## Reprisals Threatened By Hungary

**RUMANIAN "PERSECUTIONS"** 

Counter Charges Laid By Bucharest

MASSACRES ALLEGED

(United Press Association-Copyright.) (Received October 10, 10.5 p.m.) LONDON, Oct. 9.

The Hungarian Prime Minister (Count Paul Teleki), broadcasting from Budapest, said that the expulsion of Hungarians from Rumania had reached a point at which Hungary's cup was full. Hungary in the last few days had been obliged to take reprisals, which would be intensified unless Rumania changes her attitude.

"It is apparent," he said, "that Rumania is attempting to upset the decisions of the Vienna Conference, but Hungary is fully prepared to take steps to meet the situation. If necessary, Hungary will act with the greatest energy.

"Hungary has vainly waited for Rumania to show reasonable understanding. There is nothing to show that the situation which existed 22 years ago will be improved."

The Rumanian persecution of the Hungarian minority

was designed to modify the Vienna award, he claimed. Hungary had recently expelled 850 Rumanians and more would be deported unless the Rumanians ceased the persecution.

The Rumanian Vice-Premier (M. Horia Sima) in a state-

ment said that Hungarians had massacred 440 Rumanians in the recently acquired districts of Transylvania. "Hungary has not respected the agreement and peace is again threatened," he claimed. "The Hungarians cut out the tongues of their victims before killing them. They also nailed Rumanian flags to their victims' backs; some were burned at the stake and others were hanged by the feet with their throats cut."

R.A.F. STRIKES AGAIN

#### **Invasion Ports And Factories** Heavily Bombed

A vivid impression of the conditions created at invasion ports by the constant hammering of the R.A.F. may be gained from the account of the strange experience of a gained from the account of the strange experience of a British aircraft on a recent occasion over Le Havre. After 40 minutes of concentrated attack by Blenheims of the Coastal Command on the harbour, fires which had been started the previous night over most of the area were rekindled to double strength. One of these explosions was most remarkable. When a salvo of bombs burst on the target the ground became sheeted with white flame. "Then something volcanic seemed to happen," said one of the pilots. "A concussion like a giant's kick could be felt a mile and a half high. At 8000 feet I thought my aircraft would be upset. We were in cloud at the time, but the sky around us suddenly became clear. The cloud, even at that height, had actually been blown away by the force of the explosion. Night became like day.

The first of the raiding force to attack the yards at Bremen arrived as early as 8.15 p.m. and in the next half-hour the whole area was systematically bombed with high explosions and incombining. 





THE NATIONAL SAVINGS SCHEME

Modern war imposes increasing obligations on every citizen of a nation involved in a life-and-death struggle. In the case of countries subjected to aerial bombardment, the distinction between the fighting man and the civilian has disappeared to a great extent, but even in a country as remote from the actual terror of "total war" as New Zealand, there is a vital need for every man and woman to contribute something to the common effort.

The National Savings Scheme, the details of which were published in yesterday's "Daily Mail," is a comprehensive and remarkably simple device which enables every New Zealander to take part in the Empire's task of ending once and for all the threat to those liberties that are the birthright of every

Briton. Although this National Savings plan is designed principally for persons with medium and lower incomes, and is entirely separate from the War Purposes Loan, it makes no differentiation between the man or woman with a large income and the small wage earner. It offers everyone the opportunity to make a regular contribution, large or small, towards the national war effort, and, incidentally, it offers an ultimate return equivalent to that made by the Post Office Savings Bank.

A point to be emphasised is that no one need be discouraged from saving by the thought that the amount which he or she can put by in any given period is very small. This is illustrated by the history of the National Savings Certificates which were introduced in Great Britain during the last war.

In the period from February, 1916, when the certificates first became available, to December, 1918, the number sold in Britain was 280,701,054. This represented a total cash investment of £217,543,317. On September 30, 1939, the amount standing to the credit of holders of Savings Certificates (including accrued interest) was £518,000,000. And it must be remembered that the bulk of this colossal sum belonged to people of small means.

From this British example it will readily be seen that the modest savings of wage-earners and others can play an important part in the finances of a nation. New Zealand to-day, like the Mother Country, is striving to meet the tremendous cost of the war without piling up liabilities to be faced in the post-war period of reconstruction. Britain is facing a daily expenditure of £14,000,000; New Zealand's war effort in the current financial year was estimated in the last Budget at £37,500,000. It is inevitable that as the scope of the conflict widens expenditure will increase, and it is obviously necessary that the Dominion should avoid as far as possible the piling up of overseas debts to meet the situation. In other words, the more New Zealand relies on its own funds now, the stronger will be its position when peace comes.

Yet another angle of the National Savings Scheme, and one which is likely to be overlooked, is the fact that persons making contributions in New Zealand may regard their temporary sacrifice as being of direct assistance to Great Britain in the magnificent stand she is making against the blitzkrieg.

In the past, as to-day, New Zealand has been virtually dependent on the Mother Country. Britain has always been the greatest of the Dominion's markets and the source of the greater part of the national income. By reducing her demands on the resources of the United Kingdom while those resources are urgently needed at Home, New Zealand will materially assist Great Britain to tide over the critical years until security is restored.

Until then the fight must be carried on within the Dominion as well as in Europe, Africa, and Asia. The National Savings Scheme opens up a field for all those who for various reasons are prevented from taking an active part in the greatest conflict in history,

In 1939 380 trees and shrubs were planted in 1940. About 300 of the trees were natives, the remainder being exotics, said Mr MacKenzie.

