Significant Signs In **America**

GRAVE DANGERS SEEN IN THE PACIFIC

Naval Movements Rumoured

(United Press Association—Copyright.) (Received Sept. 29, 10.5 p.m.)

NEW YORK, Sept. 28. Washington reports state that there are indications that the United States answer to the Berlin-Tokyo alliance may take the form of increased aid to Britain. Signs of this have multiplied during a series of important conferences. The British Ambassador (Lord Lothian) and Sir Walter Layton to-day conferred first with the Secretary of State (Mr Cordell Hull) and then with President Roosevelt, whom Lord Lothian told: "Britain needs more of everything quickly."

Later the President conferred with the defence chiefs and Mr Henry Morgenthau, who is co-ordinator of United States-British arms purchases. Later Cabinet met.

Lord Lothian revealed that he had discussed Pacific problems with Mr Hull and they also had considered problems relating to the establishment of United States bases on the sites leased under the destroyer deal.

President Roosevelt received a delegation of 87 from all parts of the nation urging further immediate aid to Britain. The spokesman of the delegation stated later: "We were enthusiastically encouraged."

Reports from Honolulu that parts of the United States Fleet have left for Manila, in the Philippines, are unconfirmed. Apparently the main striking strength is still centred at Hawaii, although 30 ships, including four battleships, left for San Diego last week for repairs and leave.

"(2) Equality of opportunity to trade with all nations.

LONDON, Sept. 29. Terrific explosions shook the Kent coast last night when the R.A.F. delivered what is believed to be the most violent of all its attacks on the German invasion ports. Vivid orange and red flashes and sheets of flame lit up the sky as hundreds of bombs burst in an unbroken line along the French and

The flashes were bigger than anything yet seen from England, indicating that more powerful bombs were being used. Houses on the coast shuddered continually for hours.

DANGERS FOR RAIDERS

Few Reach Metropolis On Saturday

THREE ATTACKS MADE

(United Press Association-Copyright.) (Received Sept. 29, 10.15 p.m.)

LONDON, Sept. 28.

Greater London's anti-aircraft guns are now able to fire an average of more than one shell a second throughout the night. Britain's anti-aircraft guns could fire the entire 1918 production in less than a month.

London's guns are capable night after night of keeping dozens of tons of metal continually bursting in the sky.

The gunfire is chiefly of two classes, first, groups of batteries put up "pattern" fire, forcing the bombers to sheer off to avoid destruction and preventing accurate bombing; and secondly, other batteries try to hit single machines or formations. The fire is designed to "bracket" the enemy with groups of shells in front and behind and then plaster the

The perfection to which members of the Auxiliary Fire Service have brought their work was evidenced during dozens of fires breaking out in all parts of London to-day. All were quickly controlled. Firemen, jumping in and out of blazing infernos regardless of their personal safety, nullified the effects of incendiary bombs dropped in the poorer and more inflammable areas. Incendiary bombs showered north London suburbs and also gutted a north-west district public

library, thousands of books being burned. A warehouse was gutted in central London and four persons were killed in a shelter in a south-western suburb.

The enemy activity over Britain on Saturday consisted of three main operations, which are described in a joint communique issued by the Air Ministry and the Ministry of Home Security. "Early this morning and shortly after midday forces of enemy aircraft crossed the southeast coast and attempted to reach London," says the communique. "They were engaged by strong forces of our fighters and broken up.

"In the first of these attacks a few of the enemy penetrated to east London and a small number of bombs were dropped but very little damage appears to have been done and the casualties reported are few.

"In the second attack no enemy aircraft succeeded in reaching London but several bombs were dropped on a south coast town. Some houses were damaged but no casualties have been reported. Later in the afternoon an enemy force approached the Portsmouth area. They were immediately engaged by





A THREE-CORNERED BARGAIN

Out of a multitude of words the plain fact emerges that Germany, Italy, and Japan have signed a mutually defensive pact whose background is one of fear that the United States may take a more effective part in the war and one of whose consequences is that the signatories are left wondering what the attitude of Russia will be.

With the usual chicanery of German diplomatic methods Herr von Ribbentrop has declared that the pact aims at the reconstruction of peace throughout the world and that "any country which joins the alliance will have a voice in the distribution of territory after the war." The stark, materialistic selfishness of such a declaration is glaring. The world knows well by now what German efforts at the restoration of peace amount to, and it is questionable if even the offer of the most succulent tit-bits to the smaller dogs of Europe will induce them to follow on the heels of the German warhounds in their slavering, lustful dash for world domination.

The bogey of an international plot, with its familiar concomitants of Jewish financiers, is once more raised to scare the gullible. Those who read between the lines of the news must see that there is a sense of desperation behind the pact. The ringleader, of course, is Germany, for whom, despite the spectacular conquests made chiefly along Fifth Column lines, things have not been going too well. It is a thinly veneered attempt to ensure that in the event of trouble from America, the war-blot will be spread still farther across the face of the world. Germany has the corner of her eye on Spain.

It is pointed out that the agreement alters nothing in the political relationships of any one of the parties and the Soviet. But what will the Soviet think of it? The parties have agreed "to support each other militarily by all the means at their disposal in the event of one being attacked by a Power not yet involved either in the war against Britain or in the Chinese-Japanese war." That points to America, but does it leave Russia out?

And what of the question of encirclement? When Russia recently went up to the Baltic and then down to the Black Sea, the encirclement seemed to be all in favour of Russia and against Germany, and that threat still stands, for Russia is a big country which might yet upset the most hard-won German victory. The pact is one which widens the vortex of the encirclement policy by ensuring that, if need be, and whatever America may do, Germany, Italy, and Japan will be there to see that Russia does not get out of hand. Such a possibility may serve to draw Russia closer both to Great Britain and to the United States, for the ultimate encirclement, from which there could possibly be no appeal, would be a similar alliance between America, Russia, and the British Empire.

What the reputed secret clauses in the agreement may amount to no one can tell; but this much is surely true: that the conscience of the civilised world has already been too badly shocked and betrayed by the machinations of Hitler and Mussolini to be led one step farther in the way of trusting the dictatorships to keep their word.

The pact amounts to a consolidation of the opposition to what is regarded as the legitimate progress of civilisation, and as such it has so much value. The agreement defines the lines of combat so that we know where we are and who are our potential enemies. Nothing that has happened need give cause for alarm to those who are fighting on the side of the free people of the world. On the contrary, we may take pride in the fact that while Hitler searches the horizon for possible means of assistance, the British people, firmly rooted in their defensive attitude, confront the worst that he can do with ever-growing confidence. The pact is not only a cunning move to get some backstairs assistance if need be. In its essence, it is a confession of weakness and well on the way to an acknowledgment of defeat.



ENGLAND, Sept. 28.
