the style of training adopted by most New Zealand trainers is the reason why good and proven stayers cannot win the New Zealand Cup.

Nightmarch, who triumphed in 1930, can be cited as the exception to prove the rule. However, there was more than his great brilliance and stamina behind his success under a steadier of 9.6—the maximum weight which can be awarded in this race.

Many really good horses have tried to carry the weights they have earned for this race, and failed; one need only mention such great horses as Rapine, Star Stranger, Rapier (second Cup), Vintage, Wild Chase, Argentic, Willie Win, and Royal Chief in modern times.

In the past 15 years nine horses carrying 8.0 or over have won the Melbourne Cup, and three three-year-olds in that period have succeeded with weight-for-age or more.

Topweights or good three-year-olds can win the Melbourne Cup because they have a real circuit of high-class races to fit them for the A.J.C. spring carnival; further w.f.a. and middle-distance races there to attune them for the Caulfield Cup meeting; and then comes the big event at Flemington. Three-year-olds have had two Derbies to contest, while there have been plenty of w.f.a. events up to two miles.

But such circumstances do not obtain in New Zealand. There are no middle-distance races apart from the Harcourt Stakes at Trentham and the proven stayers are thus forced to race under killing imposts in handicap events. They are race-weary horses before they reach the peak of their form.

FROM 1883 until 1926 the record in the N.Z. Cup was 8.9—an honour shared by Tasman, Vanguard, Lady Zetland and Saxon. The last named had won the Melbourne Cup the previous year with 6.12.

In 1926, Count Cavour, a great stayer (who was second in three consecutive Auckland Cups with 8.13

SMART LEIGHON SPRINTER

SAXON TOR, who showed a clean pair of heels to the opposition in the Railway Handicap at Marton on Saturday, is by far the best of the stock of the Gainsborough horse Leighton yet to race.

We can improve the class of our N.Z. Cup races and we can also provide a good percentage of our good class horses from making the annual trek across the Tasman, if we offer them a reasonable amount of w.f.a. racing.

MANAWATU challenges the Auckland Racing Club offer nothing for class horses above two and three years; and the only race for older horses in all the early spring meetings is the Harcourt Stakes. Even the N.Z. Derby is run after the N.Z. Cup.

MANAWATU will have a really good class of horses in the 1940 Hastings Stakes next Thursday with Tetratina, Foreign Gold, Flying Spray, Saint Tor and Sandy Bay engaged. It is a team which will throw down a mighty challenge to the Hawke's Bay two-year-olds, who will be at a disadvantage of not having real racing experience.

Tetratina is considered likely to prove the thorn in the side of the Ngatarawa champion Varuna. Not only did she win the Wanganui Debutante Stakes in brilliant fashion but the Theo filly was well forward early as instanced by her win in the Parakee Handicap.

However, in 1930, the Night Raid horse Nightmarch, who had won the Epsom Handicap and Melbourne Cup and had been narrowly defeated in the Metropolitan Handicap the previous year, shattered all records. In a hard race this great galloper, who was over-shadowed only by Phar Lap, struggled home with the maximum impost from Concentrate (who had won the Auckland Cup the previous season) and In The Shade.

RACED AT RANDWICK NIGHTMARCH had had the correct racing in Australia in the early spring, contesting races under the w.f.a. scale from six furlongs to a mile and a half. He had returned to New Zealand only because his owner had sickened of chasing the invincible Phar Lap.

But, hard as those races were they did not impose the strain on Nightmarch's vitality as a lot of handicap racing in unwieldy fields and under huge imposts would have done.

I am convinced that when Nightmarch returned to New Zealand just before the 1930 N.Z. Cup meeting he was as fit, if not fitter, than at any other stage of his career. He was a five-year-old in his best season as a stayer. In fact, had the New Zealand gone to Flemington—with Phar Lap out of the way—he would probably have won his second Melbourne Cup.

Had Nightmarch not raced in Australia in September and October the odds are that both Concentrate and In The Shade, with their pull in the weights of 10lbs and 13lbs respectively would both have beaten the Christchurch horse. And, while both were high class gallopers, it would have been a great pity to have seen such a superlative horse as Nightmarch beaten because there was not the correct circuit of racing to fit him for his task.

LACK OF FORESIGHT TO-DAY we wonder why all our best horses leave our shores to provide the highlights of sport for Australian racegoers. It is not only

the lure of big stakes and the opportunity for big betting, for, to be successful, they must meet and beat the cream of Australia's gallopers over all distances.

It cannot be overlooked that our spring racing is too hard on first class and proven horses, and the lack of a circuit of w.f.a. races shows a real lack of foresight on the part of the executives of our major racing clubs.

The Wanganui Jockey Club has dropped its popular Eclipse Stakes; the Avondale Jockey Club and the Auckland Racing Club offer nothing for class horses above two and three years; and the only race for older horses in all the early spring meetings is the Harcourt Stakes. Even the N.Z. Derby is run after the N.Z. Cup.

Moody Type of Galloper

WHEN Autosweep is in the galloping mood he is more than useful, but the Ingledwood horse does not always race generously and his form at times is hard to follow.
