U-BOATS MUST AGAIN BE **SMASHED**

Hard Work For The Navy As Winter Brings Out Nazi **Flotillas**

(British Official Wireless.) (Received October 11, 7.30 p.m.)

RUGBY, Oct. 10. The renewal of the U-boat campaign on British shipping would entail hard work by the Navy and the Merchant Navy this winter, according to a commentator making a broadcast

"We broke the first German effort to wreck our sea-borne trade last autumn," he said. "We smashed it to smithereens and it has taken them months to rebuild the strength of their submarine flotillas.

"The **rec**ent figures of merchant shipping losses are all too clear proof that the Nazi shippards have turned out large numbers of new boats and that, despite the difficulties of hasty training, new crews of Germans have been able to man these craft. But we must not exaggerate their feat; they have not, for example, built the hundreds and hundreds of new submarines with which Berlin threatened us.

"It is perhaps rash to guess the exact number they have been able to build, but, knowing something of the German shipbuilding capacity, I doubt if they have yet completed one hundred.

"One hundred new U-boats sounds a bit formidable, but the Germans have had to start again from scratch as far as numbers of ships are con-

"Our losses have not been serious Even now the weekly average of tonnage sunk is far below the worst that the Kaiser's U-boats achieved years ago, but it is higher than last spring and the navy has to start its work of annihilation all over again. Recent Destruction

"We know by the Admiralty statement a few days ago that seven U-boats have been destroyed in the last few weeks; we know, too, that others have been damaged. Now, a damaged submarine is like a damaged aeroplane, it may or may not get back to its base, but even if it does it may be from six to sixteen weeks before it is serviceable again.

NAZI LONG-RANGE GUNS SET OUT IN BOAT TO R.A.F. Bombers Race Across

Channel In Raid At Dusk

(United Press Association-Copyright.) (Received October 12, 1.15 a.m.) LONDON, Oct. 11.

Strong forces of R.A.F. bombers last night inflicted terrific punishment on a battery of four long-range guns beside the Cap Gris Nez lighthouse after it had shelled the Dover area for half an hour at dusk. Cliff watchers saw a giant tongue of flame through the mist enshrouding the French shore and a shell burst with a terrific explosion. Several seconds later another followed, after which two guns were fired simultaneously, then four together. After half an hour's sporadic firing the bombers roared

across the coast through a south-westerly gale. Explosions were heard from Dover and sheets of orange flame slashed the darkening sky as the raiders launched what appeared to be an avalanche of bombs on the emplacements. The raiders then widened the area of their attack and

turned against Calais, where scores of bombs burst. Flaming onions" poured through the darkness and dozens of starshells and searchlights lit up the sky.







READY AND WAITING.—Two of the side gunners of a Sunderland flying boat. In these machines there are other guns in the rear turret and also in the nest.









The approximate calculation (assuming an absence of wind) is given in the diagram. On the right is shown a dive bomber making a steep dive on the target. In this method of bombing the pilot dives the machine directly at the target, releases his bombs, and pulls away.



THE COASTAL PATROL.—Day and night the coasts of Britain are patrolled by squadrons of bombers of the coastal command. These machines are Avro Ansons, comparatively slow machines, which have nevertheless exceeded all expectations, and which already have a good bag of submarines and enemy fighters to their credit.

THE BOMB AIMER.—In some of the light bombers the bomb aimer lies on the floor to operate his bomb sight. Calculations of height, speed, windage, etc., are recorded on the bomb sight, and the moment at which to release the bombs is thus determined.



BOMBS AWAY!—Here the camera in a Royal Air Force machine has caught the bombs in mid-air as they hurtle towards the target in an enemy-occupied aerodrome. There is ample evidence that this raid was not the first. Many filled-in bomb craters can be seen on the tarmac, and near the middle of the picture a group of buildings is blazing. Two big German bombers can also be seen on the ground.



THE STING IS IN THE TAIL.—The power-driven gun turrets used in the British bombers are mechanical masterpieces, and enable the rear gunners to obtain a wider field of fire than that obtained by the German gunners.