# SKILLED LABOUR IS

Shortage Of Saddlers

DIFFICULT TIMES AHEAD

An Important Trade

Faced already with a marked shortage of skilled labour, New Zea-and's saddlery trade may in the course of a few years be placed in a very difficult position, according to a Hastings master saddler interviewed

Hastings master saddler interviewed yesterday.

"The position is such that I don't know where I could, if necessary, obtain a single skilled saddle hand," he stated. This trade, in fact, enjoys the probably unique distinction of having no unemployment problem. of having no unemployment problem
—but this in itself will become serious if the present trend continues.

The saddler explained that a
union official's survey revealed that
there were in the whole Dominion
only 250 journeymen canvas workers, harness makers and saddlers;
of these not one was out of work of these not one was out of work. In addition to this, he said, the men were getting on in years; he estimated the average age of New Zealand master saddlers at 60, with many

learn. "In fact," he added, "we're always learning.
"Some to whom I have described the position have said that we will simply have to turn our hands to some other industry. That, however, is ridiculous, for the saddlery trade is indispensable."

One of the Government's biggest sources of revenue, he pointed out, was the income from horse racing to which, as well as to farmers and many others, saddlers were giving

ssential service.

Often, he said, apprentices would serve their time and leave the trade with a shortsighted view to taking with a shortsighted view to taking some more lucrative temporary occupation. In this manner, and with the number of men falling out through old age, the supply of skilled labour was rapidly diminishing. He instanced three men who, to his personal knowledge, had left the trade within a year, creating vacancies which could not easily be filled. Insufficient apprentices were filled. Insufficient apprentices were available to meet the demand thus created, as other occupations appeared to hold more attraction.

Steady Flow of Work

Illustrating the position in his own establishment, the saddler said that there was a steady demand for his product: his staff was working full-time and had all the work they could handle. "If the much talked of 'back to the horse' movement were actually to eventuate, it would mean a rush of work with which we could not cope," he remarked.

Hastings was probably the town best catered for in the whole of the North Island, he considered, as its two saddlery establishments were among the most up-to-date. Consequently they had work from as far afield as Wanganui. Steady Flow of Work

"Already there is a definite shortage of tradesmen to carry on the work," he concluded, "and I estimate that within ten years the industry will be in a serious position."

# **Entires Deserve Support** CLASSICS TO ENCOURAGE

Geldings have never been eligible to contest the English classics and in the past few years the Australian Jockey Club and the Victoria Racing Club have decreed that geldings be barred from their respective Derbies. The reform was opposed in many quarters, but, then, every reform finds dissentients, and the fact that Peter Pan, Hallmark, and Liberal are already represented with promising young horses in their short while at the Stud suggests that Australia has led the way in a wise reform.

The Colonial-bred sires in Australia have received real recognition in modern times and there is little doubt that the Canterbury Jockey Club and the Auckland Racing Club could improve the status of the home-bred sire if the N.Z. and G.N. Derbies were confined to colts and fillies.

One of the primary objects of racing, we are assured, is the improvement of the standard of thoroughbred horses. Then, how can that be attained by giving unsexed horses the right to compete in the classics—races that are intended as tests of class independent of handicap?

It would seem that the real object of the sport is being shelved in order to pander to the pure gambling side of racing.

THOSE who disapprove of the idea of debarring geldings from the Derbies do not forget to remind us that some of the greatest racehorses have been geldings. If they had been debarred from the classics the public interest in those races would have been lessened. This may be admitted, but it does not touch the real point of the question at issue.

If such great performers as Phar Lap, Amounis, Gloaming, Limerick, Rapine, Sasanof, Star Stranger, Beauford, Ballymena, Mollison, Count Cavour, Ammon Ra, and others had been prevented from racing against the best colts and fillies in their years the sport would certainly have been deprived of some interest as a sport. But, supposing the rule that debars geldings from competing in the classics had been in force before those horses came on the scene?

# Beau Vite Did Not Put

(By "Moturoa") The cable-man in Sydney must have been carried away by the merit of Beau Vite's success in the Craven Plate at Randwick on Wednesday for he credited the champion New Zealander with a fresh ten furlongs record for Australia and New Zealand. Beau Vite's 2.2½ was certainly a wonderful gallop and it beat Phar Lap's 2.2½ on the same track. However, sight has been lost of the fact that the Manfred—Sister Olive horse Manolive, in winning the 1938 V.A.T.C. Eclipse Stakes, at Caulfield, ran the mile and a quarter in 2.2.

The cable also credited the Double Remove filly All Love with creating a new record for the Colonies for five furlongs in winning the Gimcrack Stakes in 584. However, the mighty Machine Gun, burdened with 11.5, won the Randolph Handicap at Riccarton in 1904 in 58! He beat Tessera by a neck, giving her 52lb. Last November the Safari colt Enrich equalled this record when he beat Atreus by a head in the Pioneer Handicap.

However, Beau Vite has done much to put New Zealand in the limelight this season. He has certainly created one new record for the Colonies, winning the Metropolitan Handicap in 2.42 for the 13 furlongs, and he ran a Randwick record in his two other races. He has wiped out the ignominy of his defeats in the Derbies in Australia last season and has swelled his winning account by about £6000 this month.
