FREEDOM OF THE SEAS

Australia Now Able To Extend Her War Effort

(British Official Wireless.) (Received October 15, 7.45 p.m.) RUGBY, Oct. 14.

President Roosevelt's broadcast on Saturday, following closely on the recent declarations of his Presidential opponent, Mr Wendell Willkie, has given what the Press here feels is authentic notice in unmistakable terms of where the United States stands on the great moral issues which took Britain into the war against Hitlerism and where the American people will continue to stand until all danger to the ideals of freedom, justice, and neighbourliness among nations is over-

The London "Daily Telegraph" hails the speech as the most forth-right answer bet given to the Axis-Japanese pact, saying: "The President has re-stated his country's intentions with a new emphasis. He tentions with a new emphasis. He has placed the widest possible inter-pretation upon its policy of defend-ing the Western Hemisphere against acts of aggression, reminding all whom it may concern that not merely the territories of the American continent and its adjacent islands are guaranteed by that policy, but also the 'peaceful use of the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans'—a traditional principle of American diplomacy which has been ignored before with

principle of American diplomacy which has been ignored before with disastrous results to the challenger. "With this, President Roosevelt combines a perfectly clear assurance upon a matter which more nearly concerns Britain and those peoples who in any way are able to act with her as combatants. 'No combination of dictator countries of Europe and Asia,' said Mr Roosevelt, 'will prevent the help we are giving to almost the last free people fighting to hold them at bay.' That is as plain as words can make it."

No Intimidation "The Times" says: "If the pact with Japan is designed to intimidate America its failure has been disastrous. The President's broadcast has left no doubt where the United States stands and how it regards the pact. On the eve of a bitterly contested election the President could not have spoken as he did in this vigorous and uncompromising provigorous and uncompromising pro-nouncement if he had not been speaking for the great majority of

The same point is made by the "Daily Herald," which writes: "Whoever wins, the pledge to help Britain stands. Mr Willkie sees his duty as clearly as Mr Roosevelt."

"SHREWD MOVE" Axis Turns Pincers Towards Britain's Eastern Stronghold MR C. G. E. HARKER

Discussing the Balkan thrust "The Times" says: "Hitler has been compelled to recognise that his blitzkrieg against Britain is yielding no prospects of victory and none of those quick and dramatic results necessary for his prestige at home and abroad. Spain, in spite of the blandishments lavished on Senor Suner, has not committed herself, as far as can be divined, to departure from her watchful attitude



LONDON, Oct. 14. The morale of Britons has been unshaken by the prolonged bombardment. This was proved by a tour of ports and holiday towns on the south-east coast. The civilian spirit is unbroken and life is as near to normal as the actual dropping of bombs permits. Dover is as busy and cheerful as any town in England.

The seaside populations have dwindled, but the evacuation is nowhere wholesale. Children still play in the streets and women go shopping even after the raid warnings.

Ramsgate has changed its way of life more than the other towns; the women and children, remembering the terrific onslaught of August 14, spend many hours a day and most of the night from 60 to 90 feet underground.

Medical Examinations

CUSTOM OF THE LAST WAR

Regulation Rate

Following what is stated to have been the custom in the last war, all men drawn in the recent ballot are men drawn in the recent ballot are being paid 7/-, the regulation day's pay for a soldier, for attending medical examinations, says the "New Zealand Herald." This applies to all men examined since October 7, including volunteers who had not then completed their examinations and still had to come before a medical board.

If a man is classified as permanently unfit, he receives only one payment: but it is stated that if he is classified as temporarily unfit, leach additional examination held to check whether his unfitness has

ently unfit, he receives only one payment; but it is stated that if he is classified as temporarily unfit, each additional examination held to check whether his unfitness has been removed, will also be paid for at the rate of 7/- for any day or portion of a day he is away from his home.

Men passed as fit at the initial examination will be paid a further 7/- upon attending for X-ray examination. Each fit man will thus cost 14/-, while the others will be a charge on State funds according to the structure of the



Alloys Are Essential In Days Of Mechanised Warfare

Discussing the success of the British blockade in the first year of the war, the British Minister of Economic Warfare (Dr. Dalton) remarked that both Germany and Italy were seriously deficient in such key commodities as oil, alloys for hardening steel, rubber, lead, copper, and textiles, without which it was impossible to carry on a modern war.