ST. PAUL'S AGAIN IN PERIL

Perhaps it was inevitable, but the bombing of St. Paul's Cathedral, coming so soon after the epic story of Lieutenant R. Davies and his men, will move every Briton to a sense of anger against the barbarity of the German attack.

It is impossible to take a calmly detached view of things like this. It is useless to explain away the loss of, for instance, the priceless Richmond mosaics, with the thought that St. Paul's is London's greatest landmark—and target. The imagination must inevitably draw a parallel between the bombing of Sir Christopher Wren's masterpiece and the destruction of the treasures of Greece and Rome by men incapable of appreciating their loveliness.

Before 1914 there was a common delusion to the effect that men calling themselves civilised had reached a stage of cultural development in which they no longer found pleasure in destroying for the sake of destroying. That hopeful idea vanished with the burning of Louvain during the German invasion of Belgium, after which the deliberate shelling of Rheims Cathedral served only to emphasise the significance of the Imperial Command to the German armies to "go forth like Huns." And the actions of German airmen in the present conflict carry on the tradition of ruthlessness.

There seems to be a curiously primitive strain in the German mentality which leads to these manifestations of barbarism. There is no other explanation of their actions in time of war. It was a resurgence of that Prussianism which, after the formation of the German Empire in 1871, virtually obliterated the kindly spirit of the peoples of Germany outside Prussia, and which Europe believed to have been destroyed in 1918. Nazism is Prussianism in a new form, and it is a worthy successor.

There is comfort to-day in the fact that the damage to St. Paul's does not amount to anything like complete destruction. The High Altar has gone; pictures and mosaics have been ruined; and the structure itself has suffered heavily. But the great dome still looms over London from the top of Ludgate Hill, and St. Paul's Cathedral still stands as one of the Empire's greatest possessions.

RUMANIAN OIL FOR THE AXIS

That the Axis is in desperate need of oil has been common knowledge ever since it became plain that the British blockade of Germany and Italy was working much more efficiently than the enemy counter-blockade of Great Britain. Further, the German occupation of the Rumanian oilfields may be taken as an admission that Germany's hopes of drawing to an unlimited extent on the inexhaustible oil supplies of Russia have not materialised.

But if the war-engine of Nazism and Fascism requires oil, another complicated piece of machinery—transport—is also giving trouble. A cablegram published yesterday disclosed that even if Germany obtains all of the limited available output of the Rumanian oilfields, she will have difficulty in getting it to Germany.

Again, such oil as is available in Rumania, valuable as it is, will not meet the situation by a long way. The total oil consumption of Germany, Italy, and the occupied countries is enormous, and the possibility of a breakdown involving the greater part of Europe must be exercising the mind of Herr Hitler to an alarming degree.

MAORIS AND THE LIQUOR TRAFFIC

The drastic series of suggested reforms contained in reports from Native Church Board meetings to the Waiapu Diocesan Synod at Napier may or may not offer a solution to a serious problem.

It is as well to remember, however, that the question of drink, in regard to its effects on the Maori race, is only one aspect of a subject which has wide ramifications and concerns the restoration to the Maori of something of the status which he held before the impact of European civilisation changed the whole trend of his life and history. After all, drink was only one of the "blessings" of civilisation which Europe has bestowed on the Polynesian. The average Maori to-day is too Europeanised to relinquish things to which he is accustomed unless something is given to replace them, and a genuine effort on the part of the pakeha to understand the Maori would do more than any number of legal restrictions.

CLAUSES EXPLAINED

WELLINGTON, Oct. 11.

The removal of anomalies in the existing taxation law is the main purpose of the Finance Bill No. 3, which was introduced in the House of Representatives to-day. Provision is made to give temporary relief from income tax to proprietary companies establishing new industries in the interests of New Zealand. The Minister of Finance is empowered to grant relief for any period up to 10 years from the date of incorporation.

Steps have been taken by another steps have been taken by another clause to correct a mistake in the schedule to the Land and Income fax Amendment Act passed earlier in the year. It was explained by the Hon. W. Nash, that companies and public authorities with incomes of over £6,600 were inadvertently being assessed at 1/150 too much on £6,600 itself, while the extra rate was really meant to apply to income in excess of that sum. He added that no money had been collected under the erroneous clause.

Social Security

Another clause is designed to adjust the liability for social security charge and national security tax in cases of persons paying on other than salary or wages since 1931. The object is to prevent these persons from having to pay for a year longer than those paying on salary or wages.

Companies with preference shares at a fixed rate of dividend are authorised to deduct a penny in every 10d of dividend, so as to recoup themselves for national security tax as well as social security charge. They were authorised in 1939 to take off 1d in every 1/8, but the introduction of the national security tax has necessitated this change.

BRITISH CHILDREN Mr Fraser Outlines

Scheme The Prime Minister (the Rt. Hon. P. Fraser) announces that as from Monday next, November 14, children separated from their parents and evacuated from Great Britain under Government auspices, may keep in touch with their parents, at reasonable intervals, by meahs of a free cablegram f.cility.

One telegram a month, containing a pre-arranged text, may be sent by each child to its parents in Great Britain, and parents so separated may send similar telegrams to their children.

Concession by Company
This free service, which applies in all Empire countries to which children have been evacuated, is the outcome of negotiations initiated by the Chairman of Directors of Cable and Wireless, Ltd. (Sir Edward Wilshaw), and represents a very substantial concession on the part of the cable company.

An authority card was posted today by the manager of Cable and Wireless Ltd., Auckland, to each evacuated child in New Zealand (or its guardian) and the presentation of this card at any post office will entitle the holder to send without charge an appropriately worded Concession by Company

charge an appropriately worded cablegram to the parents in the Mother Country .

Appreciation Expressed. Very appreciative references to the free communication facility have been made by those responsible for the welfare of evacuated children now in the Dominion, and the service will undoubtedly help to allay the natural anxiety of parents in Great Britain for their children in this distant part of the Empire.



THE SITE OF A DIP IS MOST IMPORTANT

The best site for a sheep dip demands careful consideration. It is seldom that the bath is quite unattached from yards or buildings, but more often comprises part of the drafting layout. Sometimes it is built directly alongside the shearing shed, which is used for filling it. This method has advantages in that it saves the expense of separate yards and crush pens, the sheep are cooler just before entering the dip, and after being on the grating floor their feet will be cleaner and will foul the wash very little.

Occasionally the bath is even covered by a lean-to roof.

The following points should be taken into account before a permanent bath is built:—

A dependable water supply is essential. There should be good natural drainage. Thus, it is an advantage to have the dip built on an elevation, not only for the above reason, but because sheep yard better uphill. Soil providing a firm foundation is required, so that peaty places, which are notorious for shrinking and expanding, should be avoided.

ART OF GETTING SHEEP INTO A DIP

Anyone who has dipped sheep knows that the older members of the flock remember the bath, and have the greatest objection to going near it again. Countless schemes have been devised to outwit the sheep and get them into the fluid with a minimum of labour. Most of these work well the first year, but it seems the device has yet to be perfected that will operate successfully year after year.

One of the simplest methods is a circular pen from 12 to 16 feet in diameter fitted on a central pivot from which three gates are hung so that they can move independently and in a complete circle round the pivot. Each gate has a bolt by which it can be locked to the outer wall in certain positions.

It works as follows: As the last of the three sections is filled with sheep, the first gate is swung forward, compressing the area and forcing its contents on to the platform of the dip, thence into the fluid. The, second gate is then swung forward to deposit its sheep, and, while this is happening, the first section is refilled from the loading race. The process is a continuous one in which there is always one full pen, which helps as a decoy.







The imaginative, however, will be thankful for the monotonous repetition, which simply means that "news visibility" is poor, so that the full glory of the achievements is blurred by the smoke and flame of the hearts.

But as Mr Churchill said: "Our qualities and deeds must burn and glow through the gloom of Europe until they become the veritable beacon of its salvation."