One of the romances of the metallurgical industry in comparatively recent times has been the progress in the making of special hard alloys by the addition of various metals to crude steel. In the manufacture of weapons of war such alloys are essential for the production of the high-quality metals needed.

There are seven key metals which are used for toughening steel; manganese, chromium, tungsten, nickel, molybdenum, cobalt, and vanadium.

Perhaps the most common of Greece also produces some. Chrome these is manganese. Sir Robert which the busy German economic agents in the south-east of Europe from seven to 20 per cent. of manganese for the manufacture of ore-crushing machinery. Its strength relates G. S. TERRITORIAL BALLOTS

Reports giving an impression that the Government is contemplating a second territorial ballot to follow closely on the heels of that of October 2 have been contradicted. The ballot is on the way, but as a result of the statement of the Director of National Service, business and industrial organisations throughout the Dominion will be reassured by the knowledge that the second ballot, which must inevitably cause a certain amount of temporary disorganisation, has not to be faced immediately.

Anomalies in the drawing of the first ballot have caused a good deal of criticism, but it would be unfortunate if this criticism were to degenerate into anything in the nature of condemnation of the balloting system as it is known in New Zealand.

Until the war of 1914-1918, the idea of any form of conscription was anathema to British people the world over. Continental nations had long been used to universal conscription, even in peace time, but for centuries Britons, accustomed to regard the Navy as their first line of defence, looked upon conscript armies as something incompatible with democracy. Britain's wars in Canada, India, the Continent, Egypt, and South Africa had all been won by comparatively small but efficient "professional" armies, and if an empire could be won and held by such armies while the Navy kept the seas, people saw no reason for regimenting the entire manpower of the nation.

But within the first two years of the first Great War it became plain that the voluntary system of recruiting would be insufficient to meet the demands of the new type of warfare. Armies were not to be counted by tens and hundreds of thousands, but by millions, and the result was conscription both in Great Britain and New Zealand.

In 1939, in the period between the Munich Agreement and the outbreak of war, Great Britain introduced a measure of peace-time conscription on a limited scale, and as soon as war became inevitable this scheme was extended to include the whole available manpower of the United Kingdom. This was a vitally necessary measure and, in its sweeping comprehensiveness, it was essentially democratic-that is, as democratic as any form of compulsion can be. But it had obvious

Men were called up according to age groups, irrespective of whether they were married or single. Those in "reserved" occupations were returned to their work, but the rest, if medically fit, were almost immediately posted to commence training. This meant serious dislocation in innumerable directions in a community already disturbed by the immediate effects of war.

New Zealand, on the other hand, has adopted a ballot scheme similar to that introduced in the last war. In the main the system can be described as the best possible in the circumstances, if only for the fact that the first call is made on the section of the population best able to meet it. Further, the plan of a period of intensive training for home defence on lines which will permit the reinforcing of the New Zealand Expeditionary Forces overseas if such a step becomes necessary is essentially sound.

Conscription, at any time, is a disagreeable necessity, but New Zealand is doing her best to make it a scientific process.

MR NOEL COWARD'S MISSION

Propaganda in various forms is playing an increasing part in the war. There is a distinction, however, between propaganda as it is known in totalitarian countries and the dissemination of reliable information to people who are accustomed to freedom in the formation of their convictions.

The lecture tour of Australia by Mr Noel Coward, in

which he will speak on the war effort of Great Britain, may be described as propaganda of the very best kind. Mr Coward is a genius of a type which only England could produce. As a playwright, a light composer, and an actor, he is a dominating figure on the British stage, and his masterpiece, "Cavalcade, alone gives him authority to speak on the work and life of the British people in the present struggle. Any endeavour to arrange a tour of the Dominion for Mr Coward would be fully supported by New Zealanders.

Former Superintendent Of Telegraphs

The death has occurred of Mr F. G. Gannaway, who retired from the position of superintendent of telegraphs in Auckland 20 years ago. Mr Gannaway, who was born in Southampton, England, in 1856, arrived in Wellington with his parents two years later and joined the Telegraph Department there in 1872. 


